MBMBaM 460: Dr. Praetorium's Fudge-a-matorium

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Intro(Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music plays]

Justin: Hello, 'everyboby', and welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldewest brother, Justin McElroy!

Travis: I'm your middewest brother, Travis McElroy!

Griffin: And my name is Griffin McElroy, the youngest of the three brothers.

Travis: The lips, the teeth, the tip of the tongue.

Griffin: The lips. The 'teeps of the tee'.

Travis: I'm so excited to be here, 'cause I've been dying to ask somebody a question about Game of Thrones. And I think you guys— you guys watched it, right?

Griffin: Um...

Justin: Oh, yeah.

Griffin: Hmm. I actually... You know I'm very vocal on Facebook about how I don't watch it, because of uh, you know. I don't go so much for fantasy, except for the fantasies of babes I have when I um, lift so much weights at the gym, I fall asleep.

Justin: You could ask me any question, Travis, and the answer is gonna be, "We the fans have had enough."

Griffin: Mm.

Travis: Okay. Well, I stopped watching about... I think it was like halfway through season three.

Griffin: Oh.

Justin: That's two and a half seasons too much, according to we the fans.

Travis: So I need you to catch me up on what happened, but I don't want you to spoil anything for anybody who is going to watch it. So if you could just get me from about the middle of season three to the end of the series without spoiling anything for the people at home, that would be fine.

Griffin: Right. Just sort of broad strokes, like in the general...

Travis: Yeah, just broad-stroke it for me.

Griffin: Okay. Well, I'll tell you this much, Trav.

Travis: Uh-huh?

Griffin: For a Song of Ice and Fire, there sure wasn't very much singing being done.

Travis: Okay. That's one.

Griffin: There was— I—

Travis: Let me write that— slow down. I have to write it down.

Griffin: There were, like, 80 episodes or something in this piece of shit. And as far as I can remember, there was only like one scene with singing in it. So George, don't call it what you're gonna call it.

Travis: I would disagree with you there, 'cause he didn't call it Songs of Ice and Fire. You said there was one scene with singing...

Griffin: Ah, fuck, you're right! Fuck, you got me!

Justin: All right, idiots. Here's the thing.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Ed Sheeran. In it.

Griffin: And he didn't sing. Which is, like, his whole thing.

Justin: Drummer from Coldplay. In it.

Travis: He was in it?

Justin: Sigur Ros. From Friends?

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: He's in it.

Travis: Ross from Friends is in it?

Justin: Sigur Ros from Friends.

Griffin: Are these problems for you, Justin? I've sort of lost the plot on

where your-

Justin: Chris Stapleton is a country singer. He in it.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: Is that making you mad, though?

Griffin: Or do you not want that?

Justin: Aaron Rodgers, in it.

Griffin: So we the fans, do we like that or do we not like that? Or where

do...

Justin: We the fans are fed up, and we've had enough. This is my petition that I— it's an audio petition now several hundred episodes in the making. It is an audio petition that I am submitting for Game of Thrones.

Travis: To what?

Justin: Do it again.

Griffin: To do the whole show again?

Justin: Do it again.

Travis: Like a reboot, or just start all over?

Justin: Yes. Yes, start all over with a fresh take. Some of the things will

be the same. The cool shit.

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Okay. So keep the good— the cool stuff.

Justin: If you remember— if you remember, during my extensive, extensive uh, sardonic recap podcast, Lame of Thrones, and then in every episode, in the— I called it the roundup. At the end of every episode, I'd be like, "Okay. There was one fucking cool shit thing."

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Those are the things that should remain the same. All other things should change.

Griffin: Yeah. There were like three times throughout the series where a dude's skull just got fully fuckin' crushed by a big man's hands.

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: So supercut that shit together. That's the series for...

Justin: Keep all the skull crushing.

Travis: Now, Justin, as I said earlier, I've been out of touch with the fans for a while now.

Justin: Yeah. We the fans missed you, by the way.

Travis: Oh, I'll come back. Is it that you, the fans, want it to be sillier or...

Justin: Hell yeah. And fuckin' sexier and more ads.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [laughing] That's the main fucking problem. I can't even get up to use the shitter 'cause this shit doesn't take a break!

Travis: Oh, I thought you meant like native advertising, like—

Justin: No! Obviously!

Travis: "Oh, I love these dragons as much as I love Flamin' Hot Cheetos."

Griffin: They for sure already have the native advertising thing covered in real-ass Game of Thrones, so I'll delete that joke. It's circle gets the square. It's a little too on the nose for my taste.

Justin: What do you mean?

Griffin: You know, there—

Travis: There's a scene in Game of Thrones where they're driving a Ford truck across the, like, icy wasteland?

Griffin: Well, no, just like... you know, the Starbucks cup was very funny.

Justin: It wasn't from Starbucks. We the fans thought it was from Starbucks, and then we the fans learned it was from a local coffee shop and also, my queen Dany doesn't drink it. She drinks an herbal tea. She gets to be in the reboot by doing more cool shit. And she didn't have no powers. [laughs]

Travis: You wanted her to have some powers?

Justin: She couldn't get burned up by dragons and she had dragons and that's good.

Griffin: Yeah, badass.

Justin: But she's gonna have powers in the new one.

Griffin: Badass. Which ones? Badass, dude.

Justin: Uh, fucking lasers...

Griffin: Fuck yeah.

Travis: Woah.

Justin: ...invis, psychic blasts...

Travis: Nice.

Justin: ...plasma blades...

Travis: Yes.

Justin: All of 'em, dude. She's got all the powers and she—

Travis: Adamantium claws?

Justin: Yeah. She can give the powers to other people. Healing factor.

Griffin: Fuck yeah. All right. Let's put some ink on the fucking page now, okay, because episode one, these two, brother, sister, they're boinkin' big time on top of the tower.

Travis: I would change that, by the way. I would make them not related.

Justin: Yeah, that shit nasty. Get that shit right out.

Travis: I would just, as a small note, I think it would be a lot more approachable if they were just, like, friends who were boning.

Justin: It was so fucking gross that the people— and so lazy and sloppy that the people went done and wrote the book, George I think the guy's name is, he didn't even realize that the same people he had screwing when the little boy went to the window to enjoy it, the same people he had screwing were also the brother and sister from earlier. Are you kidding me, George?

Travis: Yeah. That was just sloppy writing.

Justin: And my sympathy's to the creators of the TV show, 'cause they had to abide by that garbage and it's, like, so embarrassing.

Travis: I would also, if I were gonna rewrite the show, along with making it sillier, I would make all of the sex that happens in it way more uh, consensual.

Griffin: Yeah. For sure. That's good. That's so fucking badass. That part's badass. So they're boinkin' on this tower, right? And they're boinking and they're not related. They're just, like, friends. But they shouldn't be boinking, because they have other things going on.

Travis: They're late for a dinner date, and they're boinking, and people are waiting for them, 'cause they were supposed to meet another couple there.

Griffin: Exactly, exactly, exactly.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: So the boy grappling hooks up the tower...

Travis: Zip!

Griffin: ...and gets up in the window and is enjoying it.

Travis: "Woah!"

Griffin: And he's like, "Cool! Cool, cool! I'm a boy. I'm a little boy. I've never seen this."

And then um, one of the couple goes over and kicks the boy so hard, he goes flying out of the tower.

Travis: Keep that. Keep that, for sure.

Griffin: And for that scene, we're actually gonna just use the 300 kick.

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: The kick that they do in 300. So we'll just literally take that footage and...

Justin: Every character— in the first episode, every character is given a coin.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: And they can use the coin eight times to do— [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [laughing] — to do a 300 kick.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: And they get no more.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Well...

Justin: [laughing] They have to make those eight kicks last for the entirety of the series. And they can—

Travis: Can they trade them to each other for goods and services?

Justin: They can trade them to each other, like in John Wick. They can trade—
[all laughing]

Justin: If you use up all your Spartan kicks, maybe you can babysit for your nephew and he'll give you one of his Spartan kicks. But those are the rules.

Travis: I have one other small change I would make.

Griffin: Well, just let me— can I— just— just— the boy goes falling, and then you're like, "Oh, no. He's dead." But then he comes up and he's on the roof of the DeLorean. Pretty badass.

Travis: Oh, I see.

Justin: I love that. I love that.

Griffin: Fuck yeah.

Travis: I was gonna say Batman, but maybe Batman's driving the DeLorean.

Justin: Batman is driving the DeLorean.

Griffin: Yeah, with my queen. With my queen and our queen, the fans' queen, uh, 'Danyeris... Turgen'.

Travis: Yes. And also, I don't know, maybe Captain America's there? Maybe...

Griffin: Stop it. Now you're making jokes. Now you're making jokes at me.

Travis: Okay. Let's just go back to where Batman was driving the DeLorean, and he pulls up and Bran, I think that was the name of the kid, Bran Flakes opens the door of the DeLorean.

Griffin: Fuck yeah.

Travis: But this time, he doesn't hit what's-his-face in the face. Like, he just says, "Hey. You accidentally kicked me off the tower. I could have died."

Griffin: Yeah. "I was just enjoying—"

Travis: And they're like, "Oh, God. I'm so sorry."

Griffin: "I'm so sorry. You know how I get when I boink."

Travis: Yeah. When I boink, I'm just flailing everywhere, legs akimbo.

Justin: They waited a really long time to put dragons in it. So I'm gonna have dragons in it from the beginning, except they can talk and use ice lances.

Travis: Ooh! Yeah.

Griffin: Cool.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: I think there's only like three dragons.

Griffin: [blows raspberry]

Travis: I would make there be like, 500, 600, maybe more?

Justin: 500, 600 dragons, and they reproduce at an uncontrollable rate.

Travis: Yes!

Justin: All the dragons are always pregnant in this one.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: They have to be hunted to keep the population down.

Justin: That's right.

Griffin: And I'd like to introduce a thing where in the big throne room in The Red Keep, which we're gonna find a way cooler name for, something like Blood Castle Storm Mountain...

Justin: Battlegeddon.

Travis: Oh, yeah.

Griffin: Battlege— what?

Justin: Battlegeddon.

Griffin: Battlegeddon is the name—

Justin: Battlegeddon.

Griffin: — is the name of the castle? The castle's called—

Justin: Battlegeddon.

Griffin: Okay. The castle's called Battlegeddon and then in the throne room, there's gonna be, like, 16 thrones. And we'll have the cool— I guess we'll have the sword one, but that shits played, but they'll be on caster

wheels and the king, whatever, gets to like, push them, and whoever wants to fight him can, like, push the— and then if your throne gets knocked over or falls down the stairs, then it's out.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Oh, I like that.

Justin: I love that.

Travis: And maybe we make the throne a little more comfortable?

Griffin: There would be a plush throne, for sensitive bottoms.

Justin: Yeah. I think—

Travis: I'd also— and this is a little note, but I'd have the snake man beat the big rock man in that one fight. I didn't like that the snake man lost to the big rock man.

Griffin: But the Trav, his head got crushed in such a cool way. That's the one badass thing about this fucking show, dude!

Travis: Ah, shit, you're right.

Justin: The one fucking cool thing that we will have.

Travis: Oh, no, you're right.

Justin: This one's got 16 thrones, but at the beginning, there's 17 people. And then after every round, they remove one of the thrones.

Griffin: That's a main mechanic, yeah. And again, if you fall down the stairs, then you are out.

Justin: Sigur Ros plays, and then eventually they stop playing. It can take anywhere from a few minutes to a few hours. But when they stop playing,

everybody tries to get into a throne. And then they— whoever doesn't have one is eliminated by blood.

Travis: Yes. I love this.

Justin: It's good, right?

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: It's unlike— I guess we the people and we the fans need uh, if HBO would just sign off on it, or respond to our emails and tweets and uh, Tumblrs and stuff.

Travis: Sorry. One more tiny note. Um, I was gonna say, "More wolves," but what if they're all wolves?

Justin: What if they all have the abil— I thought—

Griffin: Ugh. There's a separate coin. There's a second coin.

Justin: There's a second coin. Yes. There's a second coin that allows you to transform into a werewolf 17 times.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: And that's all you get for the whole TV show.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: So don't burn one [laughs] as a joke, unless it's gonna be hysterical.

Travis: Yeah. If it's a really good joke, maybe.

Justin: If it's so funny.

Travis: Also, I would like to be a character in it. I would not like to play a character in it. Let me be clear. I, Travis McElroy, would like to be a character in it.

Justin: Joe Manganiello plays Travis McElroy in Game of Thrones 2: They Back.

Griffin: I wanna make a cameo. I wouldn't mind squashing Ed Sheeran's melon.

Justin: Hey, listen to this. Hey, listen to this. Here's your poster, right here. Here's the poster. There's 500 to 600 dragons. Ed Sheeran, Sigur Ros, Aaron Rodgers all in armor, loving it. The one guy is beating the other guy. But on the other side of the poster? It goes the way it did originally.

So [laughing] both of those are depicted...

Travis: So it's just side-by-side?

Justin: In the series, both outcomes are depicted.

Travis: Cool.

Justin: Choose your own adventure.

Travis: It's a little bit for everyone!

Justin: Yeah. Both of 'em happen in it and they all win.

Griffin: Shit.

Travis: Yes!

Griffin: Put it in the hole.

Justin: It's good, right? "Let's the games begin," dot, dot, dot, dot, dot, dot, dot, dot... again.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Fuck.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: It's back.

Griffin: Let's do a question!

Justin: Yeah. I'd love that. Thank you, Griffin. I'm sorry, I got a little

lost.

"I'm in the doctor's office waiting room. They just called my name, but someone else went up and went back." Aw, man! I can't imagine that. "Now it's been 20 minutes, and I'm the only one left in the waiting room except an old woman who is parked by the nurse's door to yell at everyone who goes in before her. 'You don't look sick!' Do I go tell them that they made a mistake? What if they're just busy? How long do I wait before I become the same as this old woman? I live here now, I suppose." That's from Darned in Denver.

Travis: [laughs] This feels like a piece of paper you find crammed between two stones in the doctor's office.

Griffin: Yeah. Uh...

Justin: That's so hard, because... it's really hard living in a society. We can all accept that. It's a common theme of our program. But it's especially hard when it just... It very clearly broke down on everyone.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: We can all agree that it broke down. And I don't know how you get out of that. It's hard to admit to another person in the machine, like, "Hey. The machine's broke and there's no recompense for that. There's no way out of it."

Travis: This fear that I will infer here that you are feeling, because I have felt this many times, this fear of like walking up and saying, "Oh, I think there's been a mistake. I think I was supposed..."

And they're like, "No. There's no mistake. You'll be back soon, just sit back down."

Justin: That's 100 percent what— there's no doubt in my mind that is 100 percent verbatim, tone and everything, they would sound like my brother. That's how sure I am that is the exact response you would get.

Travis: "We haven't made a mistake. Just sit down. We're gonna call you in a minute."

And you're like, "Oh, no. I have to go."

Justin: 'Cause it's the doctor, right? If the doctor's like, "Uh, we just let anybody back there, no matter what name we call, whatever, it's all bullshit," like, the next— like, what else are they making up? Right? What else are they just, like, pulling out of their asses?

Travis: 'Cause you would think that if they called your name, if it was like, you know, "Dan," and somebody else went back and they weren't Dan, that that mistake would be found out pretty quickly!

Justin: Are they getting all your fungus medicine?

Travis: Oh, no.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: What if there's none left for you?

Travis: Oh, no.

Griffin: Because they're eating it for fuel.

Justin: [laughs] Eating all your fungus medicine and smuggling it out in their bellies.

Griffin: Now, let me say this—

Travis: The other side of this too, is also bonkers, that if someone calls "Dan," and someone was like, "Well, I'm Jim, but yeah, you know what? I'm going."

Justin: "I'm Jim, but I'm in a hurry. I'm Jim in a hurry."

Griffin: Uh, flip side, there are worse places to live now. There are worse places to live.

Justin: That's true.

Griffin: If you have a whoopsie-uh-oh, you are very close to somebody who can patch that right up for you, I hope.

Travis: And all the Highlights magazines you could want.

Griffin: All the Highlights you can read. There's the goldfish probably, and then there's— you have all those beads that you can push around on the little pipes. Gosh, those are freaking fun.

Justin: The hospital Syd works at has killer bacon.

Travis: Yeah. And apparently, you have a new friend and a, sounds like, very judgmental old woman.

Griffin: Yeah, let's get there. Let's get there. Let's get to her.

Justin: Okay. What is she doing?

Travis: Yeah, we haven't even touched on that. "You don't look sick."

Griffin: That sucks.

Travis: Well, it might be a compliment.

Griffin: Oh!

Travis: It might be like, "Hey. I want you to know, you probably feel really bad right now, and thank God you came in to take care of yourself. Listen, I appreciate it, and I'm sure all your loved ones appreciate it. I want you to know, in case you were worried about it, you don't look sick."

Justin: "Don't look sick. You're not showin' it."

Travis: "You look great. You look great. I hope you get better. 'Cause I understand that sometimes illness is invisible, and I'm glad you've taken care of yourself."

This old woman is great, I've decided.

Griffin: Yeah, she's good, I've d— yeah, I'm with Trav. This one kicks ass.

Justin: You think that maybe she was a bad egg, maybe, for a little bit. When you originally thought about it wrong, and you think that maybe she was kind of a bad egg.

Travis: Yeah. Like the pigeon lady in Home Alone 2.

Justin: You can't just start talking about Home Alone.

Griffin: You know where that—

Travis: But I'm just saying, like when you first— 'cause Kevin first sees her and he's like, "Oh, no. She's a bad 'un." But then by the end, it's like, "Oh, no. She's actually very sweet."

Griffin: Right. At the end, when she kills two men by throwing bird seed at them.

Um, how about a question from Yahoo?

Justin: I'd love that, Griff.

Griffin: Here's one sent in by Graham Roebuck. Thanks, Graham. It's anony— no, I'm sorry, it's Yahoo Answers user Sebastian. Sebastian uh, asks, "How to make boiled eggs smell bad quickly for school?"

Travis: Huh.

Justin: Woah.

Griffin: "I have to take care of a boiled egg for a week, and I broke it. So now I'm trying to make another one, and it needs to smell bad, so it's more believable."

Travis: Why?

Griffin: For school.

Travis: No, I understand.

Justin: For school.

Travis: But is the question asker saying, "Because I've had it for a week, it should smell like a week-old boiled egg?"

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: Yes, Trav.

Travis: Okay. Okay.

Justin: Yes, Travis.

Travis: I just wanted to make sure that that is—

Justin: I didn't even think that part was particularly complex or nuanced.

Griffin: So...

Travis: But that would imply that this question asker is afraid that when they turn in this fake boiled egg, this faux boiled egg, that the teacher is going to smell it.

Justin: Smell it. Yeah, your teacher's going to get that egg and be like, "Oh, that's fine. You can put it in the trash. Good work keeping it not cracked."

Griffin: Unless...

Justin: Unless...

Griffin: Unless the teacher is a nasty.

Travis: Oh!

Griffin: "Give me that stink. Let me see—"

Travis: I didn't even think about that.

Griffin: "Did you name your son?"

"Yeah, it's Kenneth."

"Give me that stink, Kenneth."

Justin: "Give me that stinky egg."

Griffin: "This one doesn't stink at all! No points!"

Travis: You know, now that Griffin said it, I cannot think of another reason that a teacher would think assigning you to take care of an egg for a week is anything.

Griffin: Yeah, you could bury that shit in a hole in your yard, and then dig him up one week later. Here he is, safe and sound, probably.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: I had to do it.

Travis: Yes, but what did it prove, Justin?

Justin: It proved that I was ready to be a father.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: It is not— can I say, that is the object of the lesson, right? "It's hard to be a parent. Here's an egg to take care of. Can you imagine how hard this would be?" One of the— two things is gonna happen.

One is, the kid's gonna do a pretty good job, and be like, "I'm ready to be a dad. I'm a very responsible 15 year old. That egg looks beautiful. I'm ready to be a dad!"

That's one option. The other one is, it like—the other problem with this is, it is nothing like that. [laughs] It's nothing like it.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: It's nothing like it.

Travis: Because I can take an egg home, and put it in my sock drawer, grab it a week later, and turn it in. And be like, "Yeah. Took it everywhere. Took care of it." But I can't do that with Bebe!

Justin: Can't do it with them.

Griffin: Yeah. Can't do it.

Well, there's— on the inverse, you could have a kid who drops their boiled egg, and it explodes when it hits the ground, and then, you know, a few years later, somebody's like, "You ever think about having kids?"

And it's like, "Well, no, 'cause I know if I did have one, I would drop it. It would explode as soon as it hit the ground." So—

Justin: To be fair, the kid wouldn't explode. But you probably shouldn't drop 'em.

Travis: Maybe taking care of an egg is harder than taking care of a baby.

Griffin: Yep.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: There it is.

Justin: 'Cause babies can recover from a drop or two.

Travis: Yeah! I'm saying, my baby is surprisingly tougher than an egg.

Justin: There is also the problem of like, if you get really hungry while you're watching your child, it's probably not gonna occur to you to scarf it.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: You probably won't think to scarf the child.

Travis: And if you do, you face way stronger punishment than just like, an F.

Griffin: So I guess while you're handing it to 'em, do a quick burp or fart right on it.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Uh, here's what I would do. I would put it in vinegar overnight. The shell will— the acid of the vinegar is gonna brake down some of the shell. That's why we use vinegar when we're helping to color eggs, 'cause they break down some of the proteins of the shell. So put it into vinegar. It's gonna break down some of the shell, and it's gonna absorb some of that vinegar smell, and it's gonna have a real gnarly stink on it. Like, a real rough stink.

Travis: Are you really that that might go the other way, though, that when you turn it in, they're like, "Hey, I'm glad you, I guess, 'kept your baby alive,' quote unquote, but also, why your baby stink so bad?"

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: If you have a stinky egg, that's out of your control.

Travis: That's true. Take it up with the chicken, my man. I don't know what to tell you.

Justin: Yeah. Ask the chicken's stinky ass why it makes its bad eggs.

Travis: [laughs] "I'm just playing with the cards I was dealt, chief."

Justin: Yeah. "This is the chicken's ass, not mine. It's your nasty assignment, Devon!"

Travis: [laughs] "I'll see you in Fortnite later."

Justin: "Please. It's Mr. Peterson, I will see you on Fortnite later, but please. It is Mr. Peterson at school."

"Fuck off, Devon!"

Travis: "Okay. You're the boss."

Griffin: Another option is, you can rub the egg up against um, yo' mama's

feet.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: You just got scorch mode! Boom.

Justin: "About three years ago, a colleague and I created a presentation for some high school students on behalf of the college where I work. The presentation involved handing out little pieces of dark chocolate."

Travis: Nice.

Justin: "My then-boss, who had a company credit card, bought the chocolate. We ended up with a lot left over, but I kept it in my office in case we ever did the presentation again. Well, now it's 2019 and I still have a bag of chocolate in my office that realistically is never gonna be used. Neither my boss nor the person— other person involved in the project works here anymore, so no one else even knows they exists. The chocolates, when unwrapped, have a thin, dusty whiteness, to suggest they are past their prime."

Griffin: Mm, yummy!

Justin: [laughing] "I eat them occasionally. Should I stop and save them for a future use that may never come?" That's from the Cocoa Monster in Canada. Holy shit. Holy shit.

Travis: I love that when you say, "Should I stop," the reason is "to save them for some future use," and not that they're over three years old.

Griffin: That they're molting, apparently.

Travis: Like, that white dust— before anybody tweets it, I believe it's called bloom, and it's a thing that if you see it on there, it means that you're not

gonna be able to temper that chocolate. It's not gonna melt right. It's not gonna temper well. But I don't think it means that it's bad. But also...

Griffin: Squad!

Travis: [gravelly] Squad!

Justin: [guitar sounds] I wanna munch!

Griffin: Squad?

Travis: Squad!

Justin: [guitar sounds] There's hope for the Munch Squad still. I thought it was winding down, but then I remembered that, you know, it's not just about current players in the fast casual market. We got new people lining up to join, every single— well, not day. That's ridiculous.

Travis: No, that would be weird.

Griffin: That would be so shitty.

Justin: Can you imagine? Here's a quick fact. A Carl's Jr. slash Hardee's uh, western bacon cheeseburger is sold uh, every 1.13 seconds.

Travis: Oh, wow.

Justin: That's a Munch Squad quick fact for you. About once a second, they sell one of these bad boys. They did some fries about it. [laughs] You can Google it.

This isn't about them. This is about "Earl of Sandwich, a fast-casual restaurant 'frounchise.'" That was a wild way of saying that. I'll never say it again. "Franchise. Co-founded by—" [laughs, hits table]

Griffin: What?

Justin: "Co-founded by a direct descendant of the actual Earl of Sandwich."

Griffin: Oh, man, yeah! Yeah, yeah, yeah! Yeah, yeah! Yeah, yeah!

Justin: Yeah. Yeah. Yeah. Yeah.

Travis: It's in his blood!

Justin: "This restaurant— this new restaurant is a part of the more than five-acre Fast Eddy's campus on Eagle Road, which already includes a Chevron gas station, a convenience store, a car wash, and a lube shop. The entire complex is owned and operated by local entrepreneurs Steve and Tracie Eddy, who previously built and sold a chain of fuel and convenience stores in the Treasure Valley." He was a British nobleman and avid gambler who, not wanting to leave the card table to eat, asked for a serving of roast beef to be placed between two slices of bread, so he could eat with his hands. Thus, the sandwich was born in 1762.

"Some 242 years later, Lord John Montagu, the 11th Earl of Sandwich and direct descendant of the inventor of the sandwich, partnered with Robert Earl," not an earl, but Robert Earl. [laughs]

Griffin: Robert Earl of Earl of Sandwich.

Justin: "Earl, who was the founder and CEO of Planet Hollywood..."

Travis: What?

Justin: "...to reclaim and reinvent the greatest of all quick food."

So you think, for like, 242 years, everyone in this dude's fuckin' family was like, "Can we not talk about sandwiches? We did it one time. We made up a snack and that's our whole fucking thing." And then this guy's like—

Travis: Don't talk with the Lord of Cheetos.

Justin: But this guy was like— was like, "Um, maybe we're gonna go ahead and just capitalize on this, 'cause it seems to be the best thing that we got going."

Griffin: I think the play here— you open this one in Idaho, it's not very successful, but you have a claim to the yeasted throne in the sense that fuckin' you invented the sandwich! So sorry, Subway. Sorry, Quiznos. Sorry, Jimmy John. Your ass is mine now. There's no more sandwiches for you, because I made them. I made— well, my great-great-grandaddy made them. But still, that's copyright infringement, I think.

Travis: Ooh!

Griffin: Right?

Travis: Yeah, yeah, yeah!

Justin: Ooh. Yeah. Nobody else can make sandwiches. You can't call

them this anymore. Bread—bread boats. I don't know.

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: They'd find some way, wouldn't they? Subway'd be like, "We're serving 'em in between two butt cheeks. Get on over to Subway now, baby."

Justin: Do you think that when—

Griffin: "Do you eat ass? It's a \$5 a— come on. \$5 foot-ass. Get in it.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Do you think when John Montagu showed up at this chain...

Travis: I'm sorry, Lord John Montagu.

Justin: Lord John Montagu, the 11th Earl of Sandwich, showed up at this chain. He was like, "Uh-huh. Good. Good. The Earl's club. I love that. The original 1762 with roasted beef." They say roasted beef.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Fuck off. "French dip. Very good. The holiday turkey. Does this one have cornbread stuffing on it? Excellent. A delicious sandwich. You've done my family pr— wait. Wait a minute. Is that— is that a 'quinoaoa' chicken salad? A salad with, what is this, 'quinoaoa'?"

"I think it's quinoa. It's a salad. Just a regular—"

And then he just starts flipping, like, bowls of salad out on the ground. "Is this— what is over here? [whimsically] Pepperoni pizza bread? Macaronied and cheese? No! Get it all out. All of it."

Travis: "It is not betwixt two slices, I cannot eat it with my hands?"

Justin: "Chips of potatoes! Out!"

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "This salad..."

Travis: "Maybe if, perhaps, the chipped potatoes were between two slices of bread?"

Justin: "This potato salad claims to be salad, but it has no bearing!"

I'm just saying, this all looks really good, and I'm pretty hungry right now.

Travis: I did kinda like that holiday turkey with cornbread stuffing.

Griffin: Yeah, that sounds promising.

Justin: This all looks really good.

Griffin: Um, how about a Yahoo?

Justin: Yep.

Griffin: This one was sent in also by Graham Roebuck. Thank you, Graham. It's an anonymous Yahoo Answers user I'm going to call uh, 'Beberly', asks, "How can I talk my dad into letting me have a 175-gallon aguarium?"

Travis: Mm.

Griffin: I don't know how big that is. I don't know how big that is. You know how when you're a kid—

Travis: You mean Griffin?

Griffin: — you had, like, a gallon of water and you poured it into a pool or a bathtub and it was fucking nothing? Like, I don't know how big 175 gallons is.

Justin: Can you guys— can we Google it?

Travis: Well, I don't want to do that.

Justin: It feels like that's important. Oh, you don't want to do that. Okay.

Travis: Because here's the thing.

[keyboard typing]

Travis: Griffin's point, if I picture 175 gallon jugs of water, I would look at

it and be like, "Wow. That's a lot of water." Right? But I—

Justin: Right.

Travis: I do have a strong suspicion...

Griffin: [starts laughing]

Travis: ...that if you showed me one container that could contain 175

gallons...

Griffin: Whoo. [blows raspberry]

Travis: ... I would be like, that's not nearly as big as I thought it would be.

Griffin: I'll tell ya, boys. I'll tell ya. 175 liquid gallons is uh, 23.394 cubic

feet. Now, how fucking big is that?

Travis: I don't know how big that is.

Griffin: I don't know how big that is.

Justin: Okay. I just Googled it. It's 100 percent, 100-percent coffin-sized.

Exactly, on-the-nose, this is coffin-sized.

Travis: Man, it even autofilled. As I typed it out in Google, I typed 175

space G and it was like "-allon fish tank."

Griffin: Uh, so this is a big— well, it depends— I've seen bigger fish tanks. At the aquarium, they have the one that's just like, bigger than my freaking house, man.

Justin: Not for home use, you haven't. You have not seen one for home use that's bigger than this bad boy.

Griffin: I guess it's a pretty big one.

Travis: This feels like something you would need to have at a restaurant, so kids could look at it while you waited for your chair.

Griffin: So that's it. Or alternatively, this is how— we're trying to convince the dad, right? We're trying to get Dad on board.

Justin: Yes. Right.

Griffin: So to get Daddy on board, you can say, "Yeah, it's a big fish tank, but we keep fresh seafood in there, and then you, every day, can be like, 'That one.' Every day."

Justin: "That one. I'll eat this one."

Travis: Also, think of how versatile it is. Yes, yes, you can put fish in it. Of course. Yes, you could also perhaps put a reptile in there, maybe even an amphibian. But you could also store your clothes in it. You could keep all your loose change in it. Travis: That's pretty good.

Justin: Your dad says he wants to— he won't get you a 175-gallon tank. "Okay, dad. You win this one. Will you get me a 10-gallon tank?"

Travis: Ooh.

Justin: "Well, yeah. Of course. It's no problem."

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Then, all of a sudden, you've got 10— no, wait. You've got 17 and a half 10-gallon fish tanks, and your dad feels like an asshole. 'Cause he's paying for all these, like, pumps and decorations and things. He could've saved a lot of dough just doing it the right way the first time. If you do the job the right way the first time.

Travis: Uh-huh.

Griffin: And he's had to take you to the hospital a few times because of how you've tried to smash all these fish tanks together to make one big fish tank. And there's been cuts.

Justin: And your dad feels like a jerk.

Travis: Who's someone your dad respects absolutely, entirely, completely?

Justin: Mr. Bean.

Travis: Mr. Bean. You say—

Justin: Oh, wait. Were you talking about my dad or this guy's dad?

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Yeah. Your dad. Our dad. If your dad is our dad, then you go to the aquarium store with your dad, and you just almost kind of say, like, offhandedly, like, "Oh, yeah, I heard Mr. Bean talking about on Entertainment Tonight, that if you're gonna get a fish tank, the only fish tank you wanna get is a 175-gallon fish tank."

Justin: Yeah. "Yeah, you know, Dad, I heard this is the kind of tank that Travis Tritt owns."

Travis: There you go.

Griffin: There it is.

Justin: "Travis Tritt owns this exact model."

Griffin: Or fuck it, man. Get Travis Tritt to just, like, walk by you behind you, look at— [Travis Tritt voice] "That's a badass fish tank, man."

Travis: "That's a great tank right there."

Griffin: "Now, that's a good tank for—"

Travis: "That's the kind of tank I got."

Griffin: "That's a good tank for a great price."

Justin: "And I want to thank you again for shopping Travis Tritt's Aquariums and More. Y'all come back, anytime. You're welcome, and nobody's gonna give you a better deal than Travis. That's what it says on the sign!"

Travis: "Hey, thanks for shoppin' at Tritt It and Quit It. Uh, please uh, grab yourself a fish tank and then get on out."

Justin: "Tritt Tanks."

Griffin: "I'd fill that shit up with mustard, I would. I often do."

Travis: "And let some kids double down around in there."

Griffin: "Double Dare dig down."

Justin: "It's always a great day to be alive here at Travis Tritt's Aquariums and Stuff."

Travis: "Okay. Anyways, please move on!"

Griffin: "Travis Tritt's Fish and Shits."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] "Hey, folks, this is Travis Tritt from Travis Tritt's Fish and Shits. I just wanna remind you that we are working every day to obtain the license that we need to sell fish directly to you, the consumer. We're just weeks to months away, our lawyers assure us, from getting those special permits that will allow us to sell the finest quality fish at the finest quality prices."

Travis: "And please, please do not confuse this location with Travis Tritt's Fish and Chips, that is across town. Uh, both are mine and both were poorly planned. Thank you."

Justin: [laughs] "I work at one during the morning and one during the night and I won't answer any more questions about that."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "That's gettin' personal, folks. And yes, I still find time to make music. Don't be an asshole about it."

Travis: "And I balance work and family. Okay. Can we please move on? Ask me about my love of fish, both retail and dining."

Griffin: "Everyone wants to know about the fish, and nobody asks me about the 'and Shits.'"

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: "That's fine. I got CD players in here too, but that's fine. I guess we just won't talk about this."

Justin: "Got back some Gatorade-brand gum that's been inspired for five years. Nobody asks me about it."

Griffin: "Yeah. Let's talk about these stupid fish, I guess."

Justin: "Tim Conway passed, and I would love to talk about this complete set of Dorf VHS tapes that I got, and I can't sell 'em."

Griffin: "Guess I can't. Hm."

Justin: "Guess I can't. Everybody wants to talk about the fish that I can't legally sell!"

Griffin: "Everyone wants to talk about the fish, God's wettest and worst animal."

Justin: [laughs] "God, I hate fish!"

Travis: "What have I done?"

Justin: "Should've thought this— what have I done? I should've thought this through."

Griffin: How about uh, one last question?

Justin: "Recently, a friend and I popped into a liquor store on our way to do some thrift shopping. Um, once inside, we noticed that they had a winetasting label—" sorry, "table. And we decided to spend a few extra minutes tasting some vine.
