Justin: Now, be guiet, so I can clarify your point.

Travis: Clam up? Do you want me to clam up?

Griffin: Clam up!

Justin: Everyone clam. Griffin, tell me if I'm understanding you properly.

Griffin: Okay?

Justin: You think that Panera, which traffics in a lot of bagels, and muffins—

Griffin: Okay, Panera was a bad example. Panera was a bad example.

Travis: Hey, clam up! Clam up!

Justin: No, no, I do want to—anyway... You clam up, except for retractions.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: I retreat on Panera, I do not retreat on Subway.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: They do have a breakfast menu at Subway. Or at least they have.

Travis: Hey, listen, freedom isn't free, baby. And I'll eat those pickles. I will go to jail for eating pickles, in my country.

Griffin: This is the most patriotic episode. That's not a very high bar to clear, but this is think our most patriotic episode. Eat pickles whenever you want.

Travis: I can't wait until they make the movie version of this episode. Starring probably John Cena, I would guess. Maybe Channing Tatum and John Cena together as brothers.

Griffin: I don't even want to talk about famous people anymore.

Justin: Yeah, I'm done. I need everybody... I'm done. I'm just gonna pretend that Hollywood didn't exist—

Justin: Oh, okay? Well perfect, Griff.

Griffin: No, no, no, he's not ready yet.

Justin: No, no, no, no, no—

Griffin: No, he's still in Alpha testing. We're getting back lots of negative feedback.

Justin: Griffin, what is this show for, if not for experimenting with bits that might not work?

Travis: Yeah, no one's gonna hear this.

Griffin: No, I'm not gonna blow it.

Justin: Yeah, this is just for drafts.,

Griffin: No, no, the feedback, guys, has been... disastrous.

Travis: Like audio feedback?

Griffin: No, like the feedback we've gotten from the focus groups on my Wizard character.

Travis: Oh, yeah.

Justin: Oh, okay.

Griffin: They say, "Please don't." They say, "You can't do that on television."

Travis: Ha... the most devastating.

Griffin: Thanks, Tanner, for sending this in.

Travis: "You're welcome."

Griffin: So, what is the—we can make Tanner a character, for sure. "What does the pizza emoji mean? Sexually?"

Travis: Wait, this is a wikiHow?

Griffin: Yeah. "What does the pizza emoji mean, sexually? You're messaging with someone and all of a sudden they send you a pizza emoji. Does pizza mean something sexual now? Sometimes, yes. Though, the pizza emoji usually just refers to a delish, cheesy slice of zay."

Justin: [chuckles]

Travis: Hey, quick note there, Griffin, I think it's I think it's D-lish.

Griffin: "Refers to a D-lish, cheesy slice of zay. On rare occasions, it can actually have a secret sexual meaning."

Travis: Oh, can we guess?!

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: And now this is it?

Travis: [chuckles] Okay. Cool, man.

Justin: [chuckles] Slice my butt off.

Travis: Mm-hmm, see, I would say—

Justin: Like, do you want a slice of my butt?

Griffin: Do you want to slice of my butt? That's cool.

Travis: I would say like, "Hey, do you want to be in this eightsome with

me?"

Justin: Oh!

Griffin: Why eight?

Travis: Because that's like eight slices. It seemed just like eight slices

would-

Justin: Because that's the cut. That's the traditional pizza cut. Yeah.

Griffin: Okay.

Travis: Like, if it was only six slices, that's too big.

Griffin: Right. "So, in rare cases, the pizza emoji might be used to suggest

a threesome."

Travis: I was close!

Griffin: You were, you were off by five. "It'll probably turn up in the phrase 'pizza night' or 'pizza place.' In this context, the threesome usually consists of two men and one woman, as a nod to the late '90s sitcom, Two Guys, A

Girl and A Pizza Place.

Travis: Yes. Hell yes. Hell yes. Hey, hell yes.

Griffin: Yeah, sure.

Griffin: Eat it.

Justin: Eat it.

Griffin: Eat it in front of me.

Justin: More?

Griffin: No, it's a slime bag.

Travis: "Ah, bought this and it says fruit—wait this is a My Little Pony?" Surprise.

Griffin: Yeah, surprise, got you. There are little dolls, surprise dolls with stickers. And tattoos.

Travis: Okay... I guess I'll eat it.

Justin: "Today, some kids in my apartment complex knocked on my door and asked if we had any snacks."

Travis: Three questions?!

Justin: Yeah, baby. This is a new era.

Travis: Wow!

Justin: "I'm a firm believer that kids should eat—" I mean... [intense thinking sounds] there's Baja Blast gelato. Okay? There. There is Baja Blast gelato.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: I mean, Doritos also did a pretty fun—but they're not really fast-casual, are they?

Justin: Zaxby's sold the first ever bottle of sauce for \$30,000.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin and Travis: Squad!

Justin: [continues riffing and sings]

Griffin and Travis: Squad!

Justin: Mini. [chuckles]

Griffin: [chuckles]

Justin: I just changed it, so it's just a Munch Squad Mini.

Griffin: Okay!

Justin: First bottle of Zax Sauce, \$30,000. The buyer of this—

Griffin: And when was this for, Juice?

Travis: Yeah, don't gloss over that!

Justin: What?

Griffin: What was the event? The special month they're celebrating?

Justin: Well, it's Saucetember.

Travis: How did you guys observe?!

Justin: Saucetember? I'm still living it, baby. Dusting on!

Travis: Yeah! Yeah, yeah, we got nine more days of Saucetember!

Justin: Yeah, I've been abstaining from sauce for 21 days and I've just got 9 more days until I can have sauce again.

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: Whew! I miss sauce!

Travis: Oh my god, Justin, I went the opposite way. I've been saucing 24/7! [chuckles]

Justin: That's where my sauce is going, your number came up in the [silo??] lottery and you were drawn as a saucer. And I was drawn as a dry boy. And that's on fate. That's fate, that's destiny.

Travis: That's true, man!

Justin: The product was the first bottled iteration in Zaxby's 33 year history and came with a lifetime supply of Zax Sauce for the winning bid. Which I'm pretty sure—

Travis: So, it's one bottle then?

Justin: What?

Travis: It's not one bottle?

Justin: Well, like the lifetime supply is the little boy. The little

boy.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: Yeah, they're small.

Justin: They're small boys, like sauce...

Griffin: Like how sauce comes?

Travis: Okay.

Justin: It went live on eBay, September 12th for \$19.90. An homage to Zaxby's founding year. And as the story goes, Zach McLeroy... [chuckles]

Griffin: Sorry?

Justin: Yeah, "Zack McLeroy personally made the sauce three plus decades ago and distributed it to various locations to ensure nobody else would have the recipe start to finish." Now, I don't think it means this exact sauce in the bottle.

Travis: Yes, because at some point in the last 33 years, someone's had to make new sauce, right?

Justin: Yeah. For Saucetember last year, Zaxby's unleashed—that's their word—sauce-flavored popsicles.

Griffin: Yeah, unleash is a good verb for that.

Travis: They wrought it upon the word, yeah.

Justin: The guy, Patrick Schwing—

Griffin: Man, fuck yeah. Some great names in this one.

Justin: Chief marketing officer and strategy officer said, "Zax Sauce is a customer favorite is inherent to our brand DNA. Our fans have been asking us for years to bring bottled Zax Sauce to stores and make it available in retail." So, in answer to their pleas, they cast out one bottle and said, "Here, peons! Pay us 30 grand for it!"

Griffin: That's too much for sauce, I think.

Justin: The bottle was auctioned in partnership with eBay, it's just a one of a kind bottle but also lifetime supply of Zax Sauce. "We took inspiration from some of our favorite spirit brands and created our own small batch bottle with a bespoke—"

Travis: Like spirit of Halloween?

Justin: "With a bespoke label, bottle topper and sauce ramekins all packaged in a beautiful velvet-lined box."

Travis: Ooh-la-la. Now Justin, I'm going to make a big assumption here—

Justin: This is the thing I want the aliens to find. This is the number one thing I want the aliens to find. This is going to throw 'em off so bad.

Travis: Justin, I'm gonna make a big assumption here, but I assume you know, how does the bottle pour? Right? Do you keep it refrigerated? Or what's it like being the owner?

Justin: I assume you never open it and you put it on a shelf and stare at it, right.

Travis: Oh, sorry, I just assumed that you bought it.

Griffin: Zax Sauce does sound like sauce that aliens would like, Justin. I can't stop thinking about that.

Travis: [in silly voice] "My name is Zaxby."

Griffin: [in silly voice] "I am Zax. Zax McLeroy."

Travis: [in silly voice] "Enjoy the sauce from my distributor."

Justin: So, they don't—what they don't say on this is that they—whether or not they're going to make Zax Sauce for store shelves. Now, if I was going to do that, one thing that I would do is make one bottle of it and sell it for \$30,000. And then announce later that like you can get it for—
