MBMBaM 648: 200-250 Catchphrases Per Episode

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids. Which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme song, "My Life Is Better With You" by Montaigne plays]

Justin: Hello, everybody! And welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modren [sings] era! I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

Travis: Yeah, domini patri, I'm your middlest brother, Travis McElroy. [chuckles]

Griffin: In excelsis Deo, he is risen, it's Griffin McElroy.

Justin: Anno domini anything goes.

Griffin: Yeah, baby.

Travis: Hey, can I... I wanna talk to you guys about one of the reasons I love capitalism so much?

Justin: Oh, good?

Griffin: Yeah, you're always talking about this stuff.

Travis: I love—I love this shit.

Griffin: And you're saying like really bad stuff about the other one that's not capitalism.

Travis: Yeah, right, right. I have a yearly tradition.

Griffin: Mm-hm?

Travis: Wake up early—It works out well now, too, 'cause I can like chain it together and combo it with dropping kid off at school.

Griffin: Yeah?

Travis: Go to—it could be like a drug store, a grocery store, whatever. February 15th, break a day, get that discount Valentine's Day candy. And here's the thing that I love most about it, hear me out.

Griffin: Yeah?

Travis: Hear me out, hear me out. They made that decision, they're like, "We got a big bag of peanut butter M&M's, we put some hearts on it. Oh shit, it didn't sell. Now it's 40% off." And that feels like a win for me, right? Because—

Griffin: Yeah, but I guess—

Justin: Okay, now I do wanna clarify, this isn't a bit.

Griffin: No.

Justin: Because this was independently relayed to me, via Teresa.

Travis: Correct.

Justin: Who explained that they don't get their kids anything for Valentine's Day, because Travis goes the day after and swoops the deals.

Griffin: Now that makes sense to me.

Travis: Thank you. Now, let me clarify, I made my kids heart-shaped pancakes for breakfast.

Griffin: Yeah?

Travis: And we did heart-shaped pasta for dinner.

Griffin: That's all you can ask for.

Justin: But—

Travis: And then on the 15th, candy, candy, candy, candy.

Justin: Okay. [laughs] The adventure continues on the next day.

Travis: Yeah, man! My kids don't know how a calendar works? Like, for Bebe, Valentine's Day is all week, baby. Like, it's a whole thing. And so, I love—man, I got so much good—I got discount Little Debbie's, bud! They did Valentine's Day Little Debbie's and I'm in there! [om-nom sounds]

Griffin: The first time someone on the internet wrote a blog post that was labeled 'life hacks,' this was the first entry on the first one of those in 1994.

Travis: Yeah, and this is across the board. If you're willing to go your first Christmas as an adult, go decoration-less? Buy those decorations the 26th, but—

Griffin: The 26th, we say—

Justin: We understand.

Griffin: "Kids, we're doing it on the 29th this year. So, we have four days to put up our discount decorations."

Travis: The one exception—

Justin: We understand what you're doing, Travis. It's just not... good.

Griffin: It's not—yeah.

Justin: [chuckles] It's not good, it's not good.

Travis: I'm taking advantage of capitalism in a way that capitalism has been taking advantage of me my entire life, Justin.

Griffin: Right.

Travis: Griffin shoplifts and I buy discount candy the day after Valentine's Day.

Griffin: The same exact level of naughtiness on that one.

Travis: I'm sticking it to big business by giving 'em 70% of the money I normally would've given 'em.

Griffin: Sure.

Justin: I will say though, Trav, also, to be fair, you are keeping that candy out of our landfills.

Travis: Thank you.

Justin: And putting into—

Griffin: Your landfill.

Justin: The landfill that is your...

Griffin: [laughs] Your stomach and toilet.

Justin: As my daughter Charlie says, "The trashcan that is my body."

Griffin: [chuckles]

Travis: Yeah! Exactly.

Justin: That's where leftover spaghetti goes.

Travis: In the trash can.

Justin: In the trashcan that is her body.

Travis: Okay. This is what I'm saying, I'm providing a service to the Earth.

Griffin: The service is something that has been being... been provided by BuzzFeed's hackwise.biz.

Justin: Hackwise.biz!

Travis: Uh-huh?

Griffin: Fuckin'—

Travis: All the big ones.

Griffin: ... Seth's Scoops. And this is one where Seth gives his little life tip. I'm saying everyone knows about this. You are talking about it on our show as if you are some great oracular sort of king.

Travis: Did you guys do it?

Justin: Would you guys say hackwise.biz is with a Z or with an S?

Travis: Oh, no...

Griffin: If we don't say, then we don't have to buy it, so don't.

Travis: No, I'm worried if we don't clarify, he'll buy all the—

Justin: It's a good—It's not a bad address. Like, it's good to say hackwise.biz.

Griffin: Hackwise.biz... I don't know...

Justin: I think it—I don't know...

Travis: It should be 'hackswives.' Wait, not wives. That would—[laughs] Don't do that.

Griffin: Not 'hackswives,' for sure not that one.

Travis: Hey, guys?

Griffin: We've never actually—Have we ever gotten video of Justin securing

a web domain before?

Travis: It's a roller coaster of facial expressions I wasn't expecting.

Griffin: I assumed he had sort of like flip down sunglasses.

Justin: It's not worth it. It's not worth it.

Travis: How much?

Justin: Someone else get hackwise.biz, do the right thing.

Griffin: But don't—

Justin: Oh, we could get hackwise.com?

Griffin: That seems much—

Justin: For \$6,375! [chuckles] So, that's not an impulse buy.

Travis: Whew. But that's an investment, Justin. You gotta spend money—If

I learned one thing from crypto and NFT.

Griffin: Wait a minute. Wait a minute. Wait a minute.

Justin: Yeah?

Griffin: I just had this idea—I think I've just independently invented insider

trading. [laughs]

Justin: [laughs] Okay? Say your idea.

Griffin: We go-

Travis: Life hack! [laughs]

Griffin: Listen, this is the—

Travis: Life hack, insider trading. [chuckles]

Griffin: This is—Fuck—Buy your candy on February 15th. Fuck that.

Everyone knows that.

Travis: Okay?

Griffin: This is guaranteed original. If you do a podcast...

Travis: Uh-huh?

Griffin: You can buy up a bunch of web domains of random garbage words. Like ostrichfart.gov, right? And you buy that domain for like \$1, but then you like make it a thing on your podcast.

Travis: Yes!

Griffin: And then you've generated buzz. Obviously like, I think to get the kind of scale... The amount of increase we can put on any of these things will be relatively minor. So, it's going to be a scaling game for us. We're gonna have to do 200 catchphrases per episode, so we can move all these sites.

Justin: Yeah, Griff. I mean, I have been doing sort of some testing on this idea.

Griffin: Oh, interesting?

Justin: I mean, since the inception of the show, I've never paid more than 13.99 for a URL.

Griffin: Okay?

Justin: So...

Travis: You got any offers? Any big fish?

Justin: Yeah, I got that one auto. So, let's see what we got. Fartpatrol.com, no one knocking on the door for that.

Griffin: No...

Justin: Griffinspacejam.com—

Griffin: That's too—If you put your name in it, it's not gonna—that was a mistake on my part.

Justin: Mysmoothface.com, booboonanny.com.

Griffin: That's good.

Justin: Dadyelp.com. No one's come for Dadyelp!

Travis: How is Dadyelp not taken?! Okay...

Griffin: Dadyelp is a service that I would use a lot in my life.

Justin: Whichonevapes, illegal.horse, derek's-trap.pizza.

Travis: [chuckles]

Justin: Blapron.com, tristeak.com. Now, these are some of the ones—the URLs we created to make... I think to dunk on sponsors, if memory serves?

Travis: No, no, no, to make our own—It was I believe our own vanity URLs for sponsors.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: It's still eerie to me, I mean, bigburgerparty.com, that's great? [chuckles] Come get it.

Griffin: That's really good.

Justin: Haunted.pizza, yes! Thekojack.com, I don't know why we have thec=kojack—

Travis: How is that not taken? I think there was a Kojack reboot and we were trying to get in early.

Griffin: Oh, yeah.

Justin: Oh, that's right!

Griffin: That sounds—

Justin: Sexygoiters.com, no offers?!

Griffin: Well, that's not... Yeah, that's a disgusting... I hate that we said that at some point, I guess.

Travis: No, Griffin, they're sexy.

Justin: [chuckles] Okay, just a few others that I still have not gotten offers on, paulandstorm.xxx.

Griffin: [laughs] How much you want? Hold on, Juice, how much you want? Tell me. I got like 20... I got 20 bucks on me right now.

Justin: No offers on dietcholera.com. [chuckles] Nothing for plannedparenthead.org.

Griffin: Plannedparenthead.org?!

Travis: Plannedparenthead.org?! Sorry, 'Planned Parent Head?'

Griffin: Justin, that's... I don't think that originated in the show, Juice. I

think-

Travis: That wasn't us, bud?

Griffin: That wasn't us, buddy. I think you came up with that. [chuckles]

Travis: That's a Justin McElroy solo mish. [chuckles]

Justin: Plannedparenthead—[laughs]

Travis: Plannedparenthead.

Griffin: Are you at your house where you live with your family? Just sitting there thinking, "Plannedparenthead, is that anything?"

Travis: "I better buy it."

"Where are you going, honey? We're in the middle of dinner."

"If I don't buy plannedparenthead, someone else will."

Griffin: This is like—The rest of us use the notes app on our phone when we need to remember something in the morning. Justin just buys a web URL, like he's on Memento or something.

Travis: [chuckles]

Justin: Still nothing—I mean, it's... I mean, even stuff like easy stuff, that should be like... Trickchruchcandles.com, or nondiscountedyachts.com. I mean, there's just no—

Travis: [laughs]

Justin: Griffinsincrediblesun.com is just sitting there. Jizzcities.com, we own jizzcites.com and no one's made any offers on any of these?!

Travis: Oh my god...

Justin: No accounting for taste, I guess.

Griffin: This is what I'm saying, though. On this episode, we casually work in the term jizz cities.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: We casually work in big burger... big burger party?

Justin: Dot com.

Griffin: Dot com.

Travis: Dot com.

Griffin: I don't even think we need to say the .com 'cause that'll—

Justin: We didn't casually work these in—What I'm saying to you is we announce these URLs, hold them up as worth having... which is all it took for NFTs.

Travis: But then never mention them again until now.

Justin: Yeah, we didn't use 'em again enough.

Griffin: Okay, but now we know. This is our... This is our annual summit. We're in the red. And if we're gonna turn this thing around, we need to start buying a bunch of novelty URLs, and then alienating our audience by saying 200-250 catchphrases per episode.

Justin: [chuckles]

Travis: Yeah. Speaking of—

Justin: We've been doing the second half of that for quite some time, we just need to now turn that into profit.

Griffin: Yeah, we need to start making money off of it, we need to be more direct.

Travis: Speaking of catchphrases, Abnimals. It's not really a catchphrase, it's just—

Griffin: The name of the thing.

Travis: ... My hyper fixation game.

Griffin: It's early in Abnimals life.

Travis: Well, this week, we're talking about Biker Mice from Mars, boys.

Justin: Ooh!

Griffin: Were they fit?

Travis: Oh yeah, they were fit. They were animals with abs.

Justin: These were thick mice.

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Travis: Now, first off, right off the bat, leading question... And I think this is gonna be a standard first question on a lot of these now. Are they mutants?

Justin: Oh...

Griffin: Oh, that's fun.

Justin: I think they're aliens, 'cause they're from Mars. So, I think that Mars probably... One needs moms... and they need the moms to kill the giant rats. That would be my guess.

Travis: They're mice, Justin.

Griffin: Justin's arguing that... aliens can't also mutate. And I think that's closed-minded.

Justin: Oh, that's true. I mean, that's a good point, Griff.

Travis: Because I would say that the Monstars are mutated aliens.

Griffin: That's a great—Travis with the... with the... appropriate slam dunk.

Justin: Free point, yeah. From downtown.

Griffin: It was incredible. That was amazing.

Justin: At the buzzer.

Griffin: You know, I'm gonna go the opposite way. I do think they are mutants. What other explanation could there possibly be?

Travis: Justin is correct.

Griffin: Oh, wow, okay?

Travis: They are not mutants, "They are a race of anthropomorphic mice, who before even reaching planet Earth, enjoyed motorsports."

Griffin: Yeah?

Travis: And had a very similar culture and society to that of human beings. Their plant was conquered by the Plutarkians—

Griffin: You mean Mars? You mean the planet Mars that we live next to?

Travis: Yeah, and then they crashed—

Justin: And we missed that, somehow?

Griffin: Huh, that's cool.

Travis: Yeah, they escaped—

Justin: We have dudes up there. We have like a little robot dude.

Griffin: I think there's like a... WALL-E's up there.

Travis: And no one's like, "Check out these fuckin' like... these ramps and shit, everyone." [laughs]

Griffin: Yeah...

Travis: And they crash-landed in Chicago and discovered—

Justin: Well, we don't look for ramps. We look for water.

Travis: Oh, that's the problem.

Justin: That's the problem.

Travis: That does explain how we keep losing our little like drone buddies up there. They're taking sick ramps. [chuckles]

Griffin: Their little solar panels tilt the wrong way, and those mice just can't... can't resist.

Travis: Now, Biker Mice from Mars shares five actors with the main cast of what popular '90s live-action drama?

Justin: What?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: So, you're saying five cast members from the same drama, also did voices on Biker Mice from Mars?

Travis: Correct.

Griffin: Fuck...

Justin: I mean, I gotta go with—hold on.

Griffin: NYPD Blue.

Justin: I'm gonna say Party of Five.

Travis: It was 90210!

Justin: Oh!

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Travis: Brian Austin Green as Rimfire. Jason Priestley as 'Asphalt' Jack

McCyber.

Griffin: [chuckles] That's not—

Justin: No, stop. Say it again.

Travis: Brian Austin Green as Rimfire.

Justin: You know I don't care about that.

Travis: Jason Priestley as 'Asphalt' Jack McCyber. [chuckles]

Griffin: 'Asphalt' Jack McCyber. [laughs]

Justin: Travis, you can't—there's no way we didn't write this show. There's

we way we didn't—

Travis: Luke Perry as—Luke Perry as—

Justin: You definitely came up with the name Jack McCyber. [chuckles]

Travis: Nope. Luke Perry as Napoleon Brie. Tori Spelling as Romana Parmesana. And Ian—

Griffin: Romana Parmesana?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Great.

Travis: And Ian Ziering as Vinnie, who was one of the titular mice.

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Travis: Now, I just wanna point out, additionally featured in the show is Brad Garrett, Michael Dorn, Leah Remini, Mark Hamill and Malcolm McDowell.

Griffin: Okay. So, a couple of... a couple of... Everybody Loves Raymonds in there, too. I love that.

Travis: Now, which of these characters is not a villain?

Griffin: Uh-oh.

Travis: The Loogie Brothers, Slobber the Mutt, General Carbine, the Cycletaurs, Mudfish Murdock.

Griffin: This is a—that was a lot. The fact that four of those are correct is heartbreaking.

Travis: This show had, in 65 episodes, like 25 different main villains.

Griffin: I'm gonna say—

Justin: That's so many more episodes than our TV show got. It's like so many more.

Travis: Correct. Correct.

Griffin: I'm gonna say Cycle-taurs.

Justin: That's actually where my head was going, too. So, I need the list again if we want it to be different.

Travis: The Loogie Brothers, Slobber the Mutt, General Carbine, the Cycletaurs and Mudfish Murdock.

Griffin: It's gotta be Cycle-taurs.

Justin: Yeah, I'm gonna go with General Carbine.

Travis: General Carbine is correct!

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Travis: She was the leader of the Mars Freedom Fighters, voiced by Leah Remini. The Cycle-taurs, Griffin, we a race created by the evil Limburger. Combining the DNA of Biker Mice and the molecular structure of motorcycles.

Justin: So, they are mutants.

Griffin: Oh, that is cool. I didn't know that motorcycle had DNA.

Travis: Molecular structure.

Justin: What do you guys think we should point jackmccyber.com to?

Travis: Jason Priestley's IMDB page?

Justin: IMDB page, yeah.

Griffin: That feels right.

Justin: Yeah, yeah.

Travis: Yeah, one last one, this is—

Justin: I knew it. As you were saying it, I knew. As you were saying it.

Travis: I'm gonna have you fill in the blank here, boys. And you can work together on this one. This is an iconic quote from one of the main mice, Throttle. "In this wild and woolly universe of ours, there are only three things you can count on, your *blank*, your *blank*, and your *blank*.

Justin: Your ride, your tail and your cheese. And your Mars.

Griffin: That feels really, really good.

Travis: I'll give you a hint.

Griffin: I'll go a different route—

Travis: I'll give you a hint. It's—

Justin: Why do I need a hint?

Travis: It's alliterative.

Justin: Oh...

Griffin: Oh, okay. My bike... my...

Travis: Bike is correct.

Justin: Butt tail. Bros?

Griffin: Buds? Bros? Buds?

Justin: Buds?

Travis: Bros is correct!

Griffin: Bikes, your bros and your... bike again. Your bike, for real.

Justin: No, the best...

Griffin: No, bike, bros, and your...

Justin: Bree.

Travis: Oh—Fuck, I wish that was it.

Griffin: Bike, bros and your... babe.

Travis: Ugh, no. Your brains, your bros and your bike.

Justin: Okay. In that order, huh? The Biker Mice are big—

Travis: In that order. I mean, bike is the last thing.

Justin: Very cerebral show.

Travis: Very cerebral. It also should be pointed out that all of them have malfunctioning cybernetics. I don't know why—

Justin: Really?

Griffin: Ah, that's cool?

Travis: ... The creators of the show were like, "And they don't work." [chuckles]

Griffin: Well yeah, they were like, "You know, coming up with nuanced character flaws is hard. So, why don't we just make it that he has a... I don't know, his nose connector is shorting out."

Travis: [chuckles] "I don't know, man. Fine, whatever. Kids are gonna love it."

Griffin: "This one's mean, 'cause he has a mean virus. I don't know."

Travis: [chuckles] "I don't know, man."

Griffin: How about a question?

Justin: When someone said Jack McCyber out loud, do you think—

Travis: [laughs] Something like, but clearly not this one.

Justin: ... They closed their eyes and they were like just waiting to hear that they'd been fired.

Griffin: What was the full name? Asphalt—

Travis: Asphalt is a nickname. In quotes, 'Asphalt' Jack McCyber.

Griffin: Asphalt Jack McCyber... It almost seems like if you wrote that out, it would seem like you were talking about some sort of futuristic heavy machinery hardware tool.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: "This is my Asphalt Jack. It's the McCyber model, so it does have lasers."

Travis: It should also be noted, that character is human. So, 0% chance that is his real last name. So, we have to assume that this guy who is good with machines and computers and stuff was like, "Yeah, no, call me McCyber." [chuckles]

Griffin: "Not Asphalt, that's my road name."

Justin: According to the wiki, "Jack McCyber is an old acquaintance of Sharleen Davidson in the original series. A computer expert and inventor, he was skilled to make his own virtual reality helmet."

Griffin: All right.

Travis: Where no one makes fun of his name.

Griffin: No one at all.

Travis: "In my world? [chuckles] This is a normal name, like Johnson."

Griffin: Hey, how about a question?

Justin: Yeah, I'd love that, Griff. "I work at an airport Kid Rock frequently travels to in his private jet. When he is here, I help carry his bags and take care of his car. It is customary for people to tip, but Kid Rock never does. What can I get him to do to fork up the dough, so I can get Taco Bell later? P.S. I'm in flight training and may one day have to be his pilot. Does this change how I should approach the situation?" That's from Mooching Money off of Musicians in Michigan.

Griffin: What a menacing little suffix there. A really—A P.S. that really put a chill in my spine.

Justin: Yeah!

Griffin: "Does it change things that one day, I'll hold his life in my hands?"

Justin: [chuckles] Like a fragile egg.

Griffin: "Like a baby chick in my hands."

Travis: Could you include that in the thing and be like, "Yeah, I'm actually... Mr. Rock—Oh, Kid? Kid, I'm actually in flight school. It's so expensive. So yeah, but hopefully I'll one day fly your plane. I'll control the plane you're in. But right now, it's so expensive. I have to go to a cut-rate—" [laughs]

Justin: "I wanna go to a good plane school."

Travis: "I go to cut-rate flight school."

Justin: [chuckles] "I gotta go to the discount plane school."

Travis: "I have to pay extra to learn how to land. So..." [chuckles]

Justin: "There is a flight—There's a pilot shortage. So, they're hire anybody. I just wish I had more to get a better education, Mr. Rock."

Griffin: [chuckles]

Travis: Yeah, "As it is now, it's mostly just a lot of like video games that have flight aspects in 'em. I've been doing a lot of Pilotwings right now. But teacher gave me an A." [chuckles]

Justin: You could do—You could... maybe just kind of do—where you rub your fingers, you know? Like...

Griffin: That's good.

Justin: Like he does in Home Alone 2? You know, where Robert Schneider—

Travis: But what if Kid Rock gives him a stick of gum?

Griffin: Oh, that's funny.

Justin: Well, if Kid Rock gets offended, you can just be like, "That wasn't—I was doing a bit from Home Alone 2, and you didn't get it. Now you're the asshole."

Travis: But then Rob Schneider's there too, 'cause he always hangs out with Kid Rock. And he's like, "Hey, you did it wrong. Let me show you how you do it."

Griffin: Travis... That is the rightest thing you've ever said on this show.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Of all the things that you don't know but you did say, that's the correctest one.

Travis: Thank you very much. I agree.

Griffin: They have... It's not just like they've... they... they run in the same circles. I'm saying that... I don't know, Kid Rock is Rob Schneider's godfather or something like that.

Travis: It's like a movie... In a movie, they always—You know, sometimes they'll be like someone out there is like your chosen, destined one, you're drawn together by fate. And like when you find each other, that's when your true power... That's Rob Schnieder and Kid Rock.

Justin: [chuckles]

Griffin: May I please Google 'Rob Schneider Kid Rock?'

Travis: Yes.

Justin: I just wanna live—I wanna say—I think—I could even envision Rob Schneider like, "And this is my spiritual adviser, Kid Rock."

Griffin: There's no auto-fill.

Justin: And Kid Rock says, "Actually, Rob, you're my spiritual adviser. We're spiritual advisers for each other. I never knew."

Travis: Ah, that actually would explain a lot, frankly. [chuckles]

Griffin: Rob Schneider...

Justin: Guys, when are we gonna get—While Griffin's Googling, when are we gonna get a spiritual advisor? Is that a phase of our arc, do you think? Where it's like, "And now they have a spiritual advisor."

Travis: I don't think you get one, I think it finds you, right. Like...

Justin: Okay?

Travis: I think that it finds you, you know what I mean?

Justin: Mm-hm.

Griffin: I'm not finding anything, guys.

Travis: What do we have to do to get these two together?

Justin: Yeah, we need these two to hook. This is the Meet Cute America craves. We're all ready for it.

Travis: Maybe just start calling him Tip Rock, and then going, "Sorry, sorry, Kid, Kid Rock."

Justin: "Sorry, Freudian slip."

Travis: "Sorry, Tip Rock. No, sorry, Kid. Kid Rock. Sorry."

Justin: Could you do it better?

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Travis: Oh, yeah!

Griffin: Fucking grab those bags and just launch 'em at the cars—

Justin: And Kid Rock's like, "Normally I wouldn't, but this is exceptional service!"

Travis: Oh, like bartenders who even like flip his bag behind your back and catch it in front of you, and then pour his clothes out. [chuckles]

Griffin: Cool! Or bring an asp to work. And then as you're carrying the bags, you open up his bag and pretend to pull the asp out. And you can be like, "Kid Rock, someone's trying to fucking kill you, dude."

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: "Another plot foiled."

Griffin: "I heard the asp through the bag with my keen senses that I've developed over years of this job."

this is a different person. "Collaborations are quite popular."

Griffin: Wow.

Griffin: "What if we put poison in 'em?" "No, you're right! Good idea! No poison!"

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: "What if we served 'em a 100 fold in a big toilet?"

"No, that's a bad idea."

"You're right. Great work today, fellas. Whoow!"

Justin: [as Isaac] Well, that... I only have one story about chocolate to tell you about.

Travis: You did great.

Griffin: You did a really good job, Isaac. I'm super proud of you. How did you get—

Travis: Do you need to go take a nap?

Griffin: How did you get here, in here?

Travis: Oh, he took a nap.

Griffin: Oh, gosh...

Travis: He's a sleepy boy.

Griffin: Should we end the show early?

Travis: I mean, I don't wanna wake him up. I feel really bad.

Griffin: I would too.

Travis: You know what you wake a kid up in the middle of... To be fair, though, he might be 14.

Griffin: He could be 14 and 34 years old, for as much as we know.

Travis: Yeah. Hm...

Griffin: Did you think it was weird that he hadn't had chocolate yet before?

Travis: Hey, Griffin, there was a lot of that, that I thought was weird. To highlight any one moment—Oh, hi, Justin, welcome back!

Griffin: Hey, Juice. Well, your voice is muted and your hair is slicked back way far.

Justin: Hey, man.

Griffin: Like way, way, way far.

Justin: Well, I had to take a business spa.

Travis: Oh?

Justin: Some of me and the boys had a back nine. And me and the other

grown-ups...

Griffin: Yeah?

Justin: Had to go do a little... get a... get a nine in. Get a quick nine in. And then we hit the sauna on our way out. And now there is a kid asleep on the floor here.

Travis: Cool.

Griffin: Okay? That's...

Justin: I made him a little bed out of magazines.

Griffin: Cool, that's Isaac. He's new.

Justin: What's it again?

Travis: He's Isaac, he's a child chocolatier prodigy, I think.

Griffin: Yeah, you'd like him, I think.

Justin: They'll never guess. Wink. I'm winking at the camera, but this is still

audio, mainly. But like, they'll never guess. Wink.

Griffin: Yeah...

Travis: Griffin? Hey, can I talk to Griffin for a second?

Griffin: Yeah, yeah, yeah, sure.

Travis: I think this is a Hannah Montana, Miley Cyrus kind of situation?

Griffin: No, 'cause Juice already has done that before.

Travis: No... what?

Griffin: He's done that before with another guy. So, it's not...

Travis: Who?

Griffin: I mean, I think he's Count Doughnut and has been the whole time.

Travis: What the fuck, really?

Justin: "I took in a takeaway order that wasn't for me, and then got stuck on what to do. It was pitch black outside, nothing going on. I got a knock at the door and I thought I heard the man saying it was an Amazon order. He passed it to me and—

Griffin: "It smelled like hamburgers. It said hamburgers on the bag and came with a... [laughs] two-liter coca cola."

Justin: "I took it, and he got back in his car before I saw what he handed me. It was a McDonald's bag. Now, what should I have done? In the end, I just stood at the end of my drive with a torch until someone—" Man, I hope this person's British, right?

Travis: Yeah, takeaway and torch, it's gotta be that and not just like, [laughs] "Hello?!"

Griffin: [chuckles]

Justin: [chuckles] "Yield!"

Travis: [chuckles]

Justin: "Should I have gone door to door, or just eat the food, or something else entirely?"

Travis: You... you didn't eat the food?

Griffin: No, they stood at the end of their driveway—

Justin: With a torch.

Griffin: For two and a half hours, waiting for someone to come outside and rescue them. And the cold McDonald's they were holding in their hand.

Travis: Walking up and down the street, knocking on doors and saying, "Hey, is this your McDonald's," is not it. [munch sound]

Griffin: I will say, though, if it's my order...

Justin: Mm-hm?

Griffin: If that shit is happy meals and its dinner tonight for two rowdy, extremely time eating sensitive boys. And so, anything you can do—

Travis: It's you and Henry. [chuckles]

Griffin: It's me and Henry. Gus is pretty child.

Justin: It's why they have the little handles on 'em, 'cause Happy Meals are just for when you need to chuck food at your kids.

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: Like into a lion's cage, you just—

Griffin: It's never the... it's rarely the first choice, but it is like, "Fuck, we got—I don't know, 10 minutes? We gotta have—"

Justin: 10 minutes.

Griffin: Just Happy Meal 'em. And then if that doesn't show up? I'm ruined.

Justin: Yeah, that's it.

Griffin: Professionally, personally, I'm ruined in this house.

Justin: That said, I can't give my kids food that they took over to a stranger's house.

Griffin: Oh, wow.

Justin: You know? How do I... How do I teach my kids?

Travis: You're a really good parent, Justin.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: How do I teach my kids, you gotta be... You know, we love and we respect people. And we wanna be friendly and welcoming. But you do need to be careful with stuff that strangers give you. And one—Except every once in a while, dad will get a fat sack of 'burgs from just a rando that lives down the street, and then hook you kids directly up with 'em.

Justin: Let me be frank. [laughs]

Griffin: When you were handed a box by someone who you thought was an Amazon delivery driver, handing you the box... I'm gonna start listing off the potential sensory experiences that you may have had in that moment.
