MBMBAM 624: Reince Your Priebus

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Intro (**Bob Ball**): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids, which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme song, "My Life Is Better With You" by Montaigne plays]

Justin: Hello everybody and welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modern era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

Travis: I'm your middlest brother, Travis McElroy.

Griffin: I'm the sweet one, Griffin McElroy.

Travis: Oh, yeah. So, I remember this, guys. So, right there, Justin had done a kind of different like me. And so, I was feeling a little different. I just had a sip of coffee. And I was looking at Griffin in his tank top. I remember that, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Griffin: [laughs] What?

Justin: Yeah, I'll bite.

Griffin: Yeah, yeah... Explain it.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Oh. So, we do a lot of episodes. And I was thinking about it, I mean we've done over 600 at this point. And like, I'm worried now that someone will ask us to like go back and do commentary on them. And like I don't remember it at all. Like, I couldn't tell you what we talked about last week.

So, I figured it would be more efficient to just record the commentary during the whole show.

Griffin: Yeah, Travis' intros usually like require you to stick with it pretty hard. And they're not always great. They're not always great. And sometimes, he tells us like, "Oh, I've got the intro." And you get really worried. But this one I remember thinking was like pretty fucking funny. Like, I was busting up inside.

Justin: [laughs] Inside. Not on the outside. It's very important.

Griffin: Justin started laughing for no reason whatsoever—

Justin: Sorry, Griffin. You were cracking me up talking about... [impersonates Griffin in low monotone voice] "And then other thing happened with my kids..." Sorry, you were cracking me up. I can talk over myself, it's fine. [mumbles] [laughs] Uh... So, um... [laughs]

Travis: I could tell Justin was having a really good time with it. Justin was really enjoying himself and I appreciated that.

Justin: This intro seems like a pretty good way to send people's brains straight to hell, right? 'Cause I'm barely hanging in there.

Griffin: Now, what did you think, Travis? What did you think of Justin when he kind of like... you could tell he didn't actually understand what the bit was, but he was like trying.

Travis: Yeah, I could tell that. But I mean, he was having fun.

Griffin: And then there was complete silence for like 20 seconds.

Travis: Oh, yeah. I remember during this commentary that Griffin and I were talking about Justin not understanding the bit.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And like... it just was clear that Justin wasn't fully—

Justin: [in old man voice] I don't remember Travis' commentary about our commentary—

Griffin: He started talking like a grandpa. Do you remember when he started talking like a grandpa?

Travis: I don't remember that. When did that happen?

Griffin: Further evidencing the fact that he did not understand the bit, 'cause he started being like an old man.

Justin: [through laughter] No, I'm doing the bit. I'm in the future, doing commentary on it. I get it, it's just not very funny.

Travis: No, he was really over complicating it, if I remember correctly.

Griffin: He was trying really hard. That's why we love Justin, is 'cause he tries his damnedest every time.

Travis: He tries so hard. He has a good heart.

Griffin: He has a great heart and a wonderful beard.

Travis: Yeah. He quit the show right after this, if I remember correctly.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: This it, guys. I'm quitting the show!

Travis: Yeah, yeah, I knew it.

Griffin: Yeah, there it was, Travis. You got it.

Justin: I'm out!

Griffin: You got it right there.

Justin: This is fuckin' stupid. You guys aren't even talking. We've just been sitting in silence. Just me. Solo mish.

Travis: And it turned out he was really mad because his Beanie Baby collection wasn't worth what he thought it was. And like, it was really eating at him. But then, luckily, the market for Beanie Babies, if I remember, a couple days later, really took off.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I think it's so fucking tragic that I put in the effort, day in day out, with my Beanie Babies. Getting all my babies together. Keeping them clean, keeping them fresh, keeping them deodorized. That's a full-time job! I got cats that love to hunt Beanie Babies. And I just simply do not have the time or bandwidth—

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Okay, so, it wasn't a tunnel. This is what everybody misses. It wasn't a tunnel, it was a cave. And it's like, why is there a cave there? Okay...

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Thanks Reince Priebus. [through laughter] Thanks for building a cave there, Reince Priebus. I mean, yeah. Priebus is in it, all the way to the top. [laughs]

Griffin: I did believe the bit about Priebus.

Travis: Yeah, of course. Well, it's a convincing name.

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Definitely not just a joke name that Justin pulled from his brain.

Justin: I really miss the days where we could talk a lot about Reince Priebus. [laughs]

Griffin: Yeah...

Travis: Is that his first name? Is that his first name? You keep saying a name...

Griffin: Rinse... I think Justin's not entirely sure and he just kind of takes a run at it every time.

Justin: Reince Priebus...

Griffin: It sounds like what the parent of a toddler would say during bath time. Like, hey, "Rinse your Priebus."

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: And I remember Griffin said this thing about rinsing your Priebus, and it cracked me up really good.

Griffin: "You're old enough now. You can rinse your own Priebus, you're old enough now."

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "No one's gonna rinse your Priebus for you once you get to kindergarten."

Travis: "Hey, leave your Priebus alone while you're at school. Right? It's just, we've gotta be gentle with our Priebuses."

Justin: So, nobody's gonna talk. None of you are gonna talk... Well, that's just great. I guess we don't have much of a podcast today, 'cause it's just me flying solo. Unless my brothers would please, just to help me out a little bit. A few jokes. One or two jokes, that's it. Don't make me carry the whole thing on my shoulders.

Travis: Sorry, Justin. I'll jump back in.

Justin: Thank you, Travis.

Travis: Sorry, I was just so distracted looking at the news today.

Griffin: Uh-oh...

Travis: Now, just in general. It's just mostly local stuff. Back to school...

Griffin: Yeah, school's abuzz. And gas prices have changed.

Justin: That's absolutely true.

Griffin: Should we do questions?

Justin: Yes. I remember that we have a list of them here. And I would be happy... Whoa... Guys, I just went to look at the email list. And I wanna tell you, I got a very real email from Dick's Sporting... and there's an ellipses... Goods. Dick's Sporting... Goods?

Griffin: Yeah?

Justin: And the subject is, "You've been chosen."

Travis: [gasp]

Griffin: Whoa... Juice!

Justin: And that feels so good.

Griffin: You're an athlete now.

Travis: "Hey, we know you've been putting in the sweat equity on the courts. You're in."

Griffin: Yeah!

Justin: It says, "Your name came up for a YETI Hopper M20 Cooler custom gift."

Griffin: Fuck yes!

Justin: Whoa. It says it's the newest model yet.

Travis: Whoa.

Justin: "Hurry up, the number of prizes to be won is limited. Confirm now."

Griffin: Do we need to delay this recording?

Justin: Whoa, I can join their loyalty program for free?

Griffin: Oh my god, Juice. You would be an idiot to not do this.

Travis: Yeah, no. Stop the podcast.

Justin: Oh my god. At the bottom it says, "If you no longer wish to receive these emails, you may unsubscribe by clicking here. Or writing to..." And then there's an address in Las Vegas. Can you imagine a world where like, "I'm tired of these spam emails! Someone get my pen. And stamps. And an envelope and paper."

Travis: "Fetch me my quill!"

Justin: "I'll tell these people exactly what I think of them."

Travis: [in Victorian British accent] "Dearest Dick's Sporting Goods. I have appreciated your info for the last several years. But now, I find it tedious. And so, I must unsubscribe. Sincerely, Justin McElroy Esquire. P.S. I would like that tumbler, please."

Justin: I get this spam email every week, guys. I searched for YETI and there's 30 emails about a fake Dick's Sporting Goods telling me about this YETI Cooler that I've got to come get.

Travis: They want you to get this cooler.

Griffin: You've been chosen, Justin.

Justin: I've been chosen.

Griffin: They can't just pick someone else.

Travis: Would you guys say this is our best episode of My Brother, My Brother and Me yet? Or just top 10?

Griffin: I would say it's probably like number six for me.

Justin: I was actually thinking before we started like—

Travis: Oh, yeah?

Justin: ... What if this was the best one ever?

Travis: Oh, wow.

Justin: There's still time.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: "My mother-in-law has repeatedly and seriously expressed interest in buying my car when I'm ready to buy a new one. Which I'd typically be more than happy to do. The problem is, a long-forgotten lunch box in my trunk has created a bit of a... 'stink' problem." They have stink in quotes.

Griffin: Oh, no...

Justin: Like, I bet it's just a stink problem.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: "I've removed the lunch box, but a light funk lingers. And I'm not confident in my ability to un-stink this thing. How do I convince my mother-in-law she really doesn't want my otherwise great car without having to explain to her the embarrassing reason why?" That's from What's That Smell in Wisconsin. This is what I'm talking about.

Griffin: And this is one of those things that I feel like... and I don't watch the television program, but I've just kind of like absorbed through osmosis, that there has been somebody on Shark Tank who's been like, "My special car destinkifying gel, you rub it in..." And then four of the people are like, "I'm out. It's bad business." But then usually Mark Cuban's like, "I wanna be your best friend on this."

Travis: "I got a stinky trunk. I love it."

Griffin: "These guys have never driven a car a day in their—they've never had to computer with their lunch box in the back. I know the struggles of the real humans. Of which I am one, Mark Cuban."

Justin: [laughs] "Just like you."

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: But I can tell you that your search for it would not be in vain.

Travis: Now, I have to say. If there's one thing you take away from 624 episodes of My Brother, My Brother and Me, and we've talked about this so many times. Griffin: That's not a real job.

Justin: Imagine a four-year-old Mark Cuban bangs on your door and he's like, "'Ey! 'Ey, 'ey! You need trash bags? I'm your guy."

Travis: This isn't a question I think anyone should have to ask the door-to-door salesman, but I think I would. Like, "They're new, right? Like, they haven't been used, right? These aren't like—"

Justin: "'Ey! They're trash bags. They're convenient, they're here. What does it matter?"

Travis: "Aah... Mark, I don't know about this."

Griffin: Christ alive. Okay, I did just Google Shark Tank car stink.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: I Googled Shark Tank car stink.

Justin: Oh, the FBI is at Griffin's door. [through laughter] They've come to reclaim his computer.

Griffin: There was a product called Pure Ayr, with a Y. That was one season 2, episode 203. That was listed as, "It can make the car stink go away." But it was also the world's only safe and natural product on the market. And the gentleman who was pitching the product—

Justin: Wait, end of sentence? It's the world's only safe and natural product on the market?

Griffin: It's world's only safe air freshener on the market.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: Okay.

Griffin: And he demonstrated this by spraying it in his mouth. You have debased yourself. He left without an investment, unsurprisingly. No clown man can walk in front of those hungry beasts and be like, "This is my stink-go-away spray. I put it in my mouth before the hotdogs make a bad smell." Like, no one's gonna give you money for that, sir.

Travis: Maybe some baking soda? Put some baking soda?

Justin: Nah. No, no, no, no.

Travis: It works on the refrigerator?

Justin: You just get an air freshener.

Griffin: Okay?

Travis: Well, but they point out... Okay, in the email, in a P.S., they point out like even if we did a really good job cleaning it, what if like in the heat, you know, you turn on the heat in the winter...

Griffin: It evaporates.

Travis: Boom. There's like a lingering smell.

Griffin: And it just... it's been waiting. It's like a sarcophagus and it just like cracks. The seal cracks and all the mummy stink comes out of the...

Travis: Could you like sell it to her and say like, "Oh, fair warning. Someone left their lunchbox in there at some point and it went bad. I wouldn't do that. I'm a responsible adult, of course. But someone."

Justin: But somebody. I'd blame my kids. You could just blame my kids.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: "Justin's kids were in there and they left a bunch of fuckin' nuggets all over."

Travis: Justin's kids!

Griffin: [laughs] "Justin's kids were in your trunk. They were playing a hiding game."

Justin: [through laughter] Like on that one episode of Punky Brewster.

Griffin: [laughs] You could also just knock like \$100 off the price, you know?

Travis: "Hey, mom-in-law. I don't usually do this. You seem like a real nice lady, and this is a real stinky trunk. So, I'm gonna take—"

Griffin: "This trunk smells like absolute nuggets."

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: "You are going to need to deal with this. And let me facilitate that."

Travis: "Now, do you need the coating on the undercarriage? 'Cause that's gonna raise that price right back up."

Justin: Oh, oh! You put your key in your trunk. Snap it clean off. [laughs]

Travis: Ah, okay.

Griffin: Okay...

Justin: "One thing you gotta know about this car, this is a problem, you can't open the trunk."

Travis: "The trunk is for ballast only, purely decorative."

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Yeah... Fuck me, I'm watching a video of this man spraying it in his mouth and it's like...

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: It makes me bummed out.

Justin: We've lost Griffin.

Travis: You think that would be a selling point. But if someone did that in front of me with a cleaning product, I'd be like, "So, it doesn't work."

Griffin: "So, it's not real."

Travis: Just say like, "It doesn't work. This is water."

Griffin: Hey, to continue the as seen on TV trend, you could just get some Flex Seal spray and spray it all over the trunk.

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: And it will trap the stink particles.

Justin: I love that. Like lamination. You're just laminating it into the trunk.

Griffin: Laminate the inside of the car, yeah. Okay, so, I have a wizard for us.

Justin: Okay, great.

Griffin: His name is s—

Travis: Were you about to say Squidward? Or did I just... Okay.

Griffin: Malphobeansis...

Travis: Oh, I know him! I went to collage with him.

Griffin: The wizard of the cloud referred me to him and it is—

Travis: He ate pennies on dares. It was the weirdest thing.

Griffin: Yeah, that's where he got his powers.

Travis: Yeah. And then one day, he had a really bad bathroom and he had to make a change.

Griffin: Yeah. So, Deli sent this one in. And this one—

Travis: 'Cause he ate pennies. Change.

Griffin: Yeah. Yeah...

Justin: Yeah...

Griffin: This one really affected me on like a deep and nostalgic level. And

I'm really excited to take us back. This is how to relive the 2010s.

Travis: Oh, thank god.

Justin: Aagh!

Griffin: The 2010s were known for a lot of important events. The rise of social media, Brexit, heated politics, LGBTQ+ activism and unique fashion defined the years from 2010 to 2019. And those 10 years are where we contained and sort of like fulfilled all of those different topics.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: Right. 'Cause those all got started and wrapped up now.

Travis: And solved.

Griffin: All solved. Better, fixed 'em. So, this article will show you a couple ways to relive the 2010s.

Travis: You just described, besides the LGBTQ+ activism... which, nice... There wasn't a lot of great stuff in there. Why would I wanna relive the 2010s?

Justin: Yeah, it doesn't sound like a choice period.

Griffin: The early 2010s were kind of fun, right? Like, 2010, 2011? Like, we were having some fun with it?

Travis: Yeah. And you know what will be a good indicator to this? I'm gonna look up like the top grossing movie from `10, `11, and `12.

Griffin: Well, honey, we'll get to that in this article.

Travis: Oh! Okay.

Griffin: So, why don't you not do that. And ride with me. Why don't you just ride with me?

Justin: Ride with him.

Justin: "That's where we get the name." [laughs]

Griffin: "That's where we got it." Hey, how about, "Wear festival fashion. Festival fashion was revived in the 2010s when people like Vanessa Hudgens wore flower crowns and boho inspired clothing, were accessories the hippies wore in the 1960s."

Travis: Oh, lord... Oh lord...

Justin: Next together.

Griffin: Moosh it. Moosh it. I want my Balenciaga festival fashion, like Vanessa wears. "Wear skinny jeans!" Okay... Viewing media from the 2010s.

Travis: Okay, here we go.

Griffin: And this is what really fucking takes me back. "Listen to songs from the early 2010s. The early 2010s were the start of modern pop songs."

Travis: What?

Travis: I don't know. *Teenage Dream* creeps me out.

Griffin: 2011, we got *Born This Way*, we got, *Super Bass*.

Justin: Aah! Don't get me started.

Griffin: Super Bass, an 11-year-old song. Gangnam Style, we've been doing for, as of last month, one decade.

Travis: Yeah! That song rules.

Griffin: Yeah! *Roar*, by Katy Perry. *Wrecking Ball*, *Happy*, all dropped in 2013.

Travis: Hey, here's what's wild. Can I tell you something? Two of those, *Roar* and *Wrecking Ball*, constitute I would say two of Bebe's top five favorite songs on Earth.

Griffin: She is in an old soul.

Justin: Sydney was in Africa when *Gangnam Style* happened. And so, I got this great delight of like... She comes off the plane and she goes to hug me. And I'm like, "Wait! No!"

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: And I just hold up my phone in front of her like, "Watch this! This is everywhere. We're all obsessed."

Griffin: And then, next step, listen to songs from the late 2010s. And folks, these are gonna take you right back.

Travis: To three years ago.

Griffin: I'm talking about *Baby Shark* by Pinkfong.

Justin: Aah!

Griffin: Ever heard of a little golden oldie called *Despacito*?

Travis: Oh, okay.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Do you know that one? Do you know Bad Guy by Billie Eilish?

Travis: I'm gonna have to dust off these albums.

Justin: I actually don't know *Despacito*. And at this point, I'm too afraid to tell people.

Griffin: You don't know *Despacito*? [sings] *Despacito*.

Justin: No. I just heard Bad Guy for the first time in the Sam Rockwell animated picture, Bad Guys.

Griffin: Great flick, by the way. A lot of fun, that flick. I had a great time.

Justin: Yeah, that was the place I heard the song *Bad Guy* by Billie Eilish.

Griffin: That's pretty wild.

Justin: I searched it out before the end. And then I heard it and I was like, this is pretty good. I get it.

Griffin: Hey, let's talk about some nostalgic 2010s kids cartoons. If you're a member of Generation Z, which I-

Travis: Am I? I'm not, right?

Griffin: "People born from 1997 to 2012." So, I'm like a rising Gen Z.

Travis: Yeah, you're on that 10-year bubble.

Griffin: Like, I'm so close. I'm so close to '97. I'm on the bubble of it. "Specifically younger Gen Z members, 2006 to 2012." Okay, that is significantly younger that I am. "You can watch these childhood cartoons to experience your 2010s childhood again." Now, hold on a second. I have umbrage with the very first one on here. It's *Arthur*. What? I claim *Arthur*.

Travis: *Arthur's* been running for 73 years.

Justin: Yeah, Arthur's wild. It's so old. Yeah, it's extremely old.

Griffin: *Arthur*'s been running from 1996 until still, now. God, *Arthur*, they are squeezing so much... They have wrung that sweet ant eater family dry, huh?

Travis: That episode where they wrung them dry is one of my favorites actually. It really hits.

Griffin: It's a weird one. So, we got *Adventure Time, Jake and the Neverland Pirates, Amazing World of Gumball, Wild Kratts, Gravity Falls, Steven Universe*. A lot of really like retro shit is on here.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: We Bare Bears, The Loud House, The Magic School Bus Rides Again.

Travis: Really old school, man.

Griffin: And then like, we can go back with some 2010s kids' movies. Like you know, *Frozen* or *Moana*, or *Coco*. Or *Toy Story 4*, which is three years old. Hop in the time whip, and let's go watch *Toy Story 4*, and remember a simpler time.

Justin: Ah, the old days.

Travis: Once again, *Toy Story 4* was like the fourth movie I took Bebe to see in theatres. Not the best way to introduce a child to the *Toy Story* franchise.

Justin: Now it's kind of wrapping it up there at the end, hey?

Travis: Fuck, man. Squinkies?

Griffin: Yeah, Trav.

Travis: We just talked about it on Shmanners this week.

Griffin: Duh, everyone knows that.

Travis: Do they?

Griffin: There's so much of the internet. And I like that. There's so much of

it.

Travis: Oh yeah.

Griffin: Anything you could want, it's always there. And I'm grateful for this.

Justin: This is a question about the picture, "Where the fuck are his ears? Tiger ears are big. Those headphones would not cover them."

Travis: That's a good point.

Griffin: Thank you.

Justin: No. I'm gonna put it into this... into this... Into this.

Travis: Squad.

Griffin: Squad.

Justin: [continues riffing and sings] I want to munch.

Travis: Squad.

Griffin: Squad.

Justin: [concludes riffing] Welcome to Munch Squad. It's a podcast within a podcast, profiling the latest and greatest in brand eating. I know we've been doing it for a little, but I didn't do the intro—

Travis: This feels like munch fraud.

Justin: No, I didn't do the intro so it was irritating me.

Travis: Oh...

Justin: I wanna tell you guys, very quickly, very quickly about this. KFC Thailand is introducing a modernist Mother's Day gift idea. The KFC Chicken Pop Garland. Celebrating national Mother's Day with a twist.

Travis: No.

Griffin: Cool.

Justin: All right, y'all... Normally, I would build to the picture of it. But I'm just gonna show you the picture. Okay? Here we go. Okay, so this is the KFC Pop Garland.

Travis: Huh...

Griffin: I like this. Just for the record. I wanna go on the record and say before I know anything else about it, that I do like it.

Travis: What... Is it...

Travis: What...

Justin: "Everyone can create their own unique Heartmade Chicken Pop Garland for ma."

Travis: Well, that's nice. First of all, the customization is nice.

Griffin: I appreciate it.

Travis: I guess I don't know what a garland is.

Justin: Yeah, it's fascinating. I mean, I know what a garland is here and how we would use that. But I think we're up against... It's interesting to see the sort of like cultural... like... I wanna say ruining. Like ruining cultures that I don't even... I haven't even gotten a chance to understand what this actually is, before KFC has gotten to it. And kind of ruined it. Justin: "You'll get to reminisce about the school days when you get to craft your own gift for mom. Most importantly, do not drool over the garland. Just hash tag, save chicken pop for mom. And let her enjoy the moment with this scrumptious, Heartmade treat from the Colonel's Kitchen."

Travis: You know what I love about that? That's a hash tag that applies to so many different situations. So, it's gonna catch on outside of this. You know what I mean?

Griffin: In a big way.

Travis: Like, that's gonna be like the new #blessed.

Griffin: I'm looking at this and I do want a ring-shaped fried chicken experience.

Justin: I would like to have it.

Travis: It seems like it would be easy to take on the go.

Griffin: Yeah, you could have one in each hand like you're fuckin' in Tron or something. I like that.

Justin: Wear it like a bracelet.

Travis: Yeah, man.

Griffin: Yeah, wear several like a bracelet.

Justin: Their garland tutorial and giveaway activity are on Facebook and TikTok Live.

Travis: Wait.

Justin: By Up Poompat Iam-samang, a famous Thai young actor, is the one doing it. Now if you look, I wanna show you a picture of this cat. And tell me if you think that the crafts that this person is able to do, you would be able to replicate it in any way.

Travis: No.

Justin: Like, they look so much more capable than me.

Travis: No, absolutely not.

Griffin: That looks absolutely beautiful.

Justin: Look at how they dress themselves. Like, I would never be able to keep up with that person. They'd be like, "[imitates sounds of a hyper active person]" I'd be like, "Wait. Slow down. Please."

Travis: It also occurs to me, is this a full DIY? So, this isn't like...

Justin: Yes. I think you are getting the components for this. It's not clear in the thing. But I think you're getting the components for this—

Travis: Which is the popcorn chicken. I think all you're getting is the popcorn chicken?

Griffin: Right.

Justin: Okay. "I ride a very distinct E-bike for transportation and fun. I love my E-bike. However, there's a skate park on my usual route. There's often a group of teenagers that yell at me. Just full-on scream." [wheezes laughing] "One of these teenagers is my girlfriend's younger brother. He definitely knows me." [laughs] "I haven't told my girlfriend yet, but should I tattle—" [laughs] "Should I—" [laughs] "Should tattle on him? How can I get them to stop screaming at me?" [through laughter] That's from Bothered by Brotherin-law.

Travis: Mm-hmm.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: The image of somebody just riding past a park on a bike and then just like 6 to 10, like teenagers just like, "Aaagh!" Just shouting.

Travis: Turning in unison, like something from American Horror Story. Just all of them, "Aaaugh!"

Griffin: Like invasion of the body snatchers. Just like, "Aaaueegh!" I think her little brother got body-snatched, for sure. For sure, for sure. He's pod person now.

Travis: If the decision is, let them keep screaming at me, or go tattle on the brother... There's a third option. Which is get in that skate park and do some sick tricks on your E-bike.

Justin: Oh!

Griffin: Those dumb-dumbs are using probably skateboards and maybe bikes, that do not have that electric power coursing through them, allowing you to do stunts, the likes of which these children could not imagine.

Travis: Yes!

Griffin: You'll go down a half pipe and they'll be like, "He's going really slow." And then you kick on... the electricity, I guess.

Travis: Yeah, and you scream, "By the power of Zeus!" And you launch off the top.

Griffin: And you zip up there and do like a 900.

Travis: Yes!

Griffin: Just like Nikola Tesla did when he invented the E-bike. You'll shut those kids up. Maybe they're screaming because of how awesome your electricity powered bicycle is. Did you think about that?

Travis: This is what I'm saying. If they're doing this consistently, I don't think it's to fuck with you. Right? They'd vary that up. If they didn't get a

response the first couple of times, they'd vary it up. I think this is very much a like, "There he is! Our hero!" [laughs]

Griffin: "Our hero, the E-biker!"

Travis: Get in there, man. Show those kids what you can do. Now, don't fuck this up. I can't stress enough, if you do get in there and you eat it in front of 'em, that's gonna be the rest of your life.

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: Or maybe that's their game plan, is they shout at every non-skater who goes by, thinking that they will be threatened into coming in. And then they fall on their butt, and then the children get a good laugh.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: But then they're done with you.

Justin: We're agreed that if this person tattles to their girlfriend on the little brother, that will be the end of their relationship as they know it. Right?

Travis: With the little brother, or with the girlfriend, or both?

Justin: With the girlfriend. You can't, like... you're... think about the words.

Travis: Right.

Justin: Like, you gotta think about the words. Like, "Your brother has been bullying me while I try to ride past him on my fast bike. And I slowed down long enough for him to bully me, and then I leave."

Travis: "What do you mean?" "Well, they scream at me." "What do they scream?" "It's just noise."

"Okay?"

Justin: "Just like bike-guy, or like there's the bike, or Mr. Bike."

Travis: "So, what do you want me to do about this?" "Tell your little brother not to bully me."

Griffin: Please don't.

Travis: You do need to think about when you get in there and you land a sick trick, what is gonna be your like motivational statement when you land it. And you like come screeching up them in like an Acura slide or something. And then you pop up and you need to say like...

Don't say don't do drugs. 'Cause there are some drugs that are kinda cool. Like, you wanna pop up and be like, "Don't fall for ponzi schemes." Or whatever your thing is gonna be that these kids will like—

Griffin: Yeah, yeah, "Look out of MLM."

Travis: ... "Whoa, that was amazing!" And then you're like, you know, "Don't forget..."

Griffin: And you tear a phonebook in half.

Travis: Yeah! You pop up from and Acura slide, you tear the phonebook in half. And you say, "Make sure to invest wisely." And you have a Roth IRA. And then you peddle out of there.

Griffin: Yeah, "I can set that up for you kids right now. Right now. Who's got money? Which one of you kids have money?" I don't know when the last time you all screamed was, it sucks. It hurts.

Justin: What, screaming?

Griffin: Yeah. It sucks to scream.

Travis: Well, you have to find you natural pitch. And you have to do it with ease.

Griffin: Okay. But I'm talking about if they scream at you the whole time that you are biking by them. Next time, just stop and look at them. And then they will scream and scream and scream. Until, I guess, they stop because they get too tired. And then you just bike away.

Travis: Nah, dude.

Griffin: And they'll probably not wanna do it again 'cause they're like, "There's that guy. It's you loser brother-in-law who we all hate so much because of how electric his bike is."

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: "But I can't keep screaming at this dude 'cause I have choir practice at church tomorrow."

Travis: But okay, Griffin, counter point. I don't want escalation from screaming.

Justin: There's no counter point.

Travis: I don't want escalation from screaming. If screaming's the worst thing they're doing and it's just noise? And that's the worst thing they're doing?

Griffin: Oh, okay. They're gonna say, "I'm tired of screaming at this dude. He did stop. Let's go hurt him. Let's take his bike. Let's use his bike to charge our vapes."

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: "We'll rip the battery from his bike, charge our vapes with it, blow our vape in his face."

Travis: "Plug it into our iPad so we can play more Roblox, while we vape."

Griffin: Yeah, "Roblox to each other..." And can I tell you the saddest part? Then you're just gonna have a bike.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: And you may as well just push that down the nearest storm drain because it's not—

Travis: Give it right to Pennywise.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Give it right to Pennywise, he'll have fun with it.

Justin: [impersonates Pennywise] "You kids have a bike?"

Travis: [impersonates Pennywise] "I thought this was electric. This sucks ass."

Griffin: How fucking dope—

Justin: [impersonates Pennywise] "Georgie... Do you have a Razor scooter? [laughs] It takes so long for me to get around down here."

Griffin: How fucking sick would a remake of IT, set now, be? When like a kid is walking in the rain and Penny's like, "Hello, little child." And he's like, "What the fuck is your deal?"

 $\textbf{Travis}: [impersonates \ Pennywise] \ ``I've \ got \ Fortnite \ skin \ certificates. \ You \ can \ cash \ these \ in \ to \ get \ Boba \ Fett!''$

Griffin: No, he would not be that up to trends. He would be like, [impersonates Pennywise] "Do you want a little boat?" And they'd be like,

"I'm playing Subway Surfers... Ah, and you made me lose, Pennywise. I'm gonna come to—"

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: "Hey, friends!"

"What do you have in your hand?"

"It's a cellphone. Shut up, I'm not talking to you. Friends, come on and we beat this clown's ass."

Travis: [impersonates Pennywise] "I've got balloons down here." "Fuck, balloons? I'm 12, dude. What the fuck are you talking about?"

Justin: "I have my own balloons."

Griffin: It took four kids to beat that clown's ass. And they were like 1970s, '80s kids.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: And they had a slingshot. I'm saying that like all these kids could get pepper spray at a nearby gas station and fuck this dude. That movie would be four minutes long.

Justin: [laughs] They hire someone on TaskRabbit to come murder him.

Griffin: Come murder his ass and rip him apart. Anyway, that's um...

Justin: Anyway, that's the story with Pennywise. [laughs] That's how we're gonna get Pennywise, in case y'all are wondering. That's how we're gonna get him.

Griffin: A YouTube popped up on Henry's cursed feed. And Pennywise was in it, and he's like, "Ah, man. Shit. I'm afraid of this clown now." And I didn't know how to tell him like, "You and your preschool friends could massacre this clown." It would not even be close. He would open his mouth real wide

and do his like silly dance. [pretend dancing sounds]. And then you would just like throw a Tide pod in his mouth.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Then he would just fall over and die.

Travis: He'd be like, "I've seen some pretty cursed Roblox, obvies. This isn't doing shit to me, dude."

Griffin: "This is nothing."

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: "I saw a thing where I was in a butcher's mouth for a while. I don't care about any of this, man."

Griffin: "I don't get it."

Justin: [laughs] Thank you so much for joining us on our program. We hope you've enjoyed yourself, and hope you've had a good time.

Travis: Maybe you've learned a little something.

Justin: Maybe you learned a little something about that, you know? I don't know. Maybe.

Travis: Probably not.

Justin: Probably not. But maybe.

Travis: Who knows?

Justin: Who knows? Maybe. Thank you so much for being a part of our show. Trav, you got anything to tell the people?

Travis: Hell yeah, I do. We got new tickets for shows in San José, California and Denver. We're doing Adventure Zone, September 29th, in San José. And My Brother, My Brother and Me, September 30th, in San José. And then we're doing another My Brother, My Brother and Me, October 1st, in Denver. Bummer, sorry about that.

Justin: Sorry.

Travis: Sorry. Sorry...

Griffin: Sorry.

Griffin: We messed up.

Travis: ... In Washington D.C., Detroit and Cincinatti. You can grab those tickets at bit.ly/mcelroytours as well. Same with... Oh, I should say, mask and proof of full vaccination or negative COVID test within 72 hours of event start is required for those tours.
