[theme music plays]

Travis: Alright.

Justin: Okay. [laughs]

Travis: A little self-edit there.

Griffin: Eh, I cut it out. Yeah, so it's time for another favorite part of the famed show, uh, everyone's beloved segment, Travis McElroy's Touched By... Hollywood Angels.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: By the Hollywood Angels.

Griffin: Touched By a Hollywood Angel. Uh, Trav-

Travis: I wanted—so—

Griffin: Travis, go—just let her—just let her rip, as I'm just gonna sit back and let it wash over me.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: I'm so excited, boys, because I went to the New York Comic-Con. I had a lot of good times, met a lot of cool people, most of them were our listeners.

Griffin: [stammering] [British accent] Eh, did you meet the Doctor Who?

Justin: [British accent] Oh, no, crikey!

Travis: I did. I met-

Travis: I met the Matt Smith. Uh, he had—uh—

Justin: [through laughter] Step in my time box, wibbly-bibbly!

Travis: Bibbly.

Griffin: [British accent] I can't die, can I? I die, I just come back somebody else. Wibbly-bibbly.

Justin: [laughs] Hey—[through laughter] do you guys think that random people just show up at com—former companions' house, and be like, "It's me, the Doctor"?

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [through laughter] "Hey, get in my car. My Tardis exploded. Get in my Datsun. Quick, hop in the back. I'm the Doctor now."

Travis: Here's the—Billie Piper has been kidnapped 18 times.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: [British accent] "I don't—I don't have British money. Can you take me out for a—a nice—a nice burger and chips?"

Justin: [British accent] "You know what I love? Fish fingers and custard. And then also, like, steak and vegetables. And some scotch—"

Travis: "And maybe some diamonds. I eat diamonds now."

Justin: "Diamonds. A diamond for my two hearts."

Griffin: [British accent] "Oh, my time box said it needed \$1,400 dollars, bibbly!"

Justin: [British accent] "Listen. I owe \$1,000 dollars on my time box, but I'm gonna sell it for a million. So here's the thing—"

Travis: "My time box just ran out of gas, and I'm trying to get to me sister's."

Justin: [British accent] "To pick up more money. So if you give me 1,000... quid..."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: [British accent] "...then I will be back with 500,000 quid, through time and space!"

Travis: "I'm gonna go back in time, and invest in Apple, ain't I? But I need..."

Justin: [bursts into laughter]

Travis: "...one thousand quid from you."

Justin: [British accent] "I've got the sports-betting almanac. And all I need you to do, crikey..."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Travis...

Travis: Yes?

Griffin: ...that was not the celebrity angel you were touched by.

Travis: No. No. I-

Justin: No. Sorry.

Travis: I—on day one, as I was walking into the building, through the – and I'm not gonna brag to you, but – talent entrance...

Griffin: Ooh.

Justin: Thank you.

Travis: ...I walked side-by-side with one Mr. Mark "The Ruffalo-Buffalo" Ruffalo.

Griffin: What's the smell? Describe it. Everything.

Travis: It—okay. What do you think he smells like? Yes.

Griffin: Old books?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Aw, shit.

Travis: And here's the thing – you know how, sometimes, you see someone, and you're like, "I think that's a celebrity. Who is that? Ooh, is that the—" I have never more quickly, like, "Yeah, that's Mark Ruffalo." Like, there was no—

Griffin: Yeah, sure.

Travis: He looks exactly like it is in fact...

Griffin: Singular.

Travis: ... Mark Ruffalo.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: No. Nope!

Griffin: Really!

Travis: He was exactly—picture what height you think Mark Ruffalo is. Yes.

Justin: Do you think that could be part of the fact that—I love the Ruffalo-Buffalo, you know this about me.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Justin: He kinda is... just doing... him. A lot of the time.

Griffin: A lot of the time, yeah.

Justin: A lot of times, it's not necessarily buried in the character. You're getting some permutation of—it's different sides of the same coin, but it is that original Ruffalo-shaped coin.

Griffin: Oh! Damn! I just had the idea of the century! The Mask—The Mask 2, or 3, starring Mark Ruffalo, who puts on the mask and becomes a sort of wild sort of physical comedy antics, clown-man.

Travis: I actually think, Griffin, if Mark Ruffalo put on the mask, the mask would be like, "You win." Like...

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Sure.

Justin: Uh-huh.

Travis: He spoiled—

Griffin: He told you all the secrets?

Justin: I'd love to know a little bit of it, though.

Travis: Okay. Well, of course, heavy spoilers for this point forward.

Justin: Sure. These are all real and true, right?

Travis: Yes. Absolutely.

Justin: Not goofs.

Travis: No. Absolutely, 1,000 percent.

Justin: Okay.

Travis: Um, a big majority of uh, of the next movie takes place in Stan Lee's coma.

Griffin: Oh.

Travis: Where Stan Lee is, like, a character in it.

Griffin: Oh, this isn't ripped—this is not ripped from the headlines, though, right, bud?

Travis: No.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: Is he in a coma?

Griffin: I don't know, bud.

Travis: No.

Griffin: But you said it so confidently, I got worried.

Travis: No, no, no. But like, he is a character in it. As he's, like...

Griffin: Oh, okay. I see, I see, I see.

Travis: ...talking with Captain America and The Hulk and stuff.

Griffin: Sure. Just remember that this podcast is a mummy's tomb just full of curses for every celebrity we name.

Travis: Oh, I know, I know.

Griffin: So Mark Ruffalo also should be on—just sort of on notice.

Travis: There's a lot of stuff in which, like, Thor is looking at Stan Lee, saying, "Why did you create us, Father?" There's a lot of that stuff.

Griffin: Sure, sure, sure.

Travis: Um, Spider-Man... is a... becomes a spider. A tiny spider. Um, and he does save a piglet's life?

Justin: Whoa.

Travis: He—he played—I don't know if you guys remember this, he played Beakman in Beakman's World.

Griffin: Interesting.

Justin: No, that was—that was Paul Zaloom.

Travis: Mm.

Griffin: Jesus Christ.

Travis: Well, to-may-to, to-mah-to.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: And?

Travis: He said it's going well. But like, um, the—he has to go through a lot of prosthetics to look, um, that young again.

Griffin: Sure, sure.

Griffin: 14 years old.

Griffin: Whoa!

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Defendgers.

Griffin: That would've been a way better name for the movie.

Travis: They are changing—they're gonna change the name.

Griffin: To Defendgers.

Travis: Because they're changing it to Defendg—Defendgers.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And they're gonna do that retroactively, and rerelease all the movies.

Griffin: For \$40 dollars, you can watch Defendgers.

Travis: For \$40 dollars, you can get Defendgers, but also it's gonna be packaged with the Lord of the Rings movies, 'cause they're tying that into the Marvel cinematic universe.

Griffin: [laughs] Yeah. Defendgers has The Incredible Mulk, and Giron Guy. And—

Travis: Now, why would they change their names, Griffin?

Griffin: I don't know, man. I just really wanna do advice. I've been, like, excited to do advice all week. I didn't think we'd get it—

Justin: Well, I've been excited to talk about Paul Zaloom, and that went nowhere.

Griffin: That was a real lead balloon, wasn't it?

Justin: [laughing] Yes, it was.

Griffin: A real lead Zaloom.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: Okay. Alright!

Justin: Uh, 'cause he's huge down there. You've gotta see—folks, get online, and see pictures of Paul Zaloom doing the Beakman thing still and watching kids in Latin America, like, flip their shit.

Griffin: Just fucking ripped. Like, so ripped.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: "Uh, hey, I want a—a book that's gonna pick up my spirits and lift my mood." Uh, folks, there's one you can get. Right now, by Jonny Sun and Lin-Manuel Miranda, and it is called Gmorning, Gnight!: Little Pep Talks from Me to You. Shouldn't you go pick up this number-one bestseller in the self-esteem category? Griffin: Put a little pep in my step, for sure.

Justin: Absolutely.

Travis: Um, how—just, side note, how much uh—what's our cut of every sale of that?

Griffin: 100 percent.

Travis: Whoa!

Griffin: Yeah. So-

Travis: That's a good deal! I mean, for us. It's a terrible deal for them!

Griffin: For sure. What's the first real question from, like, the God's-honest-truth real question on this list?

Justin: "My university students—" Damn!

Griffin: Try again.

Travis: Oh, no! We didn't even make it four words!

Justin: Damn, Daniel, I made it three words in, Daniel! Damn!

Griffin: Done it again, Daniel! Shoot!

Justin: Damn, back at it again with the white Vans.

Griffin: Hey, how come that kid was allowed to cuss that much at school?

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Yeah, I know, right?

Griffin: He was, like, yelling curse words a lot at school.

Justin: If Vine was seven seconds, you would've seen the principal be like, "Uh, excuse me, Phillip? Excuse me."

Travis: "Detention!"

Justin: "Detention." Back at it again with detention.

Travis: "Summer school!"

Justin: "Dag... Dag gummit, Daniel."

Travis: [laughs] "Gosh darn it, H-E-double hockey sticks, Daniel."

Justin: "H-E-double hockey sticks, Daniel. Back at it again with the white Vans."

Griffin: "Aw, piss, Daniel!"

Justin: [laughs] I think that one counts as a swear.

Griffin: What's the first question? I'm dying. I'm in hell.

Justin: "My university requires students to pick up packages at the bookstore. And thanks to my kind friends and family, I find myself at the bookstore once or twice a week." You know why you're there? [laughs] Shit, there was like a whole fucking thing built into this one! Fuck!

Griffin: Yeah. Yeah.

Justin: "Recently, the woman who is *always*," that's in all caps here, "running the book store told me, 'You're in here every day.' I assume she was exaggerating to make me self-conscious – it worked – until a couple of days ago, when she told me matter-of-factly, 'This is your second time coming in here today.'"

Griffin: Uh oh.

Justin: "It was not. Is the package lady confusing me for another student, or is she stuck in a time loop? How do I face her next time?" That's from Frazzled in Fredonia, New York.

Travis: I really enjoy that the question-asker's assumption here is that this woman working at the bookstore was, of course, doing this just to make them self-conscious.

Griffin: Yeah... um, and now it's making them think that they do have a twin, or... Because that can be like a—you work at a bookstore, really any sort of retail gig, you gotta make the fun, you know what I mean?

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: So maybe that means you bring, you know, some Sudoku books in with you, and sometimes it means trying to convince people that they do, in fact, have twins. Justin: Uh-huh.

Travis: Ugh. That's—it's so important—okay, listen. When you sit down to read a book, or lay down to go to bed, or something, take one hair off your head, lick both ends, stick it across the doorframe and the door.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: And that way, if it's gone when you wake back up, you know you've been Malkovich-ed.

Griffin: You've been John Malkovich-ed.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: So go ahead and balance it on the bridge of your nose.

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: And if it moves, you have—the John Malkovich door... I've not seen the film, but the John—they get in there, I guess.

Justin: [dumbfounded] You haven't seen the film?

Griffin: Uh, no. I didn't—it seems a little too, I don't know, adult?

Travis: Is there a point in the John Malkovich Being John Malkovich film with John Malkovich goes in his own John Malkovich door?

Griffin: I think, famously—famously, yes, I think that does in fact happen.

Justin: Did you guys know that—you guys ever see that bit on SNL where John Malkovich read 'Twas the Night Before Christmas...

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: ...and he all had all kind of spooky asides? If I was gonna be John Malkovich, and I ducked in, and I was like, "Hey." [laughs] "Hi, this is John Malkovich. Is this my manager? Good. Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Oh, okay.

Griffin: Sure.

Travis: Do you ever think about the fact that they just completely missed the opportunity to make a series of movies that were like, Being John Malkovich. Being Samuel L. Jackson.

Justin: Sure.

Griffin: Sure. Sure.

Travis: Being, like... Being Maya Rudolph.

Griffin: We are s-

Justin: That's what he is always on the lookout for, is a franchise. Spike Jones loves a franchise!

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: Uh, there is—there is—there are so many conversations happening about how Get Out is unofficially a—part of the Being John Malkovich-verse, but that's neither here nor there. What is going on here, in this exact situation in Fredonia, New York?

Justin: Um... I—I think this person is probably... confused. I mean, that would be my best bet, that they've just made some sort of... non-funny error. [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs] Can I have—

Travis: Hmm!

Griffin: Yeah. Can you have them take a picture of you every time "you," quote-unquote "you" come in? So then, you can at least know if you do have a um, a doppelganger. Or a twin, separated at birth! It can happen, folks. It has happened. It does happen, all the time.

Travis: It does happen. I've seen it, probably on like, ABC Family? I think it's on there, probably?

Griffin: Every third set of twins gets separated at birth.

Justin: Okay. I got a good test. I got a good test. Tell this person the next time that they see—every time they see you in the store for the next week, to force-feed you a bunch of peanuts.

Griffin: Oh, alright!

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Okay, but think about this – if that person...

Travis: Okay.

Justin: ... balloons up, or has an anaphylactic response, then that's your twin. 'Cause that stuff—that's like, that's genetic.

Travis: Wait, but hold on, Justin. [laughs] Nowhere in this question does the question-asker say that they are allergic to peanuts.

Justin: Yeah, but if they're not allergic, it won't work.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Trav.

Griffin: Did you even fucking think of that before you opened your big mouth?

Travis: No. You know what, look, I'm the asshole here, I guess.

Justin: If they're gonna come—

Travis: Oh, say the next time—tell the person the next time that you, quote-unquote "you" come in, have them hold... her, or them, in like, bookstore jail? Yeah?

Griffin: Arrest them, you're saying? And so, you can confront them, face-to-face.

Travis: Arrest them...

Justin: In the prison section. [laughs]

Griffin: I see, I see, I see.

Travis: Yeah, so have—have the bookstore worker person hold your twin until you can get there and investigate.

Justin: Listen, for me, that might as well be the cookbook section, 'cause good luck getting me out of there once I find my way...

Griffin: [bursts out laughing]

Justin: ...in. [laughs]

Griffin: I mean, it also-

Justin: Check their fingerprints. Have the librarian of the bookstore check their fingerprints, to see if it's a match for theirs.

Griffin: Mm. You know they got that ink for when they do the stamps in the book thing—do people still do that? Probably not, because...

Travis: Probably not at a book *store*, Griffin, no.

Justin: Not for—[laughs]

Griffin: Oh, yeah, it's different.

Travis: "Bring this back in two weeks!"

"Wait, what?"

Griffin: Um...

Travis: "Yeah, you're not allowed to keep this."

Griffin: It also could be, y'know, a hurricane heist where they know that you're getting your packages delivered there every other day, and so they know you're a rich target. They have Mission Impossible 3D printed on a mask of your face, and they will go in, and they'll get all the packages. That's another—you could—there's so many reasons why you need to install a series of webcams all around this bookstore, or a library, no one's quite sure what it is. There are rumors it could be either one.

[pause] Do you guys want a Yahoo?

Justin: I'd love one, thank you.

Griffin: I got this one sent in by lots of people. It's Yahoo Answers user Billy, who asks, "Do you think Neil Armstrong filled his space diaper during the moon walk? Serious answers, please."

Travis: Hmm.

Griffin: "I'm working on my dissertation related to the moon." Let that first sentence sink in.

Justin: Alright. One more time.

Griffin: "I'm working on my dissertation related to the moon. We now know that the moon's weak gravity, it loosens astronauts' bowels. Did early astronauts know this, or did they find out the hard way?"

Travis: I'm-okay. Listen. If they're-

Griffin: This is peer—this is a peer-reviewed knowledge source.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: That you could find on NexisLexis is this Yahoo Answer. I need it for my dissertation.

Travis: So there are many things that I am not. One of them is a gastrointo—yeah. Yeah, a tummy doctor.

Griffin: One of them.

Travis: And two, a scientist. Like, in any way, really. Scientist, I think, covers that as well.

Griffin: Sure.

Travis: But... my, no pun intended, gut reaction is that this is not true.

Griffin: About space loosening...

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: ...the bowel? Okay.

Travis: Because I have been on, like, roller coasters and rides and stuff that spun me around in such a way that I imagine, in a less-fun way, they do when they're training you to be an astronaut. And it has never made me shit myself.

Justin: [softly] This is amazing.

Griffin: Okay. What's wrong?

Justin: Are you telling me, Travis, that... the fact that you... have been on a roller coaster...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: ...uniquely positions you...

Travis: Yes.

Justin: ...to comment on the effects of space travel on the human body? Is this—is this what you just said, not as a joke, but as a real thing?

Travis: Well, more than that, Justin, I started originally before I thought of the roller coaster thing with *no* evidence to back it up, and then the roller coaster thing occurred to me, and I was like, "Wait, hold on. Justin: [laughs]

So these are... the world's most elite scientists, the world's most bravest explorers, space pioneers risking their lives, and uh, just everything to go up into the dangerous, endless, expansive outer space to further our scientific pursuits. Travis: 'Cause when they have to go potty, they stop and go right away.

Griffin: Yeah, exactly. "Houston, I've learned the cells have separated up here in zero gravity, furthering the research into uh, to curing cancer. I think we've finally got it. Oh! [makes beeping noise] Time for me to go pee-pee in the space potty. Um... I need to go tinkle-tinkle and make yellow, uh, Houston, so give me a bit. It's yellow time."

Travis: Now, Griffin, to be fair, not knowing if you have to go to the potty, versus, like, automatically, uncontrollably going to the potty is two different things.

Justin: Is it possible that—that this is not actually having an effect, and they're just bored?

Griffin: Mm.

Justin: 'Cause like, I would imagine trying to use a space toilet is the highlight of space travel.

Travis: Oh.

Griffin: Sure.

Justin: When you're floating up there in the dark, who cares, like, you're looking forward to that next time that you—like, you're just twiddling your thumbs, hoping that you're gonna have to take a dookie any moment now.

Travis: Yeah. That's the thing, Justin.

Justin: 'Cause what else are you doing?

Travis: We are talking about this, and I think the question-asker is talking about this in such a way of like, "Do you think Neil Armstrong might've, like, lost control of his bowels?"

But I think the opposite is true, where probably after five minutes of being on the moon, Neil Armstrong was like, "I'm gonna be the first man to shit on the moon!"

Griffin: Yeah. He definitely did that, or um, cranked. But there's something that happened back there...

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Just pulled his arm inside the sleeve of his space suit?

Griffin: He could, and they didn't know. "Plant the flag, Neil."

He's like, "Oh, I'm doing that, in a manner of speaking."

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: You ever listen to—hey, y'all ever listen to that tape where he's talking about how he did it?

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Talking about how he cranked it?

Griffin: No, he's talking about how he's taking one big step for guys.

Justin: "One big step for guys..." [laughs]

Griffin: He says, "One big—one st—" but he says, "One huge leap for boys," and he does it.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Have you listened to it?

Justin: [through laughter] "Hey, everybody, check out my moon-cave—I mean man-cave. This is where me and my other dudes hang out here in space."

Travis: He did declare, when he planted the flag, "The moon is for boys." I remember him saying that really loudly.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Out loud. But did you ever listen to it?

Justin: "Welcome to the big, radical, white rock just for boys."

Travis: For boys—for boys only.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [through laughter] "For boys only."

Travis: And they said, "Neil, you have to come back now."

And he said, "I'm playing on the moon! Leave me alone!"

Justin: "You can't boss me around; I'm a boy, and I'm on the moon."

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: "The moon's for boys!"

Griffin: And the first time an eclipse happened, he went around, apologizing to everybody. "Sorry, guys, my boy rock got in the way of the sun. I apologize."

Travis: "Sorry about that."

Griffin: "It shouldn't happen." Uh, so have you listened to the tape?

Justin: [laughs] I mean, I've seen it in like, alien movies...

Travis: Dad—Dad described it to me.

Justin: ...where they play it at the beginning to set the tone.

Griffin: Well, if you listen to it – it's on, you know, the Library of Congress website, which I'm on all the time – uh, he sounds... sheepish, a little bit. He sounds a li'l—he sounds a little bit, and for lack of a better term, just kind of naughty, like, while he's doing it.

Travis: Uh-huh.

Griffin: Um, and I do—and he wouldn't say it, right? Like, that was being broadcast to the whole world. The world's eyes were watching the stars, the cosmos, as we took our first, y'know, intrepid steps into our destiny in the galaxies beyond. He did have poop on his butt when he said it, probably.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Griffin: If you listen to the tape, if you really listen to it – and I mean really, really listen to it.

Travis: And the way that he walks in the video, if you watch it, is the way that Bebe walks when she's got poop in her pants.

Griffin: Exactly. Exactly.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Do you think it was—like, obviously, he gets out there...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Justin: He gets out there, he's walking around. Steps on the moon. "I'm the first—I'm the first man on the moon." Amazing. Do you think it took him a little while before he let, um, Buzz get out? 'Cause he was trying to think of other things he could be the first one to do? Like, I don't know how I would—

Griffin: Oh, yeah.

Justin: Like, I would wanna be the first person to do so many different things on the moon.

Griffin: [bursts into laughter]

Justin: It would be so irritating to know that I had to let Buzz out.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Like, I wanted Buzz—I want Buzz to be like...

Travis: Oh, yeah!

Justin: "Hey, look—[laughs] Hey, look at me, I just did um... I just did uh, the s—[laughs] I don't know, the hand jive, y'know, from Grease?"

Griffin: Yeah. Yeah, sure.

Justin: But he's like, "No, I just actually did that, like, two minutes before you came out."

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: "I totally did that."

Travis: This makes so much sense to me, Justin, 'cause if you remember, when Buzz Aldrin stepped on the moon, he said, "I'm the first second person on the moon."

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And then Neil Armstrong immediately murdered him.

Griffin: Yeah. Killed him—killed him dead.

Justin: Man, I bet—do you think Buzz had a moment where he was like, "I'm not even gonna get off."

Travis: [laughs] "Fuck it."

Justin: "Fuck it. He's the first man on the moon."

Griffin: He saw Neil doing armpit farts on the moon, and he was like, "Man, there's nothing left. Let's go home."

Travis: "There's nothing left for me to do."

Griffin: "I'm done."

Travis: I will say, I have-

Justin: "Is this Damien Chazelle? I'm ready for an interview. How's the script coming along for First Man and Buzz?"

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: "You're still gonna call it that, right, like you promised? First Man and Buzz?"

Travis: I have been very excited to go many, many places in my life, and I would say nine times out of ten, you build it up really big, and then you get there, and you're like, "Oh, okay."

So how long do you think they were on the moon before they were just like, "Alright. There's nothing here."

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: "Like, there's nothing to do. There's no TV or like, movies or anything. Like, I'm gonna get back in... and just head on home."

Griffin: You know Neil was hoping there would be some big worms he could fight.

Justin: [bursts out laughing]

Travis: Something!

Griffin: That's half of First Man, is them working on all the science, and Ryan Gosling, you know, getting—you know, inventing—helping invent the big rocket ship, and doing the zero-G training. And then there's a scene where like, he goes and he learns how to master the katana, so he can fight the big worms that he knows, he knows, "I know there's gonna be big worm—" he's, like, arguing with his wife.

His wife is like, "Why is it you? Why do you have to go and leave our family behind?"

And he's like, "I'm the only one that can kick those big worms' asses."

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: "I'm the chosen one."

Griffin: "I'm the chosen one!"

Justin: Buzz still came out swinging, with his katana just flying around, like—

Travis: "Nah, no, Buzz, I already got all of 'em."

Justin: "Don't worry, Neil, I'm here!"

Travis: "Before you came out, I killed all the worms. I was the first man to kill a worm on the moon."

Justin: [through laughter] They killed all the worms! "Neil, you missed it, bud! I got worm blood all over me, and it gives me powers."

Travis: "Ahh!"

Justin: "Amazing."

Travis: I mean, how often do you think, during training for Neil and Buzz and probably someone else, that they talked to, like, the head of NASA, and they were like, "Okay, so just in case... what do we do if there are moon men?"

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: And they're like, "There's not—Neil, Buzz, there's not gonna be moon people."

Like, "Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah. Cool, cool, cool."

Justin: "Yeah, yeah, yeah. Yeah, yeah, yeah, yeah."

Travis: "But..."

Justin: "Not after I'm done with 'em."

Travis: "...if there are..."

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: "...what do we do?"

Justin: [laughing] "Neil... Buzz..."

Travis: "No, no, no, I get it. I just wanna—[unintelligible] Yeah, probably, probably. Buuut, do we like, join their society and like, integrate? Are we just gonna take it?"

Justin: Every Gimlet show I listened to this week has had First Man ads on it, and we just absolutely gave them a free promo spot. So you've wasted—y'all wasted your money!

Griffin: Ehh, I don't actually think that's true. Because we actually described a way more badass movie than is almost certainly going to be presented to you on the silver screen.

Justin: It's gonna be hard to go back. Yeah.

Griffin: Also, I want to congratulate myself, as we are sort of nearing the end of this bit and sort of approaching the precipice of the Money Zone, for not ever, um, saying Lance when describing Neil Armstrong.

Justin: Congratulations.

Griffin: I have done that pretty much every time I've talked about space on the podcast before.

Travis: [laughs] Good job.

Griffin: And actually, now that I say that, I'm not sure it's true.

Travis: Yeah. If we're gonna finance our own movie about Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong fighting worms on the moon, we're gonna need some money. Let's go to the Money Zone.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: Eh, that works.

[theme music plays]

Travis: I'd really like to tell you about Boll and Branch. They make—

[music plays]

So appreciate it. Lot of fake, uh... lot of fake questions in this episode. It's a kind of a little bit of a trend.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: Uh, so what do you guys wanna do now?

Griffin: I want you to read a question.

Travis: I'm kind of hungry. I've got—oh.

Justin: Oh, you're kind of hungry? [imitates guitar solo]

Griffin: Oh, my God.

Travis: Whoa!

Justin: [imitates guitar solo]

Griffin: Well, I don't know if it's gonna be a Junior or a Big Boy. What's it gonna be?

Justin: [imitates guitar solo] [shouts] I wanna munch!

Travis: Squad!

Griffin: Squad! That's a Big Boy.

Justin: [imitates guitar solo] [sings] I want to munch!

Travis: Squad?

Griffin: Squad!

Justin: Junior. [laughs]

Griffin: Aw, damn it!

Justin: Mickey's! We've never featured Mickey's on the show. I don't even know what a Mickey's is. It's a deli.

Griffin: Holy shit.

Justin: This year, they're creating a spicy... spooky... Cheeto pizza!

Travis: Mmm.

Justin: "With the popularity of the eerie Halloween food trend—" I'm sorry. No, I don't think... is it? They had the black Whopper the one time.

Griffin: [groans]

Justin: The spooky black-bun Whopper. But that's about it that I know of.

Travis: That was an accident, though. [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs] That was an accident. They fucked up. They let some typewriter ribbons fall into the bun-maker machine.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: This is—

Travis: They just burned the buns real bad.

Justin: This is a wild—this is a wild press release here on QSR. This is one sentence. "With the popularity of the eerie Halloween food trend combined with the popularity of Flamin' Hot Cheetos," period.

Travis: Mm-hmm. ...What?

Griffin: Is this 2009? What the fuck are you talking—

Travis: Wait, that's not a complete sentence!

Griffin: Have you guys seen this awesome—have you seen this Hot Cheetos and Takis video? It's new. From 2000-and—2000. Just 2000. From the year 2000.

Justin: Here's another sentence. "Mickey's deemed it fitting to be the first pizzeria to combine the two." Period. Next sentence. "The result, the Spicy Spooky Cheeto Pizza."

Griffin: Why spooky?

Justin: "Don't be fooled by its burnt-like appearance upon first glance. The pizza is actually very tasty." [bursts out laughing]

Travis: [laughs] What a press release! "Hey, I know this looks like shit, but I promise, we didn't fuck it up!"

Justin: "This fucking looks like garbage!" The black—

Griffin: Oh, my God. I am looking at a JPEG of this. It looks like fucking garbage.

Justin: "The black hue is created by kneading activated charcoal into their fresh homemade dough. But don't worry—"

Griffin: That's good, dog. That'll clean your teeth!

Justin: This is a press release for a pizza to eat. "But don't worry – in terms of flavor, activated charcoal doesn't have much."

Travis: Huh?

Griffin: [bursts out laughing] Much!

Justin: [holding back laughter] "It's got a little bit of charcoal flavor, but not much!"

Griffin: [laughing]

Travis: Oh, my God.

Justin: "Next, two types of cheese's," with that possessive apostrophe, "cheese's are added."

Griffin: Oh, my God.

Justin: "Mickey's first pizza to have multiple kinds of cheese's," is in a complete sentence in this press release.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: "The mozzarella provides a creamy, mild taste, while the cheddar gives the pizza a balance of flavor and sharpness. To top it off, Flamin' Hot Cheetos are baked on top, adding a bit of spice to every bite while perfectly complementing the various flavors."

This is my favorite line. "The Spicy Spooky Cheeto Pizza only comes in a size large." [laughs, wheezing] I know how much pizza you're gonna wanna eat!

Travis: [laughs] "We did no half-measures."

Justin: [laughs] "There's no ha—" Yeah. You can't dip your toe in this monstrosity. You're gonna eat a large, and you're gonna like it.

Travis: I will say, we talk about food in Munch Squad a lot, that I'm like, "But you know what, I'd fucking eat it." I'm looking at this pizza, and it looks like a crime scene!

Griffin: I would not eat it with my worst enemy's mouth.

Justin: The la—speaking of which, the last sentence of this is, "Make sure to come by to get your," quote, "'Instagrammable' food post before the month ends."

Griffin: Oh, there it is. There it is.

Justin: I don't know... that we should be, and I know that we are, and the ship has sailed, and we're all doomed, right? But like, I don't know that we should... be designing foodstuffs for the visual novelty.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Like, I'm not sure we want the "to be" verb of all the food that we're trying to eat to be, "You all have to see what I'm about to put in my body."

Travis: The word I think you're looking for is, "ogled."

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Right. Exactly. I want my dinner to be rubbernecked by passersby.

Travis: How could you?

Griffin: Come have a chomp of our yucky stunt pizza, is basically what they're saying here.

Travis: Yeah. The press release should—it should just be one sentence. "Is this anything?" question mark.

Justin: "My boss loves buying ex—"

Griffin: [Borat impression] My boss!

Travis: "Fill 'er up!"

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: I don't have kids of course, but someday. [laughs]

Justin: My girls'll love these.

Griffin: It sounds like... [laughs] It sounds like your boss maybe doesn't like the snacks?

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: The boss just likes feeling powerful. And has done it right.

Justin: Yeah.

Justin: Yeah. Finite.

Griffin: Yeah. I thought you hated them, I guess.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: You can also just eat a—as many—eat too little, take too little, and he says, "Uh-oh, seems like you didn't like 'em."

And you eat them, and you go, [exaggerated] "Mm, scrummyyy!"

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: And then you'll also never get snacks again from him. There's just so many things you could do. This is an easy one. Jesus.

Justin: This one's really easy.

Griffin: This one's so easy. There's, like, 15 things you can do. It's so easy.

Travis: Is there a—do you have a scapegoat in the office that you could make go first, and see how many they take?

Justin: Ooh!

Griffin: Mm.

Travis: And then just always take-

Griffin: Dial it in.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Interesting.

Griffin: Um, I got a Yahoo here. Y'all want it?

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: It was sent in by Logan. Thanks, Logan. It's Yahoo Answers user... Tentacles87, who asks, "If you want an extra cheese slice at a fancy restaurant, what is the least embarrassing way of saying it?"

Travis: Mm!

Griffin: You're at a fancy restaurant. Like a Buca di Beppo.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: And you want, uh, an e—I guess I included this one mostly because I was trying to sort of split the needle... thread the needle—well, no, I wanted to split it, 'cause I would like to have two needles, um, of knowing what is a fancy restaurant... that does deal in cheese slices. In slices of cheese, you'd be requesting extra of.

Travis: The only thing I can think of is, like, on a burger.

Griffin: Like a fancy—

Travis: Like a cheeseburger?

Griffin: [bursts out laughing]

Travis: ...like a doula, that would be amazing. Thank you very much.

Griffin: It's just like—it's just like, I wanna go in the back room with some of these fancy restaurants, gang, and see if the fucking Riddler is the one putting these cheese plates together.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: [laughs] "I put olives and berries on there!"

"Okay. Well, now..."

Justin: It is—

Travis: "...what am I supposed to do with that?"

Justin: You know, you never really order soup and get a tray of cut-up potatoes and chicken and stuff and a can of broth, and the chef's like, "I don't know. You figure it out. Whatever tastes good, you got this."

Griffin: "Good luck."

Justin: "It's fine."

Travis: "I'm going to give you a large chunk of cheese, and three crackers!"

Justin: Oh, that's the worst!

Travis: "And it'll be up to you to determine the portions!"

Justin: There should be six of everything. How are you gonna play me like that?

Justin: Get 'er in.

Griffin: Good work, Juice.
