Wonderful! Episode 7: Dog Beach

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[theme music plays]

Rachel:

Hi, this is Rachel McElroy.

Griffin:

Boo, this is Griffin McElroy.

Rachel:

And this is Wonderful!

Griffin:

Yeah, I did a, um... It's almost Halloween so I guess I did a boo there as a... maybe I'm being like a spooky sc... like a scary ghost this time around, about like a dead person who's still around but see through, you know.

Rachel:

Should we agree that next week will be our Halloween episode?

Griffin:

What day is it today? I think next week will probably be our Halloween episode, that'll be the 25th and we wanna get in there before, people don't like Halloween episodes when it comes in after Halloween.

Rachel:

Or maybe we should do Monday the 30th, [laughs] that might make more sense.

Griffin:

This podcast comes out on Wednesdays.

Rachel:

You're correct. [laughs]

Griffin:

[laughs] What happened there?

Rachel:

I don't know what I was thinking.

Griffin:

Were you thinking that this was My Brother, My Brother and Me?

Rachel:

Maybe.

Griffin:

Hop aboard, there's room on the broom, which's broom, another spooky Halloween thing. So, uh, this is *Wonderful!* it's a podcast where we talk about things that we are into and we talk about things that you're into, things that we're excited about and enthusiastic about, and I think it's my turn to start-

Rachel:

I believe it is.

Griffin:

... and I really am very excited to start with my first thing-

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

... 'cause I've never... we haven't done one like this before.

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

My first thing that I'm real into this week and every week of my life for the rest of my life is Rachel's chili.

Rachel:

Aw!

Griffin:

Oh yeah, no, it's... a lot of people I think maybe had that reaction of like, "Aw, how sweet, Griffin is gonna talk about-"

Rachel:

I thought we were gonna save this kind of stuff for our Valentine's Day episode.

Griffin:

No, I mean, I feel no greater love for you-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... than I do when I eat this good, good chili. A lot of people are gonna hear this and say, "Aw," but I wanna be entirely sort of academic about this.

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

I wanna be very, very scientific about this because it's the best fucking chili in the entire universe.

Rachel:

Aw, Griffin.

Griffin:

No, we can't do that every time-

Rachel:

I'm sorry. [laughs]

Griffin:

... scientific... I'm not saying all these things about your, your just rambunctious chili, it gets in my mouth and it just plays around in there. I'm not talking about this so you boost your spirits up, although if that happens, I'm psyched about it-

Okay. [laughs]

Griffin:

... 'cause I love making, I love making you feel, um, like, like you are treasured 'cause you are, 'cause you- you- you are a treasure. Your chili is so fucking good and I am saying this as somebody who's not always been a chili fan. One time when I was a little boy, small boy, I went to my Nonnee's house and she made me a plate of food and on that plate with some beans and I ate the beans I threw up-

Rachel:

Oh no.

Griffin:

... and from that point I told myself I was allergic to beans-

Rachel:

Oh my gosh, this explains so much.

Griffin:

... so I just would not eat beans forever, which did not afford me many chili-tunities-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

 \ldots and that was especially heartbreaking because Huntington, where I grew up had a number of food festival-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... one of which was Chilifest where I think it's in August sometime, they like shut down 4th Avenue and it's just like all these different places come and they have a chili competition-

Rachel:

Can I ask you how old you were when this-

Like eight, like seven or eight.

Rachel:

... chili thing happened? Oh my gosh.

Griffin:

Uh, my dad judges the chili competition, which is for me hysterical and also sort of, a sort of statement about the nature-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... man and the way that he inevitably harms himself, uh, because my daddy's tum-tum is quite bad, um, but I didn't participate in ChiliFest 'cause I didn't like beans, there was beans all over the damn place. There was a restaurant, there was a restaurant in Huntington called Chili Willi's and they had a cup of what they called Texas Red Chili, Bean Free, it had like venison in it, it was amazing, place shut down though, when I was in college.

Rachel:

That's a big thing with Texas chili, is that typically there aren't beans in it.

Griffin:

There are no beans in it. Um, my mom made chili growing up, but for me it was... it always turned into a sort of bean excavation, just a sort of-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

 \ldots bean collection, I would lay them out in even rows as I would dig them out-

Rachel:

Oh my gosh.

Griffin:

... and leaving myself with sort of a t... a tomato meat soup. Um, and then what else? I guess I lived in Cincinnati for a while and Cincinnati, you got a

lot going on, loved living in you, go Reds, your chili is basically sort of cinnamon, sweet spaghetti sauce, but keep, keep at it, keep-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

Um, Rachel's chili is like a sweater that you can eat-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... and that you should absolutely eat. It's a sweater you can and should eat. You eat it and it f... there is nothing better on like a slightly cold day. Do they call it chili 'cause if you eat it when it's chilly, it feels like you're eating a big sweater that you should be wearing?

Rachel:

You know, that would be adorable if that were the reason. Um, I imagine a lot of it has to do with the ingredients-

Griffin:

Probably

Rachel:

... which include chili powder.

Griffin:

Ah, that's probably more what it is.

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

Eating Rachel's hearty ass chili on a cold day is about the best thing that you can do with your body. And I know you're asking me, "Griffin, how's the spice?" Terrible, just kidding-

Rachel:

[laughs]

... Perfect. It's extremely good. You don't wanna eat... You don't wanna tuck into a big bowl of this hardy, hardy soup mess and then your mouth is burning the whole time, no, 'cause it's work eating a bunch of chili 'cause it's a hardy, hardy food, you have to attack that mother fucker, but you can't it do it if you're getting your mouth burned the whole time. So Rachel's chili doesn't come at you like that, it comes at you with a good savory flavor with a little bit of spice on the back end that just keeps you coming back for more. It's not soup 'cause chili should not be soup. I've had a lot of chili... or if my friend's like, "I made you chili," and I'm like, "Oh, I didn't know that I... we were-"

Rachel:

Yeah, it real soupy.

Griffin:

"... this close's." And it's soup with be-

Rachel:

I know what you mean.

Griffin:

... it's a meat, bean soup, get this the fuck outta here. I've also had shit that's just a big pile of beans and meat that's kind of wet and it's like, "You've done it wrong also."

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

Rachel's chili is hardy and savory, but it's also like creamy without cream in it, you know what I mean?

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

Like it's luscious, do you know what I mean?

Rachel:

[laughs]

It all melds together into like... it's, it's that perfect... It's a... A good chili is like a plasma almost, it oscillates between the solid and liquid states.

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative]. Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... and that's what you bring to the table. Um-

Rachel:

Can I talk a little bit about what's in it?

Griffin:

I wanna know what your secret is to your-

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

... to your chili 'cause every time you make it, it feels very experimental.

Rachel:

Yeah, it's a little different every time.

Griffin:

And I love that 'cause I never, [laughs] I never know what to expect.

Rachel:

So the recipe is actually based on one that I got off of allrecipes.com, if you Google it, I believe it's called Laura's Slow Cooker Chili.

Griffin:

Rachel's Original Chili.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

I just... I'm not gonna pay attention to anything you say about-

[laughs]

Griffin:

... uh, sourcing, this recipe for me, it came from your heart and your brain, they got together for this hot collaboration.

Rachel:

So thank you Laura, uh, wherever you may be for inspiring this dish. Um, so gosh, I don't... I mean, so you, you sauté the meat-

Griffin:

Fuck yeah. What-

Rachel:

... with some onions.

Griffin:

We had special meat this time that we got from a farmers' market.

Rachel:

We did, we went to a farmer's market.

Griffin:

They were, they were very intense, "Don't cook this above 90 degrees Fahrenheit 'cause it's the-"

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

"... has a low, fat melting point-"

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... we're like, "Whoa, shit, calm down, it's ground beef-"

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

... but they were right.

Rachel:

Uh there's some kidney beans-

Griffin:

Hmm.

Rachel:

... some black beans.

Griffin:

What's up, has it got sauce, the toma... like could you put a tomato sauce starter in there?

Rachel:

Yeah, so then, um, Laura's Slow Cooker recipe recommends um, two cans of tomato soup-

Griffin:

Laura!

Rachel:

... yeah, so I use a small can of sauce.

Griffin:

See that's how you make it your own.

Rachel:

And then here's the other interesting thing, and this is actually a recommendation on the website so I can't even take credit for this either.

Griffin:

Take credit for it, please

Rachel:

... you use a, uh, a can of diced tomatoes, uh, with some, some like jalapeno peppers in there-

Griffin:

Oh.

Rachel:

... so it's kinda like a can of Rotel basically.

Griffin:

Yeah. Sure.

Rachel:

Um-

Griffin:

Can't believe you came up with that on your own baby, the-

Rachel:

No, that was, that was-

Griffin:

I can't believe you came up with that on your own baby-

Rachel:

Okay. [laughs]

Griffin:

Listen, I'm talking about this on the podcast as advertising 'cause I wanna-

Rachel:

I know.

Griffin:

I'm gonna, I'm gonna move away from the mic so they can't hear me. I wanna start selling your chili-

Rachel:

Oh, okay.

Griffin:

... but if you keep say... don't... We're away from the mic so they can't hear us.

Rachel:

Oh, mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

I wanna sell your chili.

Rachel:

Hmm.

Griffin:

I wanna put you on every jug and vase of this chili. We're gonna sell it in vases, and if you say that you got all the recipes and you stole them from a w... an old woman named Laura you knocked over at a Walmart-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... and stole her recipe book out of her purse, they're not gonna let us trademark it, so just be care... just be careful from now on.

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

Okay, let's get back it to it.

Rachel:

Okay. Um, gosh, yeah, and that's... I mean, that's honestly about it, put it in the slow cooker for-

Griffin:

All day

Rachel:

... four to six hours, um-

Griffin:

I think there's just... I, I, I, I love your chili.

Rachel:

I like to add... sometimes I'll add some red pepper flakes-

Mmm.

Rachel:

... if I'm looking for some spice, didn't, didn't this time.

Griffin:

You didn't do it this time.

Rachel:

Um, salt, pepper, you know-

Griffin:

Loving it.

Rachel:

... garlic.

Griffin:

I love your chili because... and because it feels good to eat it with my mouth, um, but really like the excite-

Rachel:

Oh, and love.

Griffin:

And the love.

Rachel:

And the secret ingredient is love.

Griffin:

Um, when you tell me at like 10:00 AM, "I'm gonna make chili for dinner tonight," I like, get excited about the entire day-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... that we're about to have, and that's not a joke, I'm not being, I'm not being like cutesy here, like when you say at 10:00 AM like, "Hey, I think...

we got that ground beef from the farmer's market, I think I'm gonna make chili tonight," I just think like, one, that's gonna be a good dinner and probably a good lunch the following day, definitely a good lunch the following day, if the... if it survives the dinner, but also the house is gonna be filled with the most wonderful, pungent meat stink-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... that is just gonna be like so good, and I don't know, it makes it... um, I... we're deep in that season game now and it just feels so, it feels... I don't know, it smells so good and it taste-

Rachel:

Yeah, I, I don't know-

Griffin:

... and I just look forward to it so much.

Rachel:

... I don't know that I've ever made chili in the summertime, for me, it is an-

Griffin:

God, no.

Rachel:

... exclusively fall, winter food.

Griffin:

Only drawback. Perfect chili, very profitable, look for it in your Sam's Clubs, look for the jug and vase with Rachel's face on it.

Rachel:

Ma- Mama Rachel's, um-

Griffin:

Good Chili.

Rachel:

... Ch- I want some alliteration though real bad, but like a ch sound, like a-

Chunky, chunky chi-

Rachel:

Cheerful, cheerful chili.

Griffin:

Cheerful chunks of chili.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

I will sell 'em in little, I'll sell 'em in little, um, like bags like they used to sell like school milk in.

Rachel:

Oh, I thought you gonna say like squeeze pouches like they make for babies. [laughs]

Griffin:

Oh, squeeze pouch of chili, I would fucking destroy those.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

Only drawback-

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

... I love this chili, very profitable-

Rachel:

Okay.

Griffin:

... is that it does give me toots that could shatter a car windshield-

[laughs]

Griffin:

... is the only problem. If I'm in the car with all the windows rolled up and then I could do a toot, and then just the sort of the pressure displacement, all the wind glass in my car explodes, which is problematic when I'm driving to daycare 'cause then the, you know, the baby seat mirror explodes-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... and then I can't see our baby while I'm driving anymore, um, so that's, uh, that's obviously not ideal.

Rachel:

I have heard, and I don't know if it's true, I try to do it, but I have heard that if you rinse off the beans really well, you have less of an issue in that area.

Griffin:

They got fart particles on... You're suggesting that when the beans grow up outta the ground from the good earth, that they have... they're coated in some sort of fart particle that they picked up, um...

Rachel:

[laughs] Well, and I've noticed this too, if you rinse a can of beans, like a lot of like bubbles will come up-

Griffin:

That's... and you're suggesting that's a fart particles that-

Rachel:

I-

Griffin:

... are just coming up off the beans.

Rachel:

[laughs] I-

I gotta be careful here because I gave you guff-

Rachel:

I'm no scientist.

Griffin:

... I gave you guff on the last episode 'cause I thought you were gonna say the names of the different chemicals wrong or something-

Rachel:

Oh yeah, people loved those. Uh-huh [affirmative].

Griffin:

... and people were like, "Wow, Rachel actually crushed it," so like I'm looking forward to getting mail into our PO Box, PO Box 66639 Austin, Texas-

Rachel:

About the fart particle? [laughs]

Griffin:

... 78766, just like, "Yeah, dude, fart particles, they're real. The m... the main matter states are neutron, positron and fart particles."

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

What was the wrongest thing I just said.

Rachel:

[laughs] I'm sure we'll hear about it.

Griffin:

Um, do you wanna tell me about your first great thing?

Rachel:

Yeah. And hey, thank you, I didn't, I didn't write down like anything about Griffin's great sauce in mind so I'm sorry about that.

It's fine, I just... I ate your chili for dinner last night and lunch today and I just like... I love eating it, but I also love that like when it... when I know that you're making it, like my whole day is like-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... chili day, it's like a little miniature holiday.

Rachel:

Um, okay, so I am going to talk about first, uh-

Griffin:

[laughs] I thought you gonna say furs, and I was like-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

"... Whoa, really?" "Yeah, I've got some nice fox and mink."

Rachel:

Um, so this topic came to me. This is something I realized, sometimes I'll think of a particular thing I like and then I'll try and figure out why I like that thing, go a little deeper, and so I was thinking about the show *My So-Called Life-*

Griffin:

All right.

Rachel:

... and I was thinking about how I like it so much-

Griffin:

Okay.

Rachel:

... and then I started thinking about what are the things I like about it, and then I realized in general, I think just like TV shows with narrators-

[laughs] Okay. S- s-

Rachel:

... because I started looking into My So-Called Life-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... which, um, Claire Danes plays Angela Chase, Angela Chase does a lot of narration, very similar to *The Wonder Years*.

Griffin:

Yeah, Wonder Years is I think-

Rachel:

... which I also love.

Griffin:

... the, the GOAT. Is there a more, is there a more famous show with narration than the... like a more iconic narration show than *The Wonder Years*?

Rachel:

No, but listen, listen to the other shows on this list.

Griffin:

I can think of a few off the top of my head.

Rachel:

Veronica Mars.

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... Scrubs.

Griffin:

For sure, that was one I was thinking of.

... Arrested Development.

Griffin:

Arrested Development's a good one.

Rachel:

... um, and then some of the other shows probably less exciting to you, but I realized also, um, *Sex and the City*.

Griffin:

Grey's Anatomy is like all over that shit.

Rachel:

... Jane The Virgin, yeah, and Grey's Anatomy, and I realize I like all those shows.

Griffin:

I really like the episodes of *Scrubs* where the point of view would change, when characters would touch each other...

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... and then they would be the narrator,

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... for a little bit.

Rachel:

See, I don't ... I, I honestly have not seen all of-

Griffin:

Oh, I've seen all of, I've seen-

Rachel:

Yeah.

... all of it. Um-

Rachel:

But it, it led me... and, uh, maybe we can explore this together, why do I like that so much?

Griffin:

Well, it's very literary, right, like if a book is written in first person, then you are essentially getting-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... uh, action and dialogue, but also the, the narrator's thoughts in, in... from a first-person perspective, right, which is not something that you get usually from television without a narrator and so it's like... I think it makes you feel a little bit more intimately connected-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

 \ldots with the character speaking, but also like the world that they're plugged into.

Rachel:

Like in some ways, it's kind of a controlling element, it's kind of like the show... the show's directors or writers saying, like, "We are gonna tell you what's really happening here." Um...

Griffin:

Well, that's the inverse, is like sometimes it is also so like, we can't... it's not enough for us to deliver sort of the, the moral message of what this episode's trying to get across in just like the action and the dialogue that is happening, so we're literally gonna have the main character of the show tell you, "You know, sometimes I think it's more important to, to lie if it means protecting your friend's feelings" like yeah, I know-

Rachel:

[laughs]

... I just watched you fucking lie to, to them-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... like I get it, you didn't have to come in and then, "I'm no Superman," like-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... thanks Zach, but I g... I got the message.

Rachel:

Yeah, it adds, it adds kind of a comedic element a lot to the show, uh, like, especially in the case of shows like *Arrested Development* and *Scrubs*, like you mentioned, um, and it also kind of adds this poignancy a lot, like... especially in *The Wonder Years* because that's told from, uh, Kevin Arnold as an adult, so you get a sense of kind of the significance of what's happening. And, and yeah, it is... it's very literary too, you know, it's, it's very much like you're being told a story that's being acted out in front of you.

Griffin:

I, I honestly think the... my favorite example of this, because it... uh, I don't know, I really liked, uh, *How I Met Your Mother*, even though it did have, uh, an element of like it was Bob Saget who was doing the narration and Bob Saget did not play the younger version of the character he was doing the voice of, nor would it be like-

Rachel:

Well, it's like Daniel Stern in The Wonder Years.

Griffin:

It, it, it is, I guess, but it is also like Josh, Josh Radnor, I think is the character's name who plays Ted on-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

... *How I Met Your Mother* and old, old Ted has played by Bob Saget, but Josh Radnor is already sort of an older j... [laughs] like, he's a j... dude-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... in like his 20s, 30s, and then Bob Saget-

Rachel:

[crosstalk 00:16:55] have been just as easy.

Griffin:

... is probably in his 50s, he probably just-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... would've been him-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... I don't know why... I don't know why Bob Saget did the voice of old him 'cause Bob Saget when he was younger, I already know what he sounded like, Bob Saget from *Full House*.

Rachel:

[laughs] Yeah, [crosstalk 00:17:10].

Griffin:

 \ldots just saying, I guess I need to circle back with Josh in like 15 years and be like, "Talk for me dude, you don't sound like Bob Saget at all-"

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

"... got you!"

Rachel:

Um, yeah, so I, I, you know, I thought about talking about all of these shows individually and maybe not-

Griffin:

What's your favorite of all of them?

Rachel:

Oh man, probably My So-Called Life.

Griffin:

Really, more than Wonder Years?

Rachel:

Yeah, I almost, I almost talked about that because the show so uniquely captures kind of the teenage experience, you know, it's like... I don't know if you had a show like that when you were growing up, but for me, the, the voice for Angela Chase and the words they chose just felt like resonated so strongly with me and I was just like,... it was like finally a show about the teen experience-

Griffin:

Sure, I mean-

Rachel:

... where they're like speaking to-

Griffin:

... that is-

Rachel:

... me.

Griffin:

... there isn't one of these that lasts longer than five years, like that it's... it doesn't cover... The- there is a, there is a, a... The reason that like the teen show market is so like saturated is just because like once a show's a few years old, it doesn't work for, for me anymore-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... me like an actual teen, like in that shit, these things have a shelf life of no years and so it's like... and that's why a lot of the greats get in, do their thing, get out-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... and if they stay a little bit too long, Dawson's Creek-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... then they start to lose the plot maybe a little bit maybe-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... maybe there... maybe there's an episode where a character leans over to pick up an ice cream cone they dropped in the car-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... and die in an accident. Maybe there's a little bit of that that happens, *Dawson's Creek*, not to name names, Dawson-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... um, but for me, I mean, like as corny as it sounds, I, I probably like... the only one I really watched much of was *The O.C.*, which while not a representation of the glamorous lifestyle that I lived-

Yeah.

Griffin:

... uh, like they talked kind of like how people I knew talked, and that was like my first like sort of experience-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... I guess it would've been... what else for me? *Like Party of Five* was on or Daw... probably *Dawson's Creek* was on while I was that age.

Rachel:

Well, I was gonna ask you if you felt that way about *Boy Meets World* 'cause I know you're a big fan.

Griffin:

Oh, shit. Well, yeah, but that was more sort of family-friendly-

Rachel:

Sitcomy.

Griffin:

... sitcomy-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

 \ldots I guess the later episodes did... the later seasons got a little bit more hard-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... but I mean, fuck, yeah, probably... I mean, I watched every episode of that a few times 'cause we had the Disney Channel, don't wanna brag, but maybe I... it is like *The O.C.*, you know-

[laughs]

Griffin:

... we had the Disney Channel.

Rachel:

We did not have the Disney Channel.

Griffin:

[laughs] Oh, I'm so sorry to hear that.

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

"Welcome to the Orange County, cuss word-"

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... character said. Um, do you want to steal me away now? [Griffin making weird mouth noises] Now what's great is I can reverse that, right, and it'll sound like-

Rachel:

And it says, uh, "Paul is dead, Griffin-"

Griffin:

Yeah.

[ad break]

Griffin:

Do you wanna read the first Jumbotron message? Well, actually before that, we should mention that Jumbotrons are about to go back on sale, uh, I believe-

Rachel:

November 1st-

Griffin:

... November 1st-

Rachel:

... at 11:00 AM Pacific.

Griffin:

... 11:00 AM Pacific, uh, so if you wanna get a show... a, a, a, a Jumbotron spot on the show, I think they're selling through the first six months of 2018 and-

Rachel:

I think we're sold out for 2017 at this point.

Griffin:

Yeah, they do sell kind of fast so if you do wanna get a message on the show, make sure that you, you show up and you can go to maximumfun.org/jumbotron for, for more details and, um, yeah.

Rachel:

Okay, this message is for Becky, it is from Cassie and Lori. "To our favorite female parent, although it's surprising to all of us, *The Bachelor* has become a delightful part of our lives so we decided to celebrate you with a shout out from your favorite podcast, from your best daughter's, happy, probably late, Mother's Day, enjoy your last one before becoming a grandma-"

Griffin:

Whew, that's a late one.

Rachel:

"... you're going to be the greatest."

Griffin:

That's a late one. That one outlived the original podcast-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... [laughs] but that's okay-

Rachel:

Hopefully-

Griffin:

... we knew this would happen.

Rachel:

... this is still your favorite podcast.

Griffin:

Yeah, I hope so.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

I think it's o... I think it's really only gotten better, despite what those three negative iTunes reviews we've gotten, that we, just for some reason, just can't stop focusing on-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... have said [laughs] about the podcast.

Rachel:

Um-

Griffin:

Uh, thank you-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

 \ldots thank you for listening at any point in history, and if you have stopped, cest la vie.

Congratulations Becky, you get to be a mother year round so it is always a happy day for you.

Griffin:

Yeah, every day it should be Mother's Day is what I'm always saying.

Rachel:

A lot of hot takes.

Griffin:

Everyone I meet, I just say that to them. I got a message for Chris and it's from Robin who says, "Uh, the last year being married to you has been amazing, from having the best wedding ever to spending our honeymoon and now our first anniversary at the happiest places on earth. I'm glad you're my fam, my boo and my bubs, I am in love with you and I'm glad we're on this journey together." That was a... I, I... first, I like couldn't not read that like Chris Harrison-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... which was challenging. "Uh, thank you for being the world's most wonderful husband." That's a sweet, sweet message from Robin, for Chris, putting down a lot of stuff there about best wedding, best husband and it's like-

Rachel:

I like bubs, I like bubs as a nickname.

Griffin:

You... Can we talk about... Do I get a say ... ?

Rachel:

Oh no, I don't have to call you that, I'm just saying-

Griffin:

Okay.

Rachel:

... from afar, I enjoy that.

Griffin:

Can I call other people bubs like I'm Wolverine?

Rachel:

Like you're Wolverine?

Griffin:

"Hey, bu... Hey, bubs..." He calls people bub or bubs or bubby. I think he says bubby, "Hey, bubby", snikt, and it's the claws sound, they say snikt every time.

Rachel:

You know, when I was a kid-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... um, and I was learning about the Jewish faith because of my heritage-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... uh, grandma and grandpa are, uh, Bubbie and Zadie in Yiddish.

Griffin:

I like very, very much.

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

I think I learned that from Rugrats-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... as I learned so many [laughs] Yiddish-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... uh, turns of phrase. Thank you Rugrats.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Speaker 3:

Hey you, with the headphones, just between you and me, the MaxFun store just got some of that sweet, sweet new merch in stock, you know, that merch from your favorite MaxFun shows, could be posters, tote bag, shirts, stickers, patches, aprons, we got it all, well, we got a lot, point is, there's some new stuff. Go to maxfunstore.com.

Griffin:

Do you want my second thing?

Rachel:

Yes, please.

Griffin:

My second thing is a board game and you've-

Rachel:

Oh.

Griffin:

... played it with me before.

Rachel:

It's not one I made though so I guess-

Griffin:

It's a board game Rachel made-

Rachel:

You really spoiled me with that first one. [laughs]

It's a board game Rachel made-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... called Dog Beach, and the point of it is you have to get all the dogs on your beach and you do this by drawing development cards, and it's a very complicated game.

Rachel:

I'm very confused.

Griffin:

You look at the bo... you look at the box and it's got dogs playing on a beach and it says, "By Rachel McElroy."

Rachel:

I don't remember making this game.

Griffin:

But then you open it up and the instruction book, there's like 500 pages and there's like warlocks with subclass and it's like, "I just wanted to play Dog Beach," but then all of a sudden you're rolling 15-sided die, which I didn't even know was a shape that was possible and there's a whole faction system that's incredibly complicated, I don't understand it.

Rachel:

"I'm making a very elaborate joke right now and Rachel doesn't seem to be getting it at all."

Griffin:

[laughs] "I hate playing in Griffin's space-"

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

"... I'm Rachel's brain. Nothing makes me happier than watching him squirm in his space alone and I won't play with him."

Why did you call it Dog Beach? I was so-

Griffin:

'Cause... Why did you call it Dog Beach-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... the board game you made about dogs playing on a beach Rachel?

Rachel:

I was so fixated on that, I couldn't even pay attention to all the other good goof work you were doing.

Griffin:

I didn't name it Dog Beach, you called it Dog Beach-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... so let's move on together and talk about Splendor.

Rachel:

Okay. [laughs]

Griffin:

Splendor is a very good board game. It is, uh, by a company called Space Cowboys, game came out in 2014 and it's kinda like my favorite type of board game, which is like the kind that is really quick to learn and pick up, but then every time you play it, there's like different... uh, there- there's variety from session to session and you can... you kind of have to use different strategies and react to sort of the, the hand that, that fate dealt you and sort of to counter these strategies that your, your opponents are using.

Rachel:

Well, it's the kind of game too that the very first time you play, like recently we played it with a group of friends and, um, our friend who was completely new to the game ended up winning her very first time.

Griffin:

Right, um, so like this idea of like a game that's easy to... What was it? There's that video... the, the, the board game Mastermind, where you had to put the pegs in and then the other player would tell you like how many colors you got right, and if they're in the right position. I think the tagline for that was, "Easy to learn, difficult to master," or something like that. I'm sure every board game at some point has used that as their tagline, but I really like that. Like Catan is like that, like Catan is not too hard to learn how to play and then every time you play it, there are certain random elements where it's like, "Oh, it's different this time." Uh, we like this game Machi Koro that is kind of also a resource-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... uh, gathering game, um, but Splendor is like my favorite version of that. It falls into a genre called engine building, which is basically this idea of you creating strategies early on in the game to support big, big moves later on, and building like a ladder to help you support those, those moves. Um, so really quick, basically, the, the basic breakdown is, um, every player on their turn can either sort of collect some gems from a pool, I think you're allowed to take like three gems, um, or you can purchase a card which will count as like a permanent gem in your collection so that whenever you buy something in the future, if it costs like one Ruby and you have one Ruby card, then you don't have to spend anything, you just have this permanent thing, the idea is that you try to build a, basically, a bank for yourself where you don't have to spend any money on cards, you can just pick 'em up for free because you have the, the cost covered by these permanent, uh, gems in your, in your collection.

I hope that wasn't too complicated. Um, and then the, the, the cards come in different tiers and the higher ones have victory points on them and once you collect a certain number, then, then you win. Um, and so the, the whole time you are building, you're like racing against your opponents to build these ladders to help you build these big cards by investing in cheap stuff that's gonna help you buy more expensive stuff, which is gonna help you buy more expensive stuff and so on and so on, um, while also everybody else is competing and maybe somebody else is doing sort of the same ladder that you're doing, and so you are-

Yeah.

Griffin:

... kind of racing to get the, the card before your opponent gets it.

Rachel:

So this is... there's several levels to this game and I tend to play at a very base level where I play my own game, where I'm just thinking about what I wanna do and the points I wanna get and how I wanna get those points, and then there's kind of the next tier up, which is, I believe the way Griffin plays most games, where he is trying to figure out what everybody else is doing and play a little defense and try and kind of-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... uh, figure out, "Okay, if they're going for those cards, then that's how I'm gonna play my game so that it prevents them or gets ahead of them."

Griffin:

Four-dimensional chess is what... What- what's great about Splendor is in addition to these sort of two basic moves of either collecting gems to buy stuff or buying stuff, um, there is a third thing you can do, which is reserving a card, which is like you take it-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... off the table, um, and it doesn't count as a gem in your collection, um, but you keep somebody else from buying it until you and you alone can buy it later on, so it kind of takes two turns to do like something that normally takes one but if you can't afford it right now, but you wanna make sure nobody else gets it, or you see somebody's like about to win on this turn if they buy this card, you snatch it up and you keep 'em from doing it and, uh, you're kind of constantly choosing... you're constantly like prioritizing different things like...

I love games like this where you have a starting point and you see what the, the lay of the land is and then you try to figure out what your end point is. And so you have your start point and your end point and the whole game,
you are just trying to walk this tight rope between those two points and make it work and I think Splendor is like a really, really brilliant, like infinitely playable version of that. Game takes like 30 minutes to play also, which, hey, board game developers-

Rachel:

Oh.

Griffin:

... is the right amount of time that people-

Rachel:

And can we talk about the packaging?

Griffin:

It's so good, it's so like...

Rachel:

All the little compartments for the cards and the gems-

Griffin:

Fit just so-

Rachel:

... they're perfectly sized.

Griffin:

The little gem tokens have some weight behind them-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... which like when you reach over to pick up some gemstones, it's like, "Mmm, that feels good." There's-

Rachel:

When you put away this game, it is just always very satisfying because everything has a place and it looks like it did when you first bought it.

Griffin:

Yeah-

Rachel:

... wonderful.

Griffin:

... just super good. I think they, they just sent out an expansion to it in June. I don't know if it's out yet or not-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... but I... we've played a lot of Splendor this year-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... I think it is a, a brilliant board game and it's, uh, more often than not like... if I know my friends are into it and they are over and wanna play a board game, it's the one we reach for because it's... we can play it a couple times.

Rachel:

Yeah, there's no actual board, it's just cards and gems, so you can spread it out anywhere.

Griffin:

And I love board games, I love super complicated board games and stuff, but we don't play those. We have an... uh, a [laughs] wrapped copy of Betrayal at House on the Hill just 'cause it's like, "Oh, it's gonna be hard to onboard somebody onto that one," Splendor it takes like a minute to teach somebody-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... the rules and then you can just keep playing. Good job Space Cowboys, this is a very good game, go, go-

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... play it if you, uh... It's won like all kinds of awards-

Rachel:

Not-

Griffin:

... if you have not played it, I think it's great.

Rachel:

... quite as good as Dog Beach, but-

Griffin:

Dog, Dog Beach is-

Rachel:

Close second. Dog beach is a game that I made and forgot about, and then couldn't remember anything about it-

Griffin:

Right.

Rachel:

... until Griffin reminded me, and let me just tell you those dogs, you wanna get all of 'em on that beach.

Griffin:

Yeah, one time I got close, I was short one terrier-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... and then... but then they countered me on the next turn with a ultra cancel.

Rachel:

Well, and terriers are worth a lot of points.

Terriers are worth 100,000 points, and I don't know why the game works that way, it's sort of a Golden Snitch situation.

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

And you just announced there's an expansion pack for Dog Beach coming out and I was wondering if you could tell us the name of that.

Rachel:

[laughs] Uh, it's called Dog Palapa-

Griffin:

Okay.

Rachel:

... uh, it focuses more on the city building aspect of-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... Dog Beach, uh, and so you start out with palapas, which as we know, um, from our previous television watching, are, are very small enclosures on a beach setting-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... uh, but you build up from the palapa.

Griffin:

Okay, to like an empire, like a dog empire.

Rachel:

Yeah, to, to a dog, a dog empire.

Griffin:

No bones about it, this is a great game-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

 \ldots and so that's the review quote that you can use on the box. I just said it, you can attribute it to me.

Rachel:

Not to be confused with the television show *Empire*. [laughs]

Griffin:

Not to be conf... which Rachel did make a board game adaptation of that was critically acc- acclaimed, that won the Boardies.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

Do you wanna tell me about your second thing?

Rachel:

Yes.

Griffin:

This is gonna be such a long episode-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... 'cause we spent so much time on talking about Dog Beach, which is... there's a lot to talk about, it's a complicated game.

Rachel:

Uh, my second thing is the Lazy Susan-

Griffin:

[laughs]

... get ready.

Griffin:

Where did that name... I hope you... part of this is the etymology of the name Lazy Susan.

Rachel:

I was hoping for that too. [laughs]

Griffin:

[laughs]

Rachel:

Uh, so the reason I came up with this topic, um-

Griffin:

You reached for a apple the other day, couldn't quite reach it, but then you spun that-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... helpful friend. [laughs]

Rachel:

We, we had a Lazy Susan at my house growing up, which is kind of ridiculous-

Griffin:

Same.

Rachel:

... because I'm an only child, so it was just me and my parents, there wasn't a lot of passing that needed to be done.

Griffin:

Built-in cabinet Lazy Susan-

Yeah.

Griffin:

... or like she... like top of the... because we had a built-in cabinet Lazy Susan and that shit was dope.

Rachel:

No, that's incredible.

Griffin:

Yeah, it was so good.

Rachel:

Um, so the Lazy Susan, uh, goes all the way back to the 18th century, um, but from what we can tell, it was not actually called the Lazy Susan back then, and when I say we, I mean other internet experts. [laughs] Uh, it was called a dumbwaiter, which-

Griffin:

Dumbwaiter is a different thing.

Rachel:

I know, I know, here's the thing though, dumbwaiters used to describe anything that removed the need for wait staff.

Griffin:

[laughs] This sucks-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... this is a bad naming convention, "You, you fucking dumb waiter, you can't lift something up a tiny, tiny shaft-"

Rachel:

So it was not-

Griffin:

"... up to my attic, what's wrong with you?

... it was not, not only revolving tabletops like the Lazy Susan, but also, uh, the elevators that carry plates of food. Uh-

Griffin:

Why can't it just be like Efficient Jeremy? Like, "Oh yeah, it, it would take a lot of energy for you to stand up and hand me the salt shaker," and so you just spun this little turn table, "that's very efficient, Jeremy," and not, "that's lazy, Susan-"

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... or, "that's... you're being dumb, waiter."

Rachel:

Uh, so what we think of as a Lazy Susan didn't come around 'till the, uh, '50s and '60s, and, um, before that, the earliest print reference to a Lazy Susan was an ad in a Vanity Fair magazine from 1917, uh, which-

Griffin:

It almost certainly has to be somewhat hateful in the origins of the name, right, like-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

"... Is your-"

Rachel:

Get ready, I've got text here.

Griffin:

Oh no, shoot.

Rachel:

So it was \$8.50 and the copy was, "An impossibly low wage for a good servant," and it refers to the Lazy Susan as, "the cleverest waitress in the world."

Holy shit guys.

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

It's a little disk that you spin around on ball bearings or what have you or some sort of spindle, it's not a person, but even if it was, that's a horrible to talk about them. Now I feel bad for this turntable-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... I feel like the turntable's being taken advantage-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... of in some way.

Rachel:

Uh, so another, another popularization occurred, uh, as I mentioned in the '50s, uh, at Chinese food restaurants-

Griffin:

Oh, okay.

Rachel:

... so, um, with the popularization of Chinese food, which happened in San Francisco's Chinatown, uh, there were a new, uh, group of entrepreneurial restaurant owners who took the small amount of space they had been given for these restaurants-

Griffin:

Hmm.

... and used the Lazy Susan as kind of an innovation to get various dishes and sauces to a... uh, around the table so yeah.

Griffin:

I'm into that, good thinking, clever stuff.

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

I just wanna take... I love a Lazy Susan, I'm right there with you, whenever I see one, unless, unless-

Rachel:

Unless.

Griffin:

 \ldots if it's one of those deals where it is like fucking... a fucking gigantic glass disc, where if you put any amount of pressure on it, it starts to wobble-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... like it's gonna slide off and cut you in half, a thing I think about basically constantly-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... no, thanks. That kind. That kind... I need it to be structurally sound, a structurally sound Lazy Susan, not some flimsy-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... glass on like a tiny, tiny, tiny little spindle, you know what I mean?

Mm-hmm [affirmative]. Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

"I'm gonna put this big bowl of beans on it to poison Griffin 'cause he's allergic later-"

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... and then like it falls, it doesn't spin anymore.

Rachel:

Yeah, I mean, I think, I think as a kid, anything that spun at the dinner table was an exciting thing-

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

... um, but also it's nice, um, if you wanna kind of forgo the formality of saying, "Uh, excuse me, will you please pass me the ketchup?" 'cause, you know, like I, I didn't, I didn't like to... well, one, I didn't like ketchup as a kid.

Griffin:

Talk to your parents-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... when you were eating with... I don't understand.

Rachel:

No, I just, you know, I... I didn't wanna go through the hassle of, of interrupting someone else's meal to get what I needed, I, I just wanted to reach for the, the disc and, and serve myself.

Griffin:

Helpful disc, I love it. I love a Lazy Susan, we just need a better name for it-

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... 'cause I, I genuinely feel uncomfortable saying Lazy Susan, I wanna say like help- helpful, he... like food friend. There's like infinite... spin pal-

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

... dish dancer, dish dancer is so good.

Rachel:

Oh, that's nice.

Griffin:

There's literally anything, but the fuckers in the '50s were like, "I wanna call something Lazy Susan, that." Like, "I just hate Susan so much, I wanna call this dish dancer a Lazy Susan and get that to catch on."

Rachel:

I've got... I'm coming up with a jingle right now in my head.

Griffin:

For the disc dancer?

Rachel:

Mm-hmm [affirmative].

Griffin:

Okay.

Rachel:

[singing]

Griffin:

[laughs]

Rachel: [laughs] [singing] [laughs]

[laughs] [crosstalk 00:40:15] go, go, go. Help me season my what?

Rachel:

[laughs] [singing]

Griffin:

Sort of a... it's sort of a minor key-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

... funeral dirge[laughs] disco dancer.

Rachel:

[singing]

Griffin:

Lanolin, it's in... on the table? [laughs]

Rachel:

[laughs] I know.

Griffin:

What's the final-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin: [singing] [laughs]

Rachel: [laughs] The line still works.

Griffin:

[laughs]

[laughs] Um, yeah, so the Lazy Susan, uh, there were... there's a lot of scuttlebutt on the internet about it starting with Thomas Edison or Thomas Jefferson-

Griffin:

No, I don't listen to that.

Rachel:

... and, and in reference specific to one of their lazy daughters but that's not true, nobody has agreed to that. I looked at, uh, some articles from like Smithsonian Magazine and nobody can pull it back to them.

Griffin:

Lanolin is wool wax or wool grease-

Rachel:

Okay, the reason-

Griffin:

... a wax secreted by the-

Rachel:

No. Mm-mm [negative]. Mm-mm [negative].

Griffin:

... sebaceous glands of wool-bearing animals, I'm curious why that's a good-

Rachel:

Don't look that up, look up the lyric to Tiny Dancer because I thought-

Griffin:

Sheets of linen.

Rachel:

Oh. [laughs]

Griffin:

He doesn't say sheets of lanolin.

Rachel:

[laughs]

[singing]

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

[singing]

Rachel:

[laughs] I was-

Griffin:

[singing]

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin: What are you saying?

Rachel:

I always thought it was-

Griffin:

[singing]

Rachel:

[laughs] I always thought it was sheets of lanolin.

Griffin:

You cover me in sheets of wool wax??

Rachel:

[laughs] I don't know, it doesn't make sense [laughs] now that you... Uh, this is actually... this is another funny, [laughs] another funny thing.

Griffin:

All of the... uh, everything Rachel said in the past 10 minutes-

[laughs]

Griffin:

... has been her pretending to do narration for me so it was me who thought all of these things [laughs]-

Rachel:

No.

Griffin:

 \ldots like that Elton John was singing about sheets of lanolin that he wants to be-

Rachel:

This is, this is a piece of, uh, of loreand my family, um, I am notorious for misinterpreting song lyrics, and my mom told me that, um... You know, that song Zip-A-Dee-Doo-Dah?

Griffin:

Yeah.

Rachel:

Instead of Mr. Bluebird on my shoulder, I used to think it was Mr. Beanbag on my shoulder-

Griffin:

[laughs]

Rachel:

... which doesn't make any sense.

Griffin:

It's better though.

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

Uh, so is that it, you wanna talk about some submissions from our listeners?

Yes, please.

Griffin:

I'm so glad I fact checked lanolin 'cause-

Rachel:

[laughs]

Griffin:

 \ldots I wasn't 100% sure I knew what it was and I... if I hadn't, we would've gotten a lot of con... very, very confused-

Rachel:

No, I thought I was pulling an original Tiny Dancer lyric.

Griffin:

Um, so here's one from Josh G. who says, "I've been really digging on the band Vulfpeck lately." Have we talked about Vulfpeck?

Rachel:

We haven't.

Griffin:

I don't think so "... uh, particularly bassist, Joe Dart, look him up if you haven't, he's extremely talented, but the thing that makes me happy about this band is that a lot of their stuff is pretty bass-driven and the fans know that. During live shows, people get really pumped about Joe and his incredible playing, and as a bassist myself, it's always heartwarming to see a frequently overlooked part of the band get the enthusiasm it deserves." Vulfpeck fucking rules-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... Joe Dart fucking rules.

Rachel:

Griffin has gotten multiple members of the McElroy family into this band.

Griffin:

Yes, and just any- anybody on the street, um-

Rachel:

Yeah.

Griffin:

... Animal Spirits is extremely good, Back Pocket is very, very good. They have a bunch of really, really good jams. I also love bass. I also didn't appreciate bass in songs until I got Rock Band, and then whenever you're playing Rock Band, you usually wanna be playing guitar or drums or singing and so every time you get stuck on bass, it's like, "Ugh, bass, it's usually the most boring part of the song," until you play a song with the freshest fucking baseline like... let me hit you with this big surprise, You Oughta Know by Alanis Morissette has the freshest fucking baseline ever. I remember the first time I played it on Rock Band and I was like, "Ah, I guess I have to play bass on You Oughta Know." No, it's extremely, extremely-

Rachel:

Hmm.

Griffin:

... good. Next time you listen, listen to that baseline-

Rachel:

Yeah, I don't usually notice-

Griffin:

... it's a... it's all over the place. Uh, here's one from Madison who says, "Uh, just wanted to take a moment to talk about theme parks, specifically Harry Potter World and how crazy it is to me that places like Harry Potter World and other magical theme parks like Disney World are all because a person was sitting there and came up with a world. Everything down to the smallest detail is because J. K. Rowling is a magical genius and now I and so many of my fellow theme park nerds can enjoy, uh, this amazing creativity and I find that wonderful."

Rachel:

Are you... this is where you're announcing The Adventure Zone theme park.

Griffin:

The Adventure Zone Zone theme park is... No I... No, I think that... I love-

That would be cool though, right?

Griffin:

Uh, it would be pretty cool. I love theme parks but I had never really thought of it this way, of just like you walk through Harry Potter World and what if you're J. K. Rowling and you walk through there and you're like, "Oh yeah, all of shit is here 'cause I thought of it with my fucking brain, what's up?"

Rachel:

Yeah, or the Jurassic Park ride-

Griffin:

Yeah, like-

Rachel:

... Michael Crichton.

Griffin:

Yeah, Michael Crichton just having fun with his k... his frie-

Rachel:

His dinosaurs.

Griffin:
