## MBMBaM 619: Great Stuff You Can Do in the Bathroom

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**Intro (Bob Ball):** The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme music plays]

**Justin:** Hello, everybody, and welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

**Travis:** I'm your middlest brother, Travis McElroy.

**Griffin:** And I'm the sweet baby brother, Griffin Andrew McElroy.

**Travis:** Let me just get ahead of it. Let me get ahead of it. I watched the first episode.

**Justin:** You watched the first episode of Man VS Bee.

**Travis:** It was harrowing, is the word I would use.

**Griffin:** I was made certain assurances that we would not need to talk about Man VS Bee.

**Travis:** No, but I also don't want people— now, what I've run into because of the blast on which I was put, that in my life, social media, in streaming, in everything I've done, if I mention—

**Justin:** In your bedroom. Your boudoir.

**Travis:** In my bedroom, my wife, my children, my dog, all of them—

Justin: Your confessional.

**Travis:** When I'm talking to my priest, my spiritual guidance, my Yogi, when I'm talking to my Yogi Bear, when I'm talking to them—

**Justin:** [as Yogi Bear] You got to watch the movie, Boo Boo!

**Travis:** And I say, "I did this today." They're like, "You should have been watching Man VS Bee." And I'm like, okay, I did it now. I did it now. Never again.

**Griffin:** So here's the issue, Travis. You're getting Man VS Bee 1.1, um, there were a lot of complaints registered toward Netflix with some of the gratuitous male and bee nudity in the original cut. And so as they are wont to do, what with this streaming era and the death of art, they went in and just took all that stuff out. So you know how the episodes are like, 20 minutes long?

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin:** They used to be like 35, 40, and you were getting a good 15 to 20 minutes of man and bee nudity.

**Travis:** Well, Griffin, I actually anticipated that because I know of Netflix's rampant censorship. And so I actually watched it in 90 second chunks on Dailymotion.

Justin: [wheezes]

**Griffin:** That is—

**Travis:** Yeah, I found a playlist, and I just watched it that way. Now, there were a couple of chunks missing, which, frankly, made it incoherent, but other than that...

**Griffin:** Obviously, I dipped into Dailymotion for those clips for my own purposes, and my net nanny was like, well, we'll let this one go. They were like, "It's Mr. Bean. There's no erotic value." It auto blurred out the bees,

**Travis:** It's educational.

Justin: [laughs]

**Travis:** Specifically Man VS Bee. I got a Mary Poppins-esque, like, "No, no! No Mr. Bean's dick today, Master Travis!" I was watching it too much, apparently, and it was affecting my relationship with my kids, so. She said, "You must go outside and get some vitamin D!" And I said, "I'm getting all the vitamin D I need right here." And she said, "No, no, Master Travis, you must sit outside!"

Griffin: I just want them to release the Snyder cut of Man VS Bee.

Travis: [laughs]

**Griffin:** And by that, I mean, Greg Snyder, who was the onset intimacy consultant for Man VS Bee.

**Travis:** Between the man and the bee?

**Griffin:** Anytime that there was exposure happening, like the scene where the bee climbs inside of his— Mr. Bean's penis?

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin:** I want to see— he worked hard on that. He had to coach both of them through that and it was probably pretty painful and humiliating.

**Travis:** And it's wild to me that they made such a progressive step to hire an intimacy coordinator, which everyone should do, but then also the rest of it exists and so that was difficult to me.

**Justin:** I watched the Snyder cut of Justice League.

**Travis:** Okay?

**Justin:** And my big thing there was—

**Griffin:** Oh, this is gonna be fucking funny.

**Travis:** Brace your asses everyone.

**Justin:** There is just so many scenes of people eating chips that it got to a point—

**Travis:** Oh, I get it, 'cause Snyders is a chip brand, which I think might only manufacture chips in Huntington, West Virginia.

Justin: It might be a regional thing. They use peanut oil. Nice.

**Travis:** Take that!

**Justin:** Enough said! [laughs] Enough said there. Appreciate that. Um, this is an advice show—

Travis: Obviously.

**Justin:** — here we take your questions and turn them, alchemy-like, into wisdom. I feel like it's been a 150 years since we've recorded one of these.

Travis: Well, we should also note that Griffin—

Justin: With travelling and the illness and what have you.

**Travis:** Griffin decided to move.

**Griffin:** Yeah, uh... like yesterday. Just real hair up my ass sort of stuff. Where I was like, I'm going to uproot my entire family and relocate to the beast coast.

**Justin:** Well, most of your family, you're having them compete to see who will be left behind to make a new life in Austin. You don't want to cede all that territory, is the problem.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Justin:** So you want to leave a man in Kamchatka, as it were.

**Travis:** It is kind of our Southern HQ, Griffin, which I am— I feel like I covered the Midwest HQ for a while and now I feel like you're kind of encroaching a bit on my territory, which I'm not wild about.

Justin: I do-

**Griffin:** Alright well fight— fight me.

**Justin:** — appreciate that we can finally make it permanent, our absolute denial of other time zones.

**Travis:** Yes, thank you.

**Justin:** If you don't know about this little fact of ours, we have people on our team all throughout the country. And if any of them mentioned any time zones other than Eastern Standard Time, we refuse to acknowledge. Like, we can't process it.

It's like, ask me again in a real time zone, because if you talk about another one— and we've been doing this with Griffin, like, [laughs] Griffin has to have to pretend that he does not live outside the Eastern time zone.

**Travis:** Occasionally Griffin will be like, "Oh, we can start at eleven." And I'm like, "It's already eleven, Griffin."

Justin: "It's already eleven. What do you mean?"

**Travis:** "What are you talking about?"

**Griffin:** Yeah, we're like flat earthers, but for like a very specific sort of latitude range.

**Travis:** And I understand, like, daylight savings time, who's saving it, and give me some back. You know what I mean? I want some of those.

Justin: [laughs]

**Griffin:** And that's some of Travis's whole deal.

**Travis:** That's my thing about time.

**Griffin:** Let's do questions because it's going to be a while before I do questions again, and I wanna scratch the itch—

**Travis:** We are about to do, like, three live shows in a row, but that's—

**Griffin:** Oh, you're right, we're about to be doing too many questions. But still my hunger must be sated.

**Justin:** "Whenever I go to someone else's house, even my best friends, I hate staying the night."

**Travis:** Yeah.

Justin: Yeah.

**Griffin:** Yeah, it's not— yeah, your stuff is not there.

**Travis:** Yeah, your stuff's not there. It's not where your bed is, it's not the air you like.

**Justin:** "I'm not able to sleep, always in a cold sweat, and wake up feeling gross. I'm happy to be with my friends. So what can I do to enjoy waking up the next morning?" That's from Anxiously Awake in Alabama. And you can't.

**Travis:** You can go home and then come back before they wake up. And then you're like, whoa, right there. "Oh, I was here the whole time, too, guys!" There's that.

**Griffin:** Sleep over— the sort of, like, logistics of sleepovers that math changes once you are sort of independent and can drive, because I would much rather— I'll kick it with you until the wee hours. And then when it's time for sleeping in a bed, I have my own that I have been sort of nestling into fucking hard for a long time now. And that nook—

**Justin:** But it's dangerous! What about the dangers of driving in the evenings?

**Travis:** What time do you go to bed, Justin? Because I'm heading home at like 9 o'clock.

Griffin: Yeah, I mean, 9, 9:30.

**Travis:** During the summer it's not even dark yet.

**Justin:** Griffin said the wee hours, so I question that.

Griffin: I was— I meant 9 to 9:30.

**Justin:** 9 to 9:30. Between 9 and 9:30.

Griffin: That's when I come home and me and Rachel play Wii together.

[Justin and Travis laugh]

**Griffin:** We play very competitive Boomblocks till we work up a nice sweat and then we instantly go to sleep.

**Justin:** The amount of props I need to sleep when I travel is truly, I mean, it's truly toddler level. It's, like, I need the log pillow. I need my wrist brace for my carpal tunnel syndrome. I need my special eye mask that has the headphones built into it so I can listen to—

**Travis:** Whoa, whoa, everyone back off. He's married. No, no, no—

Justin: Oh, no, right?

**Griffin:** I can't believe the fact that there is no, sort of, like, well known MBMBaM mythos about your log pillow, which is a, what, a bean filled...

Justin: It's a micro— Micro— what do you call that? Microfill? Like a—

**Travis:** It's like a bean bag bean filled with Justin's farts.

**Griffin:** And then he carries it, like, draped over usually a strap of his backpack, turning it into the brawniest nut sack that you have ever seen. And he walks through every airport like that and there's kids around and they seen it.

Justin: Yeah. I mean, yeah. What do you want me to say here? Um...

**Griffin:** I guess an apology.

**Justin:** Wadded up a hoodie to try to make it... No, nothing doing. It doesn't work.

**Travis:** It's not just bedroom props. When I'm away from my favorite toilet, my toilet buddy that I know, like, I know how he works. I know his whole deal.

Justin: I know how he likes to be—

**Travis:** I know where I like to look for the tough moments, you know what I mean? Like, I know the point on the wall that I'm making eye contact with when I'm struggling. Like, I know—

**Justin:** You know where you've etched your Vince Lombardi quotes? [laughs] Up there—

**Travis:** Exactly, yes! For when times get tough, I know exactly— And I know where the tally marks are for every successful completion. You know what I mean?

Griffin: Yeah.

**Travis:** You know what I'm talking—

**Griffin:** Hey Trav by the way, I was at your house the other day, and there's only six.

**Justin:** [wheezes]

**Travis:** Yeah, man. Why do you think I need so many motivational quotes? It's tough out there. I don't eat fiber!

**Justin:** You don't— You can't—

**Travis:** I just eat cheese!

**Griffin:** Yeah.

**Justin:** You can't get a good night's sleep at someone else's house. You can't.

**Griffin:** It can't be done.

**Travis:** There is a certain point of, like, there's a reason why I think maybe...

Justin: Oh, I have a rectangle pillow.

Travis: Yes. Well, yeah.

Justin: It's a cube? A pillow cube?

**Griffin:** Wait, what?

Justin: It's a pillow cube. And I can't sleep without that either. It's a cube

shaped pillow.

**Griffin:** Where does it go? Where does the cube go?

**Justin:** Well, supporting this beautiful thinker right here. [wheezes]

Griffin: Okay.

**Justin:** Right underneath the old noggin.

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin:** I've searched high and low. Do you know how many pillows I've had to shove down on my garbage disposal because they didn't give my head the support it craved?

**Travis:** Like, as a punishment?

Justin: What?

**Travis:** Like as a punishment for them disappointing you?

**Justin:** I mean, it's a sacrifice.

**Travis:** Oh, I see. I see. But I think that I can't remember the last time— I think 24 was maybe the last time I slept at a friend's house because I was too drunk to drive, so I simply slept on his couch. But it was not like a planned thing where I looked at my friend Bradbury and said, "And I'll bring my jammies!" Like, I just don't— and I think the reason is not like, "Oh, it's

weird to sleep at a friend's house when you get older." It's like, "Oh, no, this isn't, like, fun to get away from my parents and my ho—" This is like, "Oh, no, everything I know is back there. That's where I'm truly me and I can take off this mask that I wear for others."

**Griffin:** Um, hey, can we approach the wizard?

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin:** Yeah. I'd like that. Thank you.

**Travis:** Don't get too close, he's bitey.

Griffin: The other wizard, Ben Cant sent this in. Thank you, Ben. This is one

that's, again, very useful for me as a sort of, like, Gen Z, um...

**Travis:** Yeah. Here we go.

**Griffin:** Like, I live and die on, like, emojis and texts and stuff, so.

**Travis:** Not me. I'm a boomer. I don't get that stuff. You know what I

mean?

**Griffin:** Yeah. So me and my Gen Z friends are going to love this one. We're

going to bust up super hard. It's 13—

**Travis:** Is that how you pronounce it? I thought it was just genz.

Griffin: Genz. Me and my fellow genz are going to love 13 Clever Ways to

respond to wassup or what's up?

**Travis:** Thank you.

**Griffin:** "Ah, that age old guestion. What's up?"

**Travis:** [snorts] It's not, though!

**Griffin:** "It is as old as time itself. Wassup?"

Justin: It's not.

**Griffin:** "Wassup? You might have heard it thrown around so often that it's hard to come up with a fresh and creative answer."

Travis: Yes.

**Griffin:** In 1999. "Don't worry, though. We've got you covered with tons of examples that show how to have some fun with this common question. Read on and try them out to respond to what's up in a way that will breathe new life into your conversation."

Travis: Wow.

**Griffin:** "Hey, have you talked to Mark lately?"

"Yeah, it's good to talk to him now. It feels revitalizing just the way that his mind works. It really excites me."

**Travis:** "His responses to my mundane, inane questions are a breath of fresh air in this otherwise empty landscape on which I live."

**Griffin:** So here's one way to respond to wassup of 13. "After seeing you? My mood!"

**Travis:** Hell, yeah.

Justin: Yes!

**Griffin:** "Compliment anyone who could use an extra boost of confidence. This is a great reply for everyone in your life, from a friend to an acquaintance. It's an especially effective answer if the person is shy or isn't used to the attention."

**Travis:** Fuck yeah.

**Griffin:** Here are some more examples in this vein. "Now that you're talking to me? My happiness."

**Travis:** Now, that's weirder, though, because now that's starting to trend into the way an alien would say it. After seeing you, my mood is up. After this conversation that we had with our mouths? My endorphins are— like, oh no, hold on.

**Griffin:** "With you in the room? My energy level! After learning you went to Spain? My curiosity!"

Travis: Whoa.

**Griffin:** ... is up. Another way. "If someone hits you with a what's up, you hit them with a, 'I don't have any complaints.' Stay upbeat if you want to charm a stranger with your optimism. If you want to build rapport with someone or leave them in a wonderful first impression, be really cheerful and smile. Other options? 'I'm a happy camper.' 'Life's been treating me really well.'"

**Travis:** That's a serial killer response.

**Griffin:** There's a darkness. There's a darkness behind those.

Justin: No complaints here.

**Griffin:** "Everything's looking up. I've made a lot of progress lately!"

"With what?"

Travis: Mm.

Griffin: What have you—

**Travis:** Hey, I think we live in a time— I won't go deep into it, folks. But if you have no complaints? No complaints?

Griffin: That's wild.

Travis: No? Zero?

Griffin: "Nothing but good news on my end. I'm very grateful." All right,

asshole.

**Travis:** Yeah.

**Griffin:** There should be— there is objectively bad news out there, and you

saying that it doesn't impact you at all is monstrous.

**Travis:** And I— hey, listen, there's enough bad news to go around. It doesn't matter what side of any issue you're on. Nobody's got it all good

right now.

**Griffin:** How about this? What's up? "Hopefully not my rent. Get creative at

a party and point out what you don't want to go up."

**Travis:** Hopefully not my dick while people are around. That would be

inappropriate. Not the time for that.

**Griffin:** "It better not be my cholesterol levels. I've been eating healthy, dot-dot-dot. Not my student loans. I just have to keep making my payments. With any luck, not my grocery bill. I'm not buying main brands

anymore."

**Justin:** I would turn heel and walk away.

**Griffin:** Just out of there.

Justin: And that person would be gone from my awareness.

Griffin: "In a perfect world, my salary. Make your bestie laugh with a sassy

response."

**Justin:** That is sassy. Woo.

Travis: I'd say, that's sassy. Okay, you know what, actually?

**Justin:** There's some spice on that one.

**Travis:** If I walked up to my best friend, Hank Mardukas, and I said, "What's up?" And he said, "Hopefully my salary," I would high five him three times.

Griffin: For sure. That's sassy and fun.

**Travis:** It's a solid response.

Griffin: And this is the obligatory, "What's up? If life was fair, my grades."

**Travis:** Oh, keep your grades up.

**Griffin:** "My energy levels, if I had my way." A lot of concern about my energy, about my thetans.

**Travis:** I want to go back, though, because I like, if life was fair, my grades. Because that means it's, like, I'm putting in the fucking work, and Mr. fucking Johnson is being a real asshole because I did that assignment he knows I did, and yet he's still giving me a C. Life's not fair, man.

**Griffin:** "My atheist teacher gave me an F."

Travis: [laughs]

**Griffin:** "It's because I love our troops so much."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "What's up? How much time do you have?" Do not do this one.

Justin: Nope.

**Travis:** No, no. Don't do that one.

**Griffin:** Can you stick ar— it does say play around with anyone easy to fool, like an unsuspecting relative. So it's like, punk them by hinting at some deep

trouble in your life that you do need assistance with. "Can you stick around for a bit? I'll need at least 20 minutes. How long is your attention span? I'm in the mood to overshare. Okay. Let me tell you my life story. Just joking."

**Travis:** Wow. Hey, any one of those, I actually would appreciate it because it would be shorthand for, like, okay, I don't want to know you.

**Griffin:** I don't want to talk to you.

**Travis:** "I'm going to overshare." Oh, thank you for the warning. I'll be over here at the Cheeto Bowl.

**Justin:** But what if it's someone know, like, I've asked you not to be like this. We encounter each other in social situations. I've asked you not to be like this, I think. I did ask you not to do this.

**Travis:** It's also not over sharing— I asked you how you are, and I guess it depends on if you're like, "What's up, man?" And he's like, "Oh, it's nothing man..." If you're just like, "Hey, what's up with you?" And he's like, "I want to overshare." I'm like, yeah, I did just ask, what is up with you.

**Griffin:** I would take literally any response other than this one. Number six on the list, "What's up? Our time on Earth. So let's make the most of it."

Justin: What?

**Travis:** Oh, no.

**Griffin:** "Shake things up and motivate whoever is talking to you. If they're on autopilot and asking a basic question, see if you can inspire them and tell them to live every moment like it's their last."

Travis: Don't.

Griffin: "What's up? Our chances to waste another moment. Let's go!"

**Travis:** Now, that one, though, is confusing verbiage. "What's up? Our chances to waste— "So we've run out of chances? Some of us are out here

barely coping with existential dread as it is. If I see you at a party and I say, "What's up?" And you're like, "Our time on Earth." I'm in a spiral now. Thank you, very much.

**Justin:** That's not actually true, either. It's, like, we're both here. What are you talking about?

**Travis:** What do you know that— what do you know?

**Justin:** Now if you're like Matt Damon in that Kevin Smith movie. And you're like, "Your time is up on Earth?"

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And it's like, that's cool.

Travis: Yeah, I mean if you're an assassin—

**Griffin:** Every time Matt Damon gets a gun out, it's like, fuck, do you guys remember the bitcoin commercial where he was like, "Get bitcoins," and he pulled out two guns? And I was like, whoa. I was like, "Are you going to hurt me?" And he was like, "No, you can just look cool like me, Jason Bourne."

**Travis:** "These are my new bitcoins. They're guns."

**Justin:** I need to test something real quick. You guys got to let me know if this works, okay?

Travis: Okay.

**Justin:** Can you let me know if this works?

**Griffin:** Yeah.

["Whassup" clip plays]

Griffin: Yeah, I remember him. Yeah. I liked him from-

["Whassup" clip plays]

Justin: [cackles]

[Yo Quiero Taco Bell clip plays]

Travis: [overlapping] Now, Justin, you do have to comment on it in order it

to be fair use.

Justin: [wheezes]

Griffin: Hold on. Wait. Travis, you can't talk over that.

**Travis:** What was it?

Griffin: Go ahead, Juice.

[Yo Quiero Taco Bell clip plays]

**Travis:** Oh, yeah, that— what soundboard are you on? Is it just, like, classic

commercials—?

[Where's the Beef clip plays]

Griffin: Okay. Yeah, these are some of the most sort of, like, low quality,

low bitrate.

**Travis:** Do you have "dude, you're getting a Dell?"

Justin: [laughs]

**Griffin:** Do you have the Dell guy? He's funny.

Justin: What?

**Griffin:** Do you have the Dell guy?

**Travis:** It's got to be in there.

## [Intel jingle plays]

Travis: No, that's Intel inside.

Justin: That's Intel?

**Griffin:** Yeah, that's not it. Okay, so there's a lot more of these. "What's up?

Who paid you to ask me that?"

[Pizza Pizza clip plays]

**Justin:** [wheezes]

Griffin: I feel like you're not dialed in anymore, Justin.

**Justin:** Already, now I'm dialed in. I'm back. I'm back. I'm back.

**Griffin:** "Pretend to be suspicious to put on a show for your friends. Have the secret agents found me? What have you told them? Hey, that's not cool of you to ask, you know I'm on the run. I'm not sure how to answer that. Do you have a wire on you?"

**Travis:** That's a good one.

Griffin: On a text message? On a text message...

**Travis:** If someone asks me at a party, "What's up?" And I say, "Why are you asking? Are you wearing a wire?" That is a good way to, like, kid on the square to gauge if your friend's a narc.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Justin:** I just... as somebody who has trouble with social situations, especially, like, these sort of conversational things, I think it should be illegal for the Internet to publish a list of memorizable responses to banal questions, because that's not... that's not right. Like, I know that is

memorizing answers that are supposed to be witty. That's not good. You don't want to do that. That one, no.

**Griffin:** Yeah.

**Travis:** This list should be one thing long, and it should be, "Not much, you?"

Justin: "Not much."

**Griffin:** Okay, I'll go ahead and spoil number 13 is, "Not much, you?" Which is, I think, the only acceptable way of...

Justin: That's it!

**Travis:** The only one it should be. "How's your day?"

"Great. You?"

"What's up?"

"Not much. You?"

"Hey. How was your weekend?"

"Pretty good."

It should, like, three words max. It should be your response to a thing. I don't want a monologue, I just— I'm a human being who's bad at small talk and I had to say something because we locked eyes and we're sharing a physical space.

Griffin: Right.

**Travis:** And so I said, "Hey, what's up?" That's it man.

**Griffin:** Sorry guys. The conceit of this bit is that it's not— rarely the things that the wizard sends us are good things. You guys get that—

**Travis:** Yes. But now it gets into a thing where I'm imagining myself actually being in my physical meat body and someone saying one of these things to me and me having to, like, roll out of the room as quickly as possible like Sonic the Hedgehog.

**Griffin:** Okay, but what about this? Maybe you can— maybe this will be better for you guys. Not me, because like, I'm a cool, confident, popular guy. But if someone says, "what's up?" You could say, "When you ask that question, my anxiety levels."

**Justin:** Okay. Can I say— there is a delivery you can put on that where it would work. I think that one, that one I could maybe—

**Travis:** That one can stay.

**Justin:** Yeah, that could work.

Griffin: Yeah, don't-

**Justin:** "Now that you have asked me such a banal question, my anxiety currently is up."

**Griffin:** And then if you really wanted, I don't know that these three, they escalate it with each additional one under this suggestion with, "my blood pressure. What a loaded question. Moving on."

Travis: Nice.

**Justin:** Is it loaded?

**Griffin:** No, not at all. "Yikes. My discomfort. That's way too hard to answer."

Travis: "What's up?"

"Oh, I didn't expect a test."

**Justin:** Okay. What if someone said, "What's up?" And you just looked at them like, "Yikes." That would be a good way of answering.

**Griffin:** Loaded much?

**Travis:** When I go shopping and I'm buying a bunch of groceries and the checkout person says, "Oh, planning a fun weekend?" Because maybe there's, like, two bottles of wine there, I think a good response now is like, "Well, not now! Now I'm going to be thinking about this moment for the rest of the weekend because I'm worried I bought too many, I don't know, hot dogs wrapped in pastry or whatever and now I feel guilty— "

**Justin:** It's the same way you overanalyze whenever you buy, like, I get my liquor at CVS.

**Travis:** Yeah. Like a classy gent, yeah.

Travis: Preparation H.

**Justin:** Some ramen.

**Griffin:** Hey, can I make it sexy real quick?

**Travis:** Yeah.

Justin: Yeah.

**Griffin:** Thanks. "What's up? My hopes, because you swiped right on me." Is right the good one or... which one is the good one?

**Justin:** I will never know with enough confidence to where I would be able to reference it.

**Griffin:** Okay. You could also— if you want to keep being really flirty and spark up a romance with a new crush, you can say, "My heart rate, now that you're giving me the time of day. My level of attraction, your IG hypnotized me." Um... "What's up? What's up?"

**Justin:** Imagine! Imagine! Imagine!

Griffin: I can't—

**Justin:** My attraction is up! Ah!

**Travis:** Ah, for you see, milady.

**Justin:** Like other humans, I want to say that my attraction is up to you.

**Travis:** I'm definitely not a lizard that has gained access to a keyboard.

**Griffin:** [laughs] "What's up? My pulse. Your pics and your bio are so spellbinding."

**Justin:** They're in front of you! Is that— I mean— is this online?

**Griffin:** These are texts. These are text messages.

**Justin:** We're texting now. We're texting.

**Griffin:** Yeah, we're texting now. We've been texting. And then there's some asshole responses. The next two subjects are all asshole. "What's up? The opposite of down."

Travis: Nice.

Griffin: "A two letter preposition. You're welcome for the grammar lesson."

**Travis:** Not that one. No, too wordy—

**Justin:** Fall in a well. Honestly go, just, fall in a well.

**Griffin:** "What's up? A super cute movie that made me cry. Check it out."

**Travis:** Is it cute?

**Justin:** Okay. That would be good.

**Travis:** I don't know that I would respond— I don't think I would call Up a cute movie.

Griffin: "What's up? Come on, you know that. The sky." Um...

**Travis:** What's that beginning part?

**Griffin:** "Birds, planes, and on a good day, UFOs." Is that a good day? When they finally do get tired of tolerating us and they come and they zap, you know, they zap us into dust with their big tripod ships? Probably not a great day.

**Travis:** I think you could do— There could be a sincere delivery of, "come on, you know this. You can do this. You got this. I believe in you, you know what's up."

**Justin:** C'mon! You're embarrassing yourself, Doug!

Travis: "We've gone over this!"

**Griffin:** Um, I'm not going to do the rest. But the last one is, "not much." Not much. That's the only correct answer to that question because that's all they're looking for. If they really wanted some detail about how you found their picks and bio spellbinding, they would have said like, "What do you think?"

**Travis:** What is it about me that's spell blinding?

**Griffin:** Yeah, exactly. Justin, can you play the beer joke again?

**Justin:** What? What beer joke?

**Griffin:** The joke the beers— the beer joke from the commercial.

Justin: Oh-

**Griffin:** It's too late now.

**Justin:** Oh, the moment has passed?

**Griffin:** Yeah.

Audio Clip: "Well, dad, you're my dad and I love you, man."

**Justin:** That one? That one?

Travis: Wow.

**Griffin:** No. What was that?

**Travis:** I love you man.

**Justin:** That was I Love You, Man. That one was not as big of a hit back in the day. I'm out in the bone yard a little bit. I'm out in the bone yard a little bit.

"I went to the bathroom at a local grocery store and I was about to leave my stall and someone came in crying and started to give themselves a pep talk in the mirror. I don't know if they know I'm in here..."

Travis: Was it me?

**Justin:** "But I would like to leave. Is it acceptable to go wash my hands next to them as they have their moment?" That was from Bathroom Boohoo Buddy.

Travis: Oh, boy.

**Griffin:** Are you an older person who can provide a sort of sagacious little bit, little monologue for them?

**Travis:** Yeah. Or an older person that could pretend you're them from the future who just came back to tell them that everything is going to work out just fine?

**Griffin:** Yeah, that one might be tough. Depending on, like, if you look nothing like them at all.

**Travis:** You don't know what the future holds, Griffin.

**Griffin:** Yeah. Maybe carry around like a cyber mask with you everywhere you go and... that's great. You're in the stall, you're in the bathroom, and you hear somebody crying out in the sink area, the hand washing zone. And you're like, "Okay, hold on." And you pull on the sort of, like, lycra suit and cyber mask, and then you walk out of the stall. Like, [makes robot noises].

**Travis:** It helps if you have some DJ equipment with you and you have a smoke machine and a light show.

**Griffin:** And you can be like, "Contain your moisture." [imitates scratching on a record] And they're like, "Whoa, what?" And you're like, "Yeah, I'm you from the future. I'm a robot cyber DJ." I guess if this is the case, you don't have to be an older person.

**Travis:** Yeah, anyone could do that.

Griffin: Anyone could be that. Because you could—

**Travis:** With a little forethought, anyone can do that.

**Griffin:** And you could say, like, I am you from the future. I do look younger than you. But that's because, uh, that's time dilation and that's— Einstein said that.

**Justin:** I feel like if I went out there when they're in the middle of their challenging episode, that might be a little too disorienting because, like, imagine if one of your favorite podcasters just appeared out of nowhere?

**Griffin:** And it's like—

Travis: Yeah, statistically...

**Justin:** "Uh, Justin McElroy is in this bathroom?" And I'd be like, guilty as charged.

**Justin:** For no reason at all!

**Travis:** Just a little surprise letter from our friends at DreamWorks. "Hey, guys, here's \$20." Hey, thanks!

**Justin:** Wow, 20. I would love that. If I was getting \$20 checks from Trolls World Tour, I'd be a happy young guy.

**Travis:** It's like, if you went to babysit and on top of the money they were paying you to babysit, they said, here's some money to order a pizza if you want. And you're like, "Well, hey!"

**Justin:** And we'll keep sending you pizza money every few months for no reason for the rest of your life.

**Travis:** It's the closest I've come to that feeling of completing the paper from Book It to get a free personal pan pizza at Pizza Hut in my adult life. That's what residuals are to me.

Griffin: Wow, Trav.

Justin: What?

**Griffin:** I'm not sure I understood that reference. Which makes me think that none of our listeners...

Travis: Pizza Hut Book It?

**Justin:** You Pizza Hut Book It. You read enough books. Or get good grades or something, you get free pizza, free personal pan pizzas. I think it's a really nice moment for human connection. Some of the times I've had in my

life that I felt like, you know, the hand of any sort of like divine forces or whatever is when I've been there.

When somebody else is upset, that's great because it doesn't have to be about you for a little bit. You can chill on your own problems. Just be like, "Hey, let's talk through it if you feel like it. **Travis:** You could also just walk out covered in blood and say like, "Oh, no, not again." And now you've distracted them...

**Travis:** Well, with a little bit of preparation, it's right there in your bag, next to your DJ equipment and your cyber helmet. You're coming out. "Oh, what does this situation call for? What are they crying about? Oh they got fired? Is that a blood situation or I'm you from the future?"

**Griffin:** Or you could also rip a big one. And that's a bathroom joke that like, everyone really can get into—

**Travis:** Yeah, yeah, yeah.

**Justin:** That's— Griffin. I actually think that may be the best advice, is if you just like, simulate a gigantic beefer. There is no time that I've ever heard that in my life that I have not busted up 100%.

**Griffin:** Yeah. I was in the Bucky's restroom with Henry helping him do his thing when someone made a rude noise. Someone made a rude noise in an adjacent stall and Henry just started laughing. And I had to look at him and be like, "you can't do that. This is a special place. This is a special place where you can do that without judgment from five-year olds."

**Travis:** It's the closest the everyday person gets to diplomatic immunity.

**Griffin:** Yeah, please. But I think if you do it when someone's crying, they know it's like for their benefit. They'll be like, [cries] "thank you." So that should work too. Lot of great stuff you can do in the bathroom. It's a funny room.

**Justin:** It's a funny room. One of the funniest rooms.

**Travis:** Yeah, we don't talk about it enough. Why don't more people make bathroom jokes?

Griffin: I don't know.

**Justin:** Let's take a quick break and then we'll come back with lots more content.

**Griffin:** Through the Money Zone.

Justin: Okay.

**Griffin:** I guess the Money Zone is content, right?

**Justin:** Yeah, it's all content, baby, it's all content.

**Griffin:** This is content.

**Travis:** Listen, they're paying by the minute. That's all I know.

[theme song plays]

[ad break]

**Travis:** What's to say about Squarespace that hasn't been said before? Huh? Does anyone know?

**Griffin:** I mean, nothing. But they are continuing to pay us to say the same things again. So let's respect that.

**Travis:** Did you guys know? You might not know this, but there are people out there who don't have websites.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Can you imagine?

**Griffin:** Yes.

**Travis:** Right? Okay. But I'm trying to make it, like, what, why would you? Because Squarespace helps you build your own website where you can showcase your work or sell things or like, blog, publish content, all that stuff. And some people don't do that.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Travis:** What are they afraid of, right? Are they afraid of cyber ghosts? Of course. Of course. We all are. But good news, and Squarespace doesn't want me to tell you this, but all their stuff is blessed by cyber priests. Cyber ghost free, 100% guaranteed. Or your money back. There, I said it. I said it.

Justin: Now, w-

**Griffin:** Yeah?

**Griffin:** They have silver katanas.

**Justin:** [laughs]

**Travis:** Are they trained?

**Justin:** [imitates guitar]

Justin: I want to munch!

**Travis** and **Griffin:** Squad!

Justin: [imitates guitar] I want to munch!

Travis and Griffin: Squad!

**Justin:** Welcome to Munch Squad, it's a podcast within a podcast profiling the latest, greatest brand eating, KFC released finger sporks and I'm not going to talk about it.

**Griffin:** Please, will you please? At least to tell me what it is?

**Justin:** It's a spork that goes on your finger to encourage you to make all their food finger licking good. Now you can eat your corn with a finger spork.

**Griffin:** Does the spork—

**Travis:** I don't want to talk about it anymore.

**Griffin:** No, but I do want to talk about it. So does the spoon come up from the finger or do you, like, scoop like this or...

**Justin:** You wear it on your finger.

Griffin: Right, but are you talking—

**Travis:** You could wear it either way, Griffin, it's not— I can't imagine that it's like an intricate mounting process.

**Griffin:** Can I put on five finger sporks and then just pick up my taters like that and just go blop-blop-blop-blop?

Justin: Yep.

Griffin: Okay, cool.

**Justin:** It's all good stuff. It's all good. It's like, just like, finger licking...

**Griffin:** It's just if you didn't want to talk about it, I don't know why you would...

**Griffin:** [laughs]

**Travis:** Vroom, vroom!

**Justin:** "They help me with my dressings and some of my various household tasks and keep me absolutely slathered in hand breaded chicken platform."

**Griffin:** I'm pretty sure that Hardee's could be more accurately qualified as a sort of hospice facility.

Justin: Hos-spice!

**Griffin:** [laughs]

**Justin:** "I have been a true fan of Hardee's," not like some of these fake Hardee's girls you'll hear about.

Travis: [cackles] Oh, you like Hardee's, huh? Name—

**Justin:** Name four Hardee's members of the chicken platform! "Teaming up to celebrate this delicious hand breaded chicken sandwich is a real treat for me. Plus, I'm looking forward to joining Hardee's in giving the bird a whole new meaning and surprising some deserving fans here in North Carolina this summer."

**Travis:** "Plus, they said I could have a free sandwich."

**Justin:** "Petty is popping up at a Hardy's location in the Charlotte, North Carolina area," there can't be more than 30, "to give eligible guests a surprise hand delivery when they—" What makes you ineligible to get Richard Petty to hand deliver you a sandwich?

**Travis:** "Oh, I don't eat chicken."

"Oh, fuck."

Justin: "Oh, fuck! Okay, my bad."

"The hand breaded chicken platform, launched last summer in the midst of the chicken wars and featured—" Which, the fact that they're using the past tense means that there was an armistice declared that I am not familiar with. **Justin:** It's just— what they're saying to you now is this announcement is that if you order the chicken sandwich platform through the app or the drive through, maybe Richard Petty will give it to you.

**Travis:** Oh, guys—

**Justin:** Which is not a chance that I'd allowed for yet, but I guess I do always kind of assume that maybe Richard Petty will hand my food to me.

**Travis:** Wouldn't that be an amazing turn, though, if this time Richard Petty is helping the person in the vehicle, he's your chicken pit crew. This time—he's never been on that side before. He's always been the one in, because I assume now part of the pit crew duties for Richard Petty was handing him a chicken sandwich from Hardee's every time he stopped in every race.

I think that Hardee's is trying to throw shade at the KFC Jack Harlow collab by saying, "Oh, it's not real shit. Like what us and Dick have is real. This? Is real."

**Griffin:** He's real American. I feel like this is a bad campaign because the very last thing that I want is to be at a chicken platform restaurant and order some food.

And then a celebrity, that I do not know who it is, hands it to me and gives me a knowing smile like, "Vroom, vroom. Order up." And I'll be like, "thank you, mustached gentlemen."

**Justin:** Thank you, 85-year-old Hardee's employee. Very much appreciate it.

**Griffin:** He's standing back in the kitchen just holding the bag, just like looking like, "Is it— is it— do they know me? No? Okay."

**Griffin:** That'd be great.

**Griffin:** Please. Your understanding is needed. Please.

It's going to be super fun and very, I don't know, good. And you'll like it or else. We'll tweet out those lo—

**Griffin:** Fun and good.

**Travis:** Yeah, fun and good. We'll tweet out those locations and post the schedule and everything so you can find us at all those because we're doing a TAZ panel, too. It's going to be great. We'll see you there.

Justin: Oh, my gosh.

Griffin: Um...

**Travis:** I've been working on my James Spader impression and I would love to try it out if I could.

**Griffin:** I mean, we can go Amp VS Amp, Spader VS Spader, and Justin can be, Justin can be...

**Travis:** Oh, that would be great. Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Griffin: One issue is I don't know who that is.

Travis: Oh, James Spader?

**Griffin:** Yeah. So my impression will be based largely off of whatever you do, Travis.

**Travis:** Okay, let me zone in.

**Justin:** Wait. You don't know who James Spader is?

**Griffin:** I know the name. Is that, uh...? Is that Cyclops?

Travis: It's the Boston Legal—
