MBMBaM 470: Mama Freddy's Turbo Spaghetti

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music plays]

Justin: Hello, everybody, and welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy!

Travis: I be your middlest brother, Travis McElroy.

Griffin: Ya— you'll— good day! Hail and well met. I am your youngest...

Justin: Don't love that.

Griffin: ...herald...

Justin: [laughs] Don't love this.

Griffin: ...Griffin.

Justin: [laughs] I don't love it.

Travis: We're high— we're high in the fantasy spirit, 'cause we've just returned from the biggest nerd event of the year, good gentlefolk!

Justin: Folks, the rumors are true. The meek have inherited the Earth.

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Justin: [laughs] These nerds, they're running the show.

Travis: Oh, I see.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: I looked for a solid week for someone to talk to me about sports.

Griffin: Yeah. You uh, you remember that poster that was hanging up on high school walls that was like, "Don't get ma— if you get made fun of now, don't worry; you'll be Steve Jobs." Oh, I saw hundreds and thou— hundreds of thousands of Jobses here.

Travis: Everyone was a Steve Jobs.

Justin: That's true.

Griffin: Yeah. Jobses— Jobses everywhere, but not a basketball to drink.

Travis: Did you guys have any— make any, you know, big celeb friends? That's why you— you go to Comic-Con for the connectionays, you know what I mean?

Griffin: Yeah, you brush elbows with Arrow.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: You brush elbow— you brush shoulders with Flash.

Travis: I met Spider-Man, um, got a photo with Spider-Man.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Spider-Man came to our signing.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: And he said, "Thank you— it is such an honor to meet you."

And I'm like, "Are you kidding with me right now? After all you've done?"

Travis: "You're the webslinger."

Justin: "After all your good work?"

I left— here's how co— what's cooler than being at a cool party?

Travis: Ice cold!

Justin: I'll tell you. Leaving a cool party. I left uh, Comic-Con's most exclusive event to go home and eat a muffin top, a chocolate muffin top, and drink a Vitamin Water in my hotel room while I played Dragon Quest Builders.

Griffin: Fuck, yeah, dude.

Travis: Nice.

Justin: That's kind of the most exclusive— the most exclusive party is the one you leave. It was— I've never seen anything like it before in my entire life. There were fame-Os littered, [laughs] just strewn about.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: I stepped over— I stepped over the corpse of Stephen Amell. He was just there— there's like 30 Arrows there.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: I was pushed— playfully pushed into the pool by Taye Diggs.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: But then I bounced off of Cuba Gooding Jr., who was in the pool, to land on the other side without getting wet, so many famouses.

Travis: Mm-hmm. And you were over there, and you got caught by Jon Cryer. Jon Cryer said "You've safely made it to the other side."

Griffin: Jon Cryer was actually— that's not a joke; he was there.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: He was there.

Travis: And you could tell that when Jon Cryer said that thing about making it to the other side, he meant both literally, the pool, and figuratively, to the other side of fame.

Griffin: To the other side of fame. And now we're all famouses!

Travis: I would say—

Justin: Do you know what people won't tell you about red carpets? And this is probably not for everyone. I've only been to one red carpet event in my entire life. Well, the Margaritaville was a blue carpet, but this was a red carpet.

Travis: We've only been on one side—yes.

Justin: You only are there... you could just walk in [laughs] the thing.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: So there was a door that you walk— this is an Entertainment Weekly thing. And it was an honor, wow. What an honor to be there.

Griffin: Wow, what an hon-or. H-O-N-O-R.

Justin: So anyway, we went, and you go in, and they're like, "Well, there's the entrance, and then over there is where the red carpet is." And to go on it, you have to wait in like a line.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: And this line is like, there's some people from the new Spider-Man movie in this line. Jon Cryer is in this line.

Griffin: We were ahead of the Spider-Manses. The Spider-Manses was behind us.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: So we-

Justin: Not a Spider-Man, but like some cast members from Spider-Man. Legit s— I mean, top-tier talent that I honestly, earnestly suggested we should let them go in front of us.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: There's no way that we should be— but you could just go into the party, which is what a lot of people were doing.

Travis: They were— there were five minutes less of canapes for the cast of Spider-Man, because they had to wait for us to finish getting our picture taken. Strange but true.

I did enjoy making good, good friends with David Harbour. Um, now, we didn't— mm, we didn't talk.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: And we were only in the same place for like, half a second, as he got into a car as we got out of a car. But I felt him, like, register, like, my celebrity musk on the air.

Justin: Mm!

Travis: And like, I registered his. And I think he was like, "There's another, like, big, bearded man here..."

Griffin: Sure. Yeah. I saw it, Travis, he was getting in the car, and you guys like met eyes and just walked by each other, and he tickled you.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Real fast. He tickled you just real quick.

Travis: Real quick, he and I took a second to bully Tom Hiddleston for being a nerd.

Griffin: It was so fast. It was so fast.

Travis: Yes. But like, that was the only connection we made. Just real quick, me and David Harbour bullied Tom Hiddleston, and then David Harbour had to go, but he did— he kissed me on both cheeks, and said, "Now the power is yours."

Justin: We were standing outside of this party, waiting for the person that was supposed to get us into the party, and we were waiting there, feeling like we didn't belong. And as we're standing there, feeling incredibly uncomfortable and really not of a place where we should be there at all, uh, Tom Hiddleston... TV's... [laughs] Loki, walks out of this place.

Travis: TBS's Loki.

Justin: TBS's Loki walks out [laughs] and walked past us and— to get to his car. And I asked Griffin, I said, "I hope he doesn't— he didn't eat all the free hot dogs," that he had, [laughs] 'cause he had that sort of self-satisfied grin on his face that he always had.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Which I'm assuming is 'cause he ate all the free hot dogs at his party.

Travis: And he kept patting his tummy, and saying, "Yum, yum, hot dog tummy."

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: "Yum, yum, Weiner King!"

Griffin: And then I— and then I did a fun accent where I was like, [English accent] "They got split-top buns, they got brioche."

Justin: "They got a new topping only fame-Os know about."

Griffin: "They got hot dogs 2, the sequel to dogs."

Yeah, that was fun, fun times.

Justin: It wasn't fun. It wasn't fun. [laughs]

Griffin: Oh.

Justin: Maybe for Travis it was fun. Maybe you had fun.

Travis: It was way fun for me.

Justin: Good. I'm glad you all have received energy from it, instead of having it depleted from you like a vamp-eer.

Griffin: I expected to be arrested. Like, that's where I was at.

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: As I was walking around this party, I fully expected a helicopter to swoop in and arrest me. They wouldn't even send an officer; they would just kind of scoop me up with a big claw, and then like...

Travis: They would lower, like, one of those uh, things that they use to rescue people who've been injured in the desert.

Griffin: Yes. Except it's got a trapping claw on it. It would swoop down and grab me, and as I flew away, D'Arcy Carden would wave to the helicopter, and be like, "Thank you!"

Travis: "Thank you! He was eating all the hot dogs!"

Griffin: "He ate all the hot dogs."

Um, we saw so many— guys, this was a wild one. This was a wild week. I hope this doesn't come off as bragging. 'Cause I don't—

Travis: No. We did not belong.

Justin: No.

Griffin: We did not belong there.

Travis: We were like the kids in the Mixed-up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler. We were hiding in the museum, just hoping...

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: ...the security guards did not catch us as we ate from the vending machines to stay alive.

Justin: Dad had a – Dad added a fun layer...

Griffin: Oh, yeah!

Justin: ... of difficulty to it.

Griffin: Yeah, we played hard mode.

Justin: Dad— [laughs] we did play hard mode. New game plus.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Because [laughs] Dad has a tic, which makes him legally, whenever he sees a famous person, he has to loudly announce their name or a role that they're well-known for.

Griffin: "And there's fucking Duckie!"

Yeah, bud!

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Yeah, Dad!

Griffin: He's four feet away from you!

Justin: [laughs] Now, to our credit, and I think this is a testament to Dad, he did not say, "There's Duckie." He said, "I wonder if he's still bald because he played Lex Luthor."

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Is what he said about Jon Cryer.

Griffin: Good. Cool. Good and cool. And then-

Travis: And then Jon Cryer turned around and said, "Yeah." It was great.

Justin: "Yeah, Clint."

Griffin: And then— and then once we got inside the very crowded party, Dad would just go somewhere. Dad would just wander off. And we would have to find Dad, 'cause he's— can't— y'all, he can't party anymore. He can't— he can't party like Duckie do.

Travis: This— I will say this. So Dad introduced himself to Brandon Routh, one of the Supermens, and then later in the evening, our friend Sara Benincasa, introduced me to Brandon Routh, and Brandon Routh said, "Oh, that was your dad!"

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And like, remembered our father.

Justin: He gets there before you. In Hunting— in Hunt— there is two places where Travis is known as uh, Mac's kid. It's Huntington and Brandon Routh's house.

Travis: Yep.

Justin: Oh, yeah, you know my friend, your dad.

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: And apparently Dad— Dad told me later that Brandon Routh said to him, like, "Are you an actor?" and Dad explained all of his stage work in Huntington, West Virginia for him.

Griffin: Fuck yeah!

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: Hell yeah.

Justin: See, that rules. I wish I had the— the spiritual confidence of my father.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: But I mean, like, it was— the whole thing was weird. I guess that's— it's all— thank you to everybody who came out to, like, all our signings and bought our new book, The Adventure Zone: Murder on the Rockport Limited, and came to all our events and shows. Like, that's— the— you're the on— you are our only— [laughs] you're like our cool friend...

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...that gets us into parties. Like, I don't know. A bunch of other people know who these guys are, 'cause we certainly don't. Um, so we

appreciate it. Thank you for making all our lives so strange. It feels increasingly like a dare.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Uh, but only...

Travis: [laughs] "They haven't chickened out yet. Let's see. I don't know, maybe we'll invite them into, I don't know, another party with like two Jon Cryers, and see if they get the hint this time?"

Griffin: I just wanna say, this world is bullshit, you know? This-

Justin: The fame— the world of fame?

Griffin: Fiona Apple. I just wanted to get out there and say, like, it was a fine party, the hot dogs were just scrumptious, but this whole world is bullshit, and don't let anybody tell you who to be, like Fiona Apple said once.

Justin: Wow. That's beautiful.

Travis: But Griffin, what if I want to be, like, a hob-knobbing celebrity?

Griffin: That doesn't— that's— then you're bullshit.

Travis: Oh, no, ow!

Griffin: When Jon Cryer came over and was like, "Hey, I met some of your family. I hear you do a podcast. That sounds really interesting. You know, I used to play D—"

And I'm like, "Bullshit, dude! Bullshit."

Justin: [laughs] "Hey, somebody come get Duckie!"

Griffin: Brandon Routh is like, "Hey, me and your brother are literally going out for hamburgers. Do you—"

"F— bullshit, bud! I see through your lie, Superman!"

Travis: And when Melissa Fumero was like, "Oh, it's so nice to meet you..."

...I was like, "Yeah! It's nice to meet you as well. I'm a huge fan, and you're super nice."

Griffin: See? He's bullshit, Justin. Not like us.

Justin: He's fallen in.

Griffin: Sheep in wolf's clothing.

Justin: When I met— when I met Ashton, I said, "Who were you in Lion King?"

And he said, "I wasn't in Lion King."

I said, "Then what fucking good are you?" [laughs] And I wandered away.

Travis: Now, that was good.

Justin: And he had the power in that relationship, for sure.

Travis: That was a good one.

Justin: That was good. [laughs] I asked everybody what they thought of Lion King, or if they were in it. That's the only people I want to talk to, is people who have seen Lion King [laughs] or performed in the film Lion King.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: The guy who did Moana, the musical guy, he came over.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And I was like, "Were you in Lion King?"

And he was like, "Justin, we've been friends for years." Like, I don't have any friends that did work on Lion King.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Or had gone to see Lion King.

Travis: He started crying.

Griffin: He started crying.

Justin: He was hurt.

Griffin: 'Cause that was when I was like, I was like, "Lion King's the only part of this whole," and I pointed to everybody at the party, "world that isn't bullshit. It's the only legit one."

Travis: And then Seth Rogan was like, "I was in Lion King."

And that's when Dad started screaming, "Are you Nathan Lane? Are you Nathan Lane?" like, in his face, over and over again.

Griffin: And they pushed him over the balcony.

Justin: I do wanna say one other thing about this, before we move on from this intolerable section of the podcast. At a separate after-party event that was not really a party, but was just a bunch of us sitting around uh, at a bar, Griffin did, during a particularly heated round of Uno, hadouken an entire beer onto Lin Manuel Miranda's pants. Which I mention only because it's the exact thing you're worried about happening at these other parties. Like—

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: You're not gonna do something worse than that.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: Like, the worst thing had already happened to you, which you— you spin-kicked an entire beer onto this poor gentleman.

Griffin: I didn't— it wasn't a hadouken. It was a closed-fist punch into a beer glass, because I got excited about a card I had to play. And there it is, there's the truth, and like, we squashed that beef right away. We traded pants.

Okay.

Justin: Uh, okay. Moving on. This is an advice show. It's not just a San Diego Comic-Con recap.

Travis: Of fame-O's.

Justin: Nothing you just heard was a brag. It killed all of us a little bit, except Travis.

Travis: Yes. No, even I was not bragging. I have been in a cocoon for the last, like, three days...

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: ... just recovering from having to talk to so many people.

Justin: Travis did force himself into a picture with Kristen Bell, and...

Travis: That is true.

Justin: ... came back to us, and was doubled over [laughs] with the exhaustion of the effort. It took all his powers.

Griffin: [laughs] Or maybe Kristen is a Shang Tsung, and just got a little bit of that soul. Just got it, pulled it right in.

Travis: If so, she's welcome to it. You know, she's given us all so much.

Griffin: Eat my soul, Kristen Bell!

Justin: Yes, it's an advice show, and we help you, the listener, with your queries. You can send those, because I don't think we've mentioned this in a couple of years. You can send those...

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: ...to MBMBaM@MaximumFun.org. Real queries for advice only, please.

"I'm a pizza delivery driver, and every time I deliver to a certain bar in town, they tell me I have to dance, or they aren't going to tip me. I really need the money..."

Griffin: Wow.

Justin: "...so I humored them the first time, and now they ask every time, and I deliver there twice a week. How do I get them to stop asking me to dance? Is there any way I can get a tip without dancing?" And that's from Ben Vereen. No.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Mine would've made a lot of— that would've made a lot of sense. It's from Two-Stepping in Texas, and not Ben Vereen.

Griffin: Yeah. Uh, yeah, I think this is the wildest and worst bar.

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: This is a bad bar.

Justin: That's what it— that's what it says outside.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: It's a two-step bar, so may— I mean, they probably play it off like they're chill, like, "Hey, come on in, ya honky-tonk badonk-badonk, and step

this way and then this way, and that's apparently dancing. Now, you do it, or else we will suspend your ability to pay bills this month."

Travis: This seems like— this is like one step removed from like, the outlaw gang in town firing their pistol at your feet to make you dance.

Griffin: It sounds... yeah, it's a lot like-

Travis: "You want this three dollars? You're gonna have to dance!"

Griffin: Now, let me ask you— let me ask you a question. Every time you pull up to this bar, do you knock over all of the motorcycles lined up outside?

Travis: Mm.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: And then you do it as a sort of distraction to save your heinie?

Justin: This makes sense. I've seen this before. Yes. That makes sense to me.

Travis: I just don't ta— like, the nex— listen, you gotta pull that Band-Aid off. And when they're like, "You gotta dance for this tip..."

...you say, "No, I don't. I'm an adult." And then just...

Justin: That doesn't sound like the kind of person you wanna party with, though, right?

Griffin: Yeah. I wanna be a party with my pizza delivery guy.

Travis: Or maybe just say, like, "My boss said I'm not allowed to dance anymore." [laughs]

Griffin: Oh.

Justin: "My doctor said I'm not allowed to dance anymore. I have a condition where I'm not allowed to dance."

Travis: "John Lithgow said I'm not allowed to dance anymore."

Justin: "In town. If you wanna leave the town, I can go."

Travis: "Yeah, or if you know Kevin Bacon, I can probably make some arrangements."

Griffin: [laughs] Uh, you could wear your cleats inside. "Uh, fuck. The cleats. I can't."

Travis: [laughs] "Oh. Oh, I didn't know."

Griffin: "Ah, shoot. I just came from my big game. And before you ask, I won the kick."

Justin: [laughs] "And yeah, I did have a pretty special touchdown dance I did for— ah, damn it. Okay, fine. You can see it. Yes, let's go outside. I'll do my special touchdown dance." And then you've made it worse.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: At that point, it's worse, because now you have to come up with a special touchdown dance in— outside, in your cleats.

Travis: Maybe— maybe you get the first move, you get the upper hand, and you say, "Do you want this pizza? You're gonna have to sing for it."

Justin: Oh, okay.

Travis: And then when they're like, "That's ridiculous, I'm paying for it."

Then you'd be like, "Yes, thank you. Now, we're on the same page. You take the pizza and give me extra money, please. Just like I gave you extra cheese, you give me extra money."

Griffin: This is obviously untenable, but I'm very glad that you mentioned that it is two-step, which is a fairly harmless dance. Because if you hadn't included the genre of dance, my like, worst fear would be like, "Yeah, go make it clap out on the floor, and um..."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "...and then we'll see. Then we'll see." This is miserable.

Travis: "Uh, make that booty clap, but..."

Griffin: Fucking tip everyone! Tip everyone 100 percent of the price of the meal, every time. This is the new rule. It's rough out there. Unless...

Justin: Tipping rules are easy. Now, you just have to put exactly what the thing cost for everything that you purchased, and every service. You tip 100 percent, perfect. Easy. Easy to remember, easy to abide by.

Griffin: It's the same number. It's just the same number. And then, when the revolution comes? It's all gonna work out, baby.

Travis: They'll know.

Griffin: Don't worry about it.

Justin: Oh, yeah.

Travis: And listen, this is just a helpful tip from me to you, who I've been a delivery driver in different places: tip in cash, 'cause they have to pay for their own gasoline!

Griffin: Yeah, baby! But then once the revolution comes, that cash is just gonna be stinky, dirty paper.

Travis: Right.

Justin: Mm-hmm.

Travis: Correct. Then you're gonna wanna start paying with credit card.

Griffin: I have a Yahoo here. Can I read it?

Justin: Yeah, bud.

Griffin: It's from Graham Roebuck sent it in. Thanks, Graham. It's Yahoo Answers u— they're anonymous. Uh, Chelshea asks...

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: "How do I remind myself to eat more kale?"

Travis: Mm.

Griffin: "I blank—" I'll fill it in here. "I fucking used to love kale." That's it.

Travis: What happened?

Griffin: What did happen? Uh, I've had situations— when I was a kid, I stayed at Granny's house, and uh, I had myself a bean lunch, and then I got sick in the toilet. A wet sickness. Do you know what I'm talking about?

Travis: [laughs] Yes.

Griffin: And then I didn't...

Justin: [laughs] Aha, yes, sir.

Griffin: I didn't eat beans for like, no joke, six or seven years after that, because I thought I was allergic to beans. People would ask me, "Do you have any allergies?"

And I would say, "Well, yes, I do. Beans."

And they would say, "Are you positive?"

And then I would tell them the story that uh, preceded this explanation.

Justin: Griffin, that's wild. [laughs] That's wild.

Griffin: Yeah. You have— if you have a bad food time, you don't wanna eat that food again. That's what I'm saying.

Travis: But that's not the same as being allergic to a food.

Griffin: No, I know. I was wrong. I'm not allergic to beans. Now, I bean it up all the fucking— all day long.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Get off my thing, get back onto the question!

Travis: Okay. So you're thinking that this person ate a kale lunch and had a bathroom uh-oh?

Griffin: Had a — had a wet sick, yeah.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And that made them, like, stop eating kale, and then they just went like, "Aw, man, I should eat some kale again," but every time the opportunity for kale arises, they just—

Griffin: They eat something else, yeah.

Travis: They— oh, they forget about kale.

Griffin: Well, you can't look at life through the lens of "Every meal is an opportunity for kale," because you will absolutely just wear yourself down to the bone like that.

Travis: Yeah. You miss 100 percent of the kales you don't eat.

Griffin: That's— yeah.

Travis: That's what Gretzky said!

Griffin: And that's why he was so fucking yolked all the time.

Travis: Yeah. Also, regular as shit.

Griffin: A little too regular, maybe, even. Couldn't make it through a game.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: This person fuck—

Travis: That was his undoing.

Griffin: "I fucking used to love kale! How can I remind myself to eat more kale?"

Travis: Tie some kale around your finger.

Justin: That's a good one, Trav, thank you.

Griffin: That's pretty good.

Justin: Kale shirt. Can't get into bed wearing that.

Travis: Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah. Maybe like uh, hang some kale from the ceiling...

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: ...that you have to walk through to get to bed. And then just...

Justin: They should have kale barriers on stuff.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Like if you had a kale rope, tie it around every toilet.

[clapping]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: That you had to gnaw your way through before you could use the bathroom.

Travis: Yes, yes.

Justin: I'd love that.

Griffin: Or just a big sheet of kale over the bathroom door that you have to eat your way through, like you're in Metroid.

Travis: Yes. Hire a company to kidnap you and bury you in kale, and you have to eat your way out.

Griffin: That's good too.

Justin: If Marc Summers would just put the flag in a big pile of kale...

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: ...and you had to eat your way into the pile to win Double Dare, I feel like that— that is something.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: "Welcome to super healthy, super clean Double Dare! First, you're going to go through this bath, and then you're going to eat some kale, and get in some jammies, and go to bed!"

Justin: And now listen, it's gonna get pretty— I— point of order, it will get super sloppy, just not during the show.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Post-show is going to be an unfortunate sloppy situation.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: An— a Double Dare After Dark.

Griffin: [laughs] Uh, yeah.

Travis: Double Dare Nights. [laughs]

Griffin: I wish there was such a thing, and bear with me here, fellas, 'cause it's gonna—

Justin: And Double Dare Nights, a detective show starring Marc Summers.

Griffin: Yes.

Travis: "Looks like this one got a little too sloppy."

Justin: He shoots someone in the head, and he's like, "I'm sending you to space camp."

Griffin: [laughs] This is gonna get kind of cerebral.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: I— I wish there was such a thing as an edible tattoo.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Hold on. I'm getting comfy.

Travis: Okay. Go on, Wonka.

Griffin: It is kind of Wonka-esque, but like, you— if you like kale... I can't if you were to ask me, "Griffin, sit down in front of a Google Doc and type out every kind of food that you like," I would get the easy stuff first. Pizza, taco, meatballs. Um...

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: But then like, if you ask me to keep going, uh, I like broccoli okay. Like, a list, a ranking, even, of my favorite foods, I couldn't do it.

And so what if every time you tried something, and you were like, "Oh, my God, what is that?"

And somebody's like, "That is ceviche, my man."

I'll be like, "Get out the pen." And then I would tattoo it in my arm, so any time I got hungry, I could look down, and be like, "Ooh, what is that? Oh, that's right, ceviche. What did ceviche taste like?" And then you give it a little lick.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: I think you're really close to auto-cannibalism, Griffin.

Griffin: No, you don't eat it. You don't eat it, you don't eat it, you don't eat it; you lick it.

Justin: You understand— you understand that you have gone into human evolution and have basically replaced memory, our ability to remember...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...with a fun fruit snack for the whole family.

Griffin: Not a fruit—

Justin: This is what you're saying. You're trading memory for the ability to eat your own flesh.

Griffin: No. I'm saying you trade off— now I don't have to keep my favorite foods inside my brain. I keep that on my arm. Now my brain has more room for the 800 Pokémon that exist.

And we can get super hyperconcentrated flavor ink, right? And you'll be like...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Griffin: "Yeah, let me get ceviche, but do it in ceviche-flavored ink." And so they would do it, and it'd be really fucking concentrated, so it lasts a long time, but you will have to get a re-up every, like, three months or so.

Travis: Now, how do you-

Justin: We all assumed flavoring, Griffin. I mean, we all assumed that.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: That was obvious.,

Travis: Yeah, how— how do you determine— like, how much do you have to like a food for it to— is it like, the more you like a food, the bigger the tattoo is? Does every food get a spot? Is it like...

Griffin: I think it's gotta be quick, right? I think every restaurant has to offer the tattoo service. Um...

Travis: Oh, but that's awkward. They're gonna come over and be like, "So do you want a tattoo of our world-famous fries or not?" But you didn't like the fries.

Griffin: I didn't. The truffle oil doesn't— no. So no tattoo for me, thanks. No, I think the tattoo would be extremely rare. Somebody eats these truffle fries, and they go, "Yummy!" and then they— and then they just bring out the whole cart, and get 'em going. And get it on the arm.

Justin: Mm.

Griffin: It could— doesn't have to go on the arm, but it does have to go on a lickable body part. So...

Travis: Yeah. It can't be the elbow or, like, the earlobe.

Griffin: Yeah. Or your own— uh, your own butt.

Travis: You can't lick your own butt?

Griffin: [blows raspberry] Haven't tried.

Travis: Do it now.

Griffin: Uh, nah. Nah, nah, nah.

Travis: Coward.

Griffin: Well, I can't— I can't eat ass while I podcast, Trav.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Fucking "Eat ass while you podcast," that is like a t-shirt...

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: It should have a fucking eagle on it giving you a rad thumbs up with sunglasses on.

Griffin: [laughs] Or it could be like— it could be like the "Keep calm and carry on," but it just says "Eat ass and podcast."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] Big Dogs is back with a thrilling new line...

Griffin: Oh, shit.

Justin: That's our new podcast merch, is just gonna be Big Dogs-inspired collection.

Griffin: Oh, my God.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Holy shit. Uh, let's— should we do one more little question?

Justin: Yeah, I got one here for you. "My partner and I are out for dinner at a local pizzeria." This is our second uh, pizza-themed question. Our—

Travis: Listen, sometimes I put together a question list when I'm hungry, okay?

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: Don't— we don't need to identify that.

Justin: Uh, okay. "So the place is somewhat trendy, and caters to young, hip clientele. We've already ordered, and we're told it might be a 30-minute wait. The people at the table next to us just left, leaving behind three untouched slices of pepperoni pizza."

Griffin: No! Next question. No. Next question?

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: "My partner and I are both quite hungry, it's a busy night, we would almost certainly be seen by other diners if we went for it. Should we grab the pizza before someone comes to clear the table?" And that's from Pining for Pizza in Little Rock. And they have decided to solve this immediate problem by sending an email to a weekly podcast. And I'm— I solute you for that.

Travis: Now, first and foremost, I want to go ahead and get out of the way: food waste is a real issue in our country.

Justin: Thank you. Yes, Travis.

Travis: Yes. That is a problem. Why is it weird to eat that pizza that no one else is gonna take on the table? It's not suddenly— like, if they were still sitting there, and they picked— like, the people who were at the table picked up one of those three slices, no one else from the restaurant would be like, "Ew!" But if you reach across a two-foot gap to grab that piece of pizza, you're a monster.

Justin: You have to assume— okay. I want to take the social thing out of it. I always— everyone is always assuming that they're fucking up, and everyone also assumes— the assumption that everyone makes is that everyone else knows what they're doing. And it's a faulty supposition, but it's one we're constantly making on a subconscious basis.

You have to work extremely hard to make people think you don't know what you're doing. If you walk over and you pick up some 'za off a table that was abandoned by some other people, everyone will just assume it was agreed upon beforehand.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Like they texted you, they're your cousin, it could be anything. Everyone will just— take that aspect out of it. So then we're left with like a hygiene question, right? That, I think, is more debatable.

Griffin: Uh, no, I mean, hygiene's not a question for me. Hygiene's not a question.

Travis: Oh.

Griffin: This is good pizza, folks. This is good pizza, folks. It's not like they shlobbered all over it. Maybe they did, but you gotta just sort of play the odds when you're um, doing stuff like this.

Food waste is a problem, Travis, yes. And we are ba— we're basically— we're all basically already a bunch of just dirty dogs, so...

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: Just go for it. Go for it! Go eat this, and if somebody gets on you, just like throw 'em a newspaper, and say, "We're all— we're all already dirty dogs, so it doesn't— it really doesn't matter anymore."

Travis: Oh, wait, are you throwing the newspaper in like a "fetch" kind of way?

Griffin: It can be a joke like that, yeah. But I do— they do need to read it. And then read it front to back, and I don't know where you live, but you're gonna make it to the end of that newspaper, and be like, "Damn, we're all dirty dogs, so it doesn't matter if you eat the scraps, does it?"

Travis: Well, I think the only concern would be that you might get asked to leave the restaurant, but I also don't think anyone working at a restaurant would want to do that. Like, they'd have to walk over, and say, "Did you eat the pizza off that table?"

And you would say, "No."

And they would say, "Okay." And then they'd leave you alone. Because that is as much confrontation as any human being ever wants.

Griffin: Now, unless they— unless— sorry, I got a— I gave you the window.

Travis: Oh. Unless...

Griffin: Justin, you still there?

Justin: Unless.

Justin: Unless.

Griffin: ...you know, with this unsatisfied. Unless they-

Justin: Unless...

Griffin: Unless they wanted to eat that pizza, in the secret back.

Travis: That is the thing.

Griffin: And that's the thing.

Travis: That is the thing.

Griffin: But Juice, when you worked at the OG, were you...

Justin: I did.

Griffin: ...yeah, were you snarfing down soups, salad, bread bowl, breadstick, whatever?

Justin: I got hired—I got hired at the OG as a dishwasher.

Travis: So yes.

Justin: And I— I went back to walk— to meet the man who would be training me. I watched him pick up a cup of minestrone off a plate, and fucking jam it like a shooter.

Griffin: [laughs] I think—

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: And then he asked, "What department are you working in?"

And I said, "I'm a line chef."

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: Because I couldn't— I couldn't study under this man. Even though I celebrate him...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...for that, I couldn't live up to this person. So I lied and said I'd been hired as a chef.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And that's how I got to be a chef at the Olive Garden. That anecdote I've told...

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: ...probably 30 times.

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: I've never gotten more than a polite chuckle. But I submit that if I did become a chef in my life, after that, it would be an extremely good story.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: I'll just say, the value of this story is diminished because I worked there for a month, and quit, because I was tired of stinking of garlic.

Griffin: You smelled so bad. You smelled like fucking Van Helsing. You smelled so much of the garlic.

Travis: Can— I would like to pitch a new idea where it's just— I recently, while in San Diego, went to a breakfast place, and I got some pancakes, and as is always the case, they brought me three huge flappy jacks, and I only wanted one.

Justin: Oh.

Travis: And I kept thinking, I should have asked around first, to see if anyone around me was thinking of ordering the same pancakes, and I

could've just like, I don't know, ride-shared these pancakes with people sitting around me, and said like, "I only want one of these three. Does anybody else just wanna go ahead and eat one of the other ones? And then I don't have to feel bad about ordering them."

Justin: [sighs]

Travis: I'm saying, maybe we ride-share pancakes from now on. And pizza too, something that comes in easily dividable, you know, like—let's—let's—hey. When you're here, you're family.

Justin: Mm.

Travis: Let's treat it like family and share fucking pancakes and pizza. But just that.

Justin: Um, let's take a break from this.

Travis: Thank God.

Justin: It's all very good. I love this.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: But let's take a break to talk about the Money Zone.

[Money Zone theme plays]

Griffin: Ring-ring, ring-ring. Who's there?

Justin: Who's there?

Travis: Woah!

Griffin: I should've— I should've let you do it.

Travis: Yeah, were you calling yourself?

Griffin: Ring-ring, ring-ring!

Travis: Don't answer it.

Griffin: Ring-ring, ring-ring.

Travis: It's him again.

Justin: I'm gonna get a— it's fine.

Travis: No, no, don't encourage him.

Griffin: Oh, no, this is a – sorry, this is a doorbell. They're just ringing it in a pattern that makes it sound like a telephone. Ring-ring-

Travis: Okay. Try it again. We'll get it— yeah, we'll get it this time.

Griffin: Ring-ring, ring-ring.

Travis: No— no, thank you.

Justin: We're good, thank you.

Griffin: Why don't you look at that app, and see the camera, and see who it is?

Justin: I did. [laughs] And it was you.

Griffin: Uh-oh.

Justin: So you were dismi— we sent you straight to voicemail.

Griffin: Uh-oh!

Justin: Which is the modern sort of fun, kicky way of saying we didn't answer the [laughs] door.

Griffin: All right. Well, I guess I'll take this big briefcase full of money and cereal somewhere else.

Travis: Ooh.

Justin: I use the Ring— Ring is a magical doorbell that goes on the front of your door, okay?

Travis: And no one knows how it works.

Justin: No one knows how it works. But it has HD video and two-way audio. Uh, you can set motion detection. Someone shows up at your front door, you're not only gonna get a notification that they're there; you're gonna be able to pop the camera open, and see, like, "What do you want?" Like, "What are you doing? Who is that right now?"

You— if you're out and about— I've answered the door from across the country before, and said, "Just leave the weed..."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "...under the mat."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: It keeps a— one thing that I like about it is that if there's um, I'll just say, shit going down in your neighborhood, there are like these neighborhood safety alerts where you see, like, hey, a bunch of people are getting robbed over here. You should, like, try to stay cool. Try to be cool about it, and not tell the cops— no, you can tell— you should tell the cops, but like, uh, you get those sorts of neighborhood safety alerts.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: This is the cooking box. It's gonna have lots of stuff in it, and you're gonna be confused by it. "Why did I just get a big thing of asparagus and meat?" Don't freak out; look at the box. It says Blue Apron on it. That's how you know that the payload has been delivered.

Justin: It's not a threat.

Griffin: It's not a threat.

Justin: It's not a threat that says, "This is what I'm gonna do to you."

Griffin: It is a box that gives you that— those ingredients, exclusively [laughs] meat and asparagus, only...

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: ...and it'll teach you how to use them in all different kinds of ways.

Travis: That's one of my favorite things about Blue Apron. It gives you all the ingredients you need, none that you don't.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: There's never like, "What? There's just a zucchini in here. What do I do with it?"

Griffin: "There's a fucking golf ball in here. What the—"

Justin: Zucchini is neither meat nor asparagus.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And those are the two things that are available at every Blue Apron box.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And only those two things.

Travis: Now, here's what's gonna throw you.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: They have started offering the Beyond Burger, which is a plantbased patty, right, so you're gonna be like, "Wait, is this the burger, or is this the asparagus?" and you'll never know.

Griffin: Yeah. Yeah, it's confusing. So anyway, they make cooking a sustainable part of your weekly routine, and all their meals are carefully designed and tested by the test kitchen chefs. Boy, I bet that's a good job. Snacking around on these good burgers and stuff.

They use unique specialty ingredients to bring chef-quality recipes to your dinner table. We've all used it. I learned how to cook from it. It's really—it's the jam. It's the shit.

Travis: But there are non-meat options.

Griffin: They look badass. You can check out this week's menu, and get \$60 off when you visit BlueApron.com/MyBrother. That's BlueApron.com/MyBrother. Blue Apron, a better way to cook.

[funky music plays]

Dave: Hi, I'm Dave.

Graham: Hi, I'm Graham.

Dave: And we're two house DJs who have been trapped inside our drum machine.

Graham: We love it here, and we'd love if you stopped by and visited us, every week...

Both: On Stop Podcasting Yourself.

Dave: Here on MaximumFun.org. We're just a couple of doofuses from Canada.

Graham: And listen to our show or perish.

Dave: [laughs]

Graham: Stop Podcasting Yourself.

Dave: On MaximumFun.org.

[funky music ends]

Justin: [starts imitating guitar solo, singing] I yay verily want to munch!

Griffin: Huzzah!

Justin: [singing] I yay verily want to munch!

Griffin: Huzzah!

Justin: It's a ren fair...

Travis: Uh, yeah!

Justin: ...version of the Munch Squad theme song. It's a podcast within a podcast.

Uh, usually, I read press releases before I uh, do them, and I'm gonna roll the cosmic dice here on this episode of My Brother, My Brother and Me, and tell you about Taco Bell revealing spicy details of its new pop-up hotel.

Griffin: Oh, my God.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: So yeah, so they're getting into hotels with... it's called The Bell. A Taco Bell—

Travis: Have we definitely not talked about this before? 'Cause God, that's weird.

Justin: Yeah. No. I mean, we might have mentioned it, but we didn't have all these fucking spicy details, Trav. The Bell.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: A Taco Bell hotel and resort opening in Palm Springs in August. It's a limited time experience, but as this press release certainly reminds me, all

things are limited time. And this is a great application of the time that you have on Earth, is to go to the Taco Bell hotel, which is called... The Bell, available for a limited time.

Uh, what is gonna make The Bell such a plea— such an incredible experience? Is that what I hear you asking? What are your top questions about The Bell?

Griffin: Are you asking us?

Travis: Oh, yeah, no. I-

Justin: It was— it was kind of rhetorical, but I was also curious.

Griffin: Um...

Travis: Are there on-site restaurants?

Justin: The food. Obviously. Yes. Thank you, the food, yes. Here's what's gonna be the b— the be— it's Taco Bell. [laughs] And— and there's also "an unexpected take on a resort poolside menu." I guess unexpected, when you're staying at the Taco Bell hotel, means "not Taco Bell." So there's the two things you can do there, Taco Bell and not Taco Bell.

So you're looking at maybe um, a toasted cheddar club with hand-breaded crispy chicken, jalapeno bacon, avocado, sharp cheddar, doesn't matter. Or an Avocado Toast-ada...

Griffin: Mm-kay.

Justin: ...served on local multigrain toast with avocado, breakfast radish.

So this press release is bold enough to imagine a world where I would be the sort of person that would go to the Taco Bell hotel and then say, "Uh, excuse me, is this bread local?"

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: "Excuse me, is this local multi-grain toast from the region?"

Travis: But it also implies that there's a person who's like, "I'm gonna go out of my way to stay at the Taco Bell hotel..."

Justin: Yes.

Travis: "...but I don't like Taco Bell [laughs] food. It's just that— it's just closest to my convention."

Griffin: "Think outside the bun: purchase local."

Justin: Um, so there's gonna be a uh, Baja Blast Birthday Freeze...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...'cause it's celebrating the 15th anniversary, and it's gonna be served in the first-ever Freeze Lounge, to keep things chill.

Griffin: Hmm.

Justin: So I guess this is a very cold lounge, perfect for enjoying uh, the Baja Blast. I would argue we already have those, and they're called morgues.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: But there will be an on-site morgue perfect...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...for enjoying a Baja Blast. Here's a quote. I got a quote.

Griffin: All right.

Justin: It's from Rene Pisciotti. He's the executive chef of The Bell.

Griffin: They have one of those?

Travis: Hell, yeah.

Justin: [French accent] "Let's be honest— let's be honest, food is the best part of traveling. A lot of effort and homework goes into finding out the best places to eat where you are staying."

Griffin: What is this accent?

Travis: I love it.

Justin: This Rene Pisciotti, "But, with The Bell, we've thought of everything for you." Do you mean Taco Bell food? [laughs]

"From welcome beverages to room service, to build-your-own breakfast tacos and surprises throughout."

Travis: What? Woah, wait, hold on.

Griffin: Wait, hold on.

Travis: You can't just say "surprises throughout."

Justin: "Susprises without."

Uh, "...many of which feature local ingredients like our Horchata-Date Smoothie, we're curating the ultimate Taco Bell food experience." So The Bell is a hotel that has the bravery to look [laughs] at the Taco Bell menu, and say, "Well, certainly not this."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "Certainly, you didn't intend on consuming this."

Griffin: Do you guys know what uh, I think it's pronounced halocline, is?

Travis: No.

Justin: No.

Griffin: This is when uh, usually like an underwater cave, like, really salty saltwater and freshwater, like, refuse to mix, and so it creates like a visible surface from one water to the other...

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: ...that you can see. And I'm wondering if there's one of these at the front door of the Taco Bell hotel, because of how many farts, like, concentrated...

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: ...condensed, like, fart air is in there that you literally can see, like, a visible air surface.

Travis: "Ah, yes. Uh, welcome to the hotel. I do have to warn you, our air is flavor-blasted, so you're going to need to wear this special diving mask."

Justin: "It's local farts."

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: "Locally-sourced farts. These are farm-to-table farts. Um..."

Justin: The fun? The fun, you ask? Well, they've got the fun. "While D daytime DJs play jams," basically someone's nephew hooked up Spotify, "While daytime DJs play jams, surprise performances will kick off after the sun goes down for guests at The Bell.

"Fans can bring home the same vibes to their own summer plans with curated playlists from Feed the Beat artists, a Taco Bell program that's helped more than 1,600 artists and bands discover new fans."

Griffin: Mm.

Travis: Huh.

Griffin: Mm.

"And ladies and gentlemen, coming back to the stage for the fourth time today, Eddie Money."

Justin: [laughs] Eddie's back.

Griffin: Eddie's back. "Hey, what's up? Yeah, they asked me to do it again, uh, and I said..."

Justin: "So here I am."

Griffin: "...I said, 'Do you got any more Crunchwraps?' and they laughed and laughed. Anyway... [singing] I've got two tickets to paradise!"

Justin: "They didn't answer my question, but I'm assuming they're out."

I want to go to this place with a desire that I'm not sure I can quantify...

Griffin: Mm-hmm.

Justin: ...with the sort of linguistic tools that we trade in on this show. We very rarely get into sort of uh, poetry or— or epic narrative at all, and I feel like that's what I would need to sort of communicate that desire with which I really, really, really, really wanna go to The Bell.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: If I may, Justin, it seems to me to be a bit of a siren song drawing you into the cheesy ocean to crash upon the nacho rocks. Like, you know it will be your undoing...

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: ...but you're drawn to it.

Griffin: Let me remind you, you're going to have to sleep here.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: That is hard. That is hard. The other thing that I'm struggling with is, I've eaten at Taco Bell many times. My reaction physically and mentally after that is always, "Never again!"

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: I swear to myself, "Never again!" But now I'm sleeping in a place where they make it.

Griffin: Mm.

Justin: I'm sleeping at the belly of the beast, as it were. That's— that's hard for me. That's tough.

Griffin: Can I read a Yahoo?

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: Yes, please.

Justin: Yeah, there's a Taco Bell gift shop, by the way, where you can buy— it's got— I'm looking at it right now, a "Taco Bell is life" tie clip.

Travis: Mm.

Justin: Which imagines a world where you would be someone with a "Taco Bell is life" tie clip, but also have any use for a tie...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...at any point in your life whatsoever. Um... there's a lot of-

Griffin: I can think of a couple.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: Uh, CEO of Taco Bell.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Court date.

Justin: Yeah. Bail— bail arraignment.

Griffin: Um, okay. Here is a Yahoo. Gosh, these are all kind of food related. Graham Roebuck also sent this one in. It's a hungry ep. It's from Yahoo Answers user Ernesto, who asks, "Which food awakens the beast inside you?"

Travis: Aw, yeah!

Griffin: "Which food awakens the beast inside you?" Let's get this out of the way, I have— and this'll just be a blanket sort of crude humor joke, but I do have Irritable Bowel Syndrome, so you can make an argument that you are describing most foods.

Travis: More like Irritable Beast Syndrome! Feed the— yeah!

Griffin: That makes it cooler, for sure, for sure, for sure.

Travis: Yeah. You got an irritable beast in your system.

Griffin: It feels like it sometimes, certainly, but let's not go down that route, because I feel like the Taco Bell one used up all of our resources.

Travis: For me, it's kale.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: When I eat kale, I feel like a wild beast! That's also true when I eat sticks of cinnamon, or rocks.

Griffin: Here's a— this is gonna complicate things maybe a little bit, but are pills food? [laughs]

Travis: Hmm.

Griffin: Do pills count as food?

Justin: Hmm.

Travis: Do they unleash the beast?

Griffin: Well, in a manner of speaking.

Travis: I see.

Griffin: A beast who's not as anxious as a non-beast is.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Ah, yes.

Griffin: Compared to — compared to what the non-beast is, I am currently, and have been for a while now, beasting the fuck out. So...

Travis: Yes. That is true with Travis, is Anxiety Travis and Sad Travis, who is now uh, Doing Okay Trav.

Griffin: A regular – regular Travis. Yeah.

Travis: Woah!

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: I care more about the needs of others!

Justin: I wanna know more about Travis's pull of homework. [laughs] Why that's relevant to your day-to-day.

Travis: Dude, that's all that work is now. You know, I work from home. It's all homework now.

Justin: Dang.

Griffin: Dang, dude.

Justin: That's great. That is so good, dude.

Griffin: But what food makes you go wild with power and fury, and you can, like, be stronger because of the food?

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...and just kind of eat it with my puffy vest and a self-satisfied look on my face. And I really— I like to live in that moment a little bit, this world where I'm just— I'm just having a small bowl of healthy cereal, and I'm about to use this energy to hike.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Uh, I mean, a big bowl of Mama Freddy's Turbo Spaghetti will get there for me most of the time.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Most days, if I need— if I have the, like a big event coming up, or I'm about to go on book tour, or I'm about to have like a Comic-Con Fred Savage encounter, I will just like— I have a little can of Mama Freddy's Turbo Spaghetti with me, and I will just— I'll cram it, and be ready for the day.

Travis: I just assumed— I assumed that was a given. Like, I would've said Mama Freddy's Turbo Spaghetti if I had known, like, that wasn't just assumed. Like, yeah.

Griffin: Yeah. Yeah. Well, yeah, I edited out the part where I, at the beginning of the question, I said, "We're all gonna say Mama Freddy's Turbo Spaghetti, so let's just pass over that."

Justin: Is there — is there uh— this is slightly changing the uh— the question. So the inverse.

Griffin: Are there other brand-

Travis: I thought you said restaurants.

Justin: [laughs] That's— that's fair. That's a fair burn on the Long John Silver's brand.

Travis: But that's the thing, is I will say, I love— I love quick service food. Love it.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: I can't remember the last time-

Justin: No one who loves it calls it that.

Travis: What?

Justin: Fucking nobody. That's the ultimate faker— fake test.

Travis: But I can't remember the last time I ate a fast food hamburger and walked away like, "Yes! Now I'm ready!"

Griffin: I really— I really wish I could help make jokes with you guys, but all I can do is sit here and try and think of other members of the canned pasta family.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: The best I've got is Grandma Tanya's Power Lasagna...

Justin: [laughs] It's not bad.

Travis: [laughs] It's pretty good!

Justin: It's not bad.

Griffin: It's so full of protein, but not in the places you would expect, this power lasagna.

Justin: So do we leave— for the format of the joke, do we leave "turbo" in— turbo...

Griffin: No. This is— this is power lasagna. The turbo— this is a different— this one's more about...

Justin: Okay. Okay.

Griffin: This one's more about gains.

Travis: Oh, I see.

Justin: [laughs] Okay.

Griffin: Turbo Lasagna is speed, this one's about gains, there's probably a smarts one.

Travis: Yeah, like maybe like uh, like Cousin Joney's Meditative Rigatoni.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Okay.

Travis: That one's about inner peace and mindfulness.

Griffin: That one's about focus.

Justin: Here's one. C- cousin...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...Jim's...

Travis: Yes.

Justin: ...Good...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...Sauce.

Travis: Ah! So close! Almost nailed it.

Justin: [laughs] It's not—

Griffin: And then for uh, adults who need a little bit of help revving their engine...

Travis: Uh-huh?

Griffin: ...we got Papa Pokey's Horny Gnocchi. Is-

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: They're little, and it comes in a discrete can.

Travis: [laughs] Delivered to your door in a brown paper package.

Griffin: It does not say— it says, "Not Papa Pokey's Horny Gnocchi."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Mr. Jim's...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...Nice...

Travis: Yes.

Justin: ...Food.

Griffin: Yes, good, Justin! You're— it's better than the last one. You're moving in the right direction.

Justin: Thank you. That's very kind; thank you. Uh, folks, that's gonna do it for us this week on My Brother, My Brother and Me, a show that we make just for you. Uh, we hope you've enjoyed yourself. Sorry that things have been a little bit scattershot over these past couple weeks and the two weeks to come. It's kind of, like, wild...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: ...wild time with like the book and book tour and Comic-Con and vacation, and everything.

Griffin: Yes. Speaking of which-

Justin: Just hang in there with us.

Justin: We're not spinning a fucking debacle.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: It is a new era and a fresh face that all our loyal beanheads...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...are gonna go wild for. And it's a better fit for their lifestyle, and it's gonna be more relatable to them and their friends and their families. It is not a— we did not take a bath on this. We are making so much money that we want to cash in, okay?

Travis: Right, right, right.

Justin: Start over. Start over. Start over.

Travis: Have we got an offer for you? You're gonna be so excited about it. Finally, a mug that keeps up with you— listen, you loved beanjuice, but you couldn't take beanjuice on the go, 'cause that beanjuice mug just wouldn't

keep up with your lifestyle. But now, with beanjuice 2.0, the new latest and greatest...

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: We're ruined!

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] My name is Justin McElroy.

Travis: Travis McElroy. You caught me drinking on that one. I was taking a sip on that one.

Griffin: Coach Billy's Football Fusilli. Is that anything?

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: This has been My Brother, My Brother and Me. Kiss your dad square on the lips. [laughs]
