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**Intro (Bob Ball)**: The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids. Which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme song, "My Life Is Better With You," by Montaigne, plays]

**Justin**: Hello, everybody! And welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modren era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

**Travis**: What's up, Trav Nation? I'm your middlest brother, big dog, woofwoof, Travis woof-woof McElroy.

**Griffin**: My fuckin' lights are off. My ding-dang lights are off. How are the people gonna see what I'm bringing to the table, vis-à-vis face stuff?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: I'm Griffin McElroy, the youngest of them.

**Justin**: You know, the back to school doldrums can affect everybody differently.

Griffin: Got me low.

**Justin**: Got me low. But I have been looking for a pick-me-up to celebrate the fact that I have to wake up so early again. And Syd and I found a great one, and I just want to recommend it to everybody. It's called the Blue Ribbon Baking Championship.

**Griffin**: Now, that's interesting.

Justin: Why?

**Griffin**: That sounds a lot like the other one.

**Justin**: So, it is, it's ours. It's our American one.

Travis: Oh.

**Griffin**: Well, that's funny. That's also funny because we—

**Travis**: We've never done good at those.

**Griffin**: We tried that once!

**Justin**: Yeah, we've tried it many times, actually. But this is our American one and it's celebrating... fair food. It's bringing us to the fair.

**Travis**: Okay, can I tell you, just before we get into it—

**Justin**: I'd like to—okay?

**Travis**: I know, but just as a huge fan of Great British Bake Off, right? And like Theresa and I do a podcast about it, like I've seen every episode, right? And I, in general, I think British reality competition things have this like homey, kind of down to earth—

**Griffin**: Tenderness.

**Travis**: Tenderness to them. That anytime America has tried to be like, "And we're gonna do our version of it." They're like, "And this time, if you fail, we're gonna ruin your credit score. And if you win, you get a million dollars. And here's some explosions and big lights!" They can't do this down homey thing, Justin.

Justin: So, Blue Ribbon—

Travis: Okay, so Blue Ribbon, fair food.

**Justin**: Fair food. You're gonna get such—you're gonna have such a hoot about one of the hosts. It's Sandra Lee! Remember Semi-Homemade with Sandra Lee?

Griffin: Don't.

**Justin**: Do you remember?

**Griffin**: Don't. Is this whole bit only going to be funny if I know who that is? I hope not.

**Justin**: No, she is a—she is—had a show called Semi-Homemade, where she would like take a bunch of different like products from the grocery store, that you could just like buy, and then like here's how you could like spice it up.

**Travis**: Oh, make it seem like you put the work in?

**Justin**: But then there's another host of the show.

Travis: Huh?

**Justin**: It's not just Sandra Lee, you gotta have a celebrity in there.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Justin**: And so, here's the other host of the show, I'm just sharing a still from the show.

Travis: Huh!

Justin: It's Sandra Lee and—

**Travis**: Jason Biggs!

Justin: Jason Biggs! Now—

**Griffin**: That's funny—

**Travis**: Can I talk about, just in this—

**Griffin**: That's the third funny thing about this story.

**Travis**: In this image Justin, is that ribbon Photoshopped?

**Justin**: No, that's the actual prize that you win, is a gigantic blue ribbon the size of a gladiator shield.

**Travis**: Yeah, shield-sized ribbon. [titters]

**Justin**: So, it's interesting because like I couldn't—[titters] I couldn't quite figure it out. Because when Sydnee and I saw that Jason Biggs was hosting this program, we thought, well, isn't that funny? Because if you'll remember, he was very notably in the American Pie movie.

**Travis**: Oh, wait, yeah, he placed genitals in the pastry.

**Griffin**: If you were to ask me to word associate Jason Biggs on the topic of baked goods, then I would go directly to fuckin' 'em.

Justin: Now, what I enjoy—

Travis: Well, Griffin, sorry, making love.

**Justin**: [titters] Now, Mr. Biggs does a great job. He's great at this job. He is a natural fit. He's convivial, he's like whatever. But dang it, man, those Netflix folks keep making him wink at the camera about the pie he humped, and it's just not very nice.

**Griffin**: That sucks.

**Justin**: Because I thought it was gonna be kind of an underlying thing, because the movies were like American Pie. But then he's like, "That looks like—" like in the intro sequence he's like, "That looks like some pretty good pie." Barrel the camera. "And I know—" [chuckles]

Griffin: "I know what makes a good pie."

Travis: No!

**Justin**: "And I know—and I know a good pie." [chuckles]

**Griffin**: See, look, I'd watch every episode of this television show if they

never addressed it. They never—

Justin: I know!

**Griffin**: And you're just waiting for the shoe to drop. And dropping little hints like Jason Biggs episode one tasting a pie is like, "The texture of this one is—feels pleasing to the tongue." But like didn't reference it, and the whole time—

Justin: Doesn't reference it!

**Griffin:** The whole time—

**Travis**: Not just not reference it, but set up like—then like somebody serves an apple pie. And he's like, "Oh, you know what that reminds me of? Ice cream!" Right? And it's just like—

**Griffin**: Ice cream à la mode!

**Travis**: It keeps seeming like this—they're gonna have to. They're gonna have to say it now. They must say it now.

**Justin**: He's got to. It's like the entire Twin Peaks, the return. Like certainly, it's about to—this is gonna be the beginning of it, right? But no. Episode one he's like, "That looks like—"

**Travis**: Then another—have Sandra Lee reference it?

**Justin**: No—[chortles] Not yet! Not yet! But I would love that.

**Travis**: [chuckles] Sandra Lee is like, "I'd fuck that pie." And it's like, what? Wait, hold on. Hold on, Sandra Lee, what?

**Justin**: Right. And the other judges are like very prestigious. One of 'em was the pastry chef for the White House. And so they had to have a meeting where they're like, "So, how did you all get the gig?" And Jason Biggs has to be like, "Well, fun story about me. Here's like a ice break—let's play—let's play two truths and a lie. Okay?" [chuckles]

**Griffin**: The other very good version of this is that no other hosts and maybe contestants know about the offending picture with Jason Biggs in it. So when he's like, "This is like the movie in which I had sex with a pie." They'd be like, "What are you even talk—like Saving Silverman? Like, what—

**Travis**: "Was this—was it a leaked video or something? Was—did someone—

"No, no, no!"

Griffin: "That's disgusting, Mr. Biggs."

Travis: "I can't stress enough, I, Jason Biggs, didn't. My character—"

Justin: "A character I played."

**Travis**: "A character I played." Co-starring Eugene Levy, huh? Everyone loves him now, right?

Justin: We love Eugene.

**Travis**: Yeah, yeah—

Justin: We're back and we got Eugene—

**Travis**: Yeah, we all wanna date Eugene Levy—

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: I wish Eugene Levy was the host. And then people will be like—

Justin: No! Jason Biggs does a really good job!

**Griffin**: No, but if Eugene Levy was the host, then the tangential nature of the connection to the American Pie movie would I think also makes for some great situations. Of like, "Oh, good pie, huh? Just like in the movie you were in once and your son did it."

**Justin**: Are you saying there's a reality in which the producers had absolutely no—[chuckles] "This young man, we're huge on this one guy, Jason Biggs. An unknown came in to us, and he just had a great energy. We're wild about him for our cherry pie show. Let's take it away."

**Travis**: Do you think maybe they sold it to Jason Biggs where he's like, "Guys, I can't do this show about baking, because of the thing." And they're like, "No, no, no, Jason, our plan is there's going to be so many pies on the show that you don't fuck, that it's gonna cancel out—"

**Griffin**: "It's gonna change your whole reputation." Yes.

Travis: Because—

**Griffin**: Yeah, this would be like if I did a like, a YouTube streaming explainer series on the history of bananas. And then people would sort of start change—I would change the narrative a little bit.

**Travis**: There would be so many bananas Griffin could have bitten into, but didn't.

**Justin**: It's just guy—it's just that, Mr. Biggs, what I wasn't ready for is he's just such a fuckin' little stinker about it. Like that's, he is fully owning the fact that like, "Yeah, I—we all did a lot of things, didn't we? Back in our 20s. Mine was in a movie."

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin**: Right? "It's a character, not even my actions, again, I wanna specify."

**Travis**: How method do you think he was—

**Justin**: But like yeah, he's not—and how he's a total stinker about it. Like every pie he walks past, he puts a finger in it like, "Not quite ready." And it's like—

Travis: No.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: [titters] No, Jason...

**Griffin**: "This, I wouldn't finish in this. This couldn't make me finish." Stick your finger in fresh out of the oven, "Ow! It's hot! Why is it like that? Are you trying to burn my penis and balls off?"

**Justin**: [laughs] He has a very original judging method that brings a real energy to—

Griffin: I bet.

**Justin**: To the competition.

**Travis**: Do you think they had to have—

**Justin**: Let's just put it this way! Sandra Lee has to be *completely* done. She has completely done with the bite.

**Travis**: There must have been a production meeting with all the contestants where they sat down and they were like, "Has everyone here seen America Pie? And like, because it's gonna come—guys, it's gonna come up. Before you all come back to set tomorrow, we need y'all to go home and watch at least the first one. Maybe multiple ones. Because—"

**Griffin**: In fact, I'm gonna you—Google—get on YouTube, find the offending—there's really just one scene where he fucks the pie. A lot of people don't talk about that. A lot of grosser stuff happens in those movies. He feeds his dad his own pubes. That's grosser to me, but it's not called American Pubes.

**Justin**: It's not called American Pubes. That's interesting, although—

**Travis**: Well, not here, but in the French market—

**Justin**: The fifth one is called American Pie presents—

Griffin: In France—

Justin: American Pubes.

**Travis**: American Graffiti. American Pie presents American Graffiti.

**Griffin**: American Pubes presents American Graffiti.

Travis: Graffiti.

Justin: No, but it's a, it's...

**Griffin**: What kind of fair food are we talking? Are we talking like de-fried s'mores? Like, how nasty are they getting?

**Justin**: More talking about like stuff on a—like the very first challenge is stuff on a stick that shouldn't be on a stick.

**Griffin**: Love that. I want them to exclusively cook up things that Prue would not eat with her worst enemy's mouth.

**Travis**: Yeah, this is what I'm saying.

Justin: Right, just—

**Travis**: Just let 'em cook stuff they're good at.

**Justin**: I don't—I just feel like—I know we're not tastemakers. But it does feel like—

Travis: The three of us?

**Justin**: Media is increasingly making choices that are geared towards, "You know what would fuckin' bust the McElroy brothers up? What if we let Jason Biggs host a pie show. Like that would delight them personally." Like, it just feels very targeted.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Justin**: A little something for everybody.

**Travis**: Can we just hang out with Jason Biggs? I don't know him.

**Griffin:** What if Stifler's mom's the other host?

**Justin**: She's having a huge renaissance right now.

**Travis**: I'm kind of realizing right now, I don't know enough about American Pie, the movies. Griffin, apparently knows—

**Griffin**: What do you want to know?

**Travis**: Huh. Okay, Griffin. Tell me the—what's the culminating event of America Pie? Like what's the denouement of American Pie, the first one? What's the big plot twist at the end?

**Griffin**: Well... I think that Stifler's mom has a sort of erotic rendezvous with one of the guys. And then it's sort of used as a... a shift in the power dynamics.

Travis: Okay?

**Griffin**: In this largely male friend group.

Travis: Okay.

**Griffin**: And it's all about sort of their struggles to navigate that. There's obviously a huge breach of trust when that one guy hooked up with Stifler's mom.

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: On prom night—

**Justin**: Now, that is notable—it is notable—the American Pie franchise—American Pie first one is notable for both the introduction to the broader populace of Jennifer Coolidge.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Stifler's mom. And also the term MILF.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: What?

**Griffin**: Thank you so much.

**Justin**: From American Pie, it's a landmark. It's so important.

**Griffin**: Thank you to American Pie and to Justin for clarifying that for us and our audience.

**Justin**: Thank you, Griffin, yeah. I'm nothing if not a cultural critic.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: An observer.

**Griffin**: Have you seen St. Elmo's Fire? It's a lot like St. Elmo's Fire.

**Travis**: At what point in St. Elmo's Fire do they eat pubes?

**Griffin**: Eugene Levy's in St. Elmo's Fire. He does eat pubes in that one too. In one of the movies a guy—

**Travis**: Does he eat pubes in everything he's in?

**Justin**: It's in the contract.

**Griffin**: Yeah. Yeah, it's—

**Travis**: Yeah, like how The Rock doesn't lose fights, you know?

**Griffin**: Yeah, The Rock eats cod. Eugene Levy—[chuckles] chomps mad

[bush??].

**Justin**: [titters] Sorry?

**Travis**: [laughs]

**Justin**: Say it again clearer for the text—

Griffin: I won't say it—I won't say it again.

Justin: Say it clear for TikTok.

Griffin: I won't say it again. I won't say it again.

**Justin**: Say it clear for the Vine.

**Griffin**: I won't say it again.

**Justin**: That's fair. I don't blame you. This is an advice show, all right? And you're listening to us, which means you want to know what we think. So you send us your questions, and we turn them alchemy-like into wisdom. That's the program. "It's hot in Texas, so everywhere I go, I bring my big Nalgene water bottle. The only issue is whenever I drink from it, I'm never quite sure where to look. Do I—" [titters]

Griffin: Man, damn it—

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: I wish you had—

Justin: [laughs]

**Griffin**: I wish you had noticed when I just took a drink during this question which way my eyes were gone, because there's no way I'm—

**Justin**: "Do I look up? Do I look to the side and potentially make eye contact with someone? Do I close my eyes?" That's from Sip Anxiety in San Antonio. Okay.

**Griffin**: If you close your eyes, you've got to drop a, "Hm-mm! Going down wet!"

Travis: Or a big, "Ah!"

**Griffin**: That's gonna moisten it good. "Hm-mm!"

**Travis**: This feels like a—like that a high-powered like business executive test they would do for like a job interview, like room for the interviewees.

Justin: Where do you look?

**Travis**: Where you hand 'em the Nalegene and it's like, "You closed your eyes, you're prey. You kept your eyes open, looking around, you're ready for the attack." I love that. "You somehow looked multiple ways at the same time, you're a gecko. Get in here."

**Griffin**: I thought when you said you're prey, you were saying 'that you are praying' in the weirdest imaginable syntax. You have the bottle to your lips, eyes closed, in pray.

**Travis**: In pray.

Griffin: You are pray now.

**Justin**: A lot of this depends on what is at the top of the water bottle, aye? Because look at this, if I am—if I've got a straw top and I'm giving you direct eye contact, it's a little—ooh, is it getting a little flirty? If I'm giving you direct eye contact and I have a bottle top, it's more of a [spoofs gargling sounds].

**Griffin**: [titters] Yeah.

Travis: Now I also—

Justin: Splashing all over me, it's terrible.

**Travis**: I have my water bottle here. I also want to show that I, when I do it, if I'm not careful, will hit myself in the face with the lid. So that—

Justin: Oh, that's bad, yeah.

**Travis**: Because the lid's attached, right? So there is a little bit of, I'm keeping my head back.

**Griffin**: Yeah, I genuinely—

**Travis**: So I don't bash myself in the nose.

**Griffin**: I think I haul such a big aqua unit around so that I don't have to worry about this. This thing—

Travis: Can we see that? Can we see your unit, Griffin?

Griffin: I mean...

Travis: It's pretty good.

Griffin: Look at me-

**Travis**: I like the—is that—are there motivational things on the side? Because I've seen that before.

**Griffin**: I've definitely talked about that on the show before, but it's like—

**Travis**: Yeah, I know, I just wanted you to bring it up again.

**Griffin**: Yeah. I mean, my favorite is no excuses. Which is like, "I'm not thirsty anymore," is a pretty good excuse for drinking any more water.

Justin: [laughs]

**Travis**: Nope, no excuses. If you wait 'til you're thirsty, Griffin, you're already dehydrated.

**Justin**: I've never really contemplated it, but as I'm sitting here thinking about it, I realize that whenever I unscrew the top of my water bottle and start chugging, I'm on the trail for at least a second. I feel like that's kind of—I'm kind of cosplaying as like a water guy.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: You know what I mean?

**Griffin**: Just from—

Justin: Like a—

**Griffin:** Just from... drinking water?

**Justin**: Well, it's like I unscrew the top, right? And it's like a canteen. And it feels like a canteen? And then I drink it and I'm like—and I know that I'm making a good choice right then, right?

**Griffin**: Yeah, like a hiker does.

Justin: Like a hiker does or like a—

**Travis**: You put your binoculars to your eyes on your eyes, right? And you're out there—

**Justin**: Yeah, like a hiking guy or a Viking guy or whatever. And I feel like in that moment, I think I kind of pretend—now that I'm sitting here thinking about it, I've never thought about it, but I think I do. I don't look at anything because I'm thinking about like the trail ahead.

**Griffin**: No.

Justin: Usually.

**Travis**: Yeah. I like to do like I just grabbed it out of the hand of somebody standing next to me on a marathon path, and I just pour it. I open my mouth, pour it in as fast as I can. You know what I mean?

**Griffin**: I don't think that's true. I think that's a joke.

**Justin**: I put myself in a really vulnerable—

**Griffin**: He made himself really vulnerable there, to pretend to be a hiking guy.

**Travis**: I was trying to—I actually felt the vulnerability, and it made me uncomfortable in such a way that I had to make a joke out of it. Justin, I'm so sorry—

**Griffin**: I understand that.

Travis: That I didn't.

**Griffin**: But it's hugely relatable. I feel like when I walk into an REI, I see myself surrounded by opportunities to pretend like I'm an outdoors hike guy for like a little—for like a little bit.

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: A carabiner? I don't know what I would use that for, but just to have it would make me feel a little bit more like I'm living that Subaru life.

**Travis**: Anytime I see like foldable cutlery. You know, where it's like—

**Griffin**: So huge.

**Travis**: Oh, and I'm like, I'm gonna use that.

Griffin: A little gas stove? Sure.

**Travis**: When? When am I gonna use that?

**Justin**: You can—it's good to pretend in your day-to-day life. As an adult, you only get little moments to play pretend, right? Because you're very busy. So you gotta take 'em where you can get 'em. Like any—like when you—I remember when I used to get the Xbox 360 power brick and unplug it, there's like this big chunk hanging down from it. It looks like the ghost traps. And when I unplug the 360, I would pretend that I'm a Ghostbuster for a second.

Travis: Yeah, 100%.

**Griffin**: Yeah, that's exactly like when you drink water thinking you're a hiking man, because—

**Justin**: You're just pretending—it's like micro-RPG. Like I'm gonna just like, for a second, I'm cosplaying as like a hiking guy.

**Travis**: 100%.

**Justin**: And that can make you do things in your day-to-day life, right? Like when I go to ride the bike, the exercise bike, I have other clothes that I change into. Because in that moment, I'm a biking guy. You know what I mean?

Travis: Yeah, man!

**Justin**: Like if you try to talk to me during that, like I don't know, I'm all about health and fitness. And I have different clothes that I wear during that.

**Travis**: Every so often, I do a little stretch in public. Like I'm—

Justin: Yeah! Yeah! Yeah, yeah!

**Travis**: And it's like people looking at me might think, "I bet he does that all the time, to keep himself limber and healthy." No! But no, I don't! I'm pretending!

**Justin**: Yeah, yeah! Yeah, yeah! Like if you—sometimes you forget that, right? Like you think like, I would like to do a squat right now. And then you think, no one does squats. But if people see me, maybe they think like, "That guy must squat all the time."

Travis: Yeah!

**Justin**: They don't know I've never squatted before!

**Travis**: "He wouldn't have just started right now!" [chuckles]

Justin: Yeah, "This can't be his first squat!"

**Griffin**: Yeah. It's like when I go to the toilet and use the toilet, like in that moment, I'm not Griffin. I'm like, I'm being like the nasty man. You guys know him?

**Justin**: Sorry?

**Griffin**: You think about the nasty—like when I'm on the toilet, I can't think of myself doing the things that I do on the toilet.

Travis: You're—

Griffin: And so it's like in that moment I'm pretending I'm-

**Travis**: Pretending to be someone who uses—

**Griffin**: Then it's—then I'm the nasty man. Like I'm pretending to be the nasty man.

Travis: Who uses the toilet.

Justin: Who uses the toilet?

**Griffin**: He loves doing, that.

Justin: Did we come to anything—

Travis: How's potty training going with your son by the way, Griffin?

[titters]

Griffin: Pretty fuckin' great, man.

**Justin**: Is anything—like have we come to anything approach—like, eye

contact is out.

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin**: Right? Unless it's an intentional technique to seduce.

**Travis**: I think if you're talking to—okay, here—I'm talking to you, Justin.

I'm talking to you. Right? I'm talking to you, I'm gonna do—

**Griffin:** Show me what seduce while drink—

**Justin**: No. You can—no, see—

**Griffin**: No, that sucks. I hated every second of that.

Justin: I don't—

Griffin: Because it—

**Justin**: Okay, it can't be mid conversation. I want to make a rule about that, right? Like, because that made me feel not listened to and I wasn't even talking.

**Travis**: Especially if it's like a squirt, but I know we're talking about a Nalgene. But if you've got like—

**Griffin**: Ooh, shit, a squirt is good.

**Travis**: One of those and you're like, "Ah, keep going." [chuckles] No, no, no, we're not doing that.

**Justin**: I don't think I would think very highly of someone with a squirt water bottle. [titters]

Griffin: Even if it looked like they just got off the—

**Justin**: I just realized that about myself, I—

**Travis**: Oh, really? You don't like Michael Jordan in the Looney Tunes, Justin?

Justin: I'm just imagining—

Travis: Because how do you think they won Space Jam?

**Justin**: It's a bias in myself, guys, I'm trying to fix it. Okay? Let me have this vulnerability here—

Travis: Open yourself.

Justin: That I think you look like a baby if you do that. [chuckles]

Travis: That's fair.

Griffin: I can think of a few—

Travis: Or a hamster.

**Griffin**: I can think of a few—a hamster is different. The hamster thing doesn't squirt. That's all—I think we can all agree that's the baseline.

**Travis**: Well, you're either squirting or you like suckling off it. Either way—

**Griffin**: That's when I—no, you can't 'or' those. One is considerably worse than the other. If I see you go, "Hey, Griffin, what's going on?" Squirt, "Ah" I'll be like, "That was weird." If you're like, "Hey, Griffin. What's going on? Bleh-bleh-bleh-bleh-bleh-bleh."

Justin: [chortles]

**Griffin**: Now who's being the nasty man?

Travis: Now I'm watching Justin do it.

**Griffin**: Justin is looking in the middle distance. Okay, clocked Juice that time.

Travis: Middle distance, yeah, yeah.

**Justin**: I clocked me middle distance. Okay, I like that. You know what I was thinking about—

**Travis**: Here's what I—

Justin: In the middle distance?

Travis: Yeah, please.

**Justin**: You saw a middle distance, I see the horizon.

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: You know what I mean? The next cliff.

**Travis**: It gives a vibe—middle distance does give a vibe of, "Right now, it's just the water and me. Right now, everything that's happening now—"

Griffin: "I need this."

**Travis**: "It's just me and the water."

**Justin**: What I'm saying is maybe on your next drink of water, you be absolutely present.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: For that.

**Travis**: 100% my fault.

**Justin**: And in that exact moment—and by present, I mean pretending to be a hiking guy at a cliff place. You know what?

**Griffin**: I just did it—

**Travis**: Then eat a Cliff Bar! You're so healthy! What?! You've been out there, you don't even have time for a whole meal!

Justin: Oh, we all feel like a phony eating Cliff Bars, don't we?

Travis: That's true, yeah.

**Justin**: Every time I eat a Cliff Bar, I keep waiting for somebody snatch it out of my hand.

Griffin: Yeah.

**Travis**: Have a Subway sandwich, you liar. [titters]

**Griffin**: Every time I eat a Clif Bar, I think, "See you in like 128 hours, my man." Those things take a while to work through.

**Travis**: Are you eating it whole?! Griffin, you have to chew it!

**Griffin**: Yeah, thereby turning it into industrial mortar.

**Justin**: That is a feature, not a bug, Griffin. You don't want to be looking for the loo when you're out on the trail, so they keep it in you for a while.

**Travis**: Thank god that guy ate all those Clif Bars before he got trapped in that rock with his arm. And he was like, "Well, I don't have to worry about going to the bathroom for a while."

**Griffin**: He cut his arm off, he was bored. He wasn't hungry. He had Clif Bars inside him.

**Justin**: [chuckles] I don't know why we have such trouble getting them to sponsor one episode. It's not—

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: What if in that movie he did at one point have to go—have to be the nasty man? And but like while up sort of him between two rocks, and that's when someone walked by? And he was like, "I can't, I'll wait for the next one. There's no way."

Travis: Yeah, "I'm not gonna get their attention." Yeah.

**Griffin**: "I can't be pincered between two walls like I'm on American Ninja Warrior, using the bathroom from eight feet up high, and have someone see that. Because they'll tell people I know."

**Justin**: Do you think there were ever product placement meetings for 127 hours? [titters]

**Griffin**: I guarantee you there was one for Gatorade, because there's a scene where he's pinned in the rock and he's so thirsty. And he closes his eyes, and he thinks of this sweaty, glistening orange jar of Gatorade in his front seat. And seeing that in that moment, I really wanted to drink orange Gatorade pretty bad.

**Travis**: Yeah, you wanted that sour milk.

**Griffin**: I wanted that sour potion that makes me so strong I go crazy. Do you want a wikiHow?

**Justin**: Please, yeah.

**Griffin**: Thank you so much to Ren, who sent us this missive from the Wizard. It's everything you need to know about faking your death.

Justin: Oh, nice!

**Travis**: Whoa!

**Justin**: Now this is practical.

**Griffin**: "Faking your own death can be a good practical joke in the right context."

Travis: Damn it!

**Griffin**: "You don't want to—you don't want to scare people or hurt someone who cares for you. It is illegal to fake your own death to collect life insurance. But it is legal to simply fake your death in order to disappear... Seek counseling if—" This isn't funny anymore, but let's just jump ahead and pretend like it's a practical joke.

Justin: Gotcha.

**Travis**: Okay, I do just want to say. The disappear part, I don't know if that's true. It's legal to—

Griffin: What do you mean?

**Travis**: Fake my death to disappear?

**Justin**: I don't think that is in any way accurate. I think that is actually a federal crime that is quite serious. [chuckles]

**Travis**: Do you guys ever think about—I occasionally, like when Teresa and I do an episode of Shmanners about somebody like from like the 1800s or the 1700s or whatever. How easy it was to just like, "You know what? I think I've ruined everyone's opinion of myself here. I'm gonna move to like San Francisco now and my name is James. Bye, everybody!"

Griffin: "I'm James now."

**Justin**: You read about that a lot, actually, at that time period, because things are so... antiquated. Like you would hear about people like, "Yes, my husband, Robert, faked his own death." And he'd be like, "I was in St. Louis for five days, Beth. I told you."

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: [guffaws]

**Justin**: "I told you I was going out of town."

**Travis**: "Well, I couldn't get a hold of you!"

"Yeah, no shit, Beth. We don't have phones or whatever."

**Justin**: "It's 18 something. Like there's no... What do you want from me?"

**Travis**: Yeah, man. "I said I'd be home in four days and it took me five. Sorry, dude."

**Justin**: Yeah. "Well, while you were gone, several of our children died from fevers named after colors. So, I hope you're really happy."

**Griffin**: [guffaws]

Travis: Yeah, man! "We knew that was a chance when I left, Beth."

**Justin**: Yeah, "That's why I went to St. Louis to get the color medicine! Here it is, it's labeled 'cocaine' for some reason.."

**Travis**: [titters]

Griffin: [snickers] "It says blue cocaine on here. I..."

Justin: "It should help him!"

**Travis**: "Chase the rainbow, is that anything? I don't know."

**Griffin**: So, it's not inherently illegal to fake your death, but everything you do after will veer into illegal territory—

**Justin**: [chortles] So, what do you do at—like, what do they say is [faking your own death out??] that is legal?

**Griffin**: Well, it's not... it's not... the act itself—

**Travis**: If you do it just for yourself! [chuckles]

**Griffin**: If you do it and then like 12 hours later, you pop up like, "Aah, gotcha, grandpa." Then it won't be a big deal. Except to your grandpa who's probably like, "The family line is sundered." Like he'll be pretty bummed out, I bet.

**Justin**: Right.

**Griffin**: But it's not like you're breaking any laws doing that. It's just you're doing something that is I think questionable on an ethical, interpersonal level.

Travis: Yeah. Yeah. Yeah.

**Griffin**: So, there's a lot of hand wringing about how illegal this is. Let's skip—

Justin: Yada, yada, yada, yada.

Travis: Yada, yada, yada, yada!

Griffin: You get it.

**Travis**: Don't do something bad.

**Justin**: We already did our disclaimer, we don't have to do theirs too.

[chuckles]

**Griffin**: "How to fake your death. Plan the event. Decide how you want to fake it. Map out the event on paper to better flush out your ideas for the prank. Plan to die in front of people you know could handle it." It is in quotes there. So, that's—but that can be like Sherlock—like a big, flaming part of a spaceship falls down. And oh, no, it crushed Griffin. It didn't. I'm in the hatch, underneath. Collecting insurance money.

**Travis**: Would you want to be the type of person that one of your friends or loved ones thinks could handle them dying in front of you?

Griffin: Watching them fake their death in front of you? Hm... no.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: I don't know what role that person—

**Travis**: "Oh, Travis' heart? Hard as shit, man. He's not gonna get upset at

all!"

Griffin: "He won't give a shit, man. Travis will get it. He'll—"

**Travis**: "Travis is just gonna roll with the changes, baby." [chuckles]

**Griffin**: Yeah. "He'll stick around in denial for long enough that I'll be able to pop back up and have it not do—"

Travis: [titters] "He'll be fine."

**Griffin**: "Any sort of serious psychological harm. Plus, he's gonna bust up about the prank side of it. I think it'll be worth it."

"Night is a good time because there won't be as much light on the scene."

Travis: Okay?

**Griffin**: Okay.

Travis: Cool, man.

Griffin: What if I was gonna fake my death in the middle of an MLB baseball

game?

**Travis**: There you go.

**Griffin**: Then light is a feature of the experience. I want there to be no doubt as I David Copperfield myself under the pitcher's mound. "Plant the seed. Pick out one or a group of your friends to witness your faux death." You want to go to a baseball game this Saturday?

Travis: Yeah, perfect.

**Griffin**: I have—it'll be one for the memory books.

Justin: Bring a phone.

**Griffin**: Bring a phone.

**Justin**: And a notepad. [titters]

**Griffin**: And a notary public.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: And don't blink, or you might miss the clues. Did I say clues?

**Travis**: Bring a documentary crew. Don't worry about it, for the game. We've been hired to document the game.

**Griffin**: This is wild—

**Travis**: Do they talk about the method of—choose your method of dying?

**Griffin**: Yeah. So, if you—decide if you want to, quote, "Die from an injury or disease. If you're planning a disease-induced 'death,' tell them about your failing health." This is rough. This is the least funny way of doing this. Don't be like, "Hey, what's up? Yeah, oh, my shoulder hurts today." And then the next day be like, "Did you hear about Richard?"

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Like, don't do that.

Justin: Don't do that.

**Griffin**: It's gotta be—

**Travis**: "Shoulder got him."

**Griffin**: It's gotta be a big thing falls on you at an MLB baseball game.

**Travis**: And I would argue that the more embarrassing the death, the more believable it is, right? Because if you die in a really cool way, they're like, "What? How is it possible?" Like, yeah, that seems—

Griffin: "Did he even own a skateboard? What was do-"

Travis: Right.

Griffin: "I don't understand."

**Justin**: But if it was us, we would definitely pick a fake death that would be possible. Like we are aware enough of people's knowledge of us, where I might try to do one to bust people up.

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin**: You know what? I might try to get one on the way out, just kind of like a last ribbing.

**Travis**: But if it was like, yeah, he—

**Griffin**: That could be good.

**Travis**: "He pooped too hard on the toilet and died." Right? Is that—

**Griffin**: It will be one of those, yeah.

**Travis**: People would buy that.

**Griffin**: I remember in the movie Big Fish, there's the witch that shows people how they die. And they showed that one kid that he gonna be like 50, and he's gonna be on the toilet and he'll die. And I, watching Big Fish, was like, "That can happen?!" It all of a sudden leapt up to like—

**Travis**: [laughs]

**Griffin**: My number one chief concern on this earth. Of like, "You can go to the—but you could be the nasty man so bad, you could die from it?! Big Fish?"

**Justin**: God, that explains every—this is your Rosetta Stone, Griffin. [chuckles]

**Griffin**: It really is. It's my rosebud. "An act of sudden death." This is good. A slow-roll fake death is *way* more work than it needs to be.

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: Just like, week by week like, "Yeah, another decrease in my general quality of health. A sudden death—"

**Travis**: Even that, I would say a lengthy like 10 minute monolog kind of deal is going to require acting chops that most people don't have.

Griffin: Yes.

Travis: I think you want an insta-kill.

**Griffin**: So, it goes pretty deep into, "Set a time of meeting and show up late for dramatic effect. Make sure your audience is in a location for you—where you plan for them to be at. Wear the clothes and makeup from your 'injury.'" So I guess this is like saying you walk away from the baseball field to meet your friends in the parking lot. And you're already pretty busted up and you're like, "One of those big lights fell on me. And it's now—it's time for me to die now, guys."

Travis: No, Griffin.

**Griffin**: Don't show the injury happening, just—you can just kind of like turn a corner and be like, "Oof! They got me!'

**Travis**: You need to be wearing the same clothes and makeup as the cadaver that you've already sourced to take your place in front of that bus. Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah. They don't—

**Travis**: Do they include that? Do they include that in there, where to get the cadaver?

**Griffin**: They don't include get a patsy corpse anywhere in this one.

**Travis**: But that's 101?

**Justin**: That's not—that's a wild journey for that bus driver, though.

**Travis**: [laughs]

**Justin**: Because that person think—goes from fearing like, "I can't believe I hit a kid!"

Travis: [titters] "Again!"

Justin: Griffin, in this case. And then he's like, "So wait a minute—"

**Travis**: "Three strikes, I'm out! [titters]"

**Justin**: "No, don't worry, Doug. It was just a dead guy." [laughs]

Griffin: [guffaws] "No problemo, Doug!"

Justin: [chortles]

Griffin: "Doug, great news!"

**Justin**: "It was somebody else's uncle!" [snickers]

**Griffin**: "You didn't kill podcasting hero Griffin McElroy, you just hit another dead body that exploded into a million-billion parts."

**Travis**: Especially if you arrange it—

**Justin**: I don't think we have a name for that emotion!

**Travis**: If you arrange it so your friends are on this side of the bus, and the bus drivers between. What the bus driver sees is you dressed the same as the dead body that you're holding. Chuck the dead body in front of the bus and then you run away.

Griffin: Yeah, the bus driver's in on it.

**Justin**: Yeah, if I meet the bus driver that has gone through that situation, it's gonna be one of the only times in my life where I'm gonna ask somebody how are they feeling and I'm really gonna listen really hard. I'm gonna be fuckin' Count Rugen like, "Don't spare word. Like exactly how are you feeling at this exact moment?"

**Travis**: "Tell me everything."

**Justin**: Because this emotional set has never occurred in human history.

**Griffin**: Now, I've never seen this in a wikiHow article before. Obituary publication.

Travis: Mm-hm!

**Griffin**: "Step one, contemplate your decision. Some people will view this as going overboard. Before you go through—"

Justin: [chortles]

Travis: Oh, really?!

**Griffin**: "Before you go through with get—before you go through with getting your own obituary published, rethink your reasons and desires for doing so. If this is for a practical joke, it could be over the top and funny for that reason. If you're doing this for spite or legal reasons, do not go through with this." I've never seen a—

**Justin**: Okay, can I say, for spite or legal reasons is the only context in which I would approve. [titters]

Griffin: I would switch those, yeah, sure.

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin**: Like it's not—if you do it to be funny and you mess a lot of things up, that's not good.

**Griffin**: "While planning this, contact any family members that may read the obituary and tell them the truth before they begin grieving." Are we doing this thing or are we not doing this thing?!

Justin: What are—yeah!

Travis: God! Come on!

**Griffin**: You know, who can't do that? A dead person. Which I'm actively pretending to be.

Justin: Right.

**Griffin**: Because of parking tickets, for parking tickets reasons. "Write your obituary." That's cool, because you can hide all the clues in there. "Griffin McElroy, outside a baseball game, as he so often is, did not eat any hot dogs that day." Like put in shit that's like, "There's no way this stuff is true. There's no way this stuff is true."

**Travis**: Now okay, we have not until this moment entertained the idea of faking your death for an elaborate game to win your fortune. Right? Which I think is a justifiable reason. You've grown too rich, too famous, you can't handle the pressure anymore. You're ready to pass that legacy on to somebody else. And you're ready to retire into anonymity and just live on a beach or whatever. But you need to find the person who's going to solve, you know, where the money is or whatever. And that's why we're faking our death? Now I'm on board. Now I can buy into this.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Yeah.

**Griffin**: A couple really cool community Q&A excerpts on this one. "Can I make a fake body and leave it for people to discover and flee the country?"

Travis: Yes.

**Griffin**: You can, but it's pretty unlikely you'd fool the investigators looking into your death with a fake body. Now, are we talking about Ferris Bueller pillows under the bed sheet level fake body? Because it sounds like when you say, "Make a fake body that will stand up to CSI scrutiny—"

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: What... what are you doing? What are you doing over there?

**Travis**: Oh, you need to—oh.

**Griffin**: What does that mean to—

**Travis**: You have to—

**Griffin**: Make a fake body?

**Travis**: Yeah, you gotta contact a discredited dentist who needs the money because of gambling debts, and have him redo a cadaver's teeth to match your dental records. That's—

Justin: I will—

**Griffin**: That's—I guess at that point it's half home growth.

Travis: Yeah.

**Griffin**: At that point.

**Travis**: [titters]

Griffin: I love that.

**Justin**: I will say this—

**Travis**: "Hi! I'm Sander Lee! Welcome to Semi-Homemade. How to make your own fake corpse."

**Griffin**: "Have you picked up a little too much heat?"

**Travis**: [titters]

**Justin**: [snickers]

Travis: "Have you fucked one too many pies? Sure, we all have."

**Griffin**: "Is it time to get off the grid? This is my co-host, Danny Smalls." It's just Jason Biggs winking.

**Travis**: [titters]

Justin: [snickers] "It's—shh, it's still me. Heh-ah!"

**Griffin**: "It worked for me." [snickers]

**Justin**: "Don't let me near the pies." [titters]

**Travis**: Do they include a step in there, Griffin, about like for an extended amount of time following this prank, you have to be super careful not to really die? Or no—

**Griffin**: Yeah. [chuckles]

**Travis**: Or are people are gonna be like, "No way. No, just come on out. Come on out." For like maybe months afterwards.

**Griffin**: You guys have read a lot of mysteries. There has to be a mystery book about that, where like the investigator's looking into somebody who faked their death. But it turned out they really died after faking their death?

Justin: Oh, yeah, it's-

**Griffin**: Only, they were smart enough to figure it out?

**Justin**: That'd be killer, if I just said the title of whatever book that was and then you can just skip reading it.

Griffin: It sounds new. If it's new, let's do it.

Justin: Write it down!

**Travis**: Yeah, TM, TM, TM.

**Griffin**: One last quick community Q&A, "Is it possible to fake someone else's death?"

Justin: Well...

Travis: Huh.

Justin: Huh.

**Griffin**: If they're willing to go along with it, sure, but it would be pretty difficult without their consent. Unless you were doing—to kidnap them, which I do not recommend.

**Travis**: That definitely leads to murder, right? Like—

Griffin: Yeah.

**Travis**: Yeah... Don't—hey, doo-oo-oon't.

**Griffin**: Don't fake someone else's death. I mean, you could... but it wouldn't be—it wouldn't—you wouldn't be able to do a very good job of it.

**Travis**: No, I'd rather have somebody on like a—have a compatriot who's helping me fake my own death.

**Griffin**: Yeah.

Justin: That's where people mess up.

Travis: Oh?

Justin: I don't want to leave any connections here. I'm gone, baby.

**Griffin**: Yeah.

**Justin**: I didn't quit this life because it's so cool and I want to keep checking in. You know what I mean? I'm dead.

Travis: Hey-

**Justin**: If I liked anybody in my life well enough to not fake my own death, I probably wouldn't fake my own death.

**Travis**: But it would be a—

Griffin: Good point.

Justin: But I am.

**Travis**: It would be a cold-ass moment though if you're like, "Hey, thanks for helping me fake my own death." And they're like, "Sure, man." It's like, "Now I'm about to real your own death." Right? And then they have to murder them—

Justin: Oh, fuck!

**Travis**: To keep them quiet. What?!

Justin: TM, TM, TM! That one's really good!

Travis: Yeah.

**Justin**: That's one's really—because they help you fake your death, and then you're like, "Congratulations. I—" This is now the perfect fucking crime.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yes.

**Travis**: Because a dead man can't murder. [mouths explosion sound] Bdgjj!

**Justin**: Damn it! Shit. Hey, cut this part out.

Travis: Yeah, cut it out. This is too good. Too good. TM, TM, TM.

**Justin**: This, cut this part out. This is... this is good.

Travis: Yeah, yeah!

**Justin**: All right, let's—I was gonna say let's go to the Money Zone, but I don't think we need to.

Travis: We're rick now.

**Griffin**: We're gonna be rich.

**Justin**: Well, Griffin and I do. Unless Travis is gonna bring us in as like a line producer or something?

**Travis**: Yeah, I'll bring you in! I need assistants.

Justin: Thank you.

Griffin: Okay.

**Justin**: Thank you. Very kind.

**Travis**: Starer-level, like entry-level pay.

**Griffin**: I'm pretty sure I put the first English on the ball of this whole idea.

Justin: Thanks, Griffin. Hey, Griffin, you talk a lot for a PA man. [titters]

Griffin: Eh, you're right.

Justin: [titters]

**Griffin**: Yeah, I guess so. I have big ambitions, but sometimes they get the best of me.

[theme music plays]

**Justin**: Hey, if you want to keep in touch with friends and family all across this planet of ours, but they're maybe not the most tech savvy? Well, that's

**Travis**: But real!

**Justin**: [titters]

Travis: Is another Travis Mystery.

Griffin: The ET touched the child's heart like an ET.

Travis: But real.

Griffin: But real.

Justin: He flew like the Supermans he had read about in the comic books,

but this time it was real. [titters]

**Travis**: Real. [titters]

Griffin: "I'm in the cyber grid."

"What's the cyber grid?"

"Have you seen The Matrix?" She said, sexily.

Travis: It's-

[group laugh]

**Griffin**: It's like that, but even more real.

**Travis**: It's like that but even more real.

**Griffin:** This book kicks ass. It is like The Matrix.

Travis: Or better!

**Justin**: He kissed Angela from The Office, just like he had imagined it would be when he kissed Angela from The Office. But this time, he was really—

Griffin: It's real.

**Justin**: Kissing Angela from The Office. [titters]

Travis: But it's even better!

**Griffin**: I know this is a—I know this is a book. Trust.

**Travis**: [titters]

**Justin**: [titters] I know that I'm a simple Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle and you're Angela from The Office, but this is real.

Travis: It feels so real!

**Justin**: It's like a story. [titters]

**Griffin**: It's a story, but it really happened.

**Travis**: But it's really happening to us.

Justin: "How about the call to action?"

**Griffin**: "What is this Myst—Myst, why do they—"

**Travis**: "And they really brought home the call to action at the end." "Yeah. Yeah, yeah, yeah."

Justin: "Yeah, yeah, yeah."

**Griffin**: Eat my fuckin' ass and balls, Juice.

**Travis**: [laughs]

**Griffin**: "Really funny."

Justin: [chuckles] You don't like compliments?

Griffin: Leave my fuckin'—

Justin: You can't take a compliment?

**Griffin**: Eat me gnards, bro. Huff my shorts and eat the gnards in 'em,

fuckin' hater. [in a silly voice] "Really good stuff, man."

Justin: You don't like compliments anymore?

**Travis**: [chortles]

**Justin**: Why are you so insecure?

**Griffin**: Cool energy.

Justin: [titters]

**Griffin**: Not everything has to be funny that we say and do on this show. God, you just reaped the whirlwind, motherfucker.

**Justin**: Sometimes we just like to bring more of a barstool vibe, you know? Just like not funny, just like talking, you know?

Travis: Skewed view!
