MBMBaM 475: Edchup

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music plays]

Justin: [sings] Isn't it rich?

Griffin: Oh boy.

Justin: [singing] Don't you approve? One who keeps standing around...

Griffin: Yep.

Justin: [singing] And one whooo can mooove!

Griffin: This is not a special episode.

Justin: [singing] So send in the clooown-uh...

Travis: Oh!

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] [singing with less passion] This October, the clooown-uh.

Griffin: Okay.

Justin: The one clown. The clown that we're all so wild about, and America wants to know – where is this guy from?

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Who is this clown prince of crime?

Justin: Where is this clown prince of crime from, this guy with his wild clown face and his penchant for mischief?

Travis: [laughs] He's got a back full of tricks!

Justin: Everybody wants to play this clown once! [laughing]

Griffin: [laughing] Everybody gets one turn on—on the clown!

Justin: They realized... okay, we let Jack be the clown of the Joker for a little bit, and then we passed it on, and Heath did it so good, and then, they were like, looking at the list of all the actors that are. They were like, "Aw, fuck, we're gonna have to pick this up if we're gonna get through everybody."

Griffin: [laughing]

Travis: I will say... Joaquin Phoenix wrote the best essay about why he should be the next clown. And so, he got to do it.

Justin: Yes.

Travis: He did a three thousand word essay, and it was perfect. No more, no less. It was right at three thousand words. And he even drew some illustrations, and that really helped, y'know? It kind of put him over the top.

Griffin: This is My Brother, My Brother, and Me and this is Joker Watch.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Hey, my name is Justin McElroy.

Travis: I'm Travis McElroy.

Griffin: I'm Griffin McElroy. This is Joker Watch, for My Brother, My Brother, and Me.

Justin: This is Joker Watch but... The thing—the thing that I want to say about the new Joker trailer that is out.

Travis: Uh-huh?

Justin: Not one good joke in it.

Griffin: [laughs] No, it's not really funny!

Travis: Doesn't seem funny!

Justin: No.

Travis: It's weird, 'cause it's—

Justin: Not a belly laugh.

Travis: It's about a clown... who usually does japes.

Griffin: It's funny!

Travis: But I see this clown man... he just seems angry.

Griffin: It seems hurtful, and there's a scene in the subway where a bunch of clowns are hurting a guy, and it's like—

Travis: That doesn't seem right.

Griffin: Is this that Jackass humor? 'Cause I thought we were done with that.

Travis: Ohh.

Justin: I want to suggest that, at this point, it would actually be more subversive and interesting if a clown was funny. [laughs] Like, if a clown did jokes and was funny, that would actually be... more original an idea than...

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: The spooky clown.

Travis: Okay, here's my pitch for an origin movie for the Joker. It's gonna be like, an hour and 45 minutes long, right? 105 minutes. And for, let's say, 103 minutes, he is just a hilarious, effective clown.

Griffin: Right.

Travis: And in the last two minutes, he just, like, sits down for a second and goes, "Y'know what? I think I'm gonna start doing crime." Roll credits.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: That's pretty good. We could just take—or, reverse that shit! End of the Dark Knight, Heath Ledger's Joker, we like, CGI it or whatever so that at the very end, the climax, the two boats don't explode or whatever, and he's like, "I'm just a dog chasing a car!" And then Batman like, helps him up from where he fell down, and then he sits down, but he sits down on a pie.

Travis: Yes! And Batman laughs, and it makes the Joker feel good!

Griffin: Everyone just cracks the hell up. [laughs] 'Cause he sat on a pie like a clown would do. And he's like, "Wait, this is more fun."

Travis: But then, he will have a hard time booking gigs at first. 'Cause he'll come in and say, "Hey, I would like to, y'know, maybe do some slapstick jokes at your office Christmas party." And they're gonna say, "Uh, no, you killed a bunch of people."

Griffin: "No. You blowded up... you blewed up the last party that you went to, so I don't think so." But then, he'll also have a hard time adjusting, 'cause he'll be doing his set, sitting on pies, sitting on another pie, and then, he will cut someone's face, and he'll be like, "Shit. That's right, that's not part of the act anymore."

Travis: "I'm so sorry. Have a pie."

Justin: Can someone please confirm to me that Jared Leto does not know about this movie still?

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Because we all promised we would not tell him. And I haven't personally told him that at all.

Travis: No, I—

Justin: But I want to make sure everybody else is—

Travis: He called me yesterday, and he said, "There's people talking about, like, a Joke—" And I said, "No way. No. You don't have to—" And then they dropped the trailer. And I was like, "I thought we talked about this! I thought we all agreed we weren't gonna publicize this movie at all!"

Griffin: Guys—guys, he got a fucking tattoo on his face that says 'Damaged.' And he can't undo that!

Travis: He can probably change it to like, Jamaged.

Griffin: Yeah, if he gets really into making jam, sure.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: Which film, by director Todd Phillips...

Travis: Uh-huh?

Justin: The director of Joker, has you more confident about Joker? The Hangover Part 3, or Starsky & Hutch. Between the two, which one would you say makes you feel better about, um, the Joker?

Travis: Both?

Griffin: Both is a good answer.

Travis: Which makes me think that maybe this is one of those cases where the trailer does not do the movie justice, and they just seem to have just picked the least funny parts of the whole movie...

Griffin: Riiight.

Travis: And maybe there's like a funny bit where like, there's a part where the Joker is like, looking at... maybe the Joker is looking at a bad guy that he's trying to arrest, and he's just saying like, "Do it. Do it." And he's doing like, a really funny kind of Ben Stiller thing.

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Or maybe there's a part with a monkey.

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: Yeah!

Justin: Yes.

Travis: And they were like, "We can't put that in the trailer out of context, it won't make any sense. We'll save that as sort of..."

Justin: He's at Batman's funeral, and they're playing Dust in the Wind, and it's like, "That's my boy blue." I love that.

Travis: Yes. And maybe he's accidentally, um, taken some cocaine that he thought was sugar.

Justin: Oh, okay, pitch!

Travis: In his coffee.

Justin: I have a pitch! I have a pitch for this film! It starts out that he's not funny, and then he decides he's gonna be the Joker, so he watches every Todd Phillips movie back to back.

Griffin: Right.

Justin: There's like a montage where he's hitting Old School, Starsky & Hutch, Road Trip, Hangover, Hangover 2, Hangover 3, Due Date... he's hitting them all. And then he's like, "Now I'm funny, 'cause I know all of these jokes."

Travis: Those are all Todd Phillips movies?

Justin: Yes. All Todd Phillips movies.

Travis: Okay. I am now, honestly, uh, just gonna step out of the bit here for a second to say, I, Travis McElroy, real person, am confused as to why he's directing the Joker movie.

Griffin: [laughs] Yeah.

Justin: Yeah, I kind of got at that emotion through humor, but you've gone at it at a different direction with sort of a literal declaration. [laughing] Of your—

Travis: Much like the Joker movie, I don't do humor anymore. [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] You're about as funny as the Joker!

Travis: [laughs] Does Batman even appear in this movie? Huh?

Justin: I don't even think Batman's in it. He's not in the credits so far as Batman. He's not listed as Batman. I would love, though, if... I mean, we're making it up, right? Why can't he kill Batman in this one?

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: Can we have one where he just ki—"You watch out, 'cause I'm the ni—" Bang. Dead. Joker killed him. Joker killed Batman in this one.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Do y'all think Jared Leto is still gonna cut up and send some pranks to the set of this Joker movie he's not in? He's gonna cut up, send some dead fish, and some funny jokes. And like a tampon or whatever. He's so fucking nasty.

Justin: Joaquin's prep for this was, alright, first, you gotta go to Jared Leto's prank school. And Jared Leto like, came and kidnapped him in the middle of the night and took him to prank school.

Travis: It was nice.

Justin: It was nice.

Travis: It was honestly—they have a great campus. The cafeteria is lovely. And uh, they have teachers with real world experience. So...

Justin: I love that.

Travis: Yeah. And y'know, tuition? Reasonable.

Griffin: I don't know how I'm supposed to find Joker scary if I have seen

Joaquin Phoenix get pooped on in a different movie.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: That's a good point.

Travis: That's pretty funny, actually.

Griffin: Now am I the Joker?

Justin: You've just become the Jo—you'll get your turn. You gotta wait. Everybody gets their—you were on TV for six episodes, so like, you'll get your turn.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Yeah. It was—I mean, I'm checking the list here. Ooh... your turn is

not until 2433.

Griffin: Alright... better eat my vitamins...

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] Uh, this is an advice show. We help people, and we're gonna start doing that right now. "I work in a book store, and my coworker is—" I should warn you guys, just as an alert, 'cause we do like to be honest about this stuff. I am standing for this episode.

Griffin: Oh, okay.

Travis: Oh.

Justin: And that's not a challenge. It's not a threat.

Travis: You couldn't pay me to stand again.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I'm letting you know, I got the standing power. In case I feel like really... if I'm coming on too strong or too funny, please let me know. "I

work in a book store, and my coworker is, by far, the nicest person *alive*." See, I normally would've just taken that a little more low key.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: But since I'm standing, I'm like, "Bada bing!"

"Whenever he is particularly happy or having a good day, he buys some of the 80 cent caramels we sell at the front desk, and distributes them to his friends and coworkers. I've received many of these caramels from him, and while this would not normally be a problem, the caramels themselves are terrible. But I can't think of a way to turn him down without coming off as an asshole.

He often waits excitedly for me to take a bite, and I'm left making excuses, squirreling these not-sweets away 'til I can throw them out in secret. Brothers, how do I tell my coworker I don't want his caramels without making things awkward?" And that's from Make It Stop in Milwaukee.

Griffin: [sighs]

Griffin: That's so fuckin' good. Travis, that is a really good answer.

Travis: "Here, take this caramel."

"I can't. I'd have to go through a whole process and take out my plastic teeth in front of all of these human beings, and then we'd have to clean up all those walnuts everywhere."

Griffin: [laughs] And guess what? You don't even have to have Invisalign. They'll walk up and say, "Have this caramels," and I'll say, "I have Invisalign." And they'll say, "I'm looking at your mouth right now and I don't see them." And you're like, "Then they're working."

Travis: "Thank youuu."

Griffin: "Thank youuu. They're discreet."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: As somebody who just went on a beach vacation with Travis, this line is bullshit. He will leave his plastic teeth literally everywhere.

Travis: This is true. I will.

Justin: He has no hesitation.

Travis: I'm a monster. Uh, but, I'm saying maybe you are not a monster, and you—they would say like, yes, that is what a conscientious person would say. Um, just side note – 80 cents for a caramel? [sighs] Back in my day... a penny. A penny for those things. I'm just saying.

Justin: A penny for caramels?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Well, when Travis worked at the penny sweets factory.

Justin: Right.

Travis: Yes. And I stole a lot of them. That's probably what raised the price.

Griffin: Yeah. Uh... yeah, caramel is the worst candy, and I think we're all on the same page about that.

Justin: Nooo way. Are you kidding me?

Griffin: Hard caramels or soft?

Justin: You really think caramels are the worst?

Griffin: Well, the ones that really make you work for it. Like, I'm not gonna work for what is essentially like, bad chocolate. Like, I'm not gonna chew it up and get my fillings all fucked up and, y'know, disrupt the... I'm on my—Juice, I don't know if you know this. I'm on my adult teeth. I don't have any—I don't have any more ones coming after these.

Justin: You've lost your milk. You've lost your milk teeth. Now you're onto your man's teeth.

Griffin: I've lost my—[laughs] Yeah.

Justin: I think—well, okay, the worst candy is black licorice.

Travis: Wrong.

Justin: We're all on board with that. Incorr—no, you're wrong.

Travis: I love black licorice.

Justin: And the second worst candy is the black and orange, uh, tasteless lumps that you get at Halloween from mean people.

Travis: No, absolutely. Yes. Those are the worst.

Justin: Those are very bad. Those are my top two worst candies, for sure.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: But what do you—what do you say? "Ohh, here comes nice coworker. Ohhh, nice coworker's walking up. Ohh, look at that. He's got a handful of them 80 cent car—he spent \$40 on 80 cent caramels so he could pass them out to the employees, his friends... ohh, that's so nice." "Oh, here you go, Justin! An 80 cent caramel for you, my friend, 'cause I'm havin' a great day! I would like to watch you enjoy it!"

Griffin: Mmm... okay.

Justin: The problem with this is...

Travis: "Take a bite, Justin. Justin."

Griffin: "Bite the sweet. Bite the chewy sweet."

Justin: Hold on, I will bite the sweet. I enjoy the caramel. I enjoy it. You're not going to—you're not gonna trip me up on this. I'm loving it, bada ba ba. What I'm suggesting is, a lot of the time with this show, people come to us after it's too late. Because if you've taken the caramel once, then you're right, because the next time, the second time you say, "I don't like the caramel, please don't get it near me," you've already taken one. And that—and every time you've done that, you've made this weirder and weirder.

If you had just said the first time, "I don't like'a the caramel. You keep it." I can't fix this for you, folks! You gotta just tell people when you don't like'a the caramel!

Travis: Uh, I'm still waiting for you to bite the caramel I gave you, Justin.

Griffin: Yeah, bite that fuckin' caramel. Eat that chewy sweet.

Justin: I—I bite the caramel out of Travis' hand and lick his palm like a fucking horse.

Travis: How was it?

Justin: Chewy and real!

Griffin: Travis, do me. Do mine. Do me.

Travis: Okay. Ah, Griffin, I brought you this nice caramel! Please eat it!

Griffin: Aw, fuck yeah, these are my favorite—aw, shit, I dropped it down that storm drain that I'm standing on top of.

Travis: Oh, here's another one!

Griffin: Oh, thank you. Aw, real bubberfingers over here! I dropped it right down the dang storm drain!

Travis: Well, that's a \$1.60 so far. Uh... here's another one.

Justin: Pennywise is like, "Hell yes, keep them coming!"

Travis: [laughs] "It's all chewy down here!"

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: You could buy all of them before, y'know, the building opens or whatever, and dump them all down the storm drain.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: No matter what, these things are goin' in the fuckin' storm drain.

Justin: But then Pennywise starts using those to lure kids into the drain, and that's on you.

Griffin: It's 2019. He will get no kids. It's caramels.

Travis: [laughing]

Griffin: Kids are now woke as hell, and they hate caramel, as they should. They're not gonna get tricked.

Travis: They only like Japanese weird flavored Kit-Kats.

Griffin: Yes. That's it. That's what hot right now. Can I do a Ya—

Travis: Aw, no, only caramels? Call me when you got some matcha flavored Kit-Kats.

Griffin: Yes. How about a Yahoo?

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: This one was sent in by Graham Robuck. Thanks, Graham. It's Yahoo Answers user Jim who asks... [sighs] "Can you dry a hat in an oven?"

Travis: Mmm. Hmm.

Griffin: The obvious answer is no. But, is there another answer? Can we turn that into more of a yes shape?

Travis: Hmmmm.

Justin: I think if you crank the oven and leave it open, it would probably be okay. I think if you crank the oven up high, it can't catch fire. Okay, wait. Let me back up.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: We have a lot of fun here. And I know we have a disclaimer.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: That our friend Bob Ball did. And we've had that for ten years. Don't

do this thing.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Don't put your hat in the oven. But, if you did, I think it'd be fine if you left it open. I don't see how bad things could get if the oven was open.

Right?

Griffin: Okay. Um, yeah. No, I mean, it would still probably be pretty bad. Could you make your house hot if you left the oven—okay, this is nothing.

We can't even begin this suggestion.

Justin: I've had to heat my house with an oven before. Yes, that will work.

Griffin: Okay, it's doable. Cool cool. Can you just set the oven to like...

Travis: Light?

Griffin: A hundred degrees?

Justin: I'm gonna set it to hat.

Travis: Okay. Oh! Here we go! Hey. Plastic melts at 212 degrees.

Griffin: Oh!

Justin: Okay.

Travis: So you're under 200, you are golden!

Griffin: Well, assuming you're wearing a fuckin' like, baseball helmet.

Justin: Is that Celsius or Fahrenheit, Travis?

Travis: That's Fahrenheit. 212 degrees Fahrenheit. According—

Justin: That's the boiling temperature of water, too. Isn't that weird? Why would that be?

Travis: Maybe because there's water in plastic? Is there?

Justin: Maybe?

Travis: Man, we're so smart. [laughs]

Griffin: That's when fuckin' atoms just give up, 'cause they're lazy pieces of

shit.

Travis: Yeah. What about an Easy Bake oven?

Griffin: That would... be...

Travis: Shove your hat in there.

Griffin: So funny, 'cause it's really small.

Justin: You're never gonna get—they have become so safe. My daughter has one. They've become so safe at this point that you need like, a special tool to slide the thing into the thing. They don't open anymore. You slide them into a tray, and then use another special tool to get them out the other end. There is no way you're getting a hat in there. Guaranteed.

Griffin: Hm.

Travis: No, I think I could get a hat in there.

Justin: Travis, you're not gonna get a hat in there.

Travis: I could get a hat in there.

Griffin: Juice, let him fucking try, okay?

Travis: Let me put a hat in your daughter's Easy Bake oven. Please. Can you bring it on tour?

Justin: Okay. Around the holidays, come on down. You can put a hat in there.

Griffin: Oh, yeah, I'm gonna—I'm gonna turn this into the next hot viral video. Travis putting his money where his mouth is.

Travis: Yes. No, I've got it! And it's gonna be hard, 'cause it's not like 1997 anymore. But you need that Ron Popeil dehydrator shit. You got a wet hat? Gotta dry that hat? Hm. Dehydrator? That seems like the perfect way to dry a hat!

Griffin: [softly] Shit.

Travis: 'Cause you're gonna get the hydrate out of it.

Griffin: This is a fun little set up we're doing, where you look at every appliance in your house, and then you move their functions one appliance to the left.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: So like a toaster... but to make soup!

Griffin: A toaster to make soup. We're gonna need to put some sort of toaster-proof bag in there. [laughs] Uh...

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Yeah. And then we're gonna take the waffles... we're gonna put those in the hair dryer. And baby, I hope you got some time on your hands. Forget your hair? A waffle iron? Hello? Hello? Are you listening?

Travis: Yes. McFly?

Griffin: Hello, McFly? For the waffle iron? Are you kidding me? The VCR!

Travis: Yeah! Okay, now, what for the VCR, Griffin?

Griffin: This one's gonna be tough.

Travis: The Betamax player.

Griffin: This one's gonna be tough.

Justin: A big magnet?

Griffin: Big magnet.

Travis: Mmm!

Griffin: To suck all the movie out of it.

Travis: Our friend who's already seen the movie.

Griffin: Yeah. That's my favorite appliance.

Travis: [laughs] This is my friend, Jeff. I couldn't live without him. He tells

me how all the movies end.

Griffin: You can dry a hat in an oven! You can dry a hat in an oven! You

can wash a hat in a dishwater, you can dry a hat in an oven!

Justin: You shouldn't.

Griffin: You can.

Justin: You shouldn't.

Travis: You can do a lot of things.

Griffin: You must!

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: You shall!

Justin: You... you can't.

Griffin: You did.

Justin: I'm saying you can't. Is it up to me? If it's up to me, you can't.

Travis: No, you have to pan fry it.

Griffin: Now, let's hedge our bets here. Let's hedge our bets here. Can you put a little bit ooof... garlic powder and oregano on the hat before it goes in the oven? Best case scenario... you get your dry hat. Worst case scenario is still a delicious hat! A delicious—you could put some Cajun seasoning. A nice blackened hat. And it's like, well, that was my favorite hat. It was my lucky hat that my grandpa gave me, the day of the big fire... which is ironic. But, um, I guess now the flavor's out of this world.

Justin: [sings Munch Squad theme]

Travis: Oh!

Griffin: And not—in the first block? What the fuck?

Justin: [singing Munch Squad theme]

Travis: Oh my!

Justin: I wanna munch! Squaaad!

Travis: Squad.

Justin: [singing more] I want! To! Munch!

Travis: Squaaad.

Griffin: Squad. I don't know how to follow along.

Travis: Ooh, sick voice Justin is weird in this one.

Justin: [still singing, sort of] Munch Squad is a podcast within a podcast, celebrating the latest and greatest in quick service dining. Today, we are going to take a little bit of a pivot. Heinz ketchup is technically, uh, kind of a fast food staple, but this is not a specific fast food item. We've talked about a few different permutations of sauces before, 'cause we know that the Heinz company, uh, like to take it nasty.

Griffin: [laughs] You remember purple ketchup?

Travis: Oh yeah!

Griffin: What—who gave them the fucking right?

Justin: We're gonna get a little bit wilder than that today. [sighs] This was sent to me by Catherine Bonham. Very good. Thank you, Catherine. And... here's the headline, folks. Ed Sheeran's Heinz tattoo is now a limited edition ketchup bottle.

Griffin: [laughs] Again! Again! Again!

Justin: I'll take you one more trip, but it's gonna be another nickel. Ed Sheeran's Heinz tattoo is now a limited edition... ketchup bottle.

Griffin: Can I squeeze Ed Sheeran's arm and get ketchup out of it?!

Justin: Yup.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: 'Cause that's what that sentence means!

Travis: [quietly] Ed Sheeran...

Justin: If you break this sentence down literally...

Travis: [quietly] Heinz...

Justin: Literally, what it is saying is that Mr. Sheeran got onto Game of Thrones, and then made his tattoo have the ability to distribute ketchup to the people.

Griffin: [laughing]

Justin: That is, of course, not what is happening here. Uh, what is happening here is, a limited edition bottle of Heinz tomato ketchup... boys, I'm gonna send you a quick picture. Anybody who would like to can uh, find this for themselves. I'm sure it would not be a challenge. Hold on one moment.

Griffin: It will be challenging.

Justin: Challenging spiritually for you, but not a challenge literally. Here comes the picture of... and what'll be kind of nice is, it's just gonna look exactly like you expect it to. It's going to be 100% what you are envisioning when I say, uh, a ketchup bottle milked from the tattoo of Ed Sheeran.

Um, what you've got is...

Travis: Huh.

Justin: A bottle...

Griffin: Oh my god.

Justin: Of Heinz... that has Ed Sheeran's...

Travis: Skin!

Justin: Sort of tattoo...

Justin: It's also worth—\$1,800 for this special ketchup.

Travis: That better be some damn good tasting ketchup!

Justin: Um, it's called Edchup.

Griffin: Say—

Justin: They—they called—they—they—they call it Edchup.

Griffin: *Fuck,* man. This is dark.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: It's pretty dark. This is always an extremely dark segment, but um... he got this tattoo in 2012 to commemorate a tour, and it commemorated the tour and his love of ketchup. And now, Heinz is working with Ed Sheeran to make a—

Griffin: [muffled] They made a bottle—they made a bottle out of it. [laughs] They made a bottle out of it.

Justin: They made a bottle out of his tattoo, of...

Travis: That is the most recursive thing I've ever heard of.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: He got a tattoo of the label of the Heinz ketchup bottle, and Heinz said, "Aw, cool, we're gonna make a label out of your tattoo of the label of the Heinz ketchup bottle. Griffin: It's ghoulish. [laughing]

Justin: Gothic. It is... it is ghoulish. Ed Sheeran's eyes as he's holding this bottle of the ketchup based on his skin are the blackest things I've ever seen.

Travis: It's haunting!

Justin: Cold, black eyes like a doll's eyes. Terrifying. Empty, bottomless pits. Soulless.

Griffin: [laughing] It's really fucked!

Travis: This is a man who has clearly seen the end of the tunnel. Like...

Justin: [bursts into laughter]

Travis: And in the end, we are all just ketchup bottles.

Justin: This is it for Ed.

Griffin: What's great—what's great is that you can zoom in all the way on his face, and it crops the ketchup bottle out of it, but you can still see the top of his hand, so you can play a game where you imagine what he's holding that's making him have that face. And for me, in my mindscape, it's his own tombstone.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] It's the—it's an urn containing the ashes of a beloved pet. You... Ed... this is the worst thing I've seen about Ed Sheeran in my entire life, and I heard him sing a duet with Alexa *this week*.

Griffin: [laughing]

Travis: [sighs]

Justin: Ed. Do you need my help, Ed?

Justin: I will come for you.

Travis: Ed...

Justin: Are you doing alright, Ed?

Travis: You've gone too deep, Ed!

Griffin: Ed...

Travis: I know this fame thing was really fun in the beginning. You started and you were like, "Aw, man, this is great. Everybody wants to give me money for my music. How bad could this be?" And now, your skin is wrapped around a tomato bottle... tomato bottle. Ketchup bottle, and you probably feel bad. Y'know? At this point, you probably feel like a mockery of yourself. Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: Okay. Beep boop beep...

Travis: He did give us his business card that said, "In case of opossum."

Griffin: Travis! I was trying to type.

Travis: Go ahead. Okay, sorry.

Griffin: Beep bop beep, doot dip bom beep bon bee bom boop boop beep beep boop oop boop!

Travis: That's Griffin's scat keyboard.

Griffin: Riiing... riiing...

Randall: Oh, hey, Griffin.

Griffin: Aw, hey, Randall. Hold on, I'm gonna patch you in. [indescribable sound effects]

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Uh, you're on with all of us now, Randall. Thanks for joining us for this, uh, this query.

Randall: Oh, no, thanks for having me.

Griffin: Randall, we got opossums again.

Justin: Yeah, we got the opossum problem we've talked to you about several times. We always come to you with opossum issues.

Randall: No, I'm happy the help. What I don't understand—it doesn't sound like there's a big problem here.

Justin: Randall, why don't you think this is a problem? Because it seems very serious to me, someone who hates opossums.

Randall: Well, so, it seems like this person has a company to remove opossums from areas. And they've—and they've moved opossums to a neighborhood, and now the people in that neighborhood want them to... want to pay them to remove the opossums. So they can just do this again. Move the opossums to a new neighborhood.

Griffin: Interesting.

Travis: It kind of sounds like embezzling. I mean, not to—

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Not like a one to one kind of thing... but definitely some of it. There's some sort of embezzling going on here. And let me first say – listen. Both because it needs said, and because I don't want to get the tweets. Yes, opossums are great. They help with pest control. They look a little freaky. But all in all, they're pretty chill. And they're not—listen. There's way worse out there. Don't get me started about armadillos, am I right?

Griffin: Travis, list off all the animals you hate and think should be gone from the earth.

Justin: Randall, what's worse – rodents, or spiders?

Randall: Oh, I don't know. I think...

Justin: If you're walking down a hallway at a very poorly kept factory, and you turn to your left, and you see one... well, okay. One very big spider, and—like a rat-sized spider. 'Cause I don't want size to figure into it. You see a rat-sized spider...

Travis: And a spider-sized rat. [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] No, regular!

Griffin: Just a little guy! Oh, now I like him!

Justin: Which way are you running? Are you running towards the rat, or

towards the spider?

Randall: Oh... the rats can bite through things...

Travis: Mmm, true.

Randall: They've got those giant teeth. I don't know. Y'know, I think—I feel like... my one thing is, I worry about rabies. But I can't remember off the top of my head if rats in the wild ever carry rabies. So I think I would stand there, trying to Google on my phone, "do rats carry rabies," and I'd still be doing that when they both bite me from either side.

Travis: I don't have great service in here. Everybody just give me a minute.

Randall: Hang on, I just gotta hold up my phone into the air to try to get a better signal, and Google... oh, shoot...

Griffin: This is great. So your left leg gets bitten, bitten, bitten by the big spider. Your right leg gets bitten, bitten, bitten by the big rat. You have time before you inevitably die, like, your heart explodes 11 seconds later. Make sure you yell as loud as you can, like, "The rat one hurts more!"

Travis: Yes. Let us know.

Randall: Oh yeah, like that guy. Like that guy who got stung by all the different insects and made a scale for how bad it was.

Griffin: Yeah, yeah.

Randall: Right. It's important data to contribute.

Justin: You—there was an opossum. You went and caught the opossum, and you're like, "Come back to my house." And then you drove the opossum to your house, and you're like, "Here, you can hang out here." And then you come back later, and you're like, "Hey, get back in the box. I was wrong. You can't stay here."

Travis: Yeah. "Have I—am I not a good roommate, Doug? Huh? I'm—I pay my half of the rent!" [laughing] "No, those are just like, pinecones and dead bugs."

Griffin: Yeah, it's not good. It's not money.

Randall: I feel like... I was trying to think how many opossums are in this—there are in this scenario, and whether or not he—y'know, the question asker just set up an area for the opossums. Like, well, I guess I run an opossum sanctuary now, where it's like, cordoned off from the neighbors.

Griffin: To—to save them from poachers.

Randall: Yes.

Travis: [laughs] Makin' all their opossum skin hats.

Griffin: Yeah, they want their—they want their precious tusks.

Justin: I think that what this question illustrates for me, uh... and I'd love to get Randall's thoughts on it as a web comic author and regular real author of a different—of real books, who, I'm assuming, is very busy. There are people who have enough free time to really impact and interact with the outside world in a way that is kind of bewildering to me.

Do you know how many opossums I would have to see confronting me in my day to day life before I'd be like, "I've gotta do something about this."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: If I see eight opossums outside, I'm being like, "Oh, fuck. Damn. Okay. Well, I'll stay in here. Fine." [laughing] It's so wild to me that people would notice a statistical uptick in opossums and be like, "I gotta address this problem." Really? Do you?

Randall: Yeah, well, I think that in an area...like, uh, a smallish neighborhood can probably support, uh... I found a thing saying that you usually get like, five or ten opossums at most per square kilometer. So like, a medium neighborhood is probably not gonna have more than five or ten opossums. So if this person has released like, 200 opossums...

Travis: Oh, yeah.

Justin: [laughing]

Griffin: I mean, not even—not even to mention like... Randall, you would have a better idea of this, what with your science knowledge – the disruption to this, y'know, fragile biome that is in this neighborhood. Like, it's not just that there's 200 opossums. Like, now it's... I mean, I don't know, less... what do opossums eat? Snakes?

Randall: Apparently everything.

Travis: They're not mongooses!

Griffin: Eh, they kind of are.

Randall: Opossums are immune to most snake venom.

Travis: What?!

Justin: Nice.

Griffin: Fuck yeah!

Justin: So cool.

Randall: Yeah, so they'll eat plants, garbage, meat... I was checking the—to see how much—'cause they don't eat as much as mammals. And so, uh... but it looks like an adult, like, the opossums they have here in America, will eat about a... like, half a Snickers bar worth of calories a day. So...

Justin: That's it? [laughing] What a fun metric!

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: How many Pringles worth is that? [laughing] Randall, what you have suggested with your back of the napkin math here, vis-à-vis, uh, opossum population density, is that maybe, when you go to take one of the opossums, the other opossums will be like, "Fucking thank you!"

Travis: "More Snickers for me!"

Griffin: [laughing]

Justin: "There are so many of us here. You've put so many of us here, fucking take Reggie. He sucks. Goodbye."

Travis: Oh yeah, we need to turn this into a Survivor-esque like, poll the opossums. You're clearly friends with them. Which opossum should I get rid of? And they're like, y'know, Stinkeye Joe. Stinkeye Joe is bad news, so we don't like him. He brings down property values. We're gonna get him out of here. He never mows the lawn.

Randall: Yeah, apparently they have trouble walking too far. 'Cause they run out of energy. I mean...

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: They need to eat more Snickers!

Randall: Yeah, exactly. Well, so, they'll need like a Snickers every... I think it's like, kilometer and a half, or they just—

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: Or else they're just not themselves.

Griffin: We got it. We got it. Fun-sized Snickers, and you're going to lay them out in a radial fan-like pattern, away from the core cluster of this, uh, this new biome that you've created. And each opossum's gonna follow each beam, if you will. Each Snicker beam. And... you're set. And then it's—then it's God's problem.

"Okay, we're not the right people to call."

Randall: I mean, maybe it's one of those situations where you're better off asking for forgiveness than permission.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Right.

Griffin: You seen Up? 'Cause I'm kind of doing a more badass version of

that.

Travis: [laughs]

Randall: [laughs]

Justin: Uh, that book will be out September 3rd in fine bookstores

everywhere. People can preorder it.

Griffin: And the nasty bookstores.

Justin: [laughs] And all the gross...

Griffin: Yeah, the scummy... the scummy bookstores.

Travis: Like B. Dalton.

Justin: [laughs] No, they're not extant. Uh, Randall Monroe, thank you so much for coming onto our podcast. I think everybody should buy your book.

Randall: Oh, thank you so much, and thanks for having me. I'm a huge fan.

Travis: Thank you!

Justin: Wow, you should've opened with that. It would've changed the

tenor.

Griffin: Should we try it again? 'Cause we've been—there's been a little hostility, yeah.

Randall: Sorry? Uh, thanks.

Justin: [laughs] I wish everybody ended their guest segment with, "Sorry. Thanks."

Griffin: Uh, I have a Yahoo here I would looove to do.

Travis: So do it.

Griffin: Okay. This one was sent in by—

Travis: Come on! Do it, coward!

Griffin: I'm trying my best! This one was sent in by, uh, Michelle Smith. Thanks, Michelle. It's an anonymous Yahoo Answers user who I'm gonna call... uhh... Dar... bilund... gunson.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Wow. That was a struggle, huh?

Griffin: Darbligunsundi asks, "Is there an appropriate time when you should carry a briefcase? I'll make this straightforward."

Travis: [laughs] Almost always is the—my favorite is the intro to a question where it's like, "I'll be honest with you..." Or, "Let's get to it."

Griffin: Also, they are not straightforward fuckin' at all. "I'm 22, a college senior at a big university. Anyhow, I'm currently doing part time because I'm working full time to pay my bills and stuff. I recently got into YouTube, and apparently, my channel is "blowing up." Anyway, I managed to buy some hardware and finance some other stuff for my video editing. I bought an aluminum briefcase, which I thought was pretty cool, and I placed everything in there. I play gaming competitively with whatever time I have free for actual money, so I carry my controllers in there.

Anyhow, this lady in my classroom asked me why I carry a briefcase. Am I business person? I told her, nah, I'm just carrying my notes slash laptop in there. I'm not a big YouTuber yet, so I don't want to sound like I'm showing

off, which I wouldn't anyway. Anyhow, she said it was kind of weird. I don't really care, 'cause I like it. It fits all my needs. But at the same time, it makes me question – is there a rule for carry a briefcase? Is it only for "business people"? Thanks."

Justin: I feel like if you're not business people, and you carry a briefcase, people are going to assume nefarious intent.

Travis: Indeed. Perhaps there's money in there, maybe documents...

Justin: Could be money. Could be documents. Could be drugs. Could be—this is a less nefarious thing, but it could be an affectation.

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: That you're doing to get attention, which nobody is crazy about.

Griffin: That—that is where my mind went immediately, is that, if you are not a business person, and you're carrying a briefcase around, you probably look like fuckin' Jason Schwartzman in Rushmore. Like, guaranteed, you look like some sort of boy... boy prince or something. It's just not—it's no good.

Travis: Here's the thing. Here's your—may I say, question asker... your mistake here was when they asked, "Are you a business person?" You should have simply said, "Yes."

Griffin: What is business?

Travis: Because—that's what I'm saying! That could've been anything! Right? Maybe your business is playing video games. And business is good. Or whatever. When someone says, "Are you a business person?" And you say yes, you then do not have to answer any follow up questions!

Griffin: I mean, though, here's the problem, Travis. The way I play video games? Smash Bandicoot, aaand... Big Big Gun Fight, and Magic Wizards Quest...

Travis: Uh-huh, yes?

Griffin: That's art. It's not business, is it?

Travis: Ooh, now, is art a business?

Griffin: The things I do... the things I do with Master Chief and all of his cool space guns? That's, uh... that's an art, I'm afraid.

Justin: Hmm.

Travis: You're right, Griffin. I'm sorry. "Are you a business person?" "No, I'm an artist." And then you pull out your controller and just start waving it around in the air. [laughing]

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Let me check my documentation, teach. [bang] Click click. [sounds like Griffin is just slapping his desk] Be straightforward with you. You're wrong.

Travis: [laughs] Ohh!

Griffin: Aw, shit, again?

Travis: Oh, no, aw, what a mistake I've made!

Griffin: Oh, that's...

Travis: What a boo boo!

Justin: Okay, if you really want to get around it... if we want to get technical about it... if people put it out for a potluck, they expected you to put it into your mouth. What no one expected, though, was how much you could get into your mouth.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: At any one time. So I'm saying, you're gonna have to smuggle a lot of hummus out in your cheeks...

Travis: Mm-hmm. Just like Andy Dufresne.

Justin: Just like Andy Dufresne.

Griffin: [laughing] Why, every time?

Justin: Smuggling hummus out... [laughing] In what way did Andy Dufresne smuggle hummus?!

Travis: No, it was—he chipped away at the wall, and then he put all the rocks and dust and stuff into his cheeks. [laughing] [muffled] "Mm, goin' outside, boss!" And then he'd go outside, and he'd spit the dust everywhere.

Justin: [laughing]

Travis: I've seen the movie!

Justin: Andy's no hummus smuggler. I know that guy.

Travis: [laughing] Oh, we can trust him! "Hey, didn't he have a mouthful of rocks?"

"Nooo. Andy would never do that."

Justin: "Noo, it was hummus." Uh, folks, thank you so much for listening to our podcast. We hope you've enjoyed yourself. We, um... we love you. How's that?

Travis: Oh, okay.

Justin: There, I said it.

Travis: Wow.

Justin: There. It's out there.

Travis: And now, we wait for them to say it back...
