MBMBaM 755: Getting Crowded at Funny Beach

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Intro (Bob Ball): The McElroy brothers are not experts, and their advice should never be followed. Travis insists he's a sexpert, but if there's a degree on his wall, I haven't seen it. Also, this show isn't for kids. Which I mention only so the babies out there will know how cool they are for listening. What's up, you cool baby?

[theme song "My Life Is Better With You" by Montaigne plays]

Justin: Hello! And welcome to My Brother, My Brother and Me, an advice show for the modren era. I'm your oldest brother, Justin McElroy.

Travis: What's up, Trav Nation?! Vroom-vroom, it's me, middlest brother and big dog Travis 'Woof-Woof' McElroy.

Griffin: [sings] 'Shut up and drive!' It's me, built Ford tough, Griffin McElroy!

Travis: Guys, I figure it's MaxFunDrive, it's the second week. We should start off with something topical. I just watched Wicked. You guys heard about this?

Griffin: Oh, boy! Yeah! We could also, hm... I stand before a road diverging in the wood. And before one path is a bunch of dirty fuckin' footprinted trash and mud and dog shit and grime. And it's just—and then—and there's a sign right there that says, "This way to talk about Wicked." And on the other way, get this, there's money laying everywhere. And it says, "This way to do your pledge break for the drive that only lasts one more week."

Travis: Sure, sure, sure.

Justin: [chuckles]

Griffin: So, and I'm looking at that—

Travis: Can we incorporate them?

Griffin: In this case, the road less traveled has the money on it. This is a win-win for us.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: Okay, but that seems like a trap, doesn't it? Like if I went—if I went in the woods and there was a path with money laid out leading down it, and one path that everyone went down?

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: You know what's—I'm gonna get murdered on the—

Griffin: I guess—I guess let's—-I guess let's address this. Do you think your hot, new discussion points on this—

Travis: No, I was just gonna say I liked it.

Griffin: Please, please.

Justin: [chuckles]

Griffin: Do you think you're hot-

Justin: Now you ruined the whole thing!

Griffin: Your hot, new discussion points on this... ancient movie is going to support my—please let me finish.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: It's going to support my—

Justin: I didn't say anything!

Griffin: Support my family and the business that we have nurtured together

for a decade and a half. Or-

Travis: No, I was just gonna say I enjoyed it and the songs were fun.

Griffin: Okay.

Justin: Griffin, as... someone told me lately—

Travis: Yeah?

Justin: Everyone deserves the chance to fly. And I think that extends—

Travis: Wow, that's beautiful.

Justin: It was in the—[chuckles]

Travis: What?

Griffin: That was part of the movie.

Justin: Were you paying—

Travis: Oh, I fell asleep!

Justin: Okay.

Travis: No.

Griffin: Okay, so you—

Travis: I watched it in chunks.

Griffin: Okay, great.

Justin: This morning—I'm glad you mentioned Wicked, though, Travis. Because I wanted to say something about Wicked 2—

Griffin: Oh, here we go! Oh, let me put on my—let me put on my galoshes.

Justin: It's that today, the first thing I experienced this morning was... I opened some social media I don't keep track of anymore, and I watched Cynthia Erivo sing happy birthday to Guillermo from the Jimmy Kimmel show. And I went, for it was so beautiful. And I, this isn't a joke, I woke up and I watched her sing and I think I've never heard this song the way she's singing it to Guillermo.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And then it's—it was beautiful! It was beautiful. So that's the thing I want to say about Wicked.

Griffin: Okay.

Justin: That's my contribution, Trav.

Travis: Griffin, anything you'd like to add about Wicked?

Griffin: I don't know about this, man.

Travis: Well, this is—

Griffin: I don't know about this, man.

Travis: This was sent into us by Braden. I'm gonna send you guys the image in Slack.

Griffin: Okay, hopefully not entirely visual... let's see.

Travis: There will be quite a bit of description in it.

Griffin: Okay, great. I love that. Thanks, Brade.

Justin: Thanks, Brade.

Griffin: Cool, awesome. Cool. So, what we're looking at here, it looks like a custom 1992 horse's ass bar stool.

Travis: Correct.

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: And so what it is is sort of imagine a horse, truncate it—an abbreviated horse ending at the front haunches. No neck, no head.

Travis: Like if this was a centaur, all the human parts have been removed.

Justin: But here's the really important thing, is that to make it make sense, they've put the front legs like way farther up on the body than you would kind of expect them. Griffin: [laughs]

Travis: Hand-finished!

Justin: "And signed by the artist! Grab a seat on your horse's tail bar stool and have yourself a drink!"

Travis: What do you want to bet that that artist's signature, the first part of it just says, "Sorry about this." And the signature. [titters]

Griffin: Yeah, this is upsetting. "I was in a dark, dark, dark divorce."

Justin: The other thing that I do want to touch on—

Travis: Okay?

Griffin: Is this fuckin' stool, man! I wouldn't mind rubbing my paws all over this shiny lacquered beauty.

Justin: Yeah, no, it is the stool! It is—it is the fact that you, the reader, have—the listener, have at this point probably started to wonder about the gennies.

Travis: Yes.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: And they have chickened out in a major way. In either the photography or the stool, I don't know, but—

Travis: I suspect it's the photography!

Justin: [titters] Okay.

Griffin: They conspicuously did not show—

Travis: The undercarriage.

Griffin: The horse's genital area.

Justin: What I'm saying is, from the photos provided, it could actually be hanging major horse dong. [chuckles] And that information is not provided to you. Which I think is crazy, to ask me to make a buying decision if I don't know if there's a big dong on it! [titters]

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah...that's a good point, Juice.

Justin: How do I set a price?!

Griffin: I'll message the seller—

Justin: Thank you.

Griffin: Real quick. Is there—one, "Do you ship?" Two—

Justin: [chuckles] "Do you ship me and this stool together? Do you have a

fan-"

Travis: Are we OTP?

Justin: [laughs]

Travis: Me and stool.

Griffin: Is this—

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: "Is this gonna get me kicked out of my church bridge club? If I... if I

procure this item?" And "Do you ship?"

Travis: So, if you guys had to put a price on this piece of art...

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Travis, I'm gonna say a number. And I'm seeing a lot of different

numbers, but for some reason... \$1,200. [titters]

Griffin: Wow!

Justin: \$1,200.

Griffin: Is it—is it shitty if I say 1201? And then do I win the chair if I'm

closer?

Justin: Very funny.

Travis: Is that your real guest, Griffin?

Griffin: I think it's considerably more than that. I'm going to say I think that

this stool costs \$9,000.

Justin: [laughs] I think it's over 9000!

Griffin: It's a cut—fuckin' good stuff! I... I think this is a one-of-a-kind piece,

and I would be honored to have this in my home.

Justin: Or so they say?

Griffin: \$9,000 for what would become... an heirloom of my dunasty.

Justin: This is an insane gap, Griffin. This is a—this is a gap that I don't know how we close as people. Like our estimation on it is so far apart—

Griffin: I'm not saying I want this—

Travis: [yells] Well, Justin! What I've learned from Antiques Roadshow is art

is worth what people will pay for it.

Justin: Right.

Griffin: Right.

Travis: So what we're hearing here is whatever the—

Justin: I would—[chuckles]

Griffin: I would pay... I would pay \$300 for this, if the shipping was

reasonable. It's gonna cost \$9,000.

Justin: Okay. [laughs]

Travis: Oh, you're saying with shipping included, okay. Well, originally this

was listed for 1450.

Griffin: Oh, shit.

Travis: But they did mark it down to \$1,350. Currently.

Griffin: Okay?

Travis: I don't know what it's at now, it might go down to 1200.

Justin: That's astounding, guys!

Griffin: Yeah, we got a game of chicken on our hands now. Because I... if shipping is reasonable, I would grab this bad boy if it gets down low enough. Now it's a waiting game. But someone's definitely gonna snatch it up before we do. Gosh, do you think there's a wealthy benefactor amongst our listenership who's gonna—one day, one of us will show up at the post box and they'll be so fuckin' angry at us—

Justin: I was—

Griffin: At the post office. Holy shit, they'll be mad.

Justin: I was hoping, Griffin, a little bit hoping that there would be like a

ding-dong! [chuckles]

Travis: As we were talking?

Justin: The prestige! Travis has delivered it. Whose doorbell was it? Find

out next time. [titters]

Griffin: [titters]

Justin: Somebody owns this thing.

Griffin: Hey, should we do a question?

Travis: Yeah, let's do it. Thank you, Braden. Thank you for that.

Griffin: Thanks, Brandon.

Justin: Yeah, thank you! That's really—that was—that was... good.

Griffin: We'll put it on soci.

Travis: Yeah, we'll put the image up on soci.

Justin: "My name is Elliot. I've been working at the same company for 11 years, but I've changed departments a few years ago. Since changing departments, I've climbed the ladder. Last summer, my old boss hired a new employee from my old job, and his name is Elliot. To be polite, I gave him the nickname 'better Elliot' so that I could keep Elliot."

Griffin: Nice.

Justin: "After a few months of calling him 'better Elliot,' my coworkers told me he's not the better Elliot. He embellished a bit too much on his résumé. He isn't getting along with his team and he's taking a bunch of time off from work. The problem I face is, should I keep calling him better Elliot?" And that's from Nicknameless in Naperville.

Griffin: Initial gut reaction, it's not gonna—it's not gonna kill you to call a poor employee better Elliot. But I do think there's a smooth transition out of

it, where one day you make him spill a big jug of water right on his pants, and you say, "More like wetter Elliot."

Travis: Oh, that's good.

Griffin: And you make sure lots of other people are around when you say that. And you're gonna have to tell them ahead of time to bust up. So that later when people call him wetter Elliot, they can feel okay about it. He will-it will last a week before he's fired, it sounds like.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Griffin: This issue will eventually sort of solve itself, but...

Travis: Is there a way to start saying it with an implied 'do' at the beginning?

Justin: I was just—

Travis: Do better, Elliot!

Justin: Thinking that, Travis. Yeah, like—

Griffin: Oh, that's cool!

Justin: Like he-

Travis: Better Elliot.

Justin: Could be the better Elliot than you are now.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Like comparatively, you are a better Elliot than previously. Which was quite a bad Elliot, we all agree. [titters]

Travis: Yes. I think with enough prolonged eye contact and seriousness in the delivery of "better Elliot," you can really get across what you're trying to go for there.

Justin: Next time... next time—I think your problem was differentiating yourself into discrete people. I think you would have just been better served to do "also Elliot." And then you have a little bit of coverage you both do, honestly. You shackled him with a lot of pressure!

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: You know? He didn't know anything! Day one, you said he's better than you at your job? Oof. That's a lot.

Travis: Maybe give him an introducing, right?

Griffin: Ah.

Justin: Oh!

Travis: Yeah. "And introducing, Elliot."

Griffin: Yeah. Or you could call him Smelliot, since he's so bad in his job—

Justin: [chuckles]

Griffin: And he's stealing from you and your boss. And that's time crime. And I get—I get so pissed off and fired up about this stuff, when people aren't doing good enough at their jobs and working hard enough with their jobs, and still demand to be called the better Elliot. It makes me sick.

Justin: I don't think the pressure should be on you to improve Elliot's worklife balance. I think what I would—my response would be, "I'm gonna keep being nice to this cat and you guys fire him or something because I can't deal with it." This is not my problem.

Travis: I did everything I could, better Elliot!

Justin: Right.

Griffin: Yeah...

Justin: "Elliot's foibles are your problem, I got out of that stinko

department!" [chuckles]

Travis: I want to jump back to something Griffin just said. I don't think

better-

Griffin: Oh, shit.

Travis: I don't think better Elliot is demanding to be called better Elliot. I don't think that that's part of the problem, Griffin. I think that would be wild if I showed up, got a new job and there was another Travis and I said, "I know how to smooth this out. Just call me better Travis."

Griffin: Well, do you think that if someone called him regular old Elliot, he wouldn't be like, "What the fuck is that supposed to mean? What's wrong, am I not good enough for you anymore?"

Travis: Suddenly it's making things very clear where the delineation lies if you just go 'Elliot.'

Griffin: Yeah. Why did your boss hire another Elliot?

Travis: Yeah, that's on them.

Griffin: You can't keep working there.

Justin: So messed up.

Griffin: That is a great disrespect that has been placed literally upon your name.

Travis: Maybe that Job has to always be held by an Elliot?

Justin: Oh! It's a—it's a—it's a... one of those federal laws. Like—

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: One of those federal requirements!

Griffin: Maybe your boss is trying to hold up a mirror to you and your own job performance, as if to say, "Do you see now the bad Elliot? What a better job the bad Elliot could be doing? I brought bad Elliot here as a lesson to you. Pick up your performance. Increase your sales. Boost your... sales."

Travis: Yup.

Justin: Black screen, Severance season three.

Travis: Yeah, oh, shit!

Justin: Coming soon. [chuckles]

Griffin: That would be so dope! People are like, "How are they gonna do a third season Severance?" And you say, "It's just two people named Elliot. They work at the same company." [chuckles]

Justin: Yeah, same place.

Griffin: Stakes are way, way lower. They can leave, they can hang out and go to TGI Fridays together. It's not a big deal.

Travis: Just start calling yourself best Elliot.

Griffin: That's cool.

Justin: Oh? The guiding Elliot?

Travis: Oh! Omega Elliot.

Justin: The Elliot standard. [titters]

Travis: Yeah! Elliot prime.

Justin: Griffin, you were gonna say something about Elliots?

Griffin: Love 'em. Love 'em all. Can't go wrong. Gould? Fucking crazy for it. Did you guys know that this is our—

Travis: Chris?

Griffin: Yeah, sure. Sure, man.

Justin: Yeah! T.S?

Griffin: Yeah, baby! Too few Ls, but that's because all he gets is Ws. And so, I'll say this. It is the second week of the MaxFunDrive. So...

Travis: Oh, shit, what?

Travis: Yeah, 100%.

Griffin: Yummy down.

Justin: Another thing about chicken wing culture in the States is that I meant to tell you guys the BW3s at the mall closed.

Travis: No!

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: Ah, man.

Justin: It's a bummer, man. Our chicken wing culture is taking some—a lot of hard hits lately. They closed, Black Sheep closed. It's been tough for chicken wings lately.

Griffin: Knowing that the BW3s can't keep one open at the Huntington mall... makes me want to short the whole B-dubs—

Justin: [chuckles] I know, man!

Griffin: Because it seems like the big crash is a-coming. Seems like.

Justin: It was so poorly run, though. As a franchise, it was like really subpar. [chuckles]

Griffin: Oh, was it? Talk shit, man! It's gone now, talk shit.

Travis: Yeah, dude. Go off, king.

Justin: They can't—

Griffin: They only have—

Justin: Deny me my pretzel rods anymore. Because they're closed! Nobody gets 'em there.

Griffin: [titters] They only had three flavors. One of 'em was salt. I don't think that this place was—I don't think the—

Justin: They had salt and vinegar! They had salt... and vinegar. [chuckles]

Travis: Oh, separate?

Justin: Yeah, separate. You had to get one or the other. [chuckles]

Griffin: They spray—

Travis: And then they just had naked.

Griffin: On the front of the building, they spray painted, "buffalo wings and wieners." And they sold hot dogs too, with the sauce on it.

Travis: It was weird, man.

Griffin: The three types of sauce and the salt. So, I don't think that this was a legitimate business. They let dogs—

Justin: [chuckles] It was not.

Griffin: They let dogs come inside and they would go fucking ape shit every time. I really don't think that they could... they said they were veterinary office as well? I don't think that this was a real one.

Justin: It wasn't. It wasn't.

Travis: And I never saw food being served.

Justin: Oh, sorry! I meant to tell you guys, the veterinary office is still functioning. [chuckles]

Travis: Awesome!

Justin: You can still bring your—

Travis: That is the—that's my favorite one to use when I'm in town, so that's good.

Griffin: Yeah, yeah.

Justin: [chuckles]

Travis: To go back to the question, can we agree that there's an important detail left out here that changes the game entirely, which is, bone in or boneless?

Justin: They said wing, so they're not boneless.

Griffin: Well, boneless wings are—

Travis: Boneless wings.

Justin: Well, no, those are—those are nuggets, so...

Griffin: Or tenders. No, I—

Travis: I understand what *you're* saying, Justin. But I—

Griffin: Don't 'other Travis' right now. Like, we're all on the same page on this. It is a harsh reality of the world that we live in that there are—there is boneless wings.

Travis: And I'm saying if you have a box of boneless wings, and you can pop 'em in and move forward, no problem? Fine.

Griffin: If these were—if they were boneless, this person would not have fucking emailed us.

Travis: That's what I have to assume.

Griffin: No way!

Justin: I'm gonna go to Boston Pizza, because I—that is the only—

Travis: Can you pick me up something while you're there?

Justin: No, that's the only chain I know—the only Canadian chain that might sell wings.

Griffin: Okay.

Justin: So, I just want to know if boneless—because if I—I'm hoping I might be able to pick something up from the question asker being from Canada, right? Famous wings... wings combo... So, they... they have wings on the menu, and they do not specify...

Griffin: Okay, how—

Justin: Bone in, right?

Travis: Then it is bone in. If you don't specify, it's bone in.

Justin: Okay, so they—this would not occur to them, I think.

Travis: Okay, here's... here's my—

Justin: So, the bones are in there. Now, we don't know, they do not have a breakup on drums or flats. And that, for me, is a question.

Griffin: Because you can—you can [spoofs a chomping sound] a stick. You can [spoofs a chomping sound] a stick.

Travis: Yeah. A flat? You're working on that.

Griffin: A flat is rough.

Justin: I gotta get my fingers in there with a flat. [titters] To get all the—

Griffin: Hold the phone?

Travis: You're doing like a chiropractic adjustment?

Griffin: No, I think he's saying he—

Justin: No, I gotta get my fingers in there for a flat, guys! I got to!

Griffin: What's your—there's no way for me—this is a shame. There's no way for—

Justin: This is a great shame! [titters]

Griffin: It's a great shame. [titters] There is no way I can ask you to pantomime how you're popping out flats without— No! No! No! No! No! No! No! No!

Justin: [titters]

Griffin: You're close! You're close! You don't have to—

Travis: No, no, no, don't do it! This is a gamily show.

Griffin: You don't have to— No! No! No! No! No! You don't have to do it! You don't have to do it.

Travis: No, please, for the love of God.

Griffin: I'm operating—

Travis: No! No! No! No! No!

Griffin: No, listen. I'm operating on so little sleep right now. And if you do that, I'm gonna bust up. And then the video will be me busting up at you doing—

Justin: [chuckles] I understand, I get it. As a professional—

Travis: Let's just say Georgia—

Justin: Griffin, as a professional courtesy to you—

Griffin: Show me the courtesy, please.

Justin: I'm not gonna do the funnier thing. On this podcast now, I am, as a professional courtesy, gonna move on.

Griffin: But I can—

Travis: We can just say Georgia O'Keeffe would approve of the way that Justin activates his—

Justin: We can't say that, Travis. This is not our place.

Griffin: For the-

Travis: Oh, fair.

Griffin: And for just like your mental picture, like as long as we're kind of giving people something to think about later—

Travis: Something to talk about.

Griffin: Just, I'm imagining that you are using the—a finger that the TV fell on and squished. And so it's your like little flat finger and you're like, "It's flatter! It helps get in the crevices and creases!" As you put your own little fuckin' frosting spreader cake spatula in there and...

Justin: [chuckles]

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: [laughs]

Griffin: Travis, what's your style with a flat wing, brother?

Travis: I break it apart, babe.

Griffin: Yeah, I break it apart too. Because there's no other great option, visually.

Travis: I know that I am perceived visually by other human beings. And so—

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: I'm—I—

Griffin: It's tough.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: I know, Juice-

Travis: The problem is you get sauce on your fingers and then you gotta quick turn the wheel or whatever.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I can't tell you guys, the truth is, the truth is, it feels mean to break. [chuckles] It just seems mean—

Travis: J-Man?

Griffin: [guffaws]

Justin: It makes me feel like a big bear, like some sort of big, mean bear!

Travis: So you're being polite? You're being—

Justin: I'm being dignified, man! I'm being tasteful, right?

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I have—

Travis: You're showing some respect to a fallen opponent.

Justin: I have a place in the great web. [chuckles] You know what I mean?

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: Yeah, for sure.

Justin: It's like Arachne said in Spider-Man: Turn Off the Dark.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: We all have a place in the great web. And I'm trying to play my role—

Griffin: Is that a line of dialogue from—

Travis: You don't want that chicken looking down from Valhalla! Seeing you just absolutely defiling its bones.

Justin: [chuckles] Right.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: It's like... it's like when the lawyer gets chomped in half in Jurassic Park. He's probably like—his ghost is like unnecessarily—like, "You didn't need to do—you didn't need to do all that."

Travis: Yeah, man.

Griffin: You don't need this chicken's judgment on you. Yeah, if it's wings, you can one-hand those. You can't one-hand a flat. So, is that an option? Can we compromise here and say just you can eat the sticks, but not the flats?

Justin: Drums but not flat.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: I want you to keep a hand on the wheel! We have a lot of fun here and we joke, but I do—

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: I do need you to have one hand on the wheel here. One non-slippery hand on the wheel. Because that bad boy—

Justin: It's wet hand, dry hand. Wet hand, dry hand.

Griffin: Wet hand, dry hand, right? Your wet hand's for your wings, your dry hand's for your driving. And—

Travis: Yeah, 100%.

Griffin: Otherwise, your 10 might slip down to a seven. All of a sudden, you're in the fuckin' guardrail.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: And that's a tragedy. And they're gonna put in your obituary, "This dipshit died trying to eat slippery, sloppy buffalo wings while driving 96 miles an hour down the Canadian highway."

Travis: Well, they are in bumper-to-bumper traffic!

Griffin: The point stands. The point remains.

Travis: Okay.

Justin: That's so interesting, because I did not—that was not my—[chuckles]

Griffin: No, my thing still holds.

Travis: And keep an eye out—keep an eye out for a scenic overlook, that maybe you could pull off on and like really admire Canada's beauty and splendor while you chow down on some Thai chili wings?

Griffin: Yeah, it fuckin' rips ass that not eating the wings has not even been an option—

Travis: No, man!

Griffin: We have addressed. You can't let 'em get... I mean, they'll still be good cold, but they'll be better fresh.

Travis: And but you also—the powerful scent, the aroma lifting you up and carrying you over to your passenger seat is too powerful for that. They're only human, after all.

Justin: But what about like... what about if they're super spicy? You know, like you don't think they're gonna be that spicy, but what if it's like—

Travis: And you turn into a car?

Griffin: Inside a car, it explodes the—

Justin: [chuckles] And you blow up. You destroy your car, because you turned into a car inside your car.

Griffin: If you eat spicy food in—

Justin: Well, and your eyes go all wet and you're like, "Ah, I can't see!"

Travis: And don't wipe your eyes! For the love of God! Do it with your dry hand.

Griffin: Yeah. That's a good point, Juice. Danger's—

Justin: It's dangerous.

Griffin: Danger is everywhere.

Justin: I'm just saying it's dangerous.

Griffin: Yeah. Why'd you get the—why did you get such wet food? Should have thought about that, you had to drive ahead of you.

Travis: That's why you gotta get the dry rub for the drive home.

Justin: Dry rub for the drive home.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: And then you can enjoy the sloppy boys in the comfort and seclusion of your own home, where you will not be perceived by other human beings. At which point, go wild, man.

Griffin: You could pick up the world's chillest hitch hiker and be like, "Hey, where are you heading? Tucson? Great. I don't trust you to operate this car. It is mine. Can you hold these buffalo wings up to my mouth, turn 'em like a corn cob and snap my bones when I need you to? I know this seems like something a killer would have you—that a killer would ask you to do. That's not me. That's not my journey."

Travis: "And you're not a killer either, right?"

Griffin: I do think if—

Travis: "Because I said snap my bones, and I need to see how you feel about that."

Griffin: Mm-hm.

Justin: Do you guys drive and eat? You guys ever driven and eaten?

Griffin: I'll never—

Justin: Tell me, it's a podcast.

Travis: Maybe a wrap from time to time.

Griffin: Have I ever driven a car while eating a food?

Justin: Yeah. [titters]

Griffin: Have I ever done these two activities that I do—

Justin: [chuckles] Have you ever driven a car while eating a burger?!

Griffin: These two activities I do every single day? Have they ever—have their paths ever crossed? Has there ever—

Justin: I guess what I was asking is, if you're going through a drive through—

Travis: Are you a cop?

Justin: And your wife's passenger seat, and you get something super

sloppy. Like a super sloppy—

Travis: I don't get something super soppy!

Griffin: I don't get something—if I'm drop—driving, you know I'm—

Justin: [chuckles] Okay, yeah, but what if you do? So like, if you do get something super sloppy, do you want her to wrap the sandwich in the wrapper to protect the components?

Travis: Yes.

Justin: Or do you want the wrapper to be gone? Do you want to be working without a wrapper?

Travis: No, I work with a net, and I will occasionally hand it back to my wife to ask her to peel it down a little bit like I'm a child.

Justin: [chuckles]

Griffin: That's awesome, man.

Travis: So I can keep a steady hand on the wheel!

Justin: Yeah, but listen, here's my problem, man. I can't negotiate with a wrapper and drive a car?

Griffin: Yeah, too hard.

Justin: You know what I mean? I gotta go free!

Travis: I have to assume that the wrapper isn't toxic, or they wouldn't put it on my food. So, if I get a little nibble in there with the bite... [yells] If I get a little nibble!

Griffin: Just a little bit.

Justin: A little extra fiber!

Griffin: I remember how stoked I was when Burger King started doing chicken fries because I was like those are so—I could do those no hand. I could reach down like a big—a big bird and just pop one up, flip it in my mouth. Hup! One shot. Hup!

Justin: And a dispenser like Garth had in the Mirthmobile for red licorice. You just reach up and—

Travis: Exactly.

Justin: [spoofs chomping sound] Ung!

Griffin: I don't even have to chew it, and maybe accidentally closed my eyes too much to see the vehicle stop in front of me on the highway. Uh-oh, my life is saved because of Burger King's chicken fries.

Justin: [spoofs alarm sounds]

Griffin: Jesus Christ.

Justin: What the heck?

Griffin: You really pledged me there. [chuckles]

Justin: What do you mean? Were you about to do another pledge break?

Griffin: No, it's—

Travis: No, he's talking about pluh-edging.

Griffin: Yeah, you—because you took a big breath and then you didn't do the boop-boop sound for such a long time. It was crass and crude, but...

Travis: It got him hard.

Justin: [spoofs alarm sounds] Haunted Doll Watch. I just wanted to mention, I like to check in on this space from time to time, because I kind of created it. And then it got so crowded that I had to move out of it, to be—just to be real with you guys. Because—

Griffin: Is that you throwing shade at Travis for doing a haunted farm watch earlier—

Justin: No, no, no, that's shade—

Griffin: In this very episode?

Justin: That's shade at everybody else who—

Griffin: Doing haunted doll stuff?

Justin: Wanted to get into haunted doll stuff. We were already there, so I had to leave. It got a little crowded at that corner of the beach. Funny beach, as I call it.

Griffin: [chuckles]

Justin: But I did wanna—

Griffin: I mean, you're lucky, my funny beaches keep closing! My funny beaches keep eroding from the face of the Earth.

Justin: This fuckin', this—

Travis: I've had a lot of jellyfish, dead jellyfish, wash up on my funny beach, which is upsetting.

Justin: I just wanted to show you guys real quick. This is a haunted doll vessel, Teeny the Tiny Witch.

Griffin: I like Teeny the Tiny—

Justin: Look at—

Griffin: Why would you—how dare you show me an auction for one of these that is closed already? How dare you show me that?

Justin: I didn't know this is the space we're getting into. Meet Teeny, the tiniest member the gnome group, embarking on a mystical journey, [whispers] of witchcraft. As a novice, Teeny is still in training, but her innate abilities often propel her beyond her level.

Travis: Wait, hold on—

Griffin: Wish list—wish list now on Steam! You gotta get Teeny, the tiny-tiny witch doll.

Travis: So you're offering to sell me a newbie unpredictable witch?

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: No!

Justin: It says, "Hailing from an unknown realm," which I like, if we knew where teeny witches came from, I would hope that we would be...

Griffin: Living there only?

Justin: Yeah, we'd be spreading that information around.

Travis: What I love about this posting, Justin, is so far, there's been nothing to seem to indicate that it is a spirit possessing a statue, but rather, the statue itself is—

Griffin: That's cool.

Travis: A gnome from a different dimension.

Griffin: That's an evolution of the form, I like that.

Justin: She has these superpowers.

Travis: Okay, please.

Justin: "Teeny connects with others on a profound level, offering compassionate guidance and support. She has natural—"

Travis: I don't have that!

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: "She mends emotional, spiritual and physical wounds with her innate healing powers, intuitive—"

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: Physical wounds.

Justin: "Insight. She receives guidance from the spiritual whelm—realm. Four, she has protective instincts. Five, nature affinity. Six—"

Travis: Wait, does—that doesn't mean she likes nature?

Griffin: No, it means if you use a fire affinity witch against her, she takes 20 extra damage.

Travis: Oh, sick, okay.

Justin: Yeah. "Recognizing the connectedness of all living things in the cycles of nature," that's what nature affinity is. Which like I think you could do that without it being a superpower, but whatever.

Griffin: Yeah, you can also—

Travis: That also sounds like something someone would say to you, and you'd roll your eyes really hard if they were like, "Unlike other people, I recognize the connection of things." And you're like, "Cool, Teeny."

Griffin: [chuckles] "All right."

Travis: Yeah, "All right, Teeny."

Griffin: "Thanks, Teeny."

Travis: "Yeah, I got it."

Justin: "Together, Teeny and her partner will weave a tapestry of love, magic and wonder, deepening their connection with each other and the world around them. She has also expressed, if her caretaker isn't a witch, it's okay."

Travis: Ah, that's open-minded.

Justin: She's willing to guide and learn together.

Griffin: How are they gonna slip in there that there's a bodo, and they're not gonna tell us about the bonus doll?

Travis: Okay, so I—

Griffin: That's—

Travis: I was struck by that too, Griffin. I think that they are saying that if you buy this doll, you are now Teeny's partner in witchcraft.

Griffin: Ah, I got so fuckin' excited! I thought that they were saying there's a secret like slime bag bonus doll in there.

Justin: Yeah, like an extra one.

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: I wanted to give you guys all the angles. They really captured a lot of angles.

Travis: Mm-hm.

Griffin: Jesus Christ, I could—I mean, I can model this thing in fuckin'

Blender now. I don't need—

Travis: Oh, look how tiny Teeny is!

Justin: It's really tiny.

Griffin: Teeny's really, really—

Travis: They put a penny on there—or, no...

Griffin: It's not a penny—

Travis: Pence?

Griffin: An ancient... it might be a—

Travis: Why is Teeny whistling?

Justin: That's—she's screaming, she just is too little to know how.

Travis: Oh, okay, cool, cool.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: That's a horrifying thought you just said, Justin.

Justin: [chuckles] I know!

Griffin: [titters]

Justin: Yeah, but she sold for \$34.88. Now, it does say on here, "Please understand, I've had to increase my shipping fee to include better packaging. Plus, the cost of shipping has gone up. For fragile items, \$12 to \$14 is the average because I double box. The delivery services aren't gentle! I will work with you on multiple items and give a shipping discount." How

magical are these things that they can't at least guarantee safe shipping from A to B, right?

Travis: I have purchased things online before and they've come damaged in shipping.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: And if you couple that with the knowledge that not only is the item I bought damaged from shipping, but my new witch partner is dead?

Griffin: [chuckles]

Travis: I think I would be pretty, pretty shadracked by that information.

Griffin: Also, Justin, shipping haunted dolls has gotten much harder because of all the scarifs. [titters]

Travis: [chortles] Oh, Griffin. Your—Griffin, your political humor has really evolved!

Justin: It's really good, Griffin.

Griffin: Fuck, man...

Travis: I'm so proud of you.

Justin: "I teach eighth grade science in Washington. It's been cold and I really got into wearing cozy sweaters during the school year. I have a rotation of five or six sweaters that I just went through during our cold, dark months. It became so much of a thing that students started calling me sweater boy. With the weather improving, how do I make the switch back to wearing my other clothes without letting eighth graders feel like they've won and bullied me out of wearing the sweaters I love so much?" And that is from, I mean, it says here Sweater Boy, that's not me editorializing.

Travis: This is—this is—I want to say this shows the power of like pre-teens and teens in mocking. Where my first thought was like, sweater boy is not

that creative. And then I started saying it to myself like someone was saying it to me. And by the nature of it being so simple and not creative, it does imply a like, this doesn't even deserve like a fun play on words or whatever. You're just sweater boy.

Griffin: To be reduced down to such a—to such a primordial kind of component is like you—they see me for nothing else, other than my long, heavy shirt.

Travis: Not even sweater man or professor sweater or something.

Griffin: Professor sweater hits so good.

Justin: You gotta get—no, but the like, the—if you're gonna level a—if you're gonna make a nickname stick with a teacher it's gotta be that sort of banal.

Travis: Yeah.

Justin: That like there's nothing in the name necessarily, where they're letting you know that they don't like it.

Travis: Yes.

Justin: So like if you try to take them to the principal they're gonna be like, "That means sweater? He wears sweaters, I mean—"

Travis: "What do you mean they call you sweater boy?" "But you're not there when they say it!"

Justin: Right.

Travis: You don't know the tone!

Justin: "Yeah, they say it to my face." "Well, yeah but why do they—"

Travis: "They call me fuck wad. Come on, man, like sweater boy is not that bad."

Justin: "That's not my name." [titters]

Travis: Yeah!

Justin: "My name's Stacy."

Travis: "My name is Fuq Wad. It's French."

Justin: [chuckles] Yeah, I think that where you sort of—the first time someone said sweater boy, you should have taken it off. Because if people notice what you're wearing, you've gone wrong. That's—

Travis: That's too much power. Can you imagine? Justin, if the first time someone saw you wearing a sweater, they said sweater boy. [chuckles] And you instantly took it off? That person—

Justin: That's pretty darn... pretty darn close to how I would probably react, Travis, honestly. [chuckles]

Travis: I think that if you did that to me, like if I said sweater boy and you took it off, I would feel a crushing weight of responsibility for the power I had over another human being. Not just in that moment, but maybe make me second guess every interaction I would ever have again with someone ever. That I might comment on "nice shoes," and then they'd take off their shoes, right? Or something along those lines, that's too much power you're giving me.

Justin: It's—

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: What's hard is the next day, once word gets around. Like, hey, it's starting to become a thing. And like, "I want to tell you, the other students—this isn't me, sir, but the other students are really starting to notice the sweater a lot." I feel like one of the students should have given you an out

earlier on. Like just to let you know that it was building. Because the fact that you let the sort of... the rep build to this point where it's like canonical?

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Because that didn't happen on the first time you wore a sweater.

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: Maybe you could switch to sweater vests, right? Make a slow transition out of it. Ooh, ooh! Put a little like loose nail hammered into your desk. Catch the edge of your sweater on it. Continue moving around the room.

Griffin: Oh, yeah!

Travis: For the day. Let the sweater slowly unravel.

Griffin: Be wearing snee—wearing something under.

Travis: Important. Like a funny shirt that says like, "The sweater is dead."

Griffin: Yeah—

Travis: Like, "Sweater boy is dead, I'm T-shirt man now."

Justin: As someone who was in a very similar situation to this, and has been in a similar situation to this, the better play for the students would have been to start suddenly hinting that they can smell your sweater. Because—

Travis: Oh!

Justin: You really—it's such a gigantic pain in the ass to wash a sweater, right? I've got sweaters upstairs where it said "lay flat." I don't have anywhere in my house to lay a sweater flat?!

Travis: You don't have a flat surface in your home?!

Justin: I had to clean off the dining room table, yeah, man! Somewhere where cats wouldn't pee, I don't know?

Travis: Oh, fair, fair.

Griffin: That doesn't exist in that house.

Justin: I know, yeah—hey, careful, pal.

Travis: [laughs]

Griffin: [guffaws]

Justin: That's my prison you're talking about! [chuckles]

Travis: Pissin.

Griffin: I was—

Justin: That's my pissin. No, but you—[titters] The—so—it is such a pain. So you wear 'em and you're like, I don't—I—you know, there's always a shirt underneath. Like I always have like a T-shirt or something underneath. And then I'd think, well, I don't need to wash the sweater right now. So if the students started like, "[sniff-sniff] Oof... you guys—hm... smells a little bit like sweater." [chuckles] You know, like something like that. "Do you guys smell like a musty, sweatery smell?"

Griffin: Like a sweatery—yeah. That could work. I was trying to think of ways to retaliate—a teacher could retaliate against a student that would be still funny and not upsetting. And I think that what I've landed on is if people call you sweater boy in a way that you're uncomfortable with, and you kind of sigh and you walk to the door of the classroom and open it up. And you wheel in the AV cart and you say, "Well, we were gonna watch Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs 2. But I guess that movie is actually only for goodbehaved kids." And you push it right out of the room and you say, "Sorry, maybe tomorrow. Maybe tomorrow if you can keep your cruel barbs to

yourself, then we'll finally get to finish Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs 2. I heard he dies at the end of it."

Travis: Could you find like 30—however many kids are in your class, smaller, exact like child-sized duplicates of your sweater? And you bring 'em—

Griffin: Oh, nice.

Travis: In one day, and you hand 'em out to everybody. And now they're also sweater boys. And you're in sweat—and then you're gonna get some kind of like photo posted on an inspirational Instagram of like—

Griffin: Yes!

Travis: "Teacher figured out his kids were so jealous of his sweater that he got sweaters for all of 'em and taught 'em to be little gentlemen," or whatever. Those will always get on there.

Griffin: I always forget if teacher is one of those jobs that has enough expendable income to buy 30 sweaters for a goof or—

Travis: Child-sized sweaters, Griffin! They don't cost as much as the human-sized sweaters. [chuckles]

Griffin: [titters] Whoa.

Travis: Yeah!

Griffin: Yikes, man?

Travis: That's a Freudian slip that apparently reveals how I feel.

Griffin: Yeah, you need to break that down! Yikes...

Travis: Kids aren't fully-formed humans.

Griffin: I think kids are humans.

Travis: Hey, the science is out, man. Do turtles dream?

Griffin: I don't think it is. I don't—you're really stuck on that, man.

Travis: I can't stop thinking about it.

Justin: [chuckles] You must think about it a lot!

Travis: I can't stop thinking about it. What do turtles dream about?

Justin: I bet they dream about bringing in big returns this year for the MaxFunDrive—no.

Travis: You don't think turtles dream about that? I want to—this—you know, we're not quite at the end of the episode, but we're headed that way. And this is the second My Brother, My Brother and Me. So, I wanted to take a chance before we wrapped up to tell everybody how much your support over the years and on this MaxFunDrive means to us. We take this pretty seriously, and it means a lot to us. Seeing people show up for the live streams that we do, seeing people comment on like Instagram posts that they upgraded or became a new member or boosted or whatever they were able to do. It's a very good reminder that the stuff that we do matters to people. And it reminds us, you know, of... that there's people out there that enjoy the thing, that we bring some joy to.

Justin: Yeah.

Travis: And it's one of my favorite times of the year to be able to make all this extra stuff. Not just the bonus content, but all the live streams and posts and everything like that. To kind of deepen that connection.

Justin: Yeah, it's really, it's... it's also a good time—I always feel really grateful this time of year, and I wanted to express that as well. Because in like all the asking for stuff, I also want to recognize how many people have done this for many years, and I really appreciate it. If you have maybe started listening to some new shows, or maybe listening a little bit more, or your financial situation has changed, whatever! Maybe, what if you could

do... what about \$20 a month? In addition to the pin and the bonus content, we've also got a pretty freaking incredible towel. A "beach for the stars" towel, illustrated by Paul G. Hammond. It's gorgeous. It's fantastic. Or there's a bucket hat, if you don't want the towel. But I think you probably would want the towel—

Travis: You always need a towel!

Justin: Probably want the towel, that's the route that I would go. But the important thing is not the gifts, it's that you're saying, "Hey, I like when—I like when my media cares about people. I like when the stuff I make is beholden to the people who listen to it, and not to big-money corporate interests or the government."

Travis: Are there a lot of government podcasts?

Justin: A lot of government podcasts.

Travis: Oh, man?

Griffin: Huge.

Travis: Okay.

Griffin: Huge genre these days.

Travis: It is, I mean, the thing is, is the way that—

Justin: I do one for the West Virginia Department of Transportation. [chuckles]

Travis: Oh, yeah?

Justin: Dude, it's so boring. Yeah.

Travis: Okay, cool, man.

Justin: But I make \$10,000 an episode every—

Travis: Whoa, dude!

Griffin: Don't fuckin' say—don't say that now! Don't say that during—

Travis: Not now!

Griffin: Listen, we all—we all get—

Justin: It's all for the federal government. Don't worry about it, guys.

Griffin: We all get a lot of money from the left dot, but let's keep that shit under wraps until maybe next week—

Travis: The... in all seriousness, the way that Max Fund, the funding works and the way that like not just the ownership of the shows and the ownership of the network, is completely unique to podcast networks, from what I've found and talked to other people about. And this thing of like it being a pretty tight closed loop of like listeners and hosts and creators and the workers at Max Fun, feels very unique and special.

Griffin: Yes.

Travis: And our ability to just make stuff that we like for the people that like it is so unique. And it wouldn't be possible without support from you guys.

Griffin: Genuinely would not be possible you—if this is the only show you listen to, you may not be aware of this, but if you listen to other McElroy shows, you probably know that the podcast ad market is in pretty much the worst spot I've seen it in my long, illustrious podcasting career. We don't run a lot of ads on other shows that aren't My Brother, My Brother and Me.

But fortunately, because of the support we get from you all, we are able to stay solvent and keep paying people to help us—help us out, and keep making more stuff. And it's—we're not asking you to just do this for free. The bonus content, if you've never heard it, is wild. You gotta hear Prankee Doodle Dandy, you gotta hear Plato's Rave. You gotta hear all that—

Justin: Plato's, right? Yeah.

Travis: You gotta hear my—

Griffin: Plato's Rave!

Travis: Sister-in-law, my sister-in-law and me.

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: You gotta hear that! You got—if you listen to TAZ, the three—the Charlieverse trilogy of DnD sessions scripted by Justin's oldest daughter are all just—it's all unstoppable content! And so you get a lot of great stuff. And you know that you support the shows that you like for, you know, starting at just five bucks a month.

Justin: If you're already a supporter, by the way, and you haven't checked out your bonus content and you've forgotten how maybe, you can go to maximumfun.org/howtoboco.

Griffin: We are going to be streaming every day for the rest of this week. We streamed every day last week too. We have some stretch goals that we've released. If you're a member of the Max Fun network, you can watch our Hot Ones video. The full video is now up in the boco feed. If we can get up to 8000 new, upgrading and boosting members, we're gonna release an old video of Travis playing Conrad Birdie from Bye Bye Birdie on an upcoming clubhouse. Hopefully alongside one of Justin—

Travis: Yeah, we've already hit that one.

Griffin: Singing Ed Sullivan.

Travis: Yeah.

Griffin: We already hit that one.

Justin: Guys, I've invested in a pretty pricey disc resurfacing machine to keep the flow coming through the spikes. [chuckles]

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: The embarrassment spikes.

Griffin: We're leaving it all out on the court this—for the—for the rest of this week. And then we're gonna go back to the usual amount of effort that you... assume per—

Justin: That we can sustain. [titters] And that you—

Griffin: Sustainable. [chuckles] As content creators. But yeah, this our last episode of MBMBaM where we're going to ask you to help us out. So, maximumfun.org/join. If you're thinking about it, do it now before you forget, and help us keep the—keep the goof train on the tracks. Because otherwise we'll crash.

Justin: [mouths Munch Squad riff] Sorry.

Griffin: Yes!

Justin: [continues riffing and sings] I wanna munch!

Griffin and Travis: Squad!

Justin: Griffin, I'm sorry, I can't sing the song. Talk to me about your reaction to the Munch Squad theme song as you—as you just sort of like—it was more like a, "Oh?" Like a... like there was like—

Griffin: Oh, was it like, oh my gosh, I'm-

Justin: Like a stain on your shirt—

Griffin: Dude, no.

Justin: You hadn't noticed.

Travis: You were making quite a face, Justin, maybe in the ramping up to it.

Griffin: It was a—again, you gave me a—

Justin: Yeah, Trav! That's not part of it. [chuckles]

Travis: [yells] But it is for us!

Griffin: [guffaws] We have to see you, Justin. We have to see you. And sometimes we'll react to things that only we can see—

Justin: Listen-

Griffin: You don't have to hang a big lantern on it.

Justin: Listen, as I've—as I've told my wife—

Griffin: You look like you were having a heart attack and were dying on the show!

Justin: I've been spending too much of my precious little energy lately trying to mask my emotional state at any given moment. So don't—so as I told Sydnee, my face isn't part of it, right?

Travis: Oh, okay, cool!

Griffin: [laughs]

Justin: My face isn't part of it. I can't do that right now. Okay?

Griffin: Right.

Justin: Listen. [mouths Munch Squad riff]

Griffin: [in a silly voice] Yeah!

Justin: Guys, they fucking did it.

Griffin: Yes. [titters]

Justin: Guys, they—McDonald's did it.

Travis: Oh?

Justin: And we've been waiting for 'em to do it, but they did it.

Travis: They did it?

Justin: Adult-

Travis: No!

Justin: Happy Meals, man.

Griffin: [chuckles] Wait a second. Wait a second. Adult—I thought what you were showing us is that these—they got these awesome Minecraft meals. I was like, great. I didn't put together that they were doing these damn things for grown folks as well. That is—

Justin: So, right. So, there is the normal kids' Happy Meal, which we all love and revere. But now we've got a Minecraft movie meal.

Travis: Wait, for—

Griffin: Yeah.

Travis: You've just blown my mind, Justin. I didn't know 'til right this second that the article associated with the Minecraft movie was a Minecraft movie.

Justin: Yes.

Griffin: Oh, baby, you know—

Travis: This is news to me.

Justin: So, Trav, this is actually—let's talk about that for a second. I think they're calling it *a* Minecraft movie to emphasize the sort of open source, collaborative nature of Minecraft.

Griffin: Yes, for sure.

Justin: So, maybe we should have a Minecraft movie as well.

Griffin: Yeah!

Justin: But a different Minecraft movie! To kind of honor that open source, collaborative nature of Minecraft.

Travis: Okay, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Griffin: And maybe also my theory is that it was called *the* Minecraft movie, until a single focus group got plopped down in front of that trailer and they were like, "Maybe we shouldn't put all our eggs in this one particularly hugely upsetting-looking basket."

Justin: Yes. So we could have—maybe the last—the Ghostbusters movie could have been *a* Ghostbusters reboot. And then after that it is a Ghostbusters reboot! It just—

Griffin: Yes, you can—

Justin: It's just one of them.

Griffin: Just keep on with the same one, yeah.

Justin: So, let me tell you about this meal. Because we do have the kids' option that has a Minecraft toy. "From crafting pixel perfect replicas of our golden arches and world famous menu items, to stacking block upon block into full-on restaurants, fans have been building their love for McDonald's into Minecraft for years."

Griffin: Yes.

Justin: "Now, inspired by their imagination and the global big screen adventure A Minecraft Movie debuting in theaters on April fourth, we're bringing the game's cinematic world to McDonald's! Introducing A Minecraft Movie Meal and A Minecraft Movie Happy Meal, dropping together for the first time ever at McDonald's nationwide. Starting April first." Don't worry.

Griffin: I'm worried, man!

Justin: It's not a joke.

Travis: Mm-hm. Hey—

Griffin: If you—you tell me—you tell me grown-up Happy Meals launching April first, eh, my head's a little too on swivel to get fooled again—

Travis: Justin—

Griffin: By the McDonald's corporation.

Travis: I might be asking you to jump ahead a little bit. And in fact, I am. Because is this actually a grown-up happy meal, or is this just a combo meal which they've done before? Is there a toy?

Justin: Oh! Well, Travis, allow me to answer that with an affirmative yes. First off, I will have to say, Travis, chicken McNuggets meal, if you get the—there's a 10 piece McNuggets meal or a Big Mac. You can go either way. If you get the nuggets, you can spice that up with Nether Flame Sauce, a limited-edition hot sauce inspired by the Nether. With crushed red pepper and flaming cayenne. Balance with hints of garlic and sweetness, much like the Nether itself."

Griffin: Right.

Justin: "Families and our youngest fans can also enjoy a Minecraft movie Happy Meal featuring one of 12 film inspired toys." Whatever, we don't care about this. A Minecraft movie meal—

Griffin: I should say that I do care about it a great deal—

Justin: I care about it a great deal—

Griffin: It's going to absolutely invade and occupy my house like a—like some sort of enemy from abroad.

Justin: So, you can get one of six adult collectibles. There's a—

Travis: Ah, sexual!

Justin: There's a big—

Griffin: No!

Travis: No? Okay, sorry.

Justin: No, it's not like that.

Griffin: "I got a creeper for my butt at McDonald's! I got a butt creeper from Micky D's!"

Travis: It doesn't literally say that on the packaging, but if it fits, it sits! You know what I mean?

Griffin: "It says it's an Enderman for my butt! From the McDonald's grown-up Happy Meal. Fuck yeah. Thanks, Ronald."

Justin: Thanks, man. Yeah, so... you could get a Big Mac Crystal. "Mined from the sea of special sauce, this pleasure—"

Griffin: [titters]

Justin: "Precious block derives its radiant shine from melty cheese and a toasted sesame bun. Birdie Wings! Keep your eye to the sky, or you might miss this early bird soaring high above the clouds with a rare pair of elytra wings."

Travis: What?

Griffin: Yes!

Justin: Here's a—

Griffin: Fuck yeah, man!

Justin: Here's a Fry Helmet, forged from the iconic French fry box. "This enchanted helmet is rumored to protect your friends from stealing your last Fry." Which they have capitalized here, absolutely demented. "Grimace Egg! Emerging from the depths of a purple shake, this magical Grimace mob gets its shape for the most coveted egg of them all!"

Travis: [yells] What!

Justin: [yells] Soda Potion! "The electrifying effect of this potion is a mysterious as its recipe: an accidental combo of fantastic, fizzy flavors." And there's the Zombie Hamburger—

Travis: This comes from an egg?!

Griffin: Yeah.

Justin: Guys, there's the Zombie Hamburglar!

Travis: What?!

Griffin: Whoa! Too scary! Stop! Too scary!

Justin: "Little is known about this hungry mob who spawns late at night and wanders all biomes in search of hamburgers."

Griffin: So, they got a Grimace in the back of every McDonald's. It's cloaca just constantly popping out—

Travis: A brood mother.

Griffin: A brood mother of Grimace Eggs. We gotta stop this corporation. We gotta—we gotta Okja these clowns—

Travis: It's real name isn't—

Griffin: Tonight!

Travis: Grimace, that's just the look on its face as it pops out its two-hundredth egg of the day.

Justin: Guys, I'm going to show you—if you'll direct your attention to the console in front of you. I have had a signal rerouted so you can see—

Griffin: I see you've Googled 'Grimace cloaca' here. Do you want to walk us through some of the—

Travis: Oh, no, that's just in his recent searches. Over and over and over—

Griffin: [titters] Wow, over again.

Justin: Do you guys see that? Do you guys see...

Griffin: Nah, man, we can't see anything.

Justin: Oh, hold on. There you go.

Griffin: Oh, nice.

Justin: So we've got zombie—

Griffin: These are—these—

Justin: Hamburgler, Grimace Egg. Birdie Wings... And then you got the—

Travis: Huh.

Justin: It's really good. And these are like... you get 'em in-game too.

Griffin: You get in-game skins with every collectible? Gosh dang it. And Nether Flame Sauce?

Justin: Yeah.

Griffin: Guys...

Justin: Yeah. It's really good.

Griffin: And it's also a grown-up Happy Meal that I get to eat, so I don't have to be jealous of my kids every time they get a happy—every time they get a happy—I know that Happy Meals aren't for us. The amount of great, exciting stuff my kids get in a Happy Meal makes me so... makes me feel jealous, just not for the food, but for the feeling of it.

Justin: Every A Minecraft Movie meal purchased through the McDonald's app also gives fans an in-game bonus at no cost. We covered this.

Travis: Oh, that was close. I thought you were gonna say it gave money to charity, Justin.

Justin: No. God no.

Travis: Whew! That was close. Okay.

Justin: Quote, "When approaching any partnership, we look for the authentic role our brand can play in it." And again, can I just say, for me? Fuckin' nailed it, guys!

Griffin: Yeah, guys.

Justin: Absolutely—

Griffin: Read us-

Justin: Slid in here so organically!

Griffin: Read us for fucking filth, McDonald's! Absolutely, we're dirty fuckin' hogs, and you got us.

Travis: Can I just say though—

Justin: You caught us in the trough! You got us exactly where you wanted us!

Griffin: We're dirt—we're filthy shit pigs and you got us right, McDonald's.

Travis: I love the implication, though, that A Minecraft Movie would come to McDonald's and be like, "We want to partner." And McDonald's would be like, "I don't see an organic way for that to happening. No deal!"

Griffin: "Sorry."

Justin: My nearly—

Travis: "Get out!"

Justin: My nearly forty-year-old brother had to stop his comedy podcast to bust an authentic nut about how excited he is about eating a Happy Meal at McDonald's. You fucking got us.

Travis: You got us.

Griffin: I'm not—

Travis: Organic as hell.

Griffin: I am—I am *not* almost forty. And you will—you retract that! [titters] I am thirty-seven, that's such a—that's basically mid-thirties. So you—

Justin: "So we built upon what they started, our fans, and created a totally immersive experience. A custom a my—a custom A Minecraft Movie meals in our restaurant."

Griffin: [spoofing an Italian accent] "A custom-a Minecraft Movie!"

Justin: [chortles] Minecraft!

Travis: [chortles]

Griffin: Mi amigo!

Justin: "And collectibles that unlock unique in game features."

Griffin: [chuckles]

Justin: "What's special about this campaign—" Oh, you don't have to tell me, but you are, okay. "Is that every component will feel recognizable to both fan bases. A true merging of the McDonald's and Minecraft universes!" These two are inextricable!

Griffin: Yeah, for sure. I mean, yeah! Absolutely, yeah! When you play Minecraft, the order of your ideas goes: I'm gonna make a house. I'm gonna make a swimming pool. I'm gonna make a McDonald's. And I'll live in McDonald's so it'll keep me safe—

Justin: Obviously!

Griffin: From all the—

Justin: I want to make my house. And then a McDonald's!

Griffin: I'll make my house. I'll make my church. I'll make my McDonald's. I am set. Those are—that's my third location right there.

Justin: Hey, thank you so much for listening to our podcast. It's called My Brother, My Brother and Me. We've been doing it for... a very long time. Since Griffin was nearly 30. [titters]

Griffin: No, like way ya—like way, way, way—

Justin: Way, way, way.

Griffin: Way younger, way more vital and fresh. We've only been able to do this show this long—we've been part of other projects and beautiful enterprises. This one has the most longevity, and that's only not, you know, telling tales out of school here, only because of you all. No other show or media thing that I have ever seen or know about, especially in our space, has that sort of, you know, relationship with the—with the audience and the shows that they listen to.

And it's very special, and I'm so grateful. And you can be a part of it and help us make this show, and help us make a bunch of new stuff too! Over at maximumfun.org/join. Pick the shows you listen to. Your money goes straight, straight to 'em. And you get some great bonus content and other gifts too. This is our last episode where we're going to talk about it this year, so if you think about it, do it.

Travis: Yeah, along those lines, can't stress enough, if you're like, "Oh, yeah, I'll do that. Later." Do it now, because time's gonna fly by and we want you to be a part of the Max Fun magic.

Griffin: This is our fourteenth time around the bend. You'll forget. And that's okay, we're not—

Justin: You'll forget, trust—

Griffin: Saying—

Justin: This is fine. Just... just do right now, okay?

Travis: Friday at three PM Eastern Time, we're having a Max Fun East Coast pizza party on The McElroy Family YouTube channel. So make sure you check that out.

Griffin: And if you missed it, earlier today, if you're listening to this on Monday, I did another Fuser stream that is probably the longest I've ever cried laughing on a video before.

Travis: Yup, it was great.

Griffin: It goes way off the rails.

Travis: Oh, and last week we put up—when we were in Phoenix, going on a hike through Dreamy Draw.

Griffin: Yes! If you did not see it—

Justin: Yeah! That was great.

Griffin: Please watch the McElroys go on a hike on The McElroy Family YouTube channel. It's a delight and... I kind of liked it. I kind of liked—

Travis: Yeah. I'd do it again... for money, for content, you know?

Justin: Wow.

Griffin: Wow. A beautiful way to close out our last episode of the drive here on—

Justin: So tasteful, dude.

Griffin: My Brother, My Brother and Me.

Justin: So tasteful.

Griffin: But seriously, thank you all so much. Help us reach our—we have more stretch goals coming that are going to be enticing. Trust.

Travis: Also, would be remiss, and I know that we don't normally do plugs during MaxFunDrive, but next week, we're on tour.

Griffin: Yes!

Justin: My name is Justin McElroy.

Travis: I'm Travis McElroy.

Griffin: I'm Griffin McElroy!

Justin: This has been My Brother, My Brother and Me. Kiss your dad square on the lips.
