Travis: Oh.

Griffin:

Travis:

Oh, yeah...

Griffin:

... it's crazy—

Travis:

Griffin:

Yeah, they have like these secret... it's like Fight Club, but with cooking and eating dangerous things, I love it. Um, but—

Justin:

That's pretty sweet.

Griffin:

... I don't think that they're—

Justin:

Travis:

Yeah.

Griffin:

It is kinda like [laughs] going to Hillbilly. I don't think there are any other cities in Oregon though. I think Oregon in my mind is just like a vast wasteland—

Travis:

Desolate wasteland, yeah.

Griffin:

... with— with one pretty cool city in the middle of it. So, I mean, I would like to live in Portland. I think if you have...

Justin:

I would—

Griffin:

... the opportunity to move there you should do it, especially if you love this girl. So, you know what? I flip my answer.

Justin:

[laughs] You just flipped—

Travis:

Here's my question for the anonymous person asking this question. A, would you move there if she wasn't there? Are you interested in going to the city otherwise? And also, were you guys in the same area prior to this and she moved [crosstalk]...

Justin:

Right-

Travis:

... and now you're trying to decide?

Griffin:

Did you meet on MySpace? Is basically—

Travis:

Yes.

Justin:

If you— If you have been together in the same area before, that's cool. Um, and who am I to say, if you think you've got a real shot with this girl, like this is really the way it's gonna shake out for you, um, eh, you know, that's the most important thing you can find in the world.

Griffin:

Justin:

[laughs] Yeah.

Griffin:

Uh, this one comes from Dylan via Gmail, uh, it says: "So, a few friends and I are soon going to be knee-deep in the excitement and thrills of post-adolescence and cohabitation. This will be our first time living with people we aren't related to, outside of an on-campus housing arrangement.

Griffin:

Justin:

Yeah.

Justin:

Travis:

Yup.

Justin:

Done. Uh, don't put them on the back of the toilet. That's a very convenient place for readables to go, but it doesn't look nice. And also, like, you know, you know, Maxim... Best Places To Do It In A Public Bathroom.


Justin:

Justin:

Travis:

Powdering.

Griffin:

While she's-

Justin:

Powdering.

Griffin:

... um, I don't— I don't know what they do in there.

Travis:

I think they powder stuff.

Justin:

Powdering. Cheesecake Jones, uh, his wife tells... via Twitter, his wife tells him that you can wear blue shirts with blue jeans, but it doesn't feel right. "Help me, brothers." I'm gonna defer to Travis on this one.

Travis:

Griffin:

Mm-mm [negative].

Travis:

Griffin:

Justin:

Travis:

Griffin:

Travis:

But like... but like a blue T-shirt— **Griffin:** ... was that from Billy Ray Cyrus? Was that who we got that last question from? [laughs] **Travis:** Oh, Bills, what's up? Justin:

Travis:

Justin:

Travis:

Justin:

That's... no, that's not the way it works.

Griffin:

Um, yeah, pee—

Justin:

Griffin:

Justin:

Griffin:

You're in the clear, man.

Travis:

The only thing you actually have to worry about is sensitivity.

Griffin:

Mm-hmm. And— And also decreased—

Travis:

If you're going nine, ten times a day, dude...

Griffin:

... your decreased sex power 'cause you can't— That is a...

Justin:

That's a real thing.

Griffin:

That's a thing that you can run out of.

Travis:

Mm-hmm. If you're masturbating regularly, hold off five days. You can power an entire town [laughing] off of your one penis.

Justin:

Uh, just with your sex power,

Griffin:

That's the new green movement.

Travis:

The whole town lit up.

Justin:

Do you know what I found out is a thing, in, uh, in sperm count? Is, uh, if you use your laptop a lot...

Griffin:

Oh, yeah.

Justin:

... 'cause the heat from it can kill your boys. [laughing]

Travis:

Really... what?

Griffin:

Yeah, it can cook them [crosstalk]

Justin:

Griffin:

You would think that it would be like a nice, soothing sauna for them, but no, it's [crosstalk] it is, uh, it's an oven.

Justin:

Yeah, it's a bad scene for them.

Griffin:

Yeah.

Travis:

Griffin:

Oh yeah, good.

Travis:

Justin:

Travis:

Griffin:

Mm-mm [negative].

Travis:

... under his bladder [crosstalk], is the ultimate magic button to push if you want to blow—

Griffin:

Mm-mm [negative].

Travis:

Griffin:

[emphatically] Mm-mm [negative].

Justin:

The ultimate magic button [crosstalk]—

Travis:

Griffin:

You stay the fuck away from my walnut.

Travis:

Do you mean taint? [laughing] Do you mean taint?

Justin:

Travis:

Travis:

Griffin:

Justin:

Travis:

It's-

Justin:

Like, I—

Travis:

... it's feeling good.

Justin:

... the walnut's fine.

Griffin:

Do you guys remember when I went to Bonnaroo and I didn't shower for five days and I got walnut-itis? [laughing]

Travis:

[laughs] Here's my question.

Justin:

That's surreal.

Travis:

... what actual situation would that be okay in? Like, "Ah, this is the... whoa! Whoa, what are you doing?"

Justin:

Whoa, walnut!

Griffin:

Like, even when I went to see a, uh, a walnut-ologist about my walnut-itis, and he checked my walnut, like still questionable.

Justin:

You know what's weird about that story? Griffin went five days without a shower, still shampooed every day, which is—

Griffin:

Yeah.

Travis:

It was nice.

Griffin:

Uh, I would— I had lots of Aquafina, which I could, you know, wrap my shit up with.

Travis:

Hey, women? Don't touch my walnut.

Justin:

Stay away from my walnut. Don't listen to Cosmo.

Griffin:

Um, let's do another one from Yahoo. Uh, this one's from Yahoo Answers [laughs] user—

Justin:

Wait, wait, quick time out. Before we go to the Yahoo, if you're, like, sitting down, popping open Gmail, about to tell us that we need to be more free about our walnuts and maybe we should try it? Stop it. [laughing] Gross. I don't wanna know, gross.

Griffin: Oh, Donald.
Travis: Oh.
Griffin: Donald.
Justin: I mean, we've all been there.
Griffin: She's a good looking fairy. Uh—
Justin: Yeah. Yeah. A cartoon.
Griffin: cartoon fairy.
Travis: Now, if he had said Batty, I would have understood that.
Griffin: Right.
Travis:

I get that. Um.

Justin:

You know the problem with Crysta from *FernGully*, if you're in love with her, is that no, uh, no adult woman is going to satisfy that fantasy for you. I mean, they're just too old. Right? They're just too—

Griffin:

Yeah, they're not—

Justin:

... beaten down.

Griffin:

They're too big.

Justin:

They don't have the— Yeah, they're too big, they don't have the naivete of, uh, Crysta from FernGully.

Griffin:

Mm-mm [negative].

Justin:

And that's the problem, you're just not going to find an adult woman to fill that need for you, if you know what I mean.

Griffin:

It's tragic, really.


Justin:

Griffin:

Justin:

Travis:

Griffin:

Travis:

Justin:

Griffin:

Not just BFF, but you have— You are replacing...

Justin:

You are his whole social system.

Griffin:

... You are his everything.

Travis:

You are a city ambassador.

Justin:

"When, uh, S. Dezal from Twitter goes to the movies, how the hell is he supposed to know which arm rest is his? There's only one each side. Am I lost?" Guys, what's the deal, armrests?

Griffin:

I have a great trick that I do—

Justin:

Ooh.

Griffin:

... and I, uh, I'm happy to share this with people.

Justin:

Okay.

Griffin:

You— As soon as you get to the movie theater, first thing you do, hit that concessions stand, buy a soda, and then as soon as you sit down, put that soda in one of the arm rests. And then, that, if the person next to you has umbrage with that, you just meet their eyes and you just keep your hand on your soda, with your arm on the arm rest and it's yours.

Travis:

Griffin:

"Hey, how are you liking the movie? Let's take turns giving each other back rubs."

Travis:

"Hey, my hammies are real tight. I got some tight hammies."

Justin:

"No pressure. No pressure."

Travis:

"Could you rub this down for me?"

Justin:

"Hey, Mitch. You were— You were right. It was a great idea to move here. Could you just give me a quick, quick back rub like my Nana would do if we were at a movie together? 'Cause you're my whole system now." [laughing] "You're all I've got."

Griffin:

"I have put all of my eggs in the Mitch basket, so [laughing] if you could give me a slow rub down."

Travis:

Bringing it back.

Griffin:

Uh, this one comes to us, uh, anonymously from FormSpring. It says, "I feel like I'm slipping away from all of my friends. We used to have a big thing in common, which got us all hanging out together. But now that's gone and I hardly see them anymore. MBMBAM, how can I save my friendships?"

Travis:

Was that big thing like, you all murdered someone?

Griffin:

It sounds like [laughing]—

Justin:

Couldn't keep it a secret.

Griffin:

It sounds like this guy got, uh, got pulled along by the Mitch wagon. [laughing]

Justin:

This is what happens, Mitch! Uh, have you considered uniting over your shared admiration for a podcast?

Griffin:

Ooh.

Justin:

Say, one that features three brothers talk— Giving advice to peoples just like yourself?

Griffin:

Um, I totally understand where this question's coming from. Like, my group of friends, uh, was established because we all did community theater when we were kids, but now, like, we have scattered across the country, um, and, uh, and it sounds like that's the same thing that's going on there.

I think you need to just, like, evaluate... I still consider these people to be my dearest friends, um, even though I only, you know, see them or talk to them, uh, a handful of times every year. But even, uh, every time we do see each other, like, it's not weird. It's not like, "Hey, man, why haven't you given me a call?" Like, it's just a naturally, like, sort of establishment.

Justin:

Griffin:

Justin: Oh, god—
Griffin: that's— [laughing] that's, um, that's—
Justin: That's brutal.

Griffin:

Anyway, cheese. Uh, someone says, "Turophile: lover of cheese." Totally didn't make that up, Google it, it's a thing.

Travis:

Oh, Jesus.

Griffin:

It's a thing. Uh, one person [laughs] named Indian Tiger said, "No, it is not strange. Best of luck! Keep smiling!" [laughing]

Justin:

Um, what? How about you hide your smile if it's derived in any way from sexual cheese pleasure?

Griffin:

Uh, one person says, "Not at all, especially Swiss cheese. Wink." A-ha.

Justin:

Wanky, oh, god.

Griffin:

Mm-hmm.

Travis:

Um, so, here's the thing about abnormal psychology, um...

Justin:

[laughing]

Travis:

Travis: It is.
Griffin: That's like Tub Girl prime. That's like some real, heavy shit.

Griffin: She loves it—
Travis: "I'm in love with this carnival ride." It's awesome [crosstalk].
Griffin:

Justin:

Justin:

Argh.

Griffin:

... I get really psyched for when my turn comes, because I have super bitchin' pipes, and when I sing Simple Man by Lynyrd Skynyrd, it brings the house down without fail. However, sometime between when I grab the microphone and the song selection menu, a change comes over me and I wind up picking Crush, Crush, Crush by Paramore."

Travis: Nice.
Griffin: "Granted, every healthy, virile man within a quarter mile is at half mast by the time the song is over—"
Justin: Argh, half mast! [laughing]
Griffin: " but it is still concerning. What does this say about me and is my concern warranted? Stevie D." Um, I think we can all agree that Paramore rules.
Travis: Paramore does rule. Agreed.
Griffin: Uh, Paramore—
Justin: What?
Griffin: No, they're— They're—
Travis: That's a good band.
Griffin: they're a catchy band.
Justin: Why am I not love to uh, why am I not allowed to love novelty boats at theme parks, but you guys can enjoy Paramore unironically? [laughing]
Griffin:

Uh, well first of all—
Travis: I love cheese.
Griffin: the lead singer of Paramore is far more attractive than an inanimate, uh, Viking boat ship.
Justin: Can you imagine? What if she was—
Griffin: On it?
Justin: on the masthead?
Travis: Oh my God, get on it.
Griffin: What if it was her her and Vitamin C on opposite ends of the Viking boat ship?
Travis: And they're all holding cheese.
Justin: Oh, yeah. Oh— Yeah, and they're all holding cheese.
Travis: Oh
Griffin: And I've got a—
Travis:

And your walnut can—

Justin:

Griffin:

Can we pause the show for two and a half minutes? [laughing]

Justin:

Yeah.

Griffin:

Um... no, I don't think there's anything... I would be more concerned with why your singing voice [laughs] is— Has, uh, an area of effect, like gives dudes gay boners, like, [laughs] oh, I don't know why that happens. Um...

Justin:

And that's not— that's nothing troubling if you're hanging out with a bunch of gay dudes, but if your voice has the power to make people gay, you should probably have consent forms.

Travis:

Yes. [laughs] With great power comes great responsibility, my man—

Justin:

Absolutely, absolutely.

Travis:

You're ruining marriages in a quarter mile radius and be careful, be real careful.

Justin:

Travis:

... it was just [laughs]... it was just a boat. It was just a boat at an amusement park and there was— [laughing] there was a calliope in the background and I was, had a belly full of cotton candy, and I didn't know what I was doing. And I'm so sorry. [laughing]

There was— There was no line, and I [laughs] I saw it there in the reflection of the street lamp and I thought, "Yes. Yes. I'm a boat man. [laughing] I'm a boat man for life, and I left you. I didn't go see your show. And I'm sorry, Biebs. I'm sorry." Why don't you name— Why don't you name your kid Viking Fury? [laughing]
