Trends Like These 242: Warren Releases Healthcare Plan, Fake Bridezilla Dramatic Reading, Richard Spencer's True Form, Trump Owes \$2M for Sham Charity, Jeffrey Epstein Autopsy Findings, Massive AirBnb Scam, Trump Jr. is Still a Jerk

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Brent: This week: McDonald's CEO gets canned, Elizabeth Warren's brand new plan, and Popeye's we stan.

Courtney: I'm Courtney Enlow.

Brent: I'm Brent Black.

Courtney: And I'm going to need an extra week off life!

Brent: With Trends Like These.

Brent: Hello, Courtney.

Courtney: Hello, Brent!

Brent: We are doing a show... get this, get this. And I can't stress this enough... about trending news!

Courtney: What? [laughs] Oh my god.

Brent: I know! Which timeline did we end up in?

Courtney: It'll never catch on.

Brent: Well, we'll give it a college try.

Courtney: Yeah.

Brent: Um... welcome to Trends Like These, real life friends talking internet trends. It's what we do. This week is a Courtney and Brent twofer. A two-hander, as you might say in the theater.

Courtney: And y'know what? I actually—this episode is where we are going to introduce the Courtney and Brent theatrical players.

Brent: Yes. Courtney and Brent repertory theater.

Courtney: Yes. It's going to be a thing of beauty and joy forever.

Brent: Well, at least your part. We'll see.

Courtney: [sings] Foreverrr...

Brent: I'll dust off my acting skills. Um...

Courtney: Hey, Brent. Really important question. And I already know the answer, but it's basically like a pretend question to like, get us into like, a fun conversation.

Brent: Great.

Courtney: Are you one of those people for whom it's like, it's November now. It's Christmas!

Brent: Um, I mean, yeahhh. I have hang ups about Christmas... but I also love Christmas lights. So... yeee—I mean, like, I don't—you know me. I roll my eyes at the concept of American holidays, and I'm always like, "We should have a different one to celebrate a thing that nobody celebrates but me!" But um... yeeeaaah? What about you?

Courtney: [whispers] Brent, I love Christmas.

Brent: Ah, shocker. [laughs]

Courtney: [inhales deeply] I so, like—I am that person where it's like... oh, the Halloween costumes are off? It is Christmas. 'Tis Christmas time.

Brent: Mariah Carey rising from the coffin.

Courtney: Oh my gosh, yes.

Brent: I guess it's not a coffin. It's a bed in that one memey thing. I'm not trying to say she's dead. But uh...

Courtney: She can never die. She is with us forever.

Brent: Yeah, I gotta say, I feel like I'm struggling to think of a Christmas song... let me zoom out and say, I think All I Want For Christmas, the Mariah Carey version, is on the shelf with like, Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer, Frosty the Snowman, Santa Baby, it's like a perennial Christmas classic.

Courtney: Hundred percent.

Brent: Have we – and you're the pop culture expert between the two of us – have we had a song that has been such an essential Christmas song in the canon since All I Want For Christmas is You, which got popular, I think, reached its height of popularity around Love Actually time? Early 2000s?

Courtney: Well, I think that it was already a perfect, incredible classic.

Brent: It came out before that, but I think that was like, what gave it the-

Courtney: Yes. And then, Love Actually basically just made a whole movie about how good this damn song is.

Brent: [laughs] Yeah.

Courtney: Y'know, respect. Uh, but yeah, no. I feel like that is the most recent Christmas standard that we have in this world, and I'm fine with it.

Brent: Is it your favorite Christmas standard?

Courtney: It is up there. It is up there. I do have like an actual, like, breakdown. It is my favorite Christmas—

Brent: Well, hit me with just some like, basic like, gut reaction, like, rapid fire.

Courtney: Oh, okay. My number one favorite Christmas song is Baby, Please Come Home, the U2 version.

Brent: Interesting. Go on.

Courtney: Yes. But I have like—it's kind of like, um, it's one of those, like... like, Hallelujah, I have like, a million versions of it. Where it's like, anyone does a cover, it's like, I have this version. Yes. I just have a million of them. I really love, um, the Barenaked Ladies, Sarah McLaughlin version of God Rest Ye Merry Gentleman.

Brent: Wow, that is a specific cut.

Courtney: I am a specific lady.

Brent: [laughs] Um...

Courtney: I am specifique! But I have a whole playlist of like, all my Christmas jams. I busted it out last night. It was a great time. Just a goddamn holiday wonderland.

Brent: Couple thoughts from me. My Chemical Romance has a cover of Mariah Carey's All I Want For Christmas is You, and it's hilariously screamy. I think my favorite is probably I Wish it Could be Christmas Every Day by Wizard, a UK glam band. Um, great tune. Uh, I like, um... Please Come Home for Christmas, the Eagles version of that. Though, there is a line in it where he says, uh, "My baby's gone, I have no friends," and I'm like, well, that's your problem.

Courtney: [laughs] That's not on us.

Brent: That's your issue, Eagles.

Courtney: That is not our deal.

Brent: And then, and then like, the other All I Want For Christmas is You, an entirely different song by Vince Vance and the Valiants.

Courtney: I love that one. Yes.

Brent: Mm-hmm.

Courtney: I used to—like, in the days of uh, where my preferred musical streaming service was Pandora, every year, I would do a different Christmas playlist. And no matter what I did, I would do some like, thumbs up, thumbs down situation where I would end up, no matter what, the only thing it would play me would be Eagles Christmas music. And I was like, what have I done?! What did I do?

Brent: [laughs] My um, my girlfriend has this thing she calls BTP, 'cause she tries to make every goofy thing in her life sound cool, and it's Blues Traveler Pandora. Pretty solid station. But there's this random Alicia Keys song that is not in the galaxy of Blues Traveler that's always just included for some reason. And like, no shade the Alicia Keys, but like, that's... incongruous. But hello and welcome.

Um, so-

Courtney: I will—okay. I give a lot of shit to Michael Buble, as does everyone, rightfully so, for making like, the very heteronormative Santa Baby version. Where he's like, "Santa pally..." Like, we get it. You're not gay for Santa. Be cool. Chill out.

But if we were going to have like a new Christmas classic, I would put in a real vote for his song, Cold December Night. That is a legit Christmas banger, and I love it a lot. So if you can get past the whole like, "Santa

buddy... don't kiss me under the mistletoe, because I'm not gay! No homo!" But yeah, other than that, like, that song's really good.

Brent: [laughs] Michael Buble. First time I became familiar with him, I was watching a commercial that I was sure was Frank Sinatra in the background. But then it showed him lip syncing the words, and I was like, odd casting choice, but whatever. [laughs] I had no idea it was him singing. Um, anyway, okay. What are you drinking? That's a thing we do on the show.

Courtney: I'm having a beer night. I'm doing a Goose Island IPA.

Brent: Lovely.

Courtney: Yeah, 'cause my friend and I are going to—we're going to go see Last Christmas. That's another—that's another wonderful Christmas song that I love all versions of. The band Travis has a really good cover of it. Um, but we uh, we sneak in secret beers to movies like monsters.

Brent: Nice.

Courtney: So we're gonna go see Last Christmas.

Brent: It's a victimless crime.

Courtney: Which I'm so excited for! I'm so excited for this movie! I don't care that it's been spoiled by the internet. It was spoiled for me when I saw the trailer and figured out exactly what this movie was about. And it's fine. I'm so excited.

Brent: Well... I hope you don't feel the need-

Courtney: I'm not gonna spoil it for the people, though.

Brent: Okay. Okay.

Courtney: 'Cause they don't need to know.

Brent: No.

Courtney: If they haven't figured it out from the trailer, and they haven't been spoiled by the reviews or anything, like, I want them to figure out this magical journey for themselves. But I'm about to go in, drink some secret beers, and watch my very good Christmas rom com, and I'm so excited.

Brent: Well, I really hope it stuffs your stocking. Um, so, I'm drinking-

Courtney: Henry Golding can stuff my stocking, and so can Amelia Clark for that matter. Everyone in this movie can stuff my stocking.

Brent: [laughs] Mazel tov.

Courtney: What are you drinking, baby cakes?

Brent: I am back on my bullshit with... [can opens] A Polar Seltzer brand orange vanilla seltzer.

Courtney: Oh, we missed you so, you creamsicle son of a bitch.

Brent: Yes, I did not get the 96 pack this time, as I did in a ridiculously money-saving move about a year ago.

Courtney: [laughing] We are all very glad to not spend the next like, four months of our life hearing like, "Well, today I'm drinking an orange vanilla nonsense beverage."

Brent: This time, out of a glass harmonica! Uh, anyway. So, yeah, no, it's good. I have a pretty good rotation of seltz' goin' on right now, but this is... this is just like... I'm beside myseltz.

Courtney: Oh my god.

Brent: Yep.

[theme music plays]

Brent: Alright folks, there are so many stories this week, and it's just Courtney and I on the show, and we talked about it on our Slack, and we were like, y'know what? Instead of breaking it up into Beyond the Headlines and Politics Roundup, let's just do what we call... a Tidblast! [echoes]

Courtney: Tidblast! [echoes] Pew pew pew pew!

Brent: Which is a blast of Tidbits, for those of you listening for the first time and not knowing what the fuck we're saying.

Courtney: It's where we blast our tids all over the place.

Brent: It's true. Ow, my eye. Uh, so, okay. It's Thursday, November 7th as we record this. We started around six PM eastern time, just so you're aware of how much we know, in case a lot happens between now and tomorrow, or whenever you hear this. Now, there are headlines that we put in the doc that we share that are not fully fleshed out, but I feel like we can kind of wing some of them. Courtney, are you down for that?

Courtney: I'm down to wing it. Speaking of wings...

Brent: Uh-huh, take it away. Great segue.

Courtney: Speaking of wings... chicken... the Popeye's chicken sandwich is baaack!

Brent: Yes. I had planned to do some research by eating one... and then I didn't.

Courtney: I... did. So I went to—[laughs] Not only did I sit in line for like a half an hour, I went to two Popeye's. [laughing]

Brent: Wow.

Courtney: Because the first Popeye's that I went to, like, the line... the line is not, um... basically if the line gets long enough, it kind of backs out into a very busy street. And I was like, no, I'm going to the other Popeye's that is more conducive to long lines. So um, I waited in line for like 30 minutes, which was pretty decent. It was straight up at like, eleven o'clock exactly. My children were patient, question mark? Julian was like, "Mom, this is taking forever." I was like, "I don't care."

Brent: [laughs] Well... I mean, when I tried—when it first came out, when I like, just walked by a Popeye's in Philly, I was like, "Oh, y'know, it's about lunch time. I've heard this thing is a big deal." And the place just looked like there was a rollercoaster. A Six Flags rollercoaster behind the counter that everybody was just waiting to get on.

And then that bread thing. That was one of the weirdest things I ever heard, that they were like, "Look, we still got the stuff that goes in the sandwich. Bring your own bread." Like, what? I don't know. I just don't understand how the world of... I worked in fast food in college, but I just didn't understand, I guess, the supply chain of buns. But like... those must've been pretty popular.

Courtney: Well, what's wild, too, they used to have spicy chicken po' boys that was basically just this. Just on like, a different bun.

Brent: So is it the bun that makes it?

Courtney: Yeah, they no longer have the po' boys, so like, this is literally just... it's just different branding, I think. It's the same thing.

Brent: I mean, it's just one of those things, y'know?

Courtney: But it is delicious. It is like, legit delicious. I was worried—I was worried that like, memory would've like, built this thing up, and it was not gonna be as good. No, it was just as good as I remember it. It was delicious.

Brent: Okay, so you didn't have to go all Grizzabella and sing a song about it in the moonlight?

Courtney: Not yet.

Brent: Okay.

Courtney: But if they run out of bread again, I'm gonna be like, "Okay, hey. A, what the fuck?"

Brent: I cannot wait to talk about that movie on this show when it comes out, but we're not there yet. Okay. [clears throat]

Courtney: Real talk, can we do an entire episode that's just the Cats?

Brent: Love it. Yes. Done.

Courtney: Especially if it's like a really bad like, Trump week that like, we just can't. Like, it's just gonna be Cats.

Brent: I love that.

Courtney: Cats Like These.

Brent: Um, so, real quick, uh, McDonald's in Portugal did a really dumb thing. Um, it makes me wonder how much people are paying attention to history, which... I don't always, so who knows. But here's what I'm saying. Um, McDonald's Portugal had like, Halloween themed sundaes with like, I think it was like, red strawberry blood-looking syrup. Like, okay. Okay, so far so good. Spooky sundae.

Well... on an ad, they wrote, "Sundae Bloody Sundae," with like, an E instead of a Y. And the problem is, that refers to a U2 song, which itself, refers to like, essentially a small atrocity that is a blight on the history of Ireland. That's part of the troubles. I don't know much about it, but like, y'know, the British opened fire on Irish protesters, killing over a dozen of them. Not something that you necessarily want to like, parody with a Halloween ice cream dessert. McDonald's apologized. **Courtney:** Did they think it was just a good U2 song?

Brent: Turns out, it's even more. Um, and did you hear about this third one in the fast food threefer, Courtney?

Courtney: I-yes.

Brent: I don't know much about it, but we may as well just touch on it.

Courtney: I... [laughing] I heard about it, because, okay. So, basically, the CEO of McDonald's was fired due to a "consensual affair." Now, that is not why I saw the story trending. The story was trending because the piece had two photos. One of the CEO with Ronald McDonald, and one of the CEO with Chrissy Teigen. [laughs]

Brent: [laughs] Neither of them being the object of the affair, I suppose.

Courtney: Chrissy Teigen posted the image on Instagram and said, "I will be hosting a press conference in the morning," basically.

Brent: [laughs] Yeah. I mean, I don't know much about it. I guess it was a consensual affair with an employee. Um, that's not cool. Other than that, I don't know.

Courtney: Yeah, that's the thing.

Brent: Um, and I just thought three little mini headlines about fast food just felt thematic. And I will say, first off, I've had kind of a vaguely cranky day, and I know for sure I've written some angry copy. But there is sort of a through line to this show that is not fast food, and I'm gonna call on the powers of Courtney's good sense of humor and quick brain to uh, keep it fun in between my cranks.

Okay. So, let's jump into it. Richard Spencer. He is the Nazi who got punched, and then liberals, and even I initially were like, "Hey, we don't hit people! That's not a precedent we want to set!" I came around. But anyway.

Milo Yiannopoulos of all people recently leaked audio of Spencer in the immediate aftermath of the 2017 Charlottesville Unite the Right rally, ostensibly in response to protests and the murder of activist, Heather Heyer. The audio speaks for itself, but to be clear, there are a number of racist and anti-Semitic slurs in this audio, so if you don't want to hear that, skip ahead about one minute.

Richard Spencer: [yelling angrily] We are coming back here like a fucking hundred times! I am so mad! I am so fucking mad at these people! You don't do this to fucking me! We are gonna fucking ritualistically humiliate them! I am coming back here every fucking weekend if I have to! Like, this is never over! I win! They fucking lose! That's how the world fucking works! They're all fucking kikes! They get ruled by people like me! Little fucking octaroons! I fucking—my ancestors fucking enslaved those pieces of fucking shit! I rule the fucking world! Those pieces of shit get ruled by people like me! That's how the fucking world works! We are gonna destroy this fucking town!

Brent: Yeah, so... wow. Sometimes, somebody just shows you exactly who they are. I mean, this guy was covered years ago by various publications as like, "the dapper young face of white nationalism." Like, almost in a way that threatened to kind of normalize this sort of thing. Um, and Spencer and people like him love to be kind of mysterious and slippery and pretend they're not monsters, and instead, that they just want to like, protect their culture and possibly have their own geographical space in which to live apart from others.

Uh, I lived in... this is inconsequential to the story, but when I lived in Canada, that was around the time he was in the news. And I just tried to like, listen to some of his speeches. But the speeches he would give publically, I would find myself going, "Well, I agree with a lot of the basic things he's saying. Is he that bad, aside from talking about other stuff? Is he holistically bad?" Because the front facing brand of this guy doesn't want to be the ugly, terrible, racist monster part. And that's how they kind of get you.

This is all tied to like, uh, alt right radicalization, and all kinds of shit like that. Um, by the way, Courtney and I discussed, not on the air, uh... there

was a word that we'd never heard that I had to look up. And I don't think that it is so... I hope it is not so offensive that I can't just say it. It's a silly word, to me. It's "octaroons," which is apparently a dated term meaning someone who is one eighth black. But if you think about—

Courtney: There's a lot of like, race words that um, are very old-timey that I think... I would imagine a lot of people probably haven't heard before. And I remember, um, I'm not gonna say what the word was, but I remember hearing that there was a word Sarah Palin referred to Obama as being. And I'd never heard this word, and it's like, it just speaks to like, how much, um, like, racism really does travel through generations that these fuckin' old ass words still exist.

Brent: Right. Well, at one point, she said he was—yes. At one point, she said he was "shuckin' and jivin'," which might not be what you're referring to, but like—

Courtney: It's not, but it's... I mean, it's of that... general... bullshit.

Brent: Yeah. And if you think about the etymology, what "octaroons" is talking about, it really shows you the value of purity of whiteness in the culture that Richard Spencer is a part of, and I guess would um, promote and proselytize, or clearly, he wants to spread it. Feels – and he said this publically – feels like the president is making it easier for him and people like that.

Um, but this is just the heart of white supremacy laid bare, and I feel like it's been hard for me... I mean, look. [scoffs] It's been a journey for me to understand all the ways in which I have it good, and all the ways in which people who do not look like me have a harder time systemically, and how I can unfortunately perpetuate that if I'm not very careful.

And so, I've tried sometimes... like, I remember I had a conversation with a guy I knew, in a room of us that were all white, and he made kind of a vague, but like, not cool comment about black people. And I called him on it, and he was like, "Look dude, if they're not around, it doesn't hurt anybody."

Courtney: The fuuuck.

Brent: And I remember being like, yes it does, because it makes it okay. I'm not trying to like, pat myself on the back and preach to the choir here. What I'm saying is that, what this shows is like, the stuff that is made more okay by little comments and little jokes and little acknowledgements, and not an attempt to push back against the status quo and make things better than they are for more people.

What do you think?

Courtney: [sighs] Nazis should be punched.

Brent: Yeah, I'm okay with it.

Courtney: Punch early, punch often, punch all the Nazis. Every time.

Brent: Punch, rinse, repeat.

Courtney: Never not be punching. It's like that line in Glengarry Glen Ross, always be punching.

Brent: ABP. Always be punching. [laughs]

Courtney: Yeah.

Brent: Um, in the doc, I have one, but I think I should make that one after your next one, which is also something I'm gonna help you with, and then I'll copy-paste it to afterwards. I've done it! I've done it in real time! It's on the show!

Courtney: You did the thing! The people know!

Brent: I did it! Wow, that rhymed. That was great.

Courtney: This week, a series of purported Facebook posts from a greedy bridezilla hit our various timelines, and immediately, we were enraptured. Of course, nothing gold can stay, and the detectives of Reddit quickly discovered the posts were fake, designed to just drive traffic to a new website. You can read on Buzzfeed. Buzzfeed put together a lot of the Reddit stuff. They did some like, sourcing and all that stuff.

Honestly, we knew this had to be the case. We all have that exact moment when things get just a little too nonsensical, and they overplay their dramatic hand. So fuck that. Gross. Not even saying the name of their dumb site. That said, who are we to deprive the people? The posts are fake, but the joy... the joy was real.

Brent: Yes, and I would proffer, this is at the heart of trending news. The phenomenon that happened that we are going to bring to you in this form.

Courtney: I'm never gonna be mad about like, all of us coming together to just enjoy something.

Brent: Yeah.

Courtney: Like, I missed—I missed when the goats got out. Or the llamas got out. Whatever it was. It happened the same day as the dress. I missed it, 'cause I was at an OB/GYN appointment, 'cause I was very pregnant. So like, every time something like this happens, and I get to be part of it, I just like—I—life's short, y'know? Embrace the viral moments that you get to have.

Brent: Wow.

Courtney: And so... we present to you, for the first time ever, featuring Brent Black...

Brent: [laughs]

Courtney: A dramatic reading. [clears throat]

[soft music plays]

Courtney: "Hi, invitees!" Okay, real quick aside, just right off the bat. 'Invitees' here has an accent over one of the Es, and that's not a—

Brent: "Invitaes."

Courtney: Yeah, "invitaes," and that's not a thing. You don't need to do that. "Hi, invitees to the blank blank wedding! After much reflection and tear-filled conversation with our closest family members, we have decided to cancel our upcoming winter wedding. We will further notify this group when we are in a better place to reschedule.

Courtney: But... it was pretty good.

Brent: I mean, it's definitely on the order of a 50 Shades of Gray or a Twilight, in terms of realism and writing quality.

Courtney: Yeah.

Brent: Alright. Well...

Courtney: It's a solid Caroline Calloway.

Brent: Any other thoughts about that? I mean, it sort of speaks for itself, doesn't it?

Courtney: It's made up. It doesn't need more thoughts.

Brent: Alright. Now onto AirBnB. There was a fascinating long form story in the publication Vice by writer Allie Conti that I found this past week. Meanwhile, the company, AirBnB, is very slow, apparently, to give refunds regardless of circumstances, and people often had to jump through hoops and call them over and over and over again and wait on hold forever to even get partial refunds. I had planned on covering this topic in the first place, but in the last 24 hours, it's been reported that AirBnB will be instituting some serious changes to its platform in order to earn back the trust of potential customers.

Courtney: [echoing] Tidblast!

Brent: So, it's a political one, though. Gonna start off with a quick Trumpdate. Recently, we told you Trump was booed at a baseball game. Well, last week, he was booed at an MMA fight. I hope he continues to get booed in public until, I don't know, the rest of his life.

Meanwhile, Democrats in the house are taking depositions and testimony from various people involved with the Ukraine situation. A lot of it is just

confirmation of what we already knew or assumed. Multiple diplomats or diplomat-adjacent people saying they were concerned about contacts Rudy Giuliani had with Ukraine, as well as the attempt to get Ukraine to investigate the Bidens, and even announce independently that they were investigating the Bidens.

Guilfoyle, who is a lawyer, was asked by Sunny Hostin, who is also a lawyer, basically, what the fuck? Why is he too dumb to know what crime is? To which Guilfoyle said, "I did come out of the bathroom and say, "I left you alone for ten minutes. What happens when mamacita is gone?"" Now, that is the part of this that got the most attention, 'cause ew.

But it was a generally just shitshow disaster of an interview, and Jesus. Hefor one thing, speaking of mamacita, Guilfoyle is a year older than Melania and also looks like Melania. Courtney: Yoikes.

Brent: Okay. So, content warning for this next story – it involves suicide and sexual assault. If you want to—and more than we've mentioned thus far, to be clear. If you want to skip it, Mustin, who edits the show, is gonna tell you how long to skip ahead.

Mustin: 57 minutes, 30 seconds.

Brent: Thanks, Mustin! Okay, so, there are two new developments about Jeffrey Epstein, who you'll remember was jailed after they found child pornography in his apartment. He had been implicated in child sex trafficking and statutory rape, among other crimes, about ten years ago, but mysteriously got a sweetheart deal with a lawyer who later turned out to be in Trump's cabinet.

Epstein is known to have partied with Trump, Bill Clinton, Alan Dershowitz, many other famous and powerful people, and he flew plenty of them on a plane – or rather, hosted them on flights, on a plane called the Lolita Express, where allegedly, women under the age of legal consent would be present for essentially forced or coerced sex work, to put it clinically.

So you can see why a lot of people would rather him be dead than able to flip in order to lessen a prison sentence. Well, in jail awaiting trial, he apparently killed himself under mysterious circumstances, including a nearby security camera, mysteriously not working, and two security guards, apparently falling asleep around the same time it happened. Uh, and so, the New York medical examiner, at the time, concluded that he had hanged himself.

Well, fast forward to last week, when we heard from Dr. Michael Baden. Baden is the former New York City chief medical examiner, who has become something of a celebrity, hosting an HBO show called Autopsy. Strangely, Epstein's brother hired Baden to examine the body soon after he died. Now, keeping in mind that Baden has sometimes had opinions that oppose those of many experts in his line of work, and he's a fairly regular Fox News contributor.

Keeping all that in mind, he revealed his findings that certain injuries found in his autopsy of Epstein are rarely seen in a suicide by hanging, which of course, raised the suspicion that Epstein was actually killed, which is a thing a lot of us assume anyway. And the fact that Baden is a Fox News contributor doesn't actually make me believe him less in this particular case. Because even though Epstein's disgusting, decades-long crime spree implicates the likes of Bill Clinton, the UK's Prince Andrew, uh, absolutely implicates Donald Trump... And here's the thing – Donald Trump is the guy for whom Fox News has basically become a 24 hour pep rally. So like, again, Baden saying this is not made less credible to me by him being a Fox News contributor. Now, is anyone surprised by this news? Like, this feels like one of those things that's just fishy in plain sight, like the JFK assassination. And I think most people who are paying attention think it's more likely that Epstein was killed than killed himself.

I saw an Onion – I believe it was The Onion – headline that said like, y'know, "Wing nut conspiracy theorists thinks Jeffrey Epstein committed suicide," or something like that. Uh, which is dark, but like, I take the point. Um, my point is, most people who are paying attention think it's more likely that Epstein was killed than killed himself. Look, he got off cheap ten years ago, probably because of his ties to power, so he likely thought he could do that again, or something like it.

And y'know, just like any human being, he probably wanted to live, so there's that. But the whole fishy in plain sight element of this saga got turned up to 11 when ABC news anchor, Amy Robach, was caught on a hot mic, talking about a story she had investigated and wanted to report years ago after she interviewed alleged Epstein victim, Virginia Roberts-Giuffre.

Let's listen to that audio.

Amy: I've had the story for three years. I've had this interview with Virginia Roberts. We would not put it on the air. Um, first of all, I was told, "Who's Jeffrey Epstein? No one knows who that is. This is a stupid story." Then, the Palace found out that we had her whole allegations about Prince Andrew, and threatened us a million different ways.

We were so afraid we wouldn't be able to interview Kate and Will, that we that also quashed the story. And then, um, Alan Dershowitz was also implicated, 'cause of the planes. She told me everything. She had pictures, she had everything. She was in hiding for 12 years. We convinced her to come out. We convinced her to talk to us. It was unbelievable what we had. Clinton... we had everything. I tried for three years to get it on, to no avail, and now, it's all coming out, and it's like these new revelations, and I freaking had all of it. I'm so pissed right now. Like, every day, I get more and more pissed, 'cause I'm just like... oh my god. What we had we unreal. Other women backing it up. Hey. Yep. Brad Edwards, the attorney, three years ago, saying like, "There will come a day when we will realize Jeffrey Epstein was the most prolific pedophile this country has ever known." And I had it all three years ago.

Brent: By the way, that heartbeat sound effect was added by Project Veritas, which... they're usually a totally full of shit news source, but in this case, you can see the footage for yourself. It's not doctored, it's only edited to have like, the heartbeat noise, I guess to make it seem more dramatic.

But um, what do we take from this? Um, well, okay, first off, Bill Clinton's a rapist. Um, and this feels weirdly like a distant relative of the Richard Spencer audio we heard earlier. There is a class of rich and powerful people, some of whom... who don't value human life the same as the average person in the bottom 90%. Richard Spencer feels entitled to rule over people who aren't white, and it's clear that plenty of one percenters feel entitled to use the bodies of women, including minors, to abuse just on a whim.

And when I talk about corporate-owned media versus independent media, these are the kinds of things I'm talking about. If a media outlet is run by a corporation, and the corporation is ruled by the rich and powerful, then the urge to look out for other rich and powerful people and their companies will trickle all the way down to those delivering and preparing the news.

So when Biden and Buttigieg get the benefit of the doubt in corporate owned media, and Warren and Sanders are spun negatively, there's a reason for that. And this comes on the heels of finding out that NBC news killed the Harvey Weinstein story until it just was impossible to keep it under lock and key. Again, the rich and powerful protecting the rich and powerful.

And sometimes it's for access, which I don't even know, is that more or less disgusting? It's hard to say. One part of the Amy Robach ABC situation was that ABC was getting threats from, essentially, the royal family. They didn't want to piss off the royal family to out Prince Andrew, 'cause they were hoping to get an exclusive interview with Prince William and Kate Middleton. And it's not unlike how all kinds of mainstream outlets gave Trump a platform to spew his bullshit during the 2016 campaign. They did it because it got eyeballs on the screen, and they all kid gloved him and let him say all this shit and get away with it because they wanted continued access. This is what I mean when I criticize the mainstream, corporate owned media.

And I—so, look, I hope we get to the bottom of the Jeffrey Epstein situation. I hope outlets and reporters who have a spine stand up and say we're not gonna be like Russia, where journalists get killed if they cross the government. We're not gonna be like North Korea, where state-run media filters everything to benefit those in charge. We're not gonna have our collective common wisdom filtered through what a handful of oligarchs want it to be and not to be.

So... for her part, Amy Robach released a clinical statement – sounded like a hostage statement – saying her reporting hadn't been verified to ABC's editorial standards, and that's why the story never ran. ABC said in the statement that the work Robach and other investigators have done, well, the investigation never ended, and it will lead to a two hour documentary and a six hour podcast—or, sorry, a six part podcast that'll air in the new year. Yeah, I'm sure that was the plan all along.

Courtney: [monotone] Yes. That is what they have been going for. The whole time. The podcast.

Brent: [laughs] Yeah. We were just saving this all for a six part podcast! That's really what—and I mean... [sighs] Ugh. I could go on and on about this.

Courtney: There's also like, a Epstein podcast, bee tee dubs. But... [sighs] That's not what they were doing.

Brent: No.

Courtney: They were not like, "Y'know what we're gonna do? We're gonna do a whole like, uh, riding on the coattails of the thing about Pam here, and uh, really work some Epstein magic in your podcast feeds."

Brent: Right. [laughs] Well, like, and it's kind of obvious when you follow the money. George Stephanopoulos is ABC's head anchor. George Stephanopoulos was Clinton's campaign manager, or very, very high up in Bill Clinton's campaign in 1992. Like, it's not like he wants to turn around and completely torpedo Clinton's legacy.

But the thing is, if Clinton did this stuff – and he did – fuck him! The end!

Courtney: One hundred percent fuck him.

Brent: Yeah. And so like, they're gonna do this documentary. They're gonna do this six part podcast. Will it implicate the high profile monsters who almost definitely raped minors and trafficked them in connection with Epstein? We will have to see. But I... I hope that—like I said, I hope that the people that are either less afraid, or more just valuing the truth, will keep investigating, keep poking at this, and get to the bottom of it.

Because... again, this whole episode feels like, you've got a class of people that get away with shit. And sometimes it's about race, a lot of times it's about class, and you can just feel that, with the increasing inequality in the country, that it's getting more exaggerated. And like, is there always gonna be a class of people that essentially thinks they're the aristocracy? Well, probably. But... this is... I guess I just feel like we're in a really crucial time to swing back the other way before we become a really, like, authoritarian oligarchy? I don't want to do that.

Courtney: Elizabeth Warren laid out her plan for Medicare for all. Centrists are being real annoying about it. Like, Googling around to find a breakdown is just so much, "She will kill us all!!!"

Brent: [laughs] Yeah.

Courtney: Mixed with like, a couple usages of the phrase "fairy dust," and a smattering of your usual slate Bernie bros who are all like, "Honestly, how dare she?" Uh, my personal favorite take, though, is that it might have negative outcomes like "overuse of healthcare." Because that's what people with insurance do! Go to the doctor for funsies all the time!

Brent: [groans] I overdosed on care!

Courtney: I got my sixth pap smear of the year this morning just for fun. Just to feel alive.

Brent: [laughing]

Courtney: Essentially, here's how the brunt of it breaks down. Employers would pay fees to the federal government, equivalent to about 98% of what they presently pay for employee healthcare. Unionized work forces would be able to pay—they would lower that by increasing worker wages.

State and local governments would also make similar payments to the federal government, approximate to what they now pay for healthcare benefits. Corporate taxes would go up, the top one percent would pay new capital gains taxes, and billionaires would pay a higher wealth tax. Warren had originally said three percent, but now the plan states six percent.

Y'know, I don't know why people are freakin' out on behalf of the billionaires. Billionaires aren't freakin' out on behalf of you. Calm down.

Brent: Wow, that's very well said. I may have to steal that.

Courtney: Steal it!

Brent: So like, yeah. I'm so tired of both Warren and Sanders being asked, constantly, "Well how you gonna pay for that?" 'Cause the question doesn't want an answer. They've both given some various kinds of answers multiple times. Like, Bernie's Medicare for all bill has like, I think something like ten different suggestions of like, "Well, here's what we might take it from." And the flexibility there has been criticized by some as like, "Well you don't have

a plan!" And it's been praised by others as being like, "Well, he knows how Congress works, and he knows at least to be flexible with the funding."

And so, Warren's being bold here by being like, "No, here's, specifically, how I think we could do it." And for different reasons, these people both get pushed back, and sadly, with Warren, there's a sexist element. There is, in some cases, just people that are Bernie apologists that want to find a problem with hers. Though, I was happy to see the Young Turks, which is a source, very progressive, that I sometimes crib from, disagreeing on whether it was truly brilliant, or like, just a watered down Bernie thing.

But the point is that there is disagreement there, and it is a just fucking and I haven't scoured every word of it, but it is miles... miles better than anything these corporate-friendly, Pete Buttigieg, Biden, even Harris, Booker, other people on the debate dais are proposing. The Bernie people are do or die. But with Warren, like, there's wiggle room. Like, if they can scare enough people, they can knock her down.

Brent: I don't see it that way. And I think that there are more—there are more quote "Bernie brethren" that would, y'know, be fine, ultimately, voting Warren instead of Trump. But that's not what you're asking.

It started with Buttgieg criticizing Warren's "my way or the highway approach," and said that she is "so absorbed in the fighting that it is as though fighting were the purpose." Biden, historically great with women—
