Justin: You hear about this? This is just how my mind works. Iron...

Travis: Should we go?

Griffin: No, keep it on hit. We don't need more light, Justin does.

Travis: What he's doing— He clearly needs this.

Griffin: And listen, I don't want to tell the people who work here how to do their jobs, but what he's doing is more important than what me and Travis are doing right now.

Travis: We're glorified audience.

Griffin: Can you turn the lights off of me and Travis...

Travis: And if you want to mute our mics?

Justin: It's just always such a joy to be back in the Las Cruces funny bone. You all are always the best audience.

[audience cheers]

Justin: Shh... So Iron Mike's back in the headlines. I've had... I've had some—they don't mention that in the safety—

Griffin: That's great.

Justin: He hit someone on an airplane several times. If you didn't— [sighs]

[ba dum tss]

[audience cheers]

Justin: Hello, everybody, and welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me an advice show for the modern era. Wait a minute. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy, and I'm guessing we have not been here before. Is that accurate?

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Because the second time, you all will see it's much diluted from this. So I'm loving this. Getting it raw.

Travis: The second time. It's a lot more, like, "Oh!"

Justin: Yeah, it's amusing. Not funny, but amusing!

Travis: I'm your middlest brother, Travis McElroy.

[audience cheers]

Griffin: And I'm your sweet baby brother, Griffin McElroy.

[audience cheers]

Griffin: If you say so, man.

Justin: I am just so thrilled to be here in the Paris of the plains, as I call it. The city of fountains, um, soccer capital of America. We want the World Cup. Am I right?

Griffin: Yeah!

Justin: And it's also called the center of America. Mainly because it's the center of America. I mean, draw an X. We're here. This is the heartland right here. We're here.

Griffin: The coolest—I call it the cool Kansas City. Am I right?

Justin: Yeah!

[audience cheers]

Justin: Fuck that other Kansas City.

Griffin: Fuck that other Kansas City, for real. Hey, there's a lot of you here. If we all teamed up, we could beat bad Kansas City's ass.

Travis: They'd never see it coming.

Justin: Um, this is an advice show. We took a... don't be jealous, but we took a bus to get here.

Travis: Now, Justin, was it a fancy tour bus like Garth Brooks might have?

Justin: No, it was just a regular bus with cup holders. Just, like...

Griffin: It was a...

Travis: With some cup holders!

Justin: With some cup holders. There was a turlet in the back. No TP.

Which, I see you. Thank you. I get it.

Griffin: No TP, no sink. It was really just a wet bus hole.

Justin: The sink had a paper sign in it that said, "Do not use." So several of us did use the bathroom. So we all kind of exchanged this glance, like, we'll never speak of this, right? I didn't. You didn't, right? Did you bring hand sanitizer? Okay.

Griffin: But they did have one DVD on the bus and...

Travis: One. One!

Griffin: A single DVD. And the bus driver found it and was like, let me see if we have any other DVDs. But we told them to stop because the DVD was Space Jam. And we said, "Stop looking."

Justin: Here he goes.

Griffin: He's Andrew Dice Clay over here, tonight.

Travis: I don't mean to be—

Justin: [crosstalk]

Griffin: It did inspire my oldest son to, once again, just check with me that Michael Jordan is a real person and not a creation of the Warner Brothers entertainment conglomerate.

Justin: Our dad, as far as I know, did not read a book or look at a screen other than the movie Space Jam. He watched the entirety of it, rapt. And I know that because every few minutes he would announce the name of the person on the screen. "Jim Rome. Look at him. Muggsy Bogues. Look at him."

Griffin: Five foot three, Muggsy Bogues is. You can be anything you want to be.

Justin: Thank you. That's the message of tonight's—tonight's evening is, you can live your dreams. You can be anything you want to be. What a beautiful venue, by the way.

Griffin: No kidding.

Justin: We were blown away. This is—

[audience cheers]

Justin: You are so fortunate to have this, this is a lovely place. I asked who made the chandelier, and nobody would tell me.

Travis: What?

Justin: Yeah, I asked around. I was like, did you make it?

Travis: Were they're afraid you'd copy it?

Justin: Yeah, I guess. This is, as you certainly guessed by now, an advice show. And we're—you sent us your questions, and we are going to do our very best to answer them.

Griffin: Which isn't very good.

Travis: No, it's not good.

Justin: There will also be skits if you've never listened before.

Griffin: What?

Justin: There'll be skits and sketches. And bits.

Travis: [crosstalk]

Justin: Okay, here's the first question. "For my job, one of the things I've always had to do is stock the work fridge full of snacks. Once—"

Travis: What a weird part of someone's adult job to have.

Justin: Someone's got to do it.

Griffin: "I'm the CEO of Apple. I live in Kansas City."

Justin: "Once, kind of as a joke, I got Gogurts. Much to my surprise, they were almost immediately gone. So I restocked them and have been doing so for the last two and a half years."

Travis: That's a lot of Gogurt.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: That's excellent. Are you here?

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Okay. Got it.

Griffin: That sounds like someone who doesn't know how to source Gogurt.

Justin: Hey, real quick, just by a round of applause, if you live in this region and could buy Gogurt tomorrow, please applaud. Okay. Thank you. This was my suspicion. Just tell the truth. You didn't want to buy Gogurt anymore. I get it. They're pricey.

Travis: No—no—I do understand if you go to the place closest to your house and they have everything but Gogurt, the idea of being like, "Time to make a second stop for the Gogurt specific—"

Griffin: For my job.

Justin: Yeah, but like, what is this store that's like, "I don't know. We sell through all this Gogurt all the time, but it's just one person. Maybe we should stop selling it."

Griffin: If I need gut bacteria in the next 11 seconds...

Justin: There is no way. I would swear on a sack of Bibles that there is no

bacteria in Gogurt whatsoever. [laughs]

Travis: I mean, not the good kind.

Justin: It's not probiotic. I was going to say it's antibiotic, but we probably

would have heard of about that, huh?

Travis: Wait, why are both of those things good? Where's the middle

ground? Where's just biotic? Antibiotic is good. Probiotic is good.

Griffin: It's when they get out of whack. It's like midichlorians.

Travis: Oh, okay.

Griffin: That's why Jamie Lee Curtis can move things with her mind.

Justin: Gogurt is like the new Soylent for people that like to have a good

time.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Gogurt is a complete meal. It's got go, it's got gurt. It's everything

you need for the day.

Griffin: It's got cream, it's got flavor, it's got cold.

Travis: And sometimes there's SpongeBob on the package.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: The company is only giving 25-second breaks. That's the perfect time to just... [slurps] Slurp it down.

Travis: You can do that as you walk to your one bathroom break for the day. [slurps]

Justin: No problem.

Griffin: You remember the commercials for like, Yoplait fruit at the bottom where they, mm, mix it up a little bit and... [smacks lips] And it's like, I've got reports to file. I've got clients I need to interface with.

Justin: Put the fruit at the top, in the middle, and the bottom. I'm busy.

Griffin: No fruit! No fruit, just cream. Fast! Fast cream.

Travis: "And I could crush it to my face."

"What about Gogurt?"

"Yes!"

Griffin: They should call it fast cream for business.

Travis: Sometimes when I'm on my way to do brain surgery and I only have a little bit of time between brains...

Griffin: Yeah!

Travis: I need a quick Gogurt.

Griffin: I need one very fast.

Travis: I'm an adult doctor with responsibilities.

Griffin: And a hunger for cream.

Griffin: A googurt!

Justin: You might be the one person that knows how to get Gogurt because apparently the boss's boss can't get their own Gogurt. They have to come to you, their dealer.

Travis: If another human being—

Justin: The gurtsmith.

Travis: If another human being who is in charge of people, who are in charge of people has to lower themselves to ask you, another human being, "What can we do to get more Gogurt?"

Justin: Yeah, that was not it. That person had to psych themselves up for that conversation for days. Like, "No, I'm just going to ask him."

Travis: "I'm going to ask her today, honey. I have to I don't know where to get it!"

Justin: Is it like decoupage?

Travis: You say it like a spy in, like, a 1940s movie delivering a secret. "Ah,

my friends. Is it—"

Justin: Is it makeup?

Griffin: Is it like blood makeup?

Travis: It's like a cast.

Justin: Okay, that's fine. Um...

Griffin: So fucking funnyyy...

Justin: "I've been asked to participate again, and while I know it's important to have people with minor injuries, brothers, I want to know how I can beef up my performance." That's from It's Only a Flesh Wound. Are you here?

[someone cheers]

Griffin: All right!

Justin: Alright, good. Now, the first thing I do have to say before we move on is that there are no small injuries.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Um, as we've seen—

Griffin: They can get terribly infected and kill you.

Travis: So true.

Justin: Anything—Travis or Griffin, one of them once got a pine tree needle stuck in their foot. Had to go in for surgery. Anything can spiral out of control at any time.

Griffin: I got a kidney stone. Little old thing stuck in my peepee works. Took G-man out of commission for the better part of a month, so...

Travis: They had to send Dennis Quaid in there in a tiny submarine to get it out.

Griffin: That's true. Had to blast it.

Travis: Anything could happen.

Griffin: I got a boner and crushed a man inside of me.

[audience cheers]

Travis: Unrelated, those two things.

Justin: And that's what happened to Randy Quaid. If you're curious, he's still mad at Griffin.

Travis: "You killed my brother!"

Justin: "You killed my tiny brother with your boner!"

Travis: "Again!"

Justin: "Again!" That's how I lost Ralph Quaid.

Travis: "He was the best of us!"

Justin: Um...

Griffin: How did Randy Quaid get inside my wiener?

Justin: No, Randy didn't. In this fiction, Dennis did, was killed by your boner, and it made Randy so mad...

Griffin: Oh, I thought you were saying Randy Quaid was shrunk down in a urinal and shot up my pee stream...

Justin: Here's what you could do.

Griffin: ...Screaming, "Hey, boys, I'm back!"

Justin: Okay, so, hey, so here's one thing you could do...

Griffin: Because my wiener kidnapped Randy Quaid in the 90s.

Justin: [louder] One thing you could do! You do the concussion. That's child's play. Anybody could do that. But you also add on another injury, just sort of on the side, just sort of along the way. Hey, while you're looking at this, is this normal? And then you pull aside your tuxedo jacket and you get a knife wound in there.

Travis: Yeah, it's got to be good, too. It can't just, like, I got a hurt elbow and, like, a piece of rebar through. You have, like, you know, it's like one of those arrows through the head, but it's rebar one. That's what they—

Griffin: One they do on an old sweeps week episode of Grey's Anatomy.

Travis: Yeah! "Oh, there's a bomb in my tummy!" Something like that.

Justin: The other students are like, "Hey, she's doing it again. She's adding other injuries that were not there."

Travis: "Well, no, not— Be cool, be cool."

Justin: "Be cool. I got to find—"

Travis: "They said that they have an alien in their head and that's why the injuries—"

"I did not!"

Justin: "I did not! It's my tummy."

Travis: [laughs] Where aliens belong.

Griffin: You could draw with black marker, like, a crack on your head and it'd be like, "This is a real humdinger of a concussion I got over here."

Justin: It could be the story behind the concussion. You know what I mean? It could be like—

Travis: It's not related to the hurricane that happened?

Justin: No, it's just like, here's what happened. Like, I got a concussion...

Griffin: From a long time ago.

Justin: It's a long time concussion, I've been meaning to see somebody about, and maybe you could help me with that.

Travis: It always acts up during hurricanes.

Justin: "I got a concussion so bad—"

Griffin: "Oh, there's a hurricane coming. Oh! My concussion!"

Travis: Oh. What if the concussion gave you psychic powers and now they have to deal with that?

Justin: Hey, I got phenomenoned and now I have psychic powers. I got a concussion so bad I fell on this knife. So I need you to do both of them for me.

Travis: The knife hit me real hard and then bounced into my tummy.

Griffin: It phenomenoned me. I did get telekinesis, but I do not know how to use it. Exhibit A, the knife, trying to cut a steak. Instead, I cut a me.

[audience laughs]

Justin: Well, maybe you will get a better injury next time.

Griffin: Sure.

Justin: That's always possible.

Travis: Or trade with somebody lazy.

Justin: Yeah, somebody would love a concussion.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: That way you can just show up tired. Nobody would be, would bat

an eye.

Travis: "I'm going to go to sleep."

"Wait, no!"

Justin: "No, stop!"

Griffin: Or you could show up with rebar through your body and just be like, "You can't give me something else." You got to dress for the wound you want.

Justin: Yes. Yes. "Also, how good are you all at fixing stuff? Because I do actually need..."

Griffin: "This is not makeup."

Justin: "This is—I need medical attention right now."

Travis: "But please be careful. I'm just borrowing the rebar. I do have to take it back."

Griffin: "My dad's going to be so pissed if I don't get his rebar back to him. He's a foreman."

[audience laughs]

Justin: "The office I work in in downtown KC," that's Kansas City, "has big open staircases down the middle of the building, and I get the pleasure of sitting directly in front of them on the second floor. Every time someone walks down the stairs. I have severe anxiety that I will look up, make eye contact, and cause someone to trip. Dez: Hey, Dave.

Dave: Dave Hill Good Time Hour. Brand new episodes every Friday on Maximum Fun.

Chris: Plus, the show's not even an hour. It's 90 minutes.

Dez: Take that, stupid rules.

Dave: We nailed it.

[drum roll]

[ad break ends]

[Haunted Doll Watch alarm]

[audience cheers]

Justin: Wait, is this right? This can't be right. Here? Now? We're trying to do a live show and there's a Haunted Doll Watch?

[audience cheers]

Justin: I am so, so sorry, and, like, honestly embarrassed. Let's meet our first guest, Positive Leroy. Well, his full name is Positive Leroy: Died in Fire. Positive Leroy: Died in Fire. Still positive, though.

Travis: [cackling]

Justin: He don't have no limits. He's Positive Leroy, he died in a fire.

Travis: Oh, no!

Justin: "This is 18 year old Leroy. He passed away a long time ago in, you guessed it, a fire. He's obsessed with girls now, as any 18 year old would be." A little heteronormative for my tastes, but all right. "He had a girlfriend when he passed and watched over her until she went to heaven."

Griffin: Why is Positive Leroy wearing small Zubas?

Travis: Why is he shrugging so hard?

Justin: Why does he have David Spade's haircut? Nobody knows. "He said he's stuck here, but won't explain why." It's because he's a doll.

Griffin: He wants the babes.

Justin: He loves—

Travis: No babes in heaven.

Justin: No babes in heaven. "Please show him love and compassion. Know that yes, he may flirt with you."

Travis: Ooh! Don't give in.

Justin: [crosstalk] ...this beautiful boy, Positive Leroy.

Travis: Died in Fire.

Justin: Died in Fire. He's kind and so—

Travis: "No, please, Mr. Died in Fire was my dad. Call me Positive Leroy."

Justin: "He likes to communicate through the necrophonic app, K2 pendulum, and light up cat balls." I don't know what that means, but let's go with it.

Travis: The cat toys that light up.

Justin: "If you have any questions, please message me." I have a few. "Your experience may be different from mine." I assure you it is. Just from that, that's Positive Leroy...

Griffin: Look at his little toes!

Justin: He's, like, so beautiful and special. I don't think he's that creepy.

Griffin: And he's shrugging like, "Died in a fire!" It's a living.

Travis: "Thanks for the cardigan!"

Justin: Wait, this can't be right. Another haunted doll?

[audience cheers]

Travis: This one's Negative Leroy.

Griffin: Welcome to the stage, Lauren!

Justin: Neutral Lauren!

Travis: "Lived in Fire"— Whoa! No, no, no! That's Lauren.

Griffin: This is a hateful brooch.

Justin: "Haunted dolls - active metaphysical. It's Lauren. I love that this spirit is so fun."

Travis: Can I tell you what's weird, Griffin?

Griffin: What?

Travis: That's a mirror.

Justin: "I love that the spirit is so fun."

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Is it?

Justin: "She is a mysterious lady, this one. She will always change her name and voice. Her story has yet to be consistent. She often says the name Lauren, so I'm going with that."

Griffin: Shit.

Justin: "Lauren likes to just have fun with you. You'll hear her skipping, whistling..."

Griffin: With what body?

Justin: You'll hear her skippling, whistling...

Griffin: Falling down some stairs, rolling.

Justin: Only if you make eye contact with her. "She also likes to show shadows. Lauren is very bubbly..."

Griffin: Wait a second.

Justin: Yeah, that's the way it shapes.

Travis: Uh...

Griffin: Don't do that that fast because it makes it alive.

Travis: Whoa!

Griffin: It's looking at me with that picture!

Justin: Oh, no. "She also likes to show shadows. Lauren is very bubbly and always happy." For reasons that honestly escape me. "She has a fun spirit to have in a home."

Griffin: No! Paul! Why did you spend so much time on this animation, Paul?

Justin: "Lauren is very bubbly and always happy. She's a fun spirit to have in a home. No returns."

Griffin: How did she die though?

Travis: She didn't.

Griffin: [laughs] This is a living person's face adhered to an old picture frame.

Travis: You ever seen Doctor Who?

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: "If you choose to adopt her into your life, please understand something of great importance."

Travis: You got ripped off.

Justin: "Spirits do not always reveal themselves immediately. They do not perform on command. You need to give them time and space. Sometimes it happens right away, but it's quite rare. Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: What?

Justin: Now, what do we have on offer here? Well, my friends, it's a wish from the Lord of Jequitwsia, billionaire king Djinn. Now, I was worried with this that when I saw the word Jequitwsia, I thought that I might be stumbling into some, like, cultural territory that's outside of my— No, no, no.

That's a made up word. Google it. This is the only thing that comes up. So you get a wish from the Lord of Jequitwsia, billionaire king Djinn. This is one wish, I mean, "It's a wish from the Lord of Jequitwsia, billionaire king Djinn. Manifest your desires into reality, powerful and unique to God master healers."

Travis: "Hey, I'm a snake. What do you need?"

Justin: "What do you need? I'm a big snake. What do you need?"

Griffin: "What do you need? Venom, hissing sounds?"

Travis: "I'm not Jequitwsia, but I know him."

Justin: "Not available anywhere else." One would hope. "Supercharge your life with real magic. Unique secret magic to God's master healers. First time being offered to the public." Boys, let me ask you a few questions.

Griffin: Yeah, sure.

Justin: Are you tired of being poor?

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Do you want obscene amounts of money?

Griffin: Absolutely.

Travis: Wait, obscene?

Justin: Would you like money coming to you from all directions?

Travis: From all directions?

Justin: Fancy giving up your day job and live your dreams?

Griffin: Yeah, I would love to do that the most. You would not see me on this stage again.

Justin: Have you had enough just making ends meet? I may have the answer. A billionaire Djinn from my own personal collection.

Griffin: [laughs] Wait, this needs to be clarified immediately. We're not buying a Djinn.

Justin: No, you get one wish.

Travis: And not only that, I saw it on the page. You get a note card to write your wish.

Justin: Let me finish.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Billionaire Djinn, "I'm offering one wish from my own billionaire Djinn. Lord of Jequitwsia is over 42,813 years old."

Travis: Wait, over that?

Justin: Over that by a couple months.

Travis: So, like, yeah, 42,813 and a half.

Justin: And a half. "...years old and comes from first generation of Jequitwsia family."

Griffin: [in a dramatic voice] "My birthday is in September!"

Travis: "Go ahead and let me rent a car. Please be cool."

Justin: "This billionaire Djinn has plenty of experience in complex moneymaking rituals. I have owned him just over eleven years and always helped me realize my financial dreams." It's worth noting this is on sale for \$50.

Griffin: It's £50, actually.

Justin: Sorry, £50, which is roughly, let's see, \$65 and \$18 shipping. So the financial dreams can't have been that fully realized, right?

Travis: Well, that's what it is this is part of it. It's like, I would like to have a billion dollars, too. It's like, "You can. So we're going to set up an eBay account, my dude, you and me together."

Justin: "This is how we're going to do it. You're going to sell wishes from me. Big bang boom."

Travis: "And then you're going to hire people, and they're going to sell wishes for you. It's the world's first pyramid scheme. I live in a pyramid. I'm a big snake."

Griffin: "I'm a big, big snake. I looove pyramids."

Justin: "I cannot guarantee the time or how your wish will manifest, but it will happen in time. It may be months."

Griffin: It may be 40,000 years.

Justin: "It may be years. Be careful what you wish for, as it cannot be reversed." It's like hiring Dan Ackroyd and Gertzboy Blank. "It cannot be reversed. It is not if it will work or not, but do you really want what you're

asking for?" One more time. "It is not if it will work or not, but do you really want what you're asking for? The sad truth is, most people spend their lives not knowing what they really want in life."

Griffin: You have provided several helpful prompts of what this djinn can supply you.

Travis: To be fair, they were all money based. What if you write to the djinn and like, "I would like to be happy." It's like, "Ooh, I can't do that. Do you want some money?"

Justin: "Important!" This is in all caps.

Griffin: I don't think that's right.

Justin: It'll be like this.

Travis: Somewhere between those two.

Justin: "Important. I do not want to know your wish! Please do not message me."

Travis: It's birthday wish rules, okay.

Justin: "... or let me know your wish in the order details. Keep it secret, please, for your sake and your immortal soul."

Griffin: Holy shit, what?

Justin: "I'm not responsible for how your wish manifests. I will not offer refunds or return on this wish pack. I will send you a precharged magical card with my Djinn's energy. All you need to do is write your wish on the card and hide it. That is all."

Travis: And hide it?

Justin: "The Djinn will do the rest. That simple. No spells or bindings." Hide it well enough so that your wife does not come home and say, "Hey, sweetheart, what on earth is this?"

Travis: That right there? That's a £50 wish, my friend.

Justin: £50 well spent. "I have limited wish cards available. Once the billionaire Djinn has placed his limit, I will end this listing forever. Buy it now before it's too late."

Griffin: We got to get this fucking note card.

Travis: And then wish for at least £51.

Justin: I'm not dabbling in these dark arts. Anyway, that's our Haunted Doll Watch.

Griffin: Ooh, boy.

[audience cheers]

Paul: [imitates Haunted Doll Watch alert] I'm terribly sorry to interrupt. This is tour manager Paul with an important interruption. I promise it's important because this is the first ever Gurt Alert. I have a very important update relating to Gogurt, and I really kind of have to show you rather than tell you.

Griffin: Okay?

Travis: Okay? Did we get some 'gurt?

Griffin: Oh, awesome.

Travis: Hell, yeah, my dude.

Justin: Oh, cool. Hey, I'm not doing this. But this will be the live show that you saw Griffin huffs a whole Gogurt because he said he could. Thank you, Paul. Come on. I'm not—absolutely not. I don't even like yogurt.

Travis: I thought you were cool!

Justin: Okay, everybody ready to film this great Gogurt race? Two brothers, both alike in dignity. Not a sponsor, Gogurt.

Travis: I need you to count down, Justin.

Justin: Okay, you guys are ready? [crosstalk] Three, two, one, Gogurt. You ready?

Travis: I gotta burp. Hold on. Wait. Okay. I'm ready, I'm ready.

Justin: Okay. Three, two, one, Gogurt!

[audience cheers]

Justin: You guys are in for a raunchy night.

Travis: Fuck, that was good.

Justin: Was it good?

Travis: That was good as hell, my dude.

Griffin: That was really fucking good Gogurt. I get it. That company they're on—

Travis: Jesus Christ. If that was alcoholic, that's a party right there. I love

that, man. You got to do it.

Justin: I'll sip at one casually.

Travis: Make an evening of it.

Griffin: Just sip it while we answer the audience questions. Someone is at

the microphone. Come on down. Let's begin. Hi.

Michael: Hi.

Griffin: Who are you?

Travis: Is it too spicy?

Justin: I don't like it. I don't like it.

Travis: Is it too spicy?

Justin: I don't like it.

Griffin: Hi.

Michael: Hi. My name is Michael.

Griffin: Hi, Michael.

Travis: I like your jacket.

Justin: I love that look, Michael.

Michael: Thank you, sir. I appreciate it.

Griffin: Get right up on the microphone.

Justin: So, Michael, your sentence that you sent us was, "Brothers, should I keep digging this big hole under my house?" I might take an early guess at no, but I'm going to need more context.

Michael: Okay. So, my wife and I recently got a new house. It's a very old house. And, well, we started doing some renovating and dug under some concrete and we found like, a brick archway.

Griffin: Oh, shit.

Michael: And so we started digging...

Griffin: Are there any runes?

Justin: "This season on the Curse of Oak Island."

Michael: I haven't checked yet, but—

Travis: You didn't check for runes, Michael?

Griffin: Michael, they'd be glowing.

Michael: I looked, but all right, we're 7ft in at this point. I can stand I'm pretty tall, gentlemen.

Griffin: Yeah.

Michael: And I can stand completely in this hole and just...

Griffin: Vanish. Yeah, sure.

Michael: We haven't hit the bottom yet.

Justin: Of the archway?

Michael: Well, it's a completely flat wall. It's, like, plastered in.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: Holy shit.

Justin: Aren't you worried about hitting pipes? What if you hit pipes?

Travis: Or demons?

Michael: At a certain point, I either have to keep going or I have to stop.

Travis: Yes. That's all the options.

Justin: If you dig half a hole, that's really not anything, is it?

Griffin: So you have not exhumed the entire archway, is what you're

saying?

Michael: Not completely.

Griffin: I mean, you have to get the archway out, Michael.

Michael: What else can I do?

Travis: You can film it for TikTok, grow up!

Justin: Yeah, you should have been filming this whole time. How much of an archaeological background do you have that qualifies you to this exhumation?

Griffin: Also, did you call fucking 411 to make sure you're not going to zap yourself, you goofball?

Michael: We did check that there's no electrical going through it...

Justin: Did they ask, like, out of curiosity, why are you digging a big hole under your house?

Griffin: Did you ask about ley lines between archways?

Travis: What if you punch through the archway and there's more house in there?

Justin: Let him talk!

Michael: There's a big hole under my house.

Travis: Yeah. Okay, that's been established. That's not new information, Michael.

Griffin: Don't waste my fucking time, Michael. I'm drinking Gogurt, I have places to be.

Justin: Do you get another Gogurt?

Griffin: I wanted to know if the banana one was good or not.

Travis: Not as good as strawberry?

Griffin: It's not. Michael.

Michael: I'm scared that I will...

Griffin: Yes. Your house will fall on you?

Michael: No. Because it's like 110 year old house.

Travis: So it's definitely fine.

Justin: Yeah. No way. It would fall on you.

Michael: I'm scared that I'm either going to unleash something or find treasure and I don't know...

Travis: Wait, why are you scared of treasure? Don't be scared. Open your heart.

Justin: No, because then everybody comes knocking. "Hey, Michael, I heard you struck gold."

Travis: Can I say there's a third option you should be afraid of? Which is you do a lot of work and find nothing.

Justin: Yeah, but, like...

Michael: I already found a kickass archway, so it's like...

Justin: "I've found a cool archway." Michael, I'm sorry to be the one to tell you this, but you do have to keep going. If you do half of this, it's nothing. Half of this is nothing.

Travis: That's true.

Michael: Thank you.

Justin: You'll tell this story to people and they'll be like, "So?" And you'll be like, "So I covered it up and watched Wheel of Fortune." Like, that's nothing.

Travis: That's nothing.

Justin: You have to finish. You have to finish.

Travis: In fact, I would go so far as to say, like, invite people over and

make a day of it.

Justin: Yeah! Many hands make light exhumation of the weird archway. Just get some friends in and, you know, if a demon shows up you got maybe a little meat between you and them.

Travis: Yeah, sure. Yeah, don't invite your best friends. Invite people you know.

Justin: Your strong, bad friends.

Griffin: If the moon is full, maybe throw a tarp over that shit.

Travis: Yeah. If you hear whispers from inside that sound like long lost loved ones, tarp it.

Justin: Don't go.

Griffin: Tarp it.

Travis: Tarp it so hard.

Justin: As bad as you want to know the truth, the Archway wants you even more, Michael. You have to know that.

Griffin: Does that help, Michael?

Michael: That helps. Thank you.

Griffin: Exquisite.

Justin: Thank you.

Griffin: Next, please. Oh, thank you, Amanda.

Justin: Thank you, Amanda! Our manager Amanda with her debonair cape.

And she's gone!

Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Back into the night.

Justin: Thank you, Tuxedo Mask.

Griffin: Hello.

Travis: Hello.

Monroe: Hello!

Griffin: Hi.

Travis: Hey! Are you a fancy moth person or is that just what I'm gathering

from the antennae?

Monroe: They're horns.

Griffin: They're horns. Obviously, Travis.

Justin: Monroe, you said, "Can I bring my unicycle into places I've ridden to

and set it in a corner while I go about my business?" And my immediate

answer is only if you want to walk home, but go on.

Griffin: More details.

Monroe: So my car broke down this week and my only way to get around is with my unicycle. So I'm wondering if I can bring it in places and ask the cashier...

Griffin: "Do you have a unicycle parking section?"

Monroe: I don't. And I don't have a bike lock because I didn't have one before, and I'd have to go out of my way.

Griffin: There's no way to secure a unicycle.

Monroe: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah, sure. [crosstalk] It's so streamlined and stealable.

Travis: Wait, no hold on. Let them finish. Because the rest of that was asked the cashier to what?

Monroe: To watch it while I get groceries?

Griffin: Well, you know that's unacceptable, right? [crosstalk]

Justin: Monroe, you should just carry it...

Travis: Or keep riding it.

Justin: What if there's a long hallway? You want to be ready for that. You'll be so mad if you see a long hallway and you're like, "God damn it. If only I had my unicycle, I could breeze through this."

Travis: You can also, oh, here's the move, right? You take it and you look at the cashier and you go, "Where do you usually keep these?"

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Yeah, just point, like, "Unicycle? I have a unicycle. Where's...

Where's your unicycle?"

Travis: "Oh, I thought this was a high class establishment."

Griffin: Can you give me—so are you talking about, like, grocery shopping? Is that the kind of thing, experience you're talking about that you ride your unicycle to?

Monroe: Yeah. Or can I, like, take it to class and put it in the corner?

Griffin: No, you can't do that.

Travis: Unless it's clown college.

Griffin: Unless— I would say if you go to the grocery store, it's okay if you buy three round objects of similar weight and size.

Monroe: See, but I can't do anything with those.

Travis: I mean you could, as long as you have, like, a big stick and equally weighted things on either end, you could do that.

Justin: Yeah, that could be good.

Travis: I'd watch that all day.

Griffin: Here's what I would say. Oh, no. At this point, I immediately poked a hole in my own point, but I'll say it anyway. Who's going to steal a unicycle? Because very few people know how to ride those home, but I could just pick that shit up.

Travis: Yeah.

Monroe: I've had one stolen from me before.

Griffin: Really?

Monroe: Yeah.

Griffin: I want to know that story.

Monroe: My parents left the garage open and it disappeared.

Griffin: Wow.

Travis: But you'd think it would be easily identified later as the only other

unicycle in town.

Justin: Yeah. If you see someone riding it, that's yours.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Unless you tape two of them together and they're like, "Oh, that

could be a bicycle."

Justin: Time for a little frontier justice. Get it back.

Griffin: Does KC have, like, a very active unicycle scene?

[some audience members cheer]

Griffin: Holy shit. Are you fucking kidding me?

[audience laughs]

Griffin: That was, I thought, a goof, but okay, then, yeah, apparently it's pretty competitive. Don't ever let that shit out of your sight.

Travis: It's starting to sound like you could just take someone else's home with you.

Justin: Yeah. Does that help?

Monroe: Sounds like the answer is no.

Griffin: Just fuse it with your legs and become gizmo duck.

Travis: Yes! We can't keep giving that answer.

Justin: Thank you.

Monroe: Thank you.

Griffin: Thank you.

Justin: Sam, the person that asked the Gogurt question, initially asked if they could have a Gogurt, if they can have one so I'll just leave one.

Griffin: Juice, did you have one? Did you eat one yet?

Justin: I did. I'm actually, like, savoring it.

Griffin: I'm kind of having a good time just in eating Gogurt.

Justin: In fact, you know what? Actually, Sam, never mind. These are our Gogurts. I'm really sorry.

Griffin: Yeah. Gabriella, hello.

Gabriella: Hi.

Griffin: You sent many sentences which we frown upon and now we will shame you publicly. No, they were good sentences, though. Basically, there's a fish tank pickup you're looking to make with baggage.

Gabriella: Yes.

Justin: Go on.

Gabriella: So I grew up with fish and I really want to fish...

Justin: In the sea? Is this like a raised by wolves scenario or...

Travis: It's a reverse limpet.

Justin: Okay.

Travis: We got a reverse limpet.

Justin: We got to make a good impression.

Gabriella: So I really want a fish tank, but I'm kind of lazy and cheap, so I'm not going to put in the money or the effort to actually do it myself.

Griffin: Fantastic.

Travis: Yeah, it's a lot of fucking work.

Griffin: Sounds like another amazing... [laughs] home for fish is in the works.

Gabriella: Listen, I would take great care of them.

Justin: I'm sure. I'm sure, no doubt.

Gabriella: So my brother is giving his away. The only issue is I have to take the fish that he is giving away as well, and I really don't want them and I don't know what to do with them. I would rather just pick my own cool fish.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: His fish suck.

Gabriella: They suck. And I don't know, like...

Griffin: They're real betas.

[audience laughs]

Travis: Proud of you. Is the problem that they are not good kinds of fish or

that the fish themselves have bad attitudes?

Gabriella: Bad attitudes and a...

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: What are we talking about? What kind of fish...?

Gabriella: They are suckerfish.

Griffin: Suckerfish?

Travis: Wait, hold on. Those are nice. They keep the tank clean.

Gabriella: Uh...

Justin: We're not here to critique Gabriella's taste in fish.

Griffin: Right.

Gabriella: Well, kind of.

Travis: What kind of fish are you looking to get? What kind of cool fish?

Gabriella: I love, like, mollies, guppies. Not a sucker.

Justin: Why do I have to be here for this? Come on, Gabriella.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Is your question if you can throw your brother's fish in the toilet?

You can't! You can't!

Gabriella: I asked if I can flush them down the toilet.

Justin: You can't flush them down the toilet!

Griffin: You can put them in a pond or some shit!

Travis: Don't do that! Don't do that with suckerfish. They grow so big.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: They will ruin whatever you put them in.

Gabriella: So, what do I do? Do I give them to a pet store?

Justin: Oh, no.

Gabriella: Do I try to sell them on Craigslist?

Justin: I'm woefully unqualified to answer this question. I'm realizing this is real stakes. There are real fish souls on the line here. I can't just blow this!

Travis: You should take them to a fish store and give them to them. See if you can trade them for better fish. "I'll give you four suckerfish for two mollies."

Justin: Undercut people as they come in to buy fish. Like, "Don't waste money on these department store fish."

Griffin: That's good.

Justin: "I got some boys that need a home right here."

Travis: "These are farm to tank fish right here."

Griffin: "Yeah, buy my brother's idiot fish."

Justin: "It's either you or the toilet, friend. What do you think? You taking home these beautiful fish today?" Is that...

Griffin: Is that anything?

Justin: Is that anything?

Gabriella: It actually is really helpful. I think I might try to trade them.

Travis: Okay, yeah.

Griffin: Awesome.

Justin: Um... Okay.

Griffin: Hello.

Tanner: Hello.

Griffin: Hi. Tanner?

Tanner: Yes.

Griffin: Hello.

Tanner: Hi.

Travis: Hi!

Griffin: What's your—I mean, know kind of what your question is. We considered doing it in the first part of the show, but then when we saw you send it in for this part of the show, we were like there's—that's details. We got to fucking do that.

Travis: No, wait. Don't answer right away because I want to guess.

Justin: Give us a second.

Travis: Okay, here's what it could be. Obvious answer, frog-themed bar. Better answer...

Justin: Yeah. We have— Like there's Señor Frogs. There's Frogland, USA in Ironton, Ohio.

Travis: Those are the two.

Griffin: Right.

Travis: So other answer is it's a place where you can go and really be a frog.

Justin: Sorry, how do you figure?

Travis: Well, you know how you're looking around and you're, like, "Frogs

got it good." You know, they just sit around all day.

Justin: Oh, it's like a FARP. It's like a frog action role play.

Travis: Yes, thank you.

Justin: Um, it could be a FARP. It could be a bar where they serve different kinds of delicious frogs in different prepared...

Travis: No, Tanner's saying no to that one.

Justin: It's not that, okay, I know that's the wrong—

Griffin: Listen, in Princess and the Frog, the animated feature film, I think we can all agree the curves they gave those frogs are of this world, and I don't have a follow up to that. It's just something I wanted to say out loud in front of an audience of friends.

Travis: Those were some FILFs.

Justin: FILFs! Absolutely not. Tanner, free us. What's a frog bar?

Tanner: So mostly it's just a frog themed bar, but we did hypothetically create, like, a side room where you could play with frogs if you were like...

Travis: For a little extra!

Tanner: Like a cat cafe!

Griffin: We have several tiers of interactivity.

Travis: [laughing]

Tanner: Well. You want to vet people before you let them—

Justin: These tongues are so long, you wouldn't believe! Okay—

Travis: You're not a cop, right? Okay.

Justin: You have to tell us if you're a cop. What—Tanner, what— You had to come up with a better bar idea than frog bar.

Griffin: This— Obviously, that's not the—the quality of frog bar is not the fucking problem, Justin.

Justin: No, but I'm saying if Tanner has a better something that is stickier than frog bar for the boss...

Griffin: Which it sounds like very little would be.

Travis: Yeah,

Justin: Um... I got nothing.

Griffin: Tanner, you got to open frog bar, Tanner.

Justin: [crosstalk]

Travis: Make your dream come true.

Justin: Yeah. If you make frog bar, then you don't have to see your boss anymore. Oh, there's good. Yeah. Open frog bar and then you have a new boss. It's you.

Griffin: Right. And you can hang a sign— You can hang a sign on the outside of frog bar with a picture of your boss on it that says, like, "This boss is not allowed inside of frog bar."

Travis: "This guy's a real frog pervert."

Justin: You'd all go to frog bar, right?

[audience cheers]

Justin: Look, Tanner! There's a huge audience for frog bar! Does that help?

Tanner: Sure, yeah!

Griffin: Sure. Yeah. We just changed your life, is all. Golly!

Justin: God. It's like Tony Robbins is up here all of a sudden. We're inspiring—

Travis: Except not shitty.

Justin: Anybody else?

Griffin: Jenny, last audience question. Hello, Jenny.

Jenny: Hi.

Justin: How's it going?

Griffin: Jenny, the question you sent in is, "I'm living in someone's attic and don't know the etiquette of bringing home a suitor. Tee-hee."

Justin: The tee-hee really sold it, by the way.

Travis: Now, right off the bat, I have one question. The person knows you're living in the attic, right?

Griffin: Yeah.

Jenny: Yes!

Griffin: This isn't like a Parasite situation. No, fantastic.

Jenny: Not quite.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: Not quite?

Jenny: No. [laughs] No, she knows I live there. I pay her rent.

Griffin: Okay.

Jenny: She owns the home. It's an old home. I don't know, I feel like you can hear everything there. She has a child.

Travis: When you enter...

Griffin: No, hold on. Can you say that last part again, but louder for the

audience at home?

Jenny: She has an eight year old child.

Griffin: Eight years old. Okay, so they know—

Justin: These kids today.

Travis: They have the Internet.

Justin: Okay.

Travis: Now, is it the kind of thing where in order to get to your attic abode, you have to go through the house?

Jenny: Yes.

Travis: Okay, so there's no way of bringing...

Griffin: There's not, like, a ladder that you can slam up through the window like Sam from Clarissa Explains It All?

Justin: Jenny, hate to bring down the mood, but you really should have a fire ladder if you're living in the attic in case of emergency.

Travis: Do you have an Egress in case...?

Justin: You need a swift egress.

Travis: Some way to get out?

Jenny: I don't.

Griffin: Jenny, you need to figure that shit out tonight.

Justin: I know that you love sex and stuff, but this is really—

Jenny: [laughs]

Travis: Especially, Jenny, if you're lighting candles or sending the mood in any way like that, like putting some silk over a lamp or something, that's so dangerous.

Justin: Step one's gonna be fire escape ladder. Huge.

Travis: Something that unrolls in preferably seconds would be great.

Justin: You should probably talk to your friend that owns the place about your escape plan and the numbers that you would call...

Travis: And where the meeting place is and if you want to establish a code word, a code word would be great.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: And that's also good to set up a code word with suitors.

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: Don't make it the same code word for the love of God!

Griffin: Has the homeowner said something about this before? Is this a problem that has been brought to you?

Jenny: No, so I have only lived in Kansas City for six months.

Griffin: Okay.

[someone in the audience cheers]

Griffin: Okay? That's a weird—"Yeah, that's a great period of time to live in Kansas City!"

Jenny: "Six months!"

Justin: "October for life!" Go on.

Jenny: I haven't ever brought anybody over because I'm very nervous about that.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I understand that.

Jenny: And the only—I mean, okay. I don't know how to say this.

Travis: You don't have to, Jenny.

Justin: That's never stopped us before. We just go for it.

Jenny: She hasn't known that I've been there before and she has brought

over a man and the entire house shakes. This is not a joke—

Justin: Wait, hold on—

Travis: First of all, hell yeah, get it, landlord!

Justin: Yeah, go for it. So it's—I'm—my hearing is bad. What did you say?

Jenny: You heard me.

Justin: I'm going to make—I didn't!

Travis: Justin, Jenny said that the landlord brought over a suitor and when

they...

Griffin: Took it to pound town.

Travis: ...made love, the entire house shook.

Justin: Whoa! All right. Nice. So you actually have nothing to worry about, I

guess?

Travis: A precedent has been set.

Griffin: The problem with...

Griffin: [laughing] Yeah!

[audience cheers]

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: You are really, really fun people. Thank you to Paul Sabourin, Amanda Freberg. Thank you to Rachel for recording the show. Thank you—

Travis: Thank you to the staff of the Midland Theater!

Griffin: Yes!

Justin: Thank you to the incredible, incredible Shmanners for opening the show up.

Griffin: Yeah! Did you thank our dad?

Travis: Thanks, Dad!

Griffin: Thanks, Dad!

Justin: Bye, Goldie's Guide.

Travis: You can get Goldie's Guide, which Griffin hid under the table in

shame, uh Linktree...

Griffin: It obscured the view— He keeps putting it up in front of us like it's a...

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: This has been My Brother, My Brother and Me, kiss your dad square

on the lips!

[audience cheers]
