MBMBaM 395: Diagnosis: Onions

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music, "(It's a) Departure" by The Long Winters, plays]

Justin: Hello, everybody, and welcome to *My Brother, My Brother and Me*, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

Travis: I'm your middlest brother, [grandly] Travis McElroy.

Justin: Oh, God, it's—so loud.

Griffin: And I—and I—should I not?

Justin: Just bring it down.

Griffin: I don't have to do mine. Like, people know who I am and the heat that I bring. But I am the s-

Justin: Just do it, just like, bring it down.

Griffin: I'm sweet baby... Griffin.

Justin: I wanna talk about—I had a kid.

Travis: What?

Justin: I wanna talk about that. [laughs] I wanna talk about that for a second.

Travis: Well, but, see, I also had an important life event happen. I went on a cruise. And now, I want to talk about *that*.

Griffin: Well, that's funny, 'cause I had one *I* wanted to talk about. I—I—I would ha—I started going to basketball ca—I don't have anything. I started going to basketball camp? I didn't, though, but that's a lie, but I just wanted to have one.

I think I could be the impartial sort of third party here trying to decide of what's gonna be the better intro. Justin, having another beautiful, beautiful child, or Travis having a second child, so to speak, that is the boat.

Travis: The sea. The sea.

Griffin: Or the sea.

Justin: His love of the ocean...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: That was his second child.

Griffin: And let me think about this. Let me consider possibilities. Jokes for Justin's: very sleepy, uh, we could—probably got a lot of doo-doo humor. Although I will say, we could probably get some doo-doo humor out of the boat one, too.

Justin: I—this kid... is just shitting... all the t—listen, guys.

Griffin: Well-

Travis: Now, to be fair, after my time on the boat, I was also shitting all the time.

Griffin: Yeah, and Justin, I'm gonna have to stop you, 'cause I haven't made a call yet! I got a weight it... if we're talking doo-doo humor versus doo-doo humor, it sounds like I gotta figure out which one's gonna be the

richest vein, and I'm leaning towards boat. I'm leaning towards boat over child.

Justin: What I love about that is that I don't have to talk. [laughs]

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: The onus is removed from me to have a great bit.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Uh, about fatherhood, which honestly, the mine—here's one that dads won't say. Honey, if you're listening to this in the future, Cooper, Daddy's gonna brag on you a little bit, and you're probably gonna be embarrassed, so skip ahead a few minutes. Are you done listening? Okay, good.

[whispering] What have I done?!

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: [laughs loudly]

Justin: I made... such a massive error in judgment.

Griffin: Yeah. There's two-

Justin: I already had a child.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: So I had that life experience.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: I don't know... why I thought I—what was I trying to prove? [laughs] I don't know who I was trying to prove someTravis: You ticked that box, Justin. Why did you go back?

Justin: Yeah, the box was done ticked! I guess I wanted one in reserve – you know, a burner kid just in case.

Griffin: [laughs] Jesus.

Justin: I don't know why I thought I could do this again. I'm an old man!

Travis: You know, that's so funny you mentioned that, Justin. I felt the same way whenever I'd go back to the buffet and get a second plate of food. And it's like, "What am I even doing?"

Griffin: Oh, on the boat? We're back on the boat?

Travis: Yeah. Why did I go back for—I'd already eaten enough food.

Griffin: Ah, love-

Travis: You know, and then you finish, you're like, "Ugh, why did I do that?"

Griffin: I love the boat humor.

Um, at basketball camp, Dr. Jeremy Dunks, who's the camp counselor...

Travis: Uh-huh.

Griffin: ...taught us all... jumping.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Griffin: I think it's boats. I think it's boats. I think it might be boats.

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: Boats, yes. Boats, yes. Good, boats.

Griffin: So Captain Travis, uh, how-

Travis: It's actually commodore.

Griffin: Commodore Travis, how were the high seas?

Travis: It's actually Commodore Ronjamin Jane Meriwether...

Griffin: Ah, I'm not gonna—no, that's—

Travis: ...[crosstalk] privateer.

Griffin: No, that's—that's nothing. I'm just gonna call you Captain Trav.

Travis: The J stands for Joshernath. Just...

Griffin: How was the waves and the whales and all the fish, and the...

Travis: Ohh! The ship was a-rockin' and a-rollin'.

Griffin: Yeah!

Justin: Can I sleep? Like, for this part, can I s—I did have a long con—kind of cook-up where I was gonna tell my wife, like, "Oh, we got a long sesh today, recording for two hours, trying to get one in the can," and then take a nap on the floor of my office.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: That was kind of one scam I was sort of thinking about running.

Griffin: Um, well Justin, I'm gonna give you a ticket, and it's for 90 seconds of sleepytime. And something tells me you're gonna use each and every one of them. So you go ahead and do that, and Travis is gonna tell me all of his fun boat adventures.

Justin: Can he guarantee, before you give him that permission slip, that something funny did happen on the boat?

Travis: Several funny things happened, thank you for asking.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: Okay, now is this just gonna be you bragging about how you met all the hot stars?

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: [laughs] Well, then I'm not interested in that anymore. Now-

Travis: No, but it'd be interesting, though, also. But yes.

Griffin: Well, no, you're just gonna drop a bunch of names, and now I'm wondering if maybe me and Justin should overrule you, and go to basketball camp.

Travis: Well, let me try this one on for size. And this'll give you kind of a taste of my stories.

Justin: Do I still get the nap with the basketball thing?

Griffin: Yeah, Justin.

Travis: Absolutely.

Justin: Okay.

Travis: Um, the first day, I was having a conversation with Wil Wheaton...

Griffin: Okay, see, and you were fucking four seconds in.

Justin: Here we go.

Travis: No, but I—I'm getting—

Griffin: No, no, no. No, no, no. You made me a promise.

Travis: On the first day, I was having a conversation with *someone*.

Griffin: But I know who it is. You already said-

Justin: From—[holding back laughter] Someone from *Star Trek*.

Travis: Someone from *Star Trek* and *Big Bang Theory* and TableTop on YouTube, and Geek and Sundry. And uh, we're just casually on the ground —and this person just casually gestures towards the water, and goes, "There's a whale."

And it was very bizarre, and not a moment you expect to ever have in your life, just randomly having conversation, and like, there's a whale. And swimming with the whale were some dolphins, and it was fucking magical.

Griffin: And this person turned to this whale and did the Spock hand and said, "Live long and prosper," but I can't say who it is! Can't say who it is!

Travis: I can't say who it is!

Griffin: Cannot say who it was. That's funny. When I was at um, basketball camp, uh, my bunkmate was um, Worf.

Justin: They don't—

Griffin: So it sounds like we all had our own sort of great experiences here.

Justin: Yeah, God, all having our own fun.

Travis: There was also a day where we walked into one of the lounge areas, and the crew, having a bit of fun, had made a bunch of towel animals in the area, but it was all the monkeys that hang from coat-hangers. And I don't think—it was a lovely gesture, I love that they did it, I'm not complaining about that. But I don't know if they were trying to be unsettling, but it definitely was.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: If Travis was worried that his cruise chat would be alienating to many of our listeners, I'm glad that he has graduated to complaining about the available towel animals.

Travis: Anyways, the JoCo cruise was great, and uh...

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: ...JoCo cruise 2019 is already available for booking, so...

Griffin: Yeah, okay.

Justin: ...get on that. They Might Be Giants is gonna be there, and I'm not even being paid to plug, and it's not even guaranteed that I'll be on it again next year. I'm just a big fan of it, and it was really great, and you should go... do it.

Griffin: Well, I—based on the story you're telling of how you yelled at a bunch of whales with... *someone*...

Travis: With someone. We didn't yell at the whales! We gestured towards them.

Griffin: Uh, I think I know how Bil Beaton operates, and you two were definitely just yelling obscenities at the whales.

Justin, what about the birth? Was Worf there?

Justin: [bursts out laughing]

Griffin: "Yes, carve the flesh! Retrieve the new child!"

Justin: [laughs] "Fight me!"

Griffin: [laughs] "Fight your way out of the woman, child!"

Justin: "Give the baby a bat'leth, he'll carve his way out."

Griffin: Should we do—let's do questions.

Justin: Yeah. Oh, hell yeah. I got a question, what did I do?

Griffin: Yeah. Should we mention the fact that Justin is operating on no hours of sleep, and that is why we are getting this sort of fatalistic version—

Justin: The last one slept.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: For sure. This one-

Travis: But now that last one, Justin, is old enough to be like, "Hey, what's up, everybody? I don't sleep anymore!" And you also have a new one that doesn't wanna sleep.

Justin: No, the new one is—the old one's, like, very chill and sleeping through the night in her own bed. It's ma—it's amazing. She's a gift and a treasure and I didn't appreciate her enough.

[laughs] This new one... just shits, and then it yells about it, and when my—when my last baby, Charlie cried, it was so pitiful. It was like, "Aw, man, I gotta do something to fi—"

When Cooper cries, it sounds like she's praying to an Elder god for the strength to kill us. Just like, "Please, give me the strength to smite these idiots."

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Hell yeah, [crosstalk] kids.

Griffin: Sounds like maybe she's succeeding.

Justin: Yes. Well, slowly. Not that slowly, but... I've [crosstalk].

Griffin: Can we start—can we start with the third question here? `Cause I can't wait to get to it.

Justin: Yeah. Yeah. Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Travis: No, that's why I put it in third! 'Cause here's the thing. Can I pull back the curtain a little bit here on episode 395? On every week, I pick out six questions, knowing we only ever get to three. I don't know why I continue to do six, but I guarantee, if I just dropped three on you two, you'd be like, "Wait, what? Where's the other—"

And so, like, my third question is, "Oh, that's the club banger that's like, yes."

Griffin: I know, but we need to get Justin hifey, and I feel like...

Travis: Okay. Okay.

Griffin: ...this question's gonna be the one that does it.

Justin: I'm a consummate professional. When we start recording, I'm gonna be on. There is no more complaining about—

Travis: We—Justin.

Justin: Huh?

Travis: We've been recording for the last 10 minutes.

Griffin: Yeah, for a while.

Justin: Well, then, here it comes! Pull up your baseball gloves, 'cause I got a hot pitch coming in.

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Perfect.

Justin: "My husband's name is Tim Allen."

Griffin: [holding back laughter]

Justin: "Yes, like the actor. Most of the time, when we place a pickup order of some kind, we use his name. However, almost every time we go to the store to pick up the item, the cashier jokingly says, 'Oh, like the tool man, right? [impersonating Tim Allen grunt] Do you guys get that all the time?" Do they *do* that in 2017—18?

Griffin: [laughs, claps]

Justin: Oh, fuck my life. "To which we end up responding kindly, 'Yes. Yes, we do.' Is there a better way to respond to these cashiers who always think they're the first one to make the joke about Tim Allen? How do I tell them to stuff it, I've already heard that one, without being overly rude?" That's from Over It in Ohio.

Travis: I think the best way is just to say, like, "Wait, who?" And make them explain it.

Griffin: And then pretend like-

Justin: Make them explain who Tim Allen is to you.

Griffin: Make them do a bullet-point by bullet-point plot recap of the entirety of *Home Improvement*.

Travis: "Wait, what? His neighbor's behind a fence? And then different objects—what is this show?"

Justin: "Why don't you see his face? I don't understand."

Travis: "What's going on? And then—and then the thing he was building just, like, explodes, and he dies, I assume?"

"No, he doesn't die, but they keep letting him make things."

"What? What are you talking about?"

Griffin: "Tell me more about the clown man, Al Borland."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "I wanna dial into the clown man."

Justin: In e—in the future, when you see them again, ask them for updates. Ask how things are going on—

Griffin: "Tell me about the new Home Improvement."

Justin: [laughs] "Tell me about the new *Home Improvement* that there is." And then when there is no more new *Home Improvement*, make them create new *Home Improvement* for you.

Griffin: There it is. Um...

Travis: What do you think they did after the finale? And then just keep going from there?

Justin: Speculative fanfiction. And also, my Chili's to-go. Thank you. I need both.

Griffin: And maybe your parents should've thought about this before they fucking tried to steal Tim Allen's identity.

Justin: Thank you, Griffin.

Griffin: Just saying. Any time—

Justin: You had the guts to say it.

Griffin: Any time a parent names a child the same thing as another person in the world, it is identity theft. And we gotta just—nobody's talking about

this in the media. The mainstream media. The lamestream media. [laughs]

Travis: Okay, so *Home Improvement* started in 1991, right? It's 2018. So... it's very possible—I mean, the question-asker doesn't say how old the husband is, but it could be... if the husband is what, 20—no, I'm not doing math correctly. How old would this person be? Yeah, 27, right?

Griffin: 70–69.

Travis: 69. Nice. But if they're 27 or younger, then it's very possible, yes, "likethe tool man" is the correct answer to that question.

Griffin: "I was named for the tool man, in his proud—"

Travis: "Yes, I was named for the tool man."

Justin: "I was named in honor of the tool man, my godfather."

Could you say that "Yes, that's me, Tim Allen from television"?

Travis: [laughs loudly]

Justin: "It's been a weird few years, but I am Tim Allen now."

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: "It's me, Tim Allen from Michigan."

Justin: "I have been passed on the mantle. I killed the last Tim Allen, and now I am Tim Allen."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] "And I look like him. No matter what I do, I wake up every morning looking exactly like him, Tim Allen."

Griffin: "Why does Buzz sound so different in Toy Story 4?"

"Oh, you didn't hear? The Tim Allen was murdered."

Justin: [laughs] There's a new Tim Allen now.

Griffin: There is a new tool man. His name is Tim Allen.

Justin: Um-

Griffin: He also hates the Al Borland clown.

Justin: [wheezes, laughs] Who—of course, we're on the fourth Al Borland. It's worth noting.

Griffin: Um, should we mention that Tim Allen sucks?

Justin: [bursts out laughing]

Griffin: We haven't really talked about that yet. Well, I feel like we make jokes about people who are stinkers, and then people like, "Hey, did you know that this person's a stinker?" And the answer to that is yes.

Justin: Yes. That's why we're punching up at Tim Allen.

Griffin: Yeah. So we can make jokes about him, as long as we include a disclaimer that he sucks shit.

Justin: [laughs] You always go super hard—I've—Travis, correct me if I'm wrong, but do you feel like—I'm not saying that Tim Allen sucks or doesn't suck—he does. But don't you feel like Griffin goes kind of, like, an incommensurate level of hard at Tim Allen whenever Tim Allen comes up? [laughs] It feels very personal for me.

Travis: No, I get that, because I think Tim Allen... was, as we all know, a huge hero of Griffin's for a long time...

Justin: Sure, sure, sure.

Travis: ...and then when it was revealed that Tim Allen sucked, I think it really hit Griffin... in a pretty hard way. I think that for Griffin, it is—it *is* very personal.

Griffin: Well, 'cause, I mean, you knew me. I was going down the street. I was going to Blockbuster, and I would say, "Let me rent, um, you know, *Joe Versus the Volcano*... let me get my—"

Travis: Nope.

Griffin: "Let me get my—" Yeah, he was in that one, wasn't he? Or was that Tom Hanks?

Travis: That was Tom Hanks.

Justin: Tom Hanks.

Travis: For now.

Justin: For now, for now, currently rules.

Griffin: [crosstalk].

Um, oh, you know, I was talking about *Jungle 2 Jungle*, *The Santa Clause*, *Santa Clause 1*, *2*, *3*, all of 'em. And I had my t-shirt that says, you know, "Tim Allen does—"

Justin: "Tim Allen's good." [laughs]

Griffin: "Tim Allen is good."

Justin: [bursts out laughing]

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: And then he comes out, and he, um, you know, calls me a snowflake, and said that I personally got his bad show canceled, and...

Justin: [laughing]

Griffin: I don't know how to respond to that, except to go on my podcast and say, like, well, um, Tim Allen is not good, and [laughs] in fact he might suck shit! So.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: What if I couch it like that?

Travis: You said he might suck shit?

Griffin: Tim—no, I'll say this.

Justin: [wheezing laughter]

Griffin: [holding back laughter] Tim Allen is not good...

Justin: [laughing]

Griffin: ... he may suck shit.

Travis: There—he's in a quantum state where at any moment, he could be sucking shit or he could not be sucking shit, and until we observe him, we will not know.

Griffin: And what I love about—what I love about that is that that is not a very PC thing to say! And so I think the man himself, the tool man, the former tool man, would appreciate it. So.

Travis: Did you know that the name of the *Home Improvement* theme is "Iron John's Rock," and not just the theme of *Home Improvement*?

Griffin and Justin: [burst out laughing]

Justin: Fuck, Trav, that's pure Michigan.

Travis: [laughs] Why did they name the theme—I—for the life of me, I've been sitting here, googling furiously. I can't find out if it was called "Iron John's Rock" and then they used it for *Home Improvement*, or if someone wrote the theme song to *Home Improvement*, and said, "I'm also going to give it a title."

Griffin: Yeah, so they can sell-

Justin: "Well, I've just written my 30-second-long magnum opus. [laughs] It's a shame no one's ever gonna hear it. Who listens to 30-second songs, anyway?"

Griffin: I have a Yahoo here.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: And this one's sent me down a real deep oubliette, and so I wanted to invite you guys down in the oubliette with me.

It's—it was sent in by Adrian Cowles. And it's Yahoo Answers User Johnny, who asked, "In a real-life situation, can firefighter really pee on a small fire to get it out?" And then, "'Cause game shows, you can't believe."

Travis: Wait...

Justin: [wheezes]

Griffin: I saw this, and I was like, "What the fuck is this person talking about? This is—this is nonsense.

And then I kept going down the submissions, and I found one that was sent in by the Deliveryman, Seth Carlson. It's from Yahoo Answers User Johnny, who asks, again, "*Family Feud* question: name something a firefighter do to put out small fire."

That was question. The answer was "pee," how is that possible?

So it seems like on the *Feud*... there was a thing, a category, about things firefighters do to put out fires. And that's probably—Steve probably got to "What can a firefighter do to—" and then one of the um, you know, goblins that goes on that show, just screams, like, "Piss, Steve!"

Travis: "Piss!"

Griffin: Like, waiting for—"Piss, Steve, piss!"

Justin: [wheezing laughter]

Travis: "Steve, they can piss on it."

Justin: "I wanna say piss on TV, Steve."

Travis: "Piss!"

Griffin: And then he points to the board, and it probably said something like "wee-wee water."

Travis: "They could fart on it real hard, Steve! No, I'm sorry, that would actually make the fire bigger."

Griffin: "[laughs cockily] Have sex with it."

The fire? What is wrong with everyone on this show?

Justin: Making whoopie.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: U-um...

Justin: They could make whoo—[laughs]

Travis: "You could make whoopie with the fire, Steve. Uh, let's see—56 percent?!"

Griffin: So it pops up on the board, and it says, like, aspar-

Justin: Pops up on the board.

Griffin: And it says, like, "asparagus juice. Human—"

Justin: Asparagus... juice.

Griffin: And then it shows up there, and is the right answer, and I'm wondering if that's based... I never saw *Backdraft*. I never saw *Fireproof*, the Kirk Cameron sort of religious vehicle. And I'm wondering if there's a scene in either—how did this sort of get injected into the public eye, the public consciousness, that if there was a very small fire, when you're a firefighter, you don't just—

Travis: How small?

Griffin: I mean, if you're-

Travis: Like a match? Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah. I mean, if you're a firefighter and you see... a small fire, I think you know that that can turn into a big fire, and that could be a big, dangerous situation. And so you see a small one, you go out to a fancy restaurant and there's a bunch of lit candles all over the place, and you're like, "Ugh, God, not again."

Wee-wee water, does it happen then? Probably not.

Travis: But here's the thing. You're looking at two different—two different questions, really, Griffin. 'Cause "*Can* it," right? So there has to be a window of size of fire, where it's too big to stamp out, but small enough that you think a bladder-full could accomplish the task. And I do think you could find that window.

But I think the other side of the question is, is there a flap of sorts—is there some kind of mechanism in the fireperson's suit that would even allow for such a thing?

Justin: Yeah, that's a great question, Trav, thank you. Thank you, Travis.

Griffin: I haven't considered that part of it. Um, but the answer's yes. There's a little fireproof flap, kind of like how old-timey kids had it on the back of their pajamas.

Hey, was that for shitting?

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Yeah, it was for shitting.

Travis: What else would that be for, Griffin?

Griffin: Like... cute.

Travis: Tattooing?

Griffin: No, like, cute. Like, "Uh-oh, my—my hiner!" they would say. In old-timey terms.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Griffin: So is it possible that this is not the most efficient way—I mean, I can envision a situation where it's like, "Oh, no, my extinguisher tank is empty. The hose got all tongled up, and there's a—still a small fire remaining. Oh, I know how to do water with my body: I'll cry on it."

And then somebody's like, "No, no, no. There's a better way."

Travis: There's-

Justin: Just do a piss.

Travis: I think that there's a third question here: if, if, if, do you think that this is a, like, put—leave your badge and fire axe on my desk, you're a loose cannon, you know, we can't have you on the force or whatever the—

Griffin: Because of your-because of your loose cannon.

Travis: [laughs] So get out of here. But then, like, later in the day, they're gonna fire and all of their extinguishers are empty, and they're like, "If only... *they* were here." And that person then just pees all over everything and saves the day.

Justin: If only that pervert...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: [laughs] ...were still here.

Griffin: Here's the thing: maybe the firefighters wanna piss on the fire, `cause they probably hate this hot stuff so much. They hate this hot air, which is all fire is. It's air that got too hot and burnded up.

Travis: Uh-huh.

Griffin: And they hate it so much that I think they probably do try as much as they can to put out the fire, except for one last bit.

Especially the brave firefighters who go out into the wildfire situations, and they've, you know, they finally contain it, and it takes, like, two weeks, and it's a costly, horrible, horrible thing, I think at that point, if I was a firefighter, and I found the last little bit of fire from this big wildfire, I'd be like, "Alright, motherfucker. Time to put you down."

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: And then the—and then—and I'm not making jokes. It's a horrible thing. But like—I think I would be very, very angry at the fire. And I think I would want to put it off—

Travis: What if the fire was—what if it was so hot, though, Griffin, like, it boiled the pee back u—so it's like the fire's fighting back?

Griffin: Come on, Travis.

Travis: No? That-now it's-

Justin: So you think it's more of a finishing move.

Griffin: Would it make it better if you took this small little bit of fire that was left, and you put it in the toilet. And then...

Travis: And then you peed on it?

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Yeah, I think that would be better. I think there should be a rule in the fireperson code of conduct that's just like, "You can do this if you nee—if you also need to pee. Don't do it just 'cause. Don't do it just to showboat."

Justin: How would you do it if you didn't need to pee?

Travis: Well, it's—it's—

Justin: [laughs] Just stand there and pound a bottle of water, like, "Hold on!"

Travis: Look, we're getting into the honor system at this point, yes. But I think, like—

Griffin: This is taboo, but you just squeeze it real hard.

Justin: [laughs] I love your little-

Griffin: This is podcast taboo. They won't talk about this on um, you know, *WTF* or *Comedy Bang! Bang!*, but you just squeeze it real hard.

Justin: I bet-

Travis: Maybe it's like, they make all the firefighters go to the bathroom before the alarm starts, and they're like, "Okay, everybody go to the bathroom now, 'cause once we get there, there's not gonna be a bathroom."

Griffin: Oh, God, Travis. You just gave me a wave of anxiety. My whole life is based around, like, knowing that I'll be able to go to a place and not have to worry about the bathroom there and like, timing it out. Justin: Forget about it.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Um, yeah. I figured we should mention that. 'Cause we make jokes here, but we had good teachers growing up, and they deserve to be compensated and taken care of.
