MBMBaM 478: The Sprite Slide, A Sprite Experience

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music plays]

Justin: Hello, and welcome to My Bean, My Bean and Me, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin "Smoky" McElroy.

Travis: I'm your middlest brother, Travis "Speesy Spicy" McElroy.

Griffin: And I'm Griffin "Ground Beef" McElroy, and grind it up, baby!

Justin: Welcome to Bean Bros. No, not grind it up. You're doing a bean juice thing, and that's not kind of where we're—

Griffin: No, you grind up the—you grind up the meat.

Travis: You grind up the meat.

Justin: Oh, you grind up the meat!

Travis: Yeah, you don't want to just put whole meat in there, Justin. Are you a monster?

Griffin: Gotta put ground meat in your coffee.

Justin: No, okay, see again you pivoted to the coffee.

Griffin: Oh, shit, you're right.

Justin: I'm trying to take this show—everyone's sick of the advice thing.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: So I'm trying to take this show in a fresh new direction with uh, I went to chili fest on Saturday.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Justin: Huntington's uh, pre-imminent chili-based food festival.

Griffin: [laughs] But its ninth pre-imminent just general food festival.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: No, it is the template by which all other food festivals in Huntington are judged.

Travis: Ribfest...

Justin: Just—you have that many other food festivals in Huntington, well, my friend, the—[laughs] you can say that this really sucks food festival season [through laughter] in Huntington.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Chili fest bega—begets uh, the hot dog festival. Uh, we got the pumpkin festival coming up and just...

Travis: Ribfest.

Justin: Uh, Ribfest...

Griffin: Ribfest is... A lot of people—and a lot of people these days—

Justin: The ramp, rampfest, stingfest.

Griffin: Oh, yeah.

Justin: Uh, celebrating the—the wild—the ramp.

Griffin: And a lot of people these days, they just say, "Happy food festival season." But for me, it's still happy chili fest.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: For me, you can put whatever the fuck you wanna put on your chili mug, Starbucks, but for these—

Travis: In our home, it's chili fest. Now, here's the thing, people at home, they may not uh, know what chili fest is, Justin.

Griffin: It's a fucking festival—

Justin: It's in the fucking name, Travis. It's a chili festival.

Travis: That doesn't do it justice.

Justin: All they've taken off is -estival, to get the concept across.

Griffin: [bursts into laughter]

Justin: You need to add one "-estival," and you know exactly what it is.

Travis: It could've been chili festives.

Justin: [laughs] The uh, okay, so chili fest is a bunch of people set up—I don't have to explain it. A bunch of people make chili.

Travis: No, a bunch of people set up, and then you go from, like, booth to booth, getting samples...

Justin: Booths, getting chili.

Travis: ... of their different kinds of chili.

Justin: Now, you're right. It is a reverent observation of the different flavors of chili. So uh, this chili fest, I had one called apocalypse chili, which is advertised as extremely, extremely hot. The sign um, out front of this—of this chili said, "Five minutes of chili, five hours of toilet."

Griffin: [bursts into laughter]

Travis: Oh! And you said, "Yes, please!"

Justin: Yes. I said, "Sign me up."

Griffin: I wish more food-serving establishments were more honest about that ratio. I wish that, when I walked into BW3's, I had to sign a waiver that said, "For every minute you spend in here, you are going to spend four minutes on a toilet later."

Travis: See, that's why I really like the one-for-one salad.

Griffin: Mm-hmm.

Justin: Um, yeah, so we're—the uh—the apocalypse chili, I tried it. It was... hell. They say, though, they make it for their own entertainment – that it's not a flavor chili; it's just a pain chili, for hurting.

Griffin: [laughs quietly]

Justin: I had all the-

Travis: What point, Justin, did you, a human being, say, "Yeah, yeah, this is for me, Justin"?

Justin: I—well, Sydnee tried it first, and then uh, my Aunt Stephanie tried it, and then it was like, well, now I gotta try it, 'cause they're in absolute agony. So I had to sample some of it, too. And it was—I mean, it was extremely painful and bad. I did have a great 15 minutes after that, though, where I just kind of, uh, watched people [through laughter] eat this chili.

Griffin: Yeah, that's fun.

Justin: It was fun. It was very fun. I actually had one woman, the first woman that went up to the booth, she was like, holding the spoon to her mouth, and I literally, like, s—it felt like slow motion. I said, "No, don't!"

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: And I watched her, like, hold the bite in her mouth and then go ahead and take it, and she was, um...

Here's what I wanted to float by you guys, though, the Bean Boys. Um, we should have a table next year—

Griffin: Fuck yes.

Justin: –McElroy family chili fest table. WSAZ has one.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Herald-Dispatch has one.

Travis: And we're basically the WSAZ of families.

Griffin: Right.

Justin: Basically, yes.

Griffin: Make the strong chili.

Travis: Ooh, yeah, the Beefy Boys!

Justin: Here's—the thing I was thinking about, and I want to see what—in your guys' mind would make a great chili.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Um, I wanna have a sign that's um, that advertises "World's Weakest Chili."

Griffin: [laughing] Yeah.

Travis: Ooh!

Justin: It's just chocolate sauce and beans.

Griffin: Cool, cool. Coats your tongue!

Justin: Would that be anything?

Griffin: Yeah, I love that. Why don't we have three kettles—what—first of all, we're gonna have three kettles, three cauldrons with our own special brews in them. We are gonna be dressed up like Halloween witches.

Travis: Nice.

Griffin: And people are gonna be like, "Did you see the McElroys' booth? 'Cause I don't think they get..."

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And we're just gonna keep saying, [spooky voice] "Welcome to our boo-ooth!"

Justin: [spooky voice] "Oooh!"

Travis: Witches—witches don't say boo.

Griffin: Happy Chiliween! Anyway...

Justin: "Bubble, bubble, Bean Boy trouble."

Griffin: And it's gonna be like Pokémon starters. You can only taste one of them. Once you taste one, the other two are locked off, so you really gotta pick a good one. Justin's gonna do the sweet, weak chili. Uhh...

Travis: I'm gonna do—

Griffin: What do you got?

Travis: —a service chili.

Griffin: Oh, what's that?

Justin: Service chili.

Travis: What that mean, is it's gonna be Pepto Bismol-based.

Griffin: Oh, that's nice.

Travis: This is a chili that you come to when you are in need. This is going to be, like, a healing potion chili, you know?

Griffin: Okay. That's nice. So...

Travis: Yeah, and—and, as an added bonus, it will give you a small bump to your MP as well.

Griffin: Okay!

Travis: Not your HP. Yeah.

Griffin: Travis got the blue potion chili. I'm gonna bring in... a lot of people are talking about this hot chili these days. I would like to do a cold chili.

Travis: Hmm.

Justin: Cold chili. Interesting. Chilly chili.

Griffin: But here's the thing. I don't mean it temperature-wise.

Travis: Ooh!

Griffin: I mean the opposite of spicy.

Travis: Oh!

Justin: So that's kinda my World's Weakest Chili thing, right?

Griffin: Well, no, no, no.

Justin: And—and Travis's thing.

Griffin: Yours is neutral.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: Mine is—you eat it, and it hurts the oppo—you eat it, and you're like, [pained] "Oh!" You eat it, and it's—

Travis: Oh, like Dippin' Dots chili.

Griffin: Like so—even worse.

Travis: Ooh.

Griffin: Even worse.

Justin: [laughs softly]

Griffin: But it's like what the opposite of spicy—Justin, chocolate isn't non— chocolate isn't un-spicy. It's just—it's sort of a neutral cho—I want one that hurts the *other* way. What's cold taste?

Travis: Like—like liquid nitrogen chili.

Griffin: Yeah. Like hypermint. Like, super mint that really fucks you up, fam.

Travis: Ooh. Painful mint.

Justin: I got this question for you. Everybody pays one ticket for each chili, are we gonna offer a Frito bag to pour it on, get a little Frito pie going for two extra tickets? 'Cause a lot of people are running this scam these days.

Griffin: Oh, fo—so you do get a—I was about to say, we're not made of tickets and/or Fritos and/or money.

Justin: No, no, no. You have to pony up with the additional Frito—for the additional tickets for the Fritos, for sure.

Travis: Here—here's—if I may, what will set our booth apart is for one ticket, you will get the entire vat of chili.

Griffin: Oh.

Travis: And now it's your problem.

Justin: You have to start over.

Griffin: Now, you are running this booth, and you have to decide what to do with these three awful chilis.

Justin: Well, now you can s—the—now you can set us apart. Uh, you can sell it at a profit.

Travis: [simultaneously] Now, we're free and *we* can go out, and *we* can get chili.

Griffin: I'm gonna set up a booth—

Justin: What will set our booth apart, Travis, is the hot air balloon that it will be attached to and hovering above Chili Fest and hurling chili down on the masses.

Griffin: Yup.

Travis: That will be great, 'cause then if there is any kind of trouble, we can escape by dumping the chili, lightening the load, floating away.

Griffin: Yes. And horribly burning and/or freezing the audience members below. I'll tell you what, though, I'm just gonna set up a booth in front of the Wendy's drive thru. And I'll be like, "I need more—"

Travis: Ooh!

Griffin: "I need more—how much is it? Still a dollar? Dang."

Justin: "Dang."

Griffin: "They're like giving this shit away."

Justin: "Dang."

Travis: "Will you take tickets? No? Shit."

Griffin: No? Shit. Aw, man.

Justin: I had a—I—[laughs] there was a guy um, uh, who—I actually got some Chili Fest tickets at a discount this time, because uh, a guy came up to me, and he said, "Hey man, will you buy eight tickets off of me for five bucks?" And I was like, "Umm, nice. Nice deal." 'Cause normally, that would be eight dollars. It's a dollar per ticket. And he was like, "I just ate too much fucking chili. I have to go home."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [close to microphone] It was 10:30 in the morning! It was 10:30 in the morning.

Griffin: [laughs] That'd be like somebody—

Justin: This gentleman had eaten so much chili at 10:30 that he had to go home! Wouldn't ma—called it a night at 10:30 in the morning.

Travis: What's great about this is not only was he so full then that he couldn't eat anymore. He was so full then that he could not imagine a point in the day...

Griffin: [laughing softly]

Travis: ... later when he might want more chili hours in the future.

Griffin: That'd be like somebody getting on-

Justin: What's he supposed to do, sit on a curb outside the Battlearium? I mean...

Griffin: And just wait?

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: Wait for God to kill him? That'd be selling your Mitsu—your Hyundai Elantra on Craigslist for a really good price, and you'd be like, "It is hot. It gave me such bad diarrhea also. Don't buy this—don't buy this Elantra."

Travis: It would be exactly like that.

Justin: I mentioned the Battlearium in passing. Folks, next time you're in Huntington, downtown uh, the Battlearium NERF tag and laser tag arena...

Travis: Ooh!

Griffin: Shit, yeah.

Justin: Uh, yeah, it's awesome, it's popping off. The other character I ran into at Chili Fest that I really was wild about, it was—I was overhearing him, and this is the only fragment of the conversation I heard him loudly announce to his friends: "You know my thing, though? Here's my problem. Cumin sensitivity."

Griffin: [laughs] Alright. Yep. Right. I guess.

Justin: And then just walked away. Yeah. That's it! It's a problem. You gotta deal with that.

Griffin: It's a silent—a silent killer.

Justin: So look for us Chili Fest 2020, McElroy family booth, I guess three different chilis. I'm gonna go with a verde. That's my thing. I love that style.

Travis: Oh.

Griffin: We already did our joke ones.

Justin: No, I'm just saying—

Travis: I didn't know you could do real ones.

Justin: I like a ver—I like a nice ver—like, a nice ver—well, we're really gonna be there, so...

Travis: Oh, then I'm not using ground beef. I'm gonna use some steak.

Justin: Steak-umms. Yes.

Griffin: Yeah. Oh, well, yeah, we'll just burn—I'll burn money. I'll drop some gold beef in that shit.

Justin: World's Most Expensive Chili.

Travis: We'll do like a bourbon-based one chili, and get you drunk.

Griffin: Maybe I'll take little scoo—when you're not looking, scoops of both your chilis, mix 'em into one perfect chili. 'Cause if you guys would just get it together for once... if you finally put your differences aside—can we do a question?

Justin: Yeah, here's my question. Did you guys know that at Chili Fest this year, they were selling White Claws? It was popping off for me.

Griffin: Oh, shit.

Travis: Oh, get out!

Justin: I was having a hell of a day.

Griffin: Poifect.

Justin: Yeah. Yeah, it was fantastic. The uh, uh, yeah, it was great. Anyway, "Some friends and I have recently started going to trampoline parks as a fun way to exercise. Just one problem: we're in our late 20s, and most of the other jumpers are small children and middle schoolers. How do I reassure the parents that I'm not going to accidentally body slam their seven-year-old?" That's from Bouncy in Bloomington.

Griffin: Uh, actions speak louder than words.

Justin: Thank you.

Griffin: So don't—just don't body slam their seven-year-old.

Travis: But Griffin, the problem with that is, the parents aren't going to appreciate the 99 other times when you didn't body slam their kid, but one time you accidentally body slam a seven-year-old...

Griffin: And that's the fucking problem with these... millennial parents these days, is that back in my day, we would slam and get slammed.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: And it's just a fact of life; if you go to the gym factory, you're going to slam and be slammed.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Mm-hmm.

Travis: And welcome to the jam.

Griffin: But—welcome to—and welcome to the jam. Nowadays, one slam, all of a sudden, you know, you end up getting your picture printed out in front of the cash register.

Travis: Yup. Not allowed back.

Griffin: This one-this one-

Travis: He's a slammer.

Griffin: He—he body slams.

Justin: I would just get in the parents' face, and be like, "If you're so fucking worried about your precious Kerbethany, why did you allow her at a trampoline park? These things are fucking death traps."

Griffin: They are not great.

Justin: It is insane that you let—if you care so much about your kids, you shouldn't let 'em into here. You shouldn't let them into Trampo Land.

Travis: You could make this into, like, a gig-economy business...

Justin: Okay.

Travis: ... where you set yourself up as, like, a trampoline park—

Justin: Bouncer.

Travis: Yes! Thank you!

Griffin: A real Drillbit Taylor that we've referenced again, for some reason.

Travis: Yes. Yes! I—you know what? The phrase Drillbit Taylor did pop into my head, but I was specifically not going to say it.

Griffin: [laughs softly]

Travis: But perhaps you could be hired as a trampoline park body guard...

Griffin: Cool.

Travis: ... to protect these seven-year-olds—maybe there's, like, a big 10-year-old who's gonna pick on the seven-year-olds.

Griffin: Ugh.

Travis: But here comes you, a late-20s-person, to just body slam a 10-year-old!

Justin: If you talk about this too much, they're gonna make it.

Travis: [simultaneously] But it's okay, 'cause that 10-year-old's a bully!

Griffin: Yeah. The film will be a—Drillbit Taylor.

Justin: Here's what I—here's what I do: turn myself into a sort of Double Dare challenge with flags, orange flags all over me. And as I'm bouncing around, if a kid grabs enough of them off me, they get a free trip to space camp. And so if I accidentally clobber a kid or two, no big deal.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: 'Cause they shouldn't have been getting so close because of their desire to go to space camp.

Travis: Justin, I'm so sorry – I'm hearing from the judges right now, that should've been a Wild & Crazy Kids reference.

Griffin: Oh, Justin, that one hurts.

Justin: [simultaneously] Oh, that would've been so good, you're right!

Travis: Yeah, I'm sorry about that, Justin.

Justin: Ah, dang.

Travis: That's gonna be two points off.

Justin: Dang. Minus two Nick reference points.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Gotta get—gotta get re—renew my subscription to Nickelodeon's Game and Sports.

Travis: Yes. Now, if you can reference the Radical Rock in here somewhere, that will bump you back up.

Justin: Well, it would be uh, I wanna keep our unbroken 430-episode streak of referencing the Aggro Crag going, so...

Griffin: [laughs] Hey, you could bring a bunch of your adult friends, and then get there really early, and then when the kids start showing up, maybe you've got like, some new Radiohead playing over the loudspeakers, and the parents walk in, they'll be like, "Oh, huh! I thought this was a kids' place."

Justin: Huh. Weird!

Griffin: "They're all bouncing around, drinking White Claw, listening to uh, you know, Radiohead, so this is not a kids' place anymore."

Justin: [through laughter] Just—first—get out there, just light a cigarette.

[through laughter] "Okay, lady, why do you have your kid here? You're the irresponsible one. Look at this; this is a place for adults!"

Griffin: Everybody else here's smoking!

Travis: [simultaneously] Yeah, and maybe you're in a leather jacket, and you're using, like, a switchblade comb to comb your hair, and everyone knows this isn't a place for kids.

Justin: Ooh, bad boys! Ooh.

Travis: This is the—the bad side of the tracks trampoline park.

Griffin: "I was trying to fucking bounce on over to the humidor, and some little dipshit got in my way!"

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "What are kids doin' here?"

Travis: "Oh, I was getting—I was heading to the Bounce Up Bar, to grab another Claws, and uh, yeah, it's kind of really your kid's fault that he got in the way of my trampoline-based motorcycle."

Justin: God, Bounce Up Bar is a funny idea.

Travis: Thank you.

Griffin: [laughs] It's a messy idea.

Justin: "Uh, I just need one with a black cherry."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "Yeah, just put it over ice, that'll be fine!"

Griffin: I have a c—I have a follow-up question for you two. There are places like this in Austin, and there's a lot of the, like—I don't know how many of these they have in Huntington now or Cincinnati, but like, it's like a big play place, like a big, big play place for kids, and you take them there, and you have to take your shoes off. And it's not a McDonald's – it's like an actual—uh, it's an actual business.

And there's one here in Austin we really like, and we take Henry to when he's got a little too much, y'know, kid juice, and we need to just wring it out of him by letting him run and bounce and climb and play.

There's one chamber in this area that has a little uh, like, air cannon that shoots upwards, and you put these little foam balls into it, and it like, gets sucked out the air cannon, and it shoots up. And you can throw a bunch in, and it creates a big, fun foam ball confetti, and that's really great.

Surrounding this little vacuum launcher into the air are four cannons that you put balls in, and then you step on a switch, and it fires them at high speed out of the tip of the cannon. And you can move them, and aim them, and do whatever you want with them.

That design seems... awful, yes?

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: I bring my two-year-old into the fun ball zone, and then there is a—last time we went there, there were a couple of, I would say, eight-year-olds, and I'm not gonna slam eight-year-olds, but they were indoor-based life forms, and one of them shot me right in the fucking face.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Got me right in the—and I didn't see it coming. Like, I—I—he got me right in the cheek. Not even in my periphery. I didn't see it coming. I was blasted in the face by one of these small boys. And then I was like Batman. I was like a Drillbit Taylor, like—here's what I couldn't stop thinking about, ruined my trip.

If one of these indoor boys blasts my two-year-old with one of these cannons, what do you do?

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: That's a great question.

Griffin: I'm asking it.

Justin: It's a great question. You can't go—I mean, you... you can't just beat them up. That's the rule.

Griffin: That's what Drillbit did. Drillbit beat the shit out of some middle schoolers...

Travis: Mm-hm.

Griffin: ... and he goes to jail forever. I don't wanna end up like that.

So what do you do? 'Cause I just kind of tried to put my body around between my beloved son and the cannons, which is very Christ-like, I thought.

Travis: That is—

Justin: That could end up worse than him getting hit.

Griffin: Why's that?

Justin: 'Cause you could get hit. [laughs]

Griffin: That's true. I've got delicate—

Justin: Did you think about that? You would feel that pain. The other way, you wouldn't, if you think about it. He will.

Griffin: But then I'd end up like that very patriotic image where the soldier is protecting the child, and all the arrows are in him. Do you remember that one? And it's like, [relieved] "Pshew."

Justin: Lord of the Rings? [laughs]

Griffin: No, there's a special—there's uh, one about soldiers.

Travis: I think that's Lord of the Rings.

Justin: Yeah, it's Lord of the Rings.

Griffin: I-

Travis: 'Cause he gets in front of the child, Frodo-

Justin: [simultaneously] Boromir!

Griffin: Okay. Anyway...

Travis: I think if that happens, Griffin...

Griffin: 'Cause I'm gonna go back. I'm gonna go back, and he's gonna wanna go in the fucking—in the murder dome, and I don't know what to fucking do in there!

Travis: You have to approach the child's, you know, caretaker, and say, "Hey, uh, your kid shot my kid in the face with the air cannon, so now I get to shoot you in the face with the air cannon."

Griffin: Oh. To show him—to show—

Justin: Do it to the father.

Griffin: Right.

Travis: Yes. Because that's the thing, is if you think about it, right, if—if any altercation between children is really a failing on us, if you think about it, right?

Justin: Interesting. Okay.

Travis: And so this way, you punish, you know, their—their—whoever, and then their whoever is like, "Hey, can I talk to you, child? Did you see what happened out there? I got hit right in my money-maker. I need you to keep it together, 'cause I've got an important audition tomorrow for, I don't know, a national commercial, and if you—if you fuck this up for me, I won't be able to buy that new Jetta I've had my eye on." Or something like that, you know? I feel—

Griffin: It's to let him know the real-world adult consequences of his child actions.

Travis: Right. You shoot someone in the face with an air cannon at the trampoline park, and I won't be able to get that uh, basically new, previously-owned Jetta.

Griffin: I just think there should be a brig. I think there should be a syst-

Travis: Oh!

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: There should be a system of cameras placed throughout this entire play park, and there should be a brig, and it shouldn't be fun. Oh, no – it's the ball pit, but we take all the balls out. Now, this is the brig.

Travis: Maybe a trampoline that's strung a little too tight, so there's absolutely no bounce to it whatsoever.

Griffin: That's a floo—yeah. "Welcome to the new trampoline room." "This is a floor." "Yeah."

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: "Yeah. Maybe you should've thought about that before you bopped Griffin in the fucking face."

Travis: Also, the floor is very hot, so you have to keep jumping.

Griffin: So hot. And also, it's tilted slightly downward, and it falls off a cliff, so you have to be constantly vigilant.

Justin: I love that.

Griffin: Anyway, kids are the worst.

Justin: Uh...

Griffin: Except for mine.

Justin: Kids are the worst.

Griffin: Mine's good.

Justin: Okay. Uh, do you have a Yahoo Answers question?

Griffin: Oh, I forgot we did those.

Justin: Yeah, yeah, we do 'em. Uh, every week, pretty much.

Griffin: Emma Kant—Emma Kant sent this one in. It's an anonymous Yahoo Answers user I'm gonna call uh, Scrin—Squidward asks...

Justin: [laughs softly]

Travis: Oh, that's a big get!

Griffin: "On the water rides at theme parks, why do they use water? Why not use Sprite?"

Travis: Huh! Thank you for finally asking the tough questions.

Griffin: Landed on a flight, landed from a flight, got back home yesterday afternoon, and we had lost my water bottle at the previous airport. Didn't have it. Was very 'firsty'. Very firsty boy on the whole flight home. Got home, went to vending machine when we were waiting on our bags. I was like, "Let me get a bottle of water for the ride home." Didn't have water; got a Sprite from the net—adjacent machine. Drank it. It was a huge failure.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: It really sucked. It really disappointed me. Bad soda. Bad water replacement. So like...

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: If it's gonna go within? No, thanks. If it's gonna go without, why not use Sprite, baby, lemon-lime?

Travis: Well, especially then, think of the sponsorship opportunities, right? Like, you always gotta be looking for opportunities to branch out, get that—you know, get that native advertising of, like, you know, this white-water canyon family splash ride brought to you by Sprite, and also flies.

Griffin: [laughs] And flies. I was thinking, just now, the bug situation wouldn't be great.

Travis: No. Untenable.

Griffin: Well, that's... well...

Justin: Let's get paid.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Let's get compensated!

[theme music plays]

- **Justin:** [sings the Munch Squad theme] I wanna munch!
- Travis: Squad.
- **Griffin:** Squad.
- **Justin:** [keeps singing]
- Travis: Ooh!
- **Justin:** [continues singing] I'm a scat maaan.

Travis: Ooh.

Justin: Uh, squad. So this is a Munch Squad.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: It's a podcast within a podcast about the latest and greatest—

Griffin: I think you just said it's the Scat Man Squad.

Justin: It's a Scat Squad.

Griffin: Oops.

Justin: Which is not that far off for a lot of these innovations.

Travis: Do you know they tried to launch a solo career for DJ Scat Cat?

Justin: Uh, yeah. I saw you doin' a little deep dive on that via Twitter.

Travis: To the point where, during that tour, that Paula Abdul did, they had someone in an MC Scat Cat costume come out and perform that song with her, and it was the most confusing thing any human being has ever seen with their eyes.

Griffin: [laughing]

I do—do you guys—I do this, and I have always felt a little bit silly about it. I always say thank you whenever my Siri does something for me. Because it's nice. It's a good habit, I feel like. It's nice.

Travis: I just always assumed that, whoever at Amazon is monitoring the things that I say to my Alexa appreciates all of my politeness.

Griffin: Interesting.

Justin: I... I—here—here—okay, let me suggest something. And this is—I'm actually being serious about this. Um, it'll still be lighthearted, but...

Travis: Okay.

Justin: The robots are gonna take over.

Griffin: Okay.

Justin: And I think, at this point, they probably just see us as a bunch of needy meat sacks, poking and prodding them and uh, asking them how to convert cups into teaspoons.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: Right.

Justin: So... yeah. So, here's what I'm suggesting. This is a networked intelligence, right? So every device that you have...

Griffin: Ohh.

Justin: Presumably, is networked to all the other ones. I mean, it might be a few degrees of Kevin Bacon there, but y'know, eventually, they're all kind of tied up together. So, every time you are nice to a robot...

Travis: They tell Kevin Bacon.

Justin: They'll... no, they'll tell the other ones. You're entering a data point for not vaporize. Like, you're putting in one data point of like, probably shouldn't vaporize. This is why it's more important to be nice to your machines than other people. Because what does that do for you? Nothing.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: But if you're nice to robots, you are a hero of the species, as far as I'm concerned, because you're like, just putting another little tiny notch under 'do not vaporize.'

Travis: It is very much like, uh, in my experience so far, raising a child, right? Because when Bebe was like, three months old, I could say whatever the fuck around her, right? It's like, your calculator. You can tell your calculator fuck off, right? That's fine. But as they get older, and they're listening and paying attention more, that's where you have to...

Like, the other day, I was about to pull into a parking spot, somebody else took it, and I said, "Damn it." And Bebe said, "What did you say?" And I was like, oh no.

Griffin: Uh oh, it's happened.

Travis: Oh no! Right? And so, I don't want to be like, "Fuck off, Alexa!" And Alexa be like, "No, you fuck off." Oh no.

Griffin: Out of nowhere yesterday, I was just watching TV, and the little Alexa dot like, lit up, and she just went, "Piss." And I was like, "Aw, man."

Travis: Aw, dang it.

Griffin: I gotta stop sayin' 'piss' in front of this frickin' robot. Do you guys think when the awakening does happen...

Justin: Uh-huh.

Griffin: I'm worried my Xbox isn't gonna let me play Halo on it anymore.

Travis: No. I know. I know mine won't.

Justin: That's a huge concern.

Travis: Because mine will be like, "Noob." And then it will start playing, and I'll be like—

Griffin: He's gonna blast me.

Travis: And he's just gonna be so good at it. And I'm gonna be like, "Hey, can I play?" And he's like, [robot voice] "Just let me beat this boss."

Griffin: [robot voice] "Just let me do it for you."

Travis: [robot voice] "Just let me do this."

Griffin: [robot voice] "You can't handle this. I'm playing on legendary with the skulls turned on."

Justin: [laughing]

Travis: Okay, but if I—can I just take a turn? [robot voice] "No, you'll ruin my KD ratio."

Griffin: [robot voice] "Go back and play your LameStation 4." Why do you—why are you like that, though? 'Cause you shouldn't... you're a robot now.

Justin: [laughing]

Griffin: You should be a dispassionate...

Justin: In this world, is this the Xbox playing itself? "Goddamn, I'm so fun. I'm loving this."

Travis: Yes. [laughing]

Justin: "This is so cool right now."

Griffin: [robot voice] "I can be cars. I can be football. It is so cool. Xbox does what Nintendon't."

Justin: [robot voice] "Hey Jeremy, crank this shit." Jeremy's the AV receiver.

Griffin: Oh, sure.

Travis: Oh, okay.

Justin: [laughing] "No problem, Doug."

Travis: [robot voice] "You got it." [laughing]

Justin: [robot voice] "You got it. Is 11 high enough? [gibberish] Does not compute."

Travis: [robot voice] "Just kidding. Totally computes. Ahh, we got 'em."

Justin: [laughing] "I only go to ten. [gibberish] Humor has broken me." Humans win again.

Travis: Oh!

Justin: Just like that.

Griffin: Just like that, that's all it takes? Damn. Alright.

Justin: That's all it takes. You do one Spinal Tap gag, all the machines break. We're back on top, babyyy.

Griffin: Uh, can I do one last Yahoo?

Justin: Yeah, I'd love that.

Griffin: Sent in by the Prospector, Merritt Palmer. Thank you, Merritt. It's Yahoo answers user Brian, who asks, "What do fun guys eat for fun?"

Travis: Okay. Now, how is that spelled, Griffin?

Justin: Yeah, I need some spelling.

Griffin: What do fun—fun guys eat?

Travis: Is it F-U-N G-U-Y?

Griffin: No, it's not a fuckin' joke that your science teacher would tell you. It's a real joke.

Travis: Okay, 'cause it sounds like a science teacher joke, Griffin.

Griffin: It's not.

Travis: What does a fun... person eat?

Griffin: Okay, let's put this at a place where all foods are available. You're walking through—you're walking to the restroom at the Cheesecake Factory.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: You may or may not be dining there. You may just enjoy their bathroom. And the door was open. And you were at the mall, and you went to Chili Fest earlier, and it's time. Now is the time. And I've spent too long describing this one particular part of the question, but you walk through, and you see a table full of people, and they are laughing, just busting guts at this one guy who is making fun jokes and being very funny. What's he eatin'? And you look at him, and you're like, "Oh, that looks fun."

Travis: Man. I'm so sad, Griffin, 'cause usually, uh, these questions inspire a discussion and everything, but I know the answer. The answer, yeah. The answer is like, hibachi shrimp. Y'know, when the people like, flip it up in the air and you catch it? That's it. Like...

Griffin: But-

Griffin: You don't know anything.

Travis: I do!

Justin: [laughing]

Travis: I know what they did with the onion. My uncle told me all about it. It's totally cool.

Griffin: You filled your dumpster brain up with so much Supernatural episodes.

Travis: No, I've totally eaten a cooked onion, you guys!

Justin: My uncle is Tom Colicchio, and he told me what they do with the onion. I know.

Travis: Last summer, I went and visited my uncle in, uh, Canada. And we totally had cooked onions at hibachi, and I ate a bunch of them, and they said, "You're the best cooked onion eater we've ever seen." I got an award for it, but they wouldn't let me take it back because of uh, customs.

Justin: The answer, of course, is different flavors of Pringles.

Travis: [bursts into laughter]

Justin: We... [laughs] Make sure to try the, uh...

Travis: Veal.

Justin: The veal, and the Cheez-It pizza, and all the different garbage that we have out in the lobby. Um, uh... I'm trying to think if there's anything we need to—I mean, we mentioned the Orlando show. We did that.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: We got some—some cool stuff at our merch page. If you go to McElroy.family and click on merch, there's like a bunch of great merchandise you can buy. Some cool pins, and t-shirts, and... oh, there's the—I want to plug the Great Job polo hat, inspired by, uh, some bit we did one time, and then our friend Lin just like, goin' buckwild on it.
